The following findings were transcribed from original parish records by Fred Cooper at the church in Abbots Leigh. I understand, though, that a fire there destroyed many others.

Yes, I'm glad you asked me that and was prepared for your question.

"Holman" is most common over the centuries in both Cornwall and Devon, naturally due to the spoken word towards the counties to the south of Somerset.

"Holiman;" "Holliman," Holyman" and "Hollyman," however, appears to have been the norm, in comparison with "Holman," from Somerset to the west, north and east.

As the name evolved to "Holyman" from its original Anglo-Saxon forms it then progressed to different transcriptions in different areas throughout Great Britain due to both dialectical and language variations within particular localities.

Furthermore, as population movement took place, some "Hs" moved to other "H" places; so one could find a number of "H" families in small areas using different ways to spell their names.


