Dec. 10 1840 Frances Duckett vs. Thomas Duckett, Mary Duckett and Rachel Duckett. Partition suit - Joseph Duckett died 22 May 1834, leaving Frances, widow, and three infant children, Thomas age 9, Mary age 8 and Rachel age 6. He owned 2 tracts of land - 214 a. on Duncans Creek, bounded by lands of Major Benj. A. Duckett, James Roberds, John N. Herndon and James Neighbours; 480 a. on Enoree River bounded by above tract, John Odell and Wm. Duckett. Commissioners appointed to make division: Dr. John N. Herndon, Allen S. Shell, James Roberds, Stephen Hillard and Dr. John A. Law. Major Benj. Duckett appointed Guardian Ad litem for the 3 minor children. [Newberry Co. Equity Court Records, Box 1841-16.]

Mar. 3 1845 Mary Duckett, dec'd. Letters of Adm. issued to Benjamin Duckett. Heirs were Frances Duckett, her mother, Thomas Duckett, her brother, and Rachel Duckett, her only sister. The petition shows that Mary was an infant. Her property was her distributive share of her father, Joseph Duckett, dec'd. Estate in the amount of \$1637.92. [Newberry Co. Probate Records, Box 73, Pkg. 186, Est. No 1850.]

Issue of Joseph and Frances (Cookborn) Duckett:

(i.) Thomas "Big Tom" Duckett, aged 9 in 1834 (b. C1824/5); d. May 10, 1890, Abbeville, S.C.; m. Harriet E. (\_\_\_\_), who survived him. He was an heir of James Williams Duckett, whose estate was finally settled in 1881, at which time Thomas was residing in Abbeville Co., and where he later died. Issue, if any, unknown.

(II.) Ann Duckett, b. C1746-47, P. G. Co., Md. (named for her paternal grt. grd-mother); m. by Apr. 1764, prob. in Frederick Co., Md., William Boteler (sometimes spelled, Butler), who was b. C1738, Md. They were left 85 a. of land in Frederick Co., called "Oversight", by her father's will of 1764. On May 29, 1771, "William Boteler of Frederick County, Maryland, farmer", sold to James Sergeant, for 150 pounds, the "Tract of land called Oversight in Frederick County, between Kitocton and Blue Ridge Mountains, beginning at trees of the tract called John and Priscilla taken up by John Hawkins, Junr.", 85 acres. Ann Boteler, wife of William, released her dower rights to the above land. [Frederick Co., Md. Deeds, Liber O, f. 384.] At least one branch of the descendants of this family eventually settled in Tenn. The following issue supplied this compiler by Mrs. Wilburn J. Butler, of Houston, Tex., whose husband is a direct desc.:

(III.) MARGARET DUCKETT

(III.) Margaret Duckett, named for her maternal grd-mother; m. Notley Masters, Fred. Co., Md.; removed to N.C. Margaret was unmarried in 1764, at time of her father's will (and indeed was undoubtedly a minor then), but probably m. by late 1766, when her mother moved to S.C. Her husband was a tobacco planter, & apparently a son or grd-son of William & Ann Masters, of Fred. Co. By deed dated 2 Nov. 1772, Notley Masters of Fred. Co., sold to Townley Bruce for £400., the 197 a. Resurvey of Thorough Fare, his wife Margaret releasing her dower right. [Russell, op. cit., p. 126.] They moved to Wachovia, N.C., immediately thereafter, where they bought 400 a. jointly with the Daniel Smith family, located on Mud-dy Creek (nr. present town of Clemmons). There's no further reference to them in Moravian records. [Ibid.] Issue, if any, unidentified.

It is Mr. Russell's considered opinion that it was simply proximity that led Margaret's mother, Sarah, and because of her, the rest of the family, into Moravianism, as the nearest Anglican church was at Frederick-town, quite a distance away.

(IV.) MARY DUCKETT

(IV.) Mary Duckett, b. Fred. Co., Md.; d. 1805, Newberry Co., S.C.; m. (1) by 1775, one Baruch Williams, quite possibly one of the Maryland Williams, as the father of Hilleary Williams was Baruch Williams, so he very likely had descendants named for him.

Family tradition has it that Mary's husband d. of smallpox during the Revolutionary War, in S. C. At any rate, she m. (2) bef. Mar. 1, 1788 (date she made a deed jointly with her (2) husband, when they sold land to Edward Goree - [Newberry Co., S.C. Deed Bk. J, p. 316.], her 1st cousin, Reginald Odell, son of James and Martha [Prather] Odell. He d. 1805, Newberry Co., and her death followed his in the same year. The children of her (2) m. will be found under the Odell family.

Both Mary and her husband, Reginald (or, "Rignal"), d. intestate. As he d. first, administration was begun on his estate, and papers concerning this [Box 14, Pkg. 31, Newberry Co. Probate Records], give the names of hers and Rignal's children, as heirs: however, as Mary soon d. too, the two estates were combined, and are filed together, but under Mary's estate, her Williams children are also given, in addition to her Odell children, and her son, James Williams was appointed guardian to her minor son (and James' half-brother), John Odell.

Issue of the Williams marriage:

Benjamin and Sarah (Wilson) Duckett. He was named as heir of his cousin, James Williams Duckett, who d. 1860, Sevier Co., Ark., or Newberry Co., S.C. (will filed in latter place). Papers having to do with the settlement of this estate, show that James H. Williams was living in Little River Co., Ark., in 1881 [Newberry Co., S.C. Deed Bk. 1, p. 484, dated, Sept. 20, 1881.] Following we give, in full, a sketch concerning him which appeared in O'Neill and Chapman, op. cit., pp. 647-8, which we have only recently discovered.

"James H. Williams

"James H. Williams was born in Newberry County, S.C., October 4th, 1813, and died at his home, Rocky Comfort, Ark., August 21st, 1892,

in the 80th year of his age.

"His father was James Williams, a native of Newberry. The family was Welsh and immigrated to America with Lord Baltimore's colony. His mother was Isabella Shuttlesworth of English parentage. His grandfather was killed at the siege of Ninety-Six, in the War of the Revolution. His father was a captain in the war of 1812.

"Col. Williams was an entirely self-educated man: not having had in his youth the advantages of a High School or Collegiate education. He seemed to have taken naturally to military life, as he enlisted in Col. Caldwell's Regiment of nullifiers in 1831. He served in 1836 three months in the Indian War in Florida, belonging to Col. Goodwin's Regiment of Cavalry.

In 1837 he was elected Major of the 38th Regiment, South Carolina Militia - resigned in 1843, and in the same year was elected Captain of the McDuffie Artillery at Newberry C.H. In 1846, January 29th, he organized a company for the same war, and was mustered into the service of the United States on the 20th of January, 1847, as Company L of the Palmetto Regiment. Took part in the siege of Vera Cruz and fought at Madelon Bridge, and at the capture of Alvarado. He marched with the army to Puebla and was engaged in the skirmish at the Pass of El Penal. August 8th he moved with Quitman's Division from Puebla in the advance on the City of Mexico. Fought at the battle of Contreras and captured General Mendoza and staff in their retreat. On the same day he was in the heat of the battle at Churubusco. Leading in the storming of Chupultepc and Garita de Belen his troops were the first Americans to make lodgment. He was wounded in this assault. He was amongst the first of the American officers to enter the City of Mexico.

"Soon after the capture of the city the war with Mexico closed and Colonel Williams returned home. He left Mexico in May, 1848, and was discharged from service in July of the same year at Mobile, Ala.

"After his return home he was elected Brigadier-General and then Major-General of Militia. He served four years as Mayor of the town of Newberry; four years as Commissioner of Equity and was a member of the Legislature, House of Representatives, for several terms.

At the beginning of the war between the States he was elected Colonel of the South Carolina Regiment of Volunteers, which regiment went to Virginia in June, 1861, and was engaged in the battle of Bull Run or First Manassas. He served on the Potomac and in the Peninsula until the reorganization of the regiment in 1862. He afterwards commanded the 4th and 9th Regiments, State Troops, and was on duty in Charleston during the siege. He was at Florence and finally surrendered his command as part of Gen. Joe Johnston's Army.

"After the war he was one of the delegates from the State to ask a Provisional Government for South Carolina. He was a member of the State Senate, elected in 1865, until Reconstruction became the order of the time.

"In 1867 he left Newberry and moved to Arkansas, where he engaged in planting, but soon again entered into public life. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1874, and assisted greatly in bringing order and prosperity out of chaos and commercial degradation.

"General Williams was a lawyer by profession. He was married in Newberry in 1844 to Miss Jane W. Duckett. He was the father of eight children, three of whom are living. One son, P. B. Williams, graduated at the Virginia Military Institute as 1st lieutenant, Company A. Another son, J. C. Williams, has held several offices of trust. He, like his father, is a successful planter."

E. Pierce Butler Williams, the third son, and probably the 5th or 6th child; b. Feb. 20, 1854, S.C.; d. Feb. 28, 1921, Foreman, Ark.; m. Feb. 14, 1883, Ark., Lutie S. Shaver, dau. of Col. Robert G. and Addie (Ringgold) Shaver, of Batesville (Independence Co.), and Howard Co., Ark. Information on him and his family was secured by this compiler from the File Room of Virginia Military Institute, Lexington, Va., courtesy of Mrs. George Mohler, File Clerk, in August, 1968. Mrs. Mohler very kindly sent us photocopies of a biography prepared by Pierce Butler Williams, in 1914, for, as we suppose, the Year Book; and a copy of a letter from Mr. B. W. Nichols, Superintendent, to James H. Williams, son of P. B. Williams, dated June 10, 1921, expressing regret at the news of the demise of P. B. Williams, who "Died very suddenly in his law office at Foreman, Arkansas, on the morning of February 28th, 1921." P.B. Williams graduated from VMI in 1879, after which he returned to Arkansas and engaged in farming on Red River, Little River Co., until 1889, when he removed to Rocky Comfort, Sevier Co. He continued farming until 1895; when admitted to the Ark. Bar, Jan. 7, 1897, after which he practised law until his death. He was commissioned Lt. Col. of the Ark. Nat'l. Guard, in 1880; elected Co. Surveyor, in 1898, and served 8 years, and served one term as Mayor of Rocky Comfort, in 1909. He was also a member of Ashdown Lodge #111, I.O.O.F., and served as vice president of the Little River Co. Bar Assn., in 1914.

It is very unlikely that Pierce Butler Williams and Lutie S. Shaver, his wife, ever knew that they were distant cousins, but this compiler is reasonably certain that they were full sixth or seventh cousins, as well as cousins of a more complicated degree, through their mutual Sprigg ancestry. Both were descended from Thomas Sprigg, Sr., and his (1) wife, Katherine (Graves)-Roper Sprigg, (P. B. Williams was thrice descended from them), and he was also descended from the same Thomas Sprigg, Sr., and his (2) wife, Eleanor Nuthall.

In early 1969, Mrs. J. S. Johnson, of Little Rock, mother of this compiler, sent us a full sheet (p. 4E), from the ARKANSAS GAZETTE, dated Jan. 26, 1969, on which appeared a long article by Wilson Powell, with sketches by Craig D-gilvie, and a photo by Bob Reynolds, and which we have since deposited with the library of the Maryland Genealogical Society, Baltimore. The article concerned a no longer extant mansion in Batesville, Ark., built and occupied by John Cadwallader and Elizabeth (Sprigg) Ringgold, from 1827 until his death in a steamboat accident, near Clarendon, on June 17, 1857. Mr. Powell gave considerable genealogical material, including the following. John Cadwallader Ringgold was b. Nov. 15, 1794, at "Ringgold Manor", a 17,000 a. estate at Fountain Rock, near Hagerstown, Md., the 7th generation of a famous and wealthy family of Maryland's Eastern Shore. He was the son of Gen'l. Samuel Ringgold, who d. in 1829, nr. Hagerstown, Md., and his wife, Mary Cadwallader, dau. of Gen'l. John Cadwallader.

John Cadwallader Ringgold came to Ark. about 1820, from Kentucky, and although no statement was made concerning the date and place of his marriage to Elizabeth Sprigg, we suspect that he may well have married her in Ky., and if so, that she was most likely the dau. of Levin Sprigg (b. Mar. 14, 1762), who was in Nelson Co., Ky., in 1800 tax lists, and in Hardin Co., Ky., at least as late as 1820. Levin, son of James and Elizabeth Sprigg, grd-son of Col. Edward and his (1) wife, Elizabeth (Pile) Sprigg, grt. grd-son of Col. Thomas and Margaret (Mariarte) Sprigg, Jr., and grt., grt. grd-son of Thomas and his (1) wife, Katherine (Graves)-Roper Sprigg, Sr., the immigrants. At any rate, whether or not Elizabeth (Sprigg) Ringgold was a dau. of Levin, if she was born &/or married in either Md. or Ky., and she surely was, then she was a descendant of this Sprigg family. Levin Sprigg, incidentally, was the only Sprigg listed in 1800 tax lists for Ky., and he and his children were, so far as we know, the only Spriggs in Ky., as early as the years prior to 1820, when John Cadwallader and Elizabeth (Sprigg) Ringgold were married. Of course, they may have married in Maryland. Levin's father, James Sprigg, d. in Montgomery Co., Md., in 1778. Washington Co., in which Hagerstown is located, is two counties west of Montgomery.

But to return to Mr. Powell's article. He mentions that Col. Robert G. "Fight-

ing Bob" Shaver. was one of two of the "noted" sons-in-law of John Cadwallader Ringgold, and of course, as we have seen, Lutie S. Shaver, wife of Pierce Butler Williams, was a dau. of Col. Shaver. Issue of Pierce Butler & Lutie S. (Shaver) Williams:

Jerusha, believed dau. of Richard and Ruth Fowler, of Newberry Co., S.C., as in Richard's will of 1798, he mentioned his dau. (but not by name), "wife of Josiah Duckett" Her Christian name is shown in Deed Bk. C, p. 412, Union Co., S.C. dated July 14, 1794, when Josiah and Jerusha Duckett sold land to David Smith, Jr. She was sister of Ruth Fowler, who m. Joseph Hill.

Josiah was a Revol. soldier [REVOLUTIONARY RECORDS (ms.), op. cit., AA 1123, 3613.] Records in S.C. concerning him are scarce, but about 1784 (no date given), "Jno., Barbary, Abner, Harold Cain, Jno. Townsend, Josiah Duckett, Mahlon Pearson", were buyers at Estate sale of Jonathan Cain. [OLD NINETY-SIX & ABBEVILLE DISTRICT WILLS AND BONDS, by Willie Pauline Young, p. 62.], and on Aug. 13, 1805, Josias Duckett and Hillary Snellgrove were Bondsmen for James Williams and Baruch Odell, Admrs. of Estate of Mary (Duckett)-Williams Odell. [Newberry Co., Box 14, Pkg. 31, Est. #338.] On Apr. 9, 1827, Josias Duckett, sold 423 a. on the South side of the Enoree, to Joseph Duckett, and the deed says, "Josias Duckett, late of Newberry County, now of Perry County in the State of Alabama, by his attorney, Benjamin Duckett..." [Newberry Co. Deed Bk. U-2, p. 299.]

Mrs. Ruby Adams Bostwick, of Florence, Ala., discovered the following records concerning Josiah's estate and heirs, in Perry Co., and very kindly forwarded them to us...

SEPT. TERM 1832 - "Presley Rhodes, Adm. of Est. of Josiah Duckett, deceased, produced in open Court the within agreement of the heirs and legatees of said decedent, agreeing to sell the real and personal estate of the said decedent - to be filed and recorded."

"This day Presley Rhodes, Adm. of Josiah Duckett, decd., produced in open court an inventory of the sale of the real and personal estate of the said decedent, which is hereby ordered to be filed and recorded."

"Presley Rhodes, Adm. of Estate of Josiah Duckett, returned to the Court an amount of interest - \$74.93 - collected for and belonging to the Estate of said decedent..."

"Presley Rhodes, Adm. of the Estate of Josiah Duckett...after paying debts of said deceased and allowances and expenses of administration, does state that the sum of \$3,065.31 1/4 is now subject to distribution among the heirs of the said Josiah Duckett... It is therefore ORDERED AND DIRECTED that the sum of \$613.06 1/4 be, and the same is hereby distributed to each heir hereinafter named, to-wit:

- Dec. 9 1786 Jacob Duckett purchased for 50 lbs. Sterling, 50 a. on S. side of Enoree River, from Samuel Bishop and Mary, his wife, all parties of Laurens Co. Land originally granted to Charles King & Charity his wife, on Nov. 5, 1755, sold to Samuel Bishop on Nov. 23, 1769. Wit: Samuel Bishop (Jr.?), Joel Whitten, John Odell. [Laurens Co. Deed Bk. B, p. 44.]
- May 17 1796 Margaret Edmondson of Union Co., S.C., acknowledges debt of \$100. to Jacob Duckett and deeds 1200 a., formerly property of her late husband, Isaac Edmondson. Wit: Thomas Gitzendanner, John Dillard, Mary Kennedy. [Union Co., S.C. Deed Bk. D, p. 375.]

A paucity of records in Laurens and Newberry Co's., in Jacob's name, indicate that he may have left the Province, or at least, the area, early. Family tradition has it that "one of the brothers", presumably this Jacob, removed to Buncombe Co., N.C., and that later he or, more probably, a son, settled in Habersham Co., Ga., c1823. The Ducketts below are almost certainly descendants of this Jacob Duckett, Jr., and others may have been the Ducketts of Madison Co., N.C. (where a mountain is locally known as "Duckett's Bald"), and of Haywood Co., N.C.

Equity Records, Bill No. 17, shows that the husband of the above Mary Duckett, was Richard Duckett. He is listed in the 1800 census for Laurens Co. [THE SECOND FEDERAL CENSUS 1800 SOUTH CAROLINA, LAURENS COUNTY (1959), University of South Carolina, Columbia, p. 8], as being between ages of 26-45, with one son under 10, his wife 16-26, and 1 dau., under 10, and living 3 doors away from the widow "Alse Whitmore".

He rose from the rank of Lt. to Brig.-Gen., during the Revolution, and later served as S.C. state Senator from Newberry Dist., and was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives for 8th, 9th and 10th Congresses. [Biographical Directory of the American Congress (1949 ed.), p. 373; also, Biographical Directory of the Senate of South Carolina, 1776-1964, by Reynolds and Faunt (1964), which gives some slightly different and additional information.] Mrs. Andrew J. Darby of Florence, Ala., wrote an interesting and informative article on the Casey family for the April, 1960 issue of the Daughters of The American Revolution Magazine, pp. 277-8.

As a teacher he was studious in preparing to meet his classes, careful in his instruction, and critical in his examinations; but just to his pupils... In 1859, Prof. Casey went to Greensboro, Ala., as a professor of ancient languages in the Southern University. He remained at Greensboro until 1876, when he went to Pulaski, Tenn., where he had a position in Martin College. From Pulaski, he went to Montgomery, Ala., where he had a private school for several years. He then opened a private school at Auburn, Ala., and died there in 1888 (sic)."
