Dear Mrs. Peevy:

I was very pleased to receive your letter of January 2nd, making inquiry about your Holliman kin. Several years ago I was in touch with Mrs. Hollis M. McLaughlin, 5222 Homer St., Dallas, Eexas, from whom I obtained considerable data on Charles Stephen Copprell and Sarah Jane H. Copprell.

For your information I have been working on our Holliman line about fifteen years, and have assembled quite a bit of material. I don't think any of our Holliman line have ever worked on the subject as the hunt for information was difficult. I have now fairly well completed the list of descendants of Cornelius Holliman and his children, except for a few blank spots. I am working on the theory that we are descended from Christopher Holliman, (originaly "Hollyman", of Jamestown Virginia, (1611), One or more of his grandsons settled in Johnston and Wake Counties, North Carolina. James Holliman was born there in 1750, and served as a soldier in the Rev. War. He moved to Lancaster County, S.C. in or around 1792 and settled there, and died in 1836. A number of Holliman families left Anson County, N.C. and Landaster County, S.C. in 1835-36 and came to Fayette County, Alabama. One of these families, Warren H. Holliman, moved to Hot Springs Arkansas, in 1840. Dr. Joshua Holliman, a son of Uriah Holliman went there in 1867 and settled. Elijah A. Holliman, son of Uriah also settled in Oklahoma in the 1870s. Several Holliman families went to Choctaw and Carrol Counties, Mississippi in 1836. All were kin, and probably as brothers. Several people in Arkansas, Texas and Kansas have aided me, and I have about 200 pages of a manuscript completed, all except for a few blank spots and connecting links.

I need to go to Lancaster County, S.C., to State Archives at Columbia, S.C., to Wake and Johnston Counties, N.C. and the State Archives at Raleigh, N.C. to assemble materials which I know can be found. However, I am now 77 years of age, with a frail wife, and I cant very well get away from home to do all of these things.

I am enclosing herewith copies of two pages of my book, which you may add to your records. I have a copy of the Lodge Minutes on Charles Copprell. I could use copies of the Pension records you have on Mary Lucas Holliman. Uriah Holliman died at or near Okalona, Miss., but I have been unable to pin it down, I have been to Okalona, and have visited the Confederate Cemetery, but there is nothing there except a lot of markers of "Unknown soldier" on them. Both Uriah, and his two sons Elijah and Charles Daniel died while in the Confederate Army. James Franklin Holliman, buried at Stewart-Holliman Cem. was a 1st Lieutenant in Company "B" of the 58th Ala. Inf. Regt. - the same company that Charles S. Copprell was in. James was captured at Missionary Ridge. John T. Holliman (Hico John) was my grandfather, and is buried at Caine's Ridge Cemetery, 4 miles south of Fayette.

I could use a statistical list of your brothers and sisters, to use in my manuscript, if you have the time to prepare it.

Regarding the question as to relationship with the Cowens, Stewarts, Grahams and Bynums. James Franklin Holliman, my grandfather's brother, married Rebecca Utley Stewart just as soon as he was freed from the Civil War prison at Johnstons Island. Two of her brothers went to Wise County Texas and settled in the 1870s. Both died within a short time but left families who remained there. That is the only connection I know about that might indicate relationships.

When I get a little further along with my manuscript, I am going to have several copoes run off on a duplicating machine, and I will try to send you a copy. In the meantime, if you have any additional data, please let it come forward. I will be glad to answer any questions you may have, i. I have the data at hand. I appreciate your letter, and hope that you will assist me in supplying materials.

Evelyn Robertson, Fayette ala. was kind enough to send me your name and address. I had written to Fayette County Historial Society for any information evailable to my Holleman family History.

My Great Grandmother was Sarah Jane Halliman b. Oct.

3, 1840 to Uriah Holliman and Mary (Lucas) Holliman. Sarah Jane married Charles S. Copprell (b. 2 July 1836 in Lenoa Italy) July 13, 1864. They had 9 children. The Coppell's left Alabama in 1870 for Dade Co. Missouri, later moved to arkansus then to Kaufman Co. Texas, and back to alabama, where my Grandmother Sarah Elizabeth Copprell was born Feb. 23, 1880. Enclosed herewith a copy of a clipping from the Fayette County Newspaper. I do not recall the name of the newspaper, but do not think there is but one newspaper there. The article was written by Mrs. Charlene McGee Foster, who resides at Kennedy, Alabama.

I am also enclosing several sheets from my note wok. (I have other copies). Thse sheets relate to Sarah Jane Helliman Copprell. and this data is all that I have on your great grandwother. If you can supply other data, I would suggest you do so, as I can use all the cata I can get. occurs to me that someone out there should undertake to work up an outline on the Hollimans of Texas, and I am sure we have a lot of relatives there. In 1836 three Holliman families dropped off in Fayette County, Alabama, Others from this family went on to Choctaw and Carrol and settled there. Counties, Mississippi and settled there. One of the three who stayed in Fayette County (Warren Holliman) went to Grant County Arkansas and settled. Then Dr. Jeshua Helliman (brother of Uriah and Elijah) went to Grant County, Arkansas and settled. That left two Holliman families in Fayette County --Charles and Cornelius. Our line is through Cornelius's son Wrish. Charles died in Fayette or Tuscaloosa County, between 1840 and 1850 and left large. His wife was Barbara (or B arbary), said to be a daughter of John Walters, Baptist Preacher. Charles had a sen, Peter Helliman, who moved to Brownsbo: Texas, and had a preacher son. Mrs. McLaughlin remembered that in her childh this preacher son visited them. Some of the Peter Helliman descendants still live around Brownsboro, and a lot of them are buried there. So you see, we have a lot of kinfolks in Texas. My note book is short on information on these folks, and if you can add to the information, I will appreciate it.

One of my grand daughters, Jennifer Youngblood Browne, and husb now reside at Houston, where he is employed by Texas Instruments.

I hope the enclosed data will be of interest to you, and will add to your store of family love. I still work on my family note book, but not as much as I formerly did.
