

Hershey resident is named a Hero of **Emergency Medicine**

Holliman. James *F.A.C.E.P., professor of emergency redicine, Penn State Hershey College of Medicine, was recently recognized by the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) as a "Hero of Emergency Medicine." The campaign, which is part of ACEP's 40th anniversary, recognizes emergency medicine physicians who have made significant contributions to emergency medicine, their communities and their patients.

Holliman was recognized for his Medical Specialty Development Project," which introduced the specialty of emergency medicine to Iraq.

organization. He has earned a Bronze Palm and is currently w toward earning a Gold and Silver Palm.


His Eagle project was to design and build a three-sided wooo for storing firewood a the south campus picnic area of the Evan Free Church for use of the church members.

Holliman has published numerous manuscripts that provide background structure for international emergency medicine development efforts, and has authored five emergency medicine textbooks used as training texts in other countries. His trauma course has been adopted as the standard national emergency medicine trauma training course in five countries. Holliman has traveled extensively to other countries, often at his own expense, to provide training courses and emergency medicine residency development consultations.
