

The John Hollyman of Northampton Co., VA died in 1650 shortly before our antecedents arrived, was apparently a bachelor (I have seen a note that his wife in England had died) as his will left all of his possessions to male friends.

*(There was a Chris. Charles Holleman but he was s/o Chris, Jr. Both Sr. & Jr. made their marks with a large 'C', not an 'X', leading some to think it was an initial.)

I have found records of my maternal grandmother's Little family, whose name was Kleijne when they arrived from the Netherlands. And have records of my paternal grandmother's Adams family back to New England. I've been told they were related to John and Samuel. Uh? Even this little grain of salt, spices up my glass of wine. But I'd like to believe that...

I won't apologize for the history lesson but will for being so damn wordy - it's just my style.

Hi Allen

I am very happy to get your e-mail offering to help me with researching the Hollomans who lived in Wake County before 1807. I definitely will appreciate all the help I can get.

I have suspected that the James Holliman listed in Wake Co. in the 1790 census might have been James Granston Holliman.

The records I found for James Holloman in Wake Co may be for 2 different James. There are actually 2 records in 1793 both having to do with the James Holloman who had moved to Bladen Co, NC and was turning over his claim/rights to a few slaves in Wake Co. Presumably he had rented out the slaves to Wake Co. residents before he moved and essentially was not going to come back to get them. He was letting his friend Hobson try to get them if Hobson could. I looked in Bladen Co. records and found that a James and Samuel Holloman appeared in those county records shortly after 1790. I figured they were likely James Granston and his brother Samuel. However, the descendents of James Granston do not seem to claim them.

Wake County court minutes

Jun 1777 - James Holloman - bought land from Richard and Thomas Bridges and the transfer of the deed was approved and the approval was recorded in the minutes of the court.

Nov 1793 - James Holloman of Bladen Co, sold slaves located in Wake Co. to friend Charles Hobson

I do not know who the William Holloman who lived in Wake County in 1800 was but I do speculate on who he might have been. However, he had 4 children under the age of 10 and 3 under the age of 16 and 8 slaves. This means he was not all that young, probably 35-40 and he was pretty well off to have 8 slaves. Thomas and Millie's children were most all under age 26, much younger than William's and they were poor like Millie and Thomas had been. From these facts I conclude William is not

likely to have been a son of Thomas and Millie.

I suspect that William may have been the brother of Blake Holloman who lived in Franklin Co. NC. Blake and brother William were the sons of Edmund Holloman who with his own brother named William were the two sons of Robert Holloman and his wife Mary who had moved to Granville Co. NC in 1847. Robert died there in 1749. Robert's brother William (this is the third and oldest of that name in this family) moved to Granville Co. about 1751 and was living there until 1769 when his brother John's will was probated. John had lived in Northampton Co. NC in 1757 when he sold land that had belonged to Robert to Robert's son Edward. By 1766 John apparently was living in Granville Co. and I reckon died there in 1769.

Bute Co was split off from Granville Co .in 1764 and in 1771 a William Holloman sold land in Bute Co. to Kitchen Prim. In 1770 a Harmon Holloman also sold land to Prim in Bute Co. and some claim the land of Harmon and this William Holloman were close together. This William and Harmon knew each other as Harmon apparently had borrowed money from William, according to court minutes. Was this William one of the two older Williams who had lived in Granville Co. or some other William who might have been kin to Harmon?

This Harmon Holloman I think was the son of the older of the two Christopher Hollomans who lived in Bertie County between 1727-1760. A lot of researchers claim the older one was Charles (Christopher Charles) grandson of Christopher Holloman I. Helen Leary disagrees but does say the younger of these Christophers was the son of Charles (not named Christopher Charles as many claim) but she does not know where the older one comes from. Records say Harmon was living in Granville Co. in 1760 and in Johnston Co. in 1770 when he sold the land in Bute Co. Anyway, after Wake Co. was formed in the early 1770s, both Harmon and William Holloman begin appearing in records there often in the same quarter session next to each other. Does that mean they are some how connected? There was one 1777 case where Ralph Holderfield/Hollifield, Harmon Holliman and my Thomas Holliman are all named as Guarnishees in a case BIRD vs Chrs'r (Christopher) Hollimon. Researchers or

abstractors seem to think Chrs'r was deceased and the case was about a debt he owed to BIRD. There must be some connection between these men but William Holliman is not named meaning he is not connected to them?

In any case, I tend to favor the idea that the William Holloman in the 1800 census was the the William Holloman, brother of Blake Holloman from Franklin Co. rather than one of the William Hollomans who appear in the 1770s and 1780s Wake county records but who knows?

As for Samuel Sr, I guess you are referring to the one in Johnston Co. as opposed to the ones in Bertie Co. I suspect my Hollomans come from the Bertie County group and are associated with one of the Christophers in that county. I have seen no records that associate my Thomas with Hollomans that I can feel sure were from the Johnston Co. or with friends who are associated with Hollomans from Johnston Co. However, there are so many Hollomans in NC in the 1700s that I have no idea where they came from and how they are related that I cannot be comfortable in ruling them out quite yet.

I do not know how much of my research on my own family you know. So I will try to recapitulate what I have been able to determine.

I have been able to sort out the decedents of my ggg-grandfather Edmund Holloman and his wife

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Mary Barrett who were both born in Wake County near Raleigh between 1773-1785. I am fortunate to have found biosketches of two of Edmund's children that were printed in the mid to late 1800s, one in a book about Missouri state legislators from the mid 1800s about their oldest son and the other in a Goodspeed book that was about the husband of their youngest daughter, and also her, from the late 1880s. There also is a depository of 16 boxes of pictures and stories and diaries from the family of one of Edmund's granddaughters, copies of letters family members wrote to each other in the 1930s trying to gather the family history and genealogy info, and several CDs of the research gathered by other family genealogists between 1950-1990 containing scans of old letters, newspaper articles and obituaries from old newspapers, copies of pages from the Family Bible of one of their sons, etc. I have an extensive collection of pictures of their children and grandchildren gathered from many of their descendents I have contacted since the early 2000s.

While I have been able to collect lots of information about the descendents of Edmund Holloman and his wife Mary Barrett, the information about their parents, siblings, aunts, uncles, grandparents and any family genealogy from NC and before from all of these sources is very limited. The gist of it is that Edmund and Mary married in Raleigh, NC, and their oldest son Allen W. Holloman was born within a year or two on Jan 1, 1805. The couple left Wake County headed west after Allen was born and Edmund had two brothers who left Wake county with him while there had been an older brother who had previously died. According to one of their grandchildren, that older brother had been a Rev. War soldier killed in the war but I do not believe that legend as Edmund was born between 1773-1775 and what I have found about his likely siblings indicates they were born after he was. Abner, the second son of Edmund and Mary, was born in Tennessee in 1807. While in Tennessee Edmund's brothers are thought to have struck out in other directions before Edmund, Mary and Mary's younger brother joined a wagon train led by a man the family called Bent Counts and headed west looking for land in the recently acquired Louisiana Territory. They arrived in the Cape Girardeau district of what became MO and began to setup their homesteads shortly before the New Madrid earthquakes struck in southern MO in Feb of 1811. Apparently, they were traumatized by the effects of the quakes which ended in early 1812. By the end of 1812, they and most of their neighbors who had come with them from Tennessee moved north of the devastated area to an area in the Sainte Genevieve district of MO that was called the New Tennessee Settlement where they successfully established new homesteads. I have not been able to discover if the name New Tennessee Settlement was given to that area before they came to settle it or after. However, I suspect the name came after and was given because it was the second settlement for this group of migrants from the state of Tennessee. Much of this information is in those biosketches published in the mid to late 1800s, but the part about Bent Counts and the siblings of Edmund and Mary comes from family stories.

After sorting out what happened to Edmund and Mary and their children following their move to Missouri, I have turned my attention to NC to see what I can figure out. In Wake Co. records I found that a Thomas Holloman died in 1796 leaving a widow Millie, and sons Edmund, Benjamin and Samuel. In addition there were records that indicated Benjamin was the bondsman when Edmund and Mary married in 1804 and that there likely was a sister named Telitha who married in 1806 with Edmund Holloman being the Bondsman. A Wake county court minutes record in 1801 indicated that a 4 year old orphan girl Polly Holloman was apprenticed to her grandmother Millie Holloman and in the same quarter session another orphan William Holloman was apprenticed to some un-named person. I suspect that William was the brother of Polly and grandson of Millie as two children of corresponding ages were found in the household of Millie Holloman in the 1800 Wake county census. The census record indicated that Millie was over age 45 in 1800. Another court record indicates that Millie Holloman married Jesse Rowland in 1804.

He was likely the Jesse Rowland who was also over 45 and who was listed in the 1800 census for Wake County and the 1802 Wake county tax record just above Edmund Holloman. According to descendents of Jesse Rowland, he moved his family to Warren County Kentucky between 1806-1810. For reasons I do not understand, the descendents of Jesse Rowland have ignored the marriage record of 1804 to Millie Holloman and do not include Millie as one of his wives. Presumably Millie was the over 45 female listed in his household in 1810 in Warren Co. KY. I wonder if the young female under 15 in the household was Millie's granddaughter Polly Holloman. However, Rowland descendents claim she was Jessie Rowland's own daughter named Polly Rowland who was born about 1795 and died Jan. 1825 in Monroe Co. MO. When Jessie Rowland died in 1828 in Warren Co. KY, his will did not mention a wife and it left his estate to be divided between 3 of his sons James, Archibald, Jesse

Rowland. Postings by Rowland descendents indicate Jesse's son Archibald was living in Washington County, MO in the 1820s. Washington County MO is located about 50 miles west of Ste. Genevieve Co. where Edmund Holloman and his family had settled and Washington Co. had been part of Ste. Genevieve County until 1813. My family in Missouri had dealings with people in Ste. Genevieve Co, St. Francis Co, Washington Co., Iron Co., Madison Co., and Perry Co. When I go to Missouri, I have to research in all of those counties in order to understand how my family interacted with each other and with their many friends whose lives were intertwined with theirs. It has taken me many years and trips to MO. I am afraid there will need to be many trips to NC in my future if I am to make any head way in my quest to unravel Thomas' and Mary's family genealogy. But that is not likely to happen for at least another year. So any help from you is greatly welcomed.

I will leave off here. There is much more but what I have given above is probably too much for you to digest right now. Later I will send you more e-mails with early NC - Wake Co. record abstracts in chronological order for you to consider. Meanwhile, maybe you have some questions about what I have written or some info to add. I have made two trips to the NC State Archives, one in 2007 and one in 2011. I do have copies of some tax records and some land records but I know it will take records about the friends of Hollomans in order to figure things out. Right now, I am just not sure which ones I will need to investigate.

Lynn, some time

ago, I saw Amelia Holliman on the 1800 Wake census records and was surprised to find any Hollymans here (I'm in Raleigh) before Jesse, Jr. and John in about 1804-05. Also a William Holliman, young adult with wife and children: under 10 and teenagers. I was juggling so many things, I just made notes to look further later. Then in the 1790 saw a Thomas H. and James H. both with families and thought she'd have been married to one of them - but which? Were they brothers..., cousins? Last week, Jeanette sent a note to Denise and I to not add anything more to these records pending more from you and shared your emails so we'd understand why and to show your works and reasoning. D. & I are both generalist editors on the Hollyman Tree - the other editors are so specialized they wouldn't be relevant to this. We two also have our specialties as well and my main one is Wake and surrounding counties. I had no idea that you were from any line in Wake and frankly was very glad to see your work - which is very good and impressive. It answered a lot of questions as well as brought up more of them, as almost always happens, eh? Such as, "who were these folks and where did they come from?" I thought you might have the answer to that. I agree with you that Joe's thoughts about them being from Joseph, Jr. was a tad off base but we can't be too hard on him as he has done so much excellent work and so much in times barely less 'primitive' than George's in compiling "The Hollyman Family" in the 40's & 50's. And I can see his reasoning but I see two other more likely possibilities. Both from Christopher III (& Margaret Bird), son of C.H., Jr. (& Susannah Vassar). One is from Samuel, Sr. as there are sons: Thomas and James. Neither of which we have any records on. The other, which seems more likely to me, is from son Edmund as Thomas and Amelia had a son named Edmund, presumed for his grandfather. (I use the full Amelia as it's such a beautiful name). Could the William H. be Millie and Thomas' son? If they were M. in 1772 it would be tight. Might they have been m. earlier? Also with a wife Millie? And it appears there were children older than Polly and William... Sometimes, for lack of solid sources, we just have to use some logic or anecdotal evidence. But with the work you have done, you just might have the answer. I have no intention to 'update' these records in the Tree but would like to get my own records up to date and correct. I would hope we can work

together on this or anything else relevant. I will be in the NC Archives this afternoon and fairly often and maybe I can be your eyes and legs for anything specific you might want or need. I was so pleased to see some of your excellent work and look forward to more. I look forward to hearing from you. -Allen

Lynn, Even though files are visible on link above - the act of finding them on line is very difficult at first but it gets better as you use these links which are at LDS but obscure. I can teach you how to do it if you are interested. I added today more Rev War docs to James Grantson on the Hollyman tree - they are at Ancestry and much easier to find than those at LDS. I only downloaded and uploaded them today as all the old Civil War pensions I used to get into at Ancestry are now blocked unless you have paid Fold 3 - what a rip off from Ancestry! I wish I had downloaded and uploaded originals of all of those I wanted when I found them long ago but never thought Ancestry would block access.

Anyway, my thoughts on James Grantson at this point are very confused. It appears to me that the James in the 1793 slave deed record possibly did not live in Wake as his slaves were in Nash and he was in Bladen. Looks like Hobson who was his lawyer/friend/representative did live in Wake so the papers were filed there.

Here is the link from Ancestry to read James Grantson of Rev War. 8 pages to flip through and all are on the tree now. Lynn, please do stay in touch. I have some other very early Holleman documents which I can't at this point attach to anyone and would appreciate sharing and your input and ideas. Denise

In the birth list I mentioned, I looked more closely last night with a good magnifying glass and realized it was only the births written in the same hand. The only death originally written was...

Thomas Atkins was born 4th January 1762 and departed this life 5th Feb'y 1803.

(As if it were an entry in a family Bible - as all of the births were & noted looking like with a quill or pen with a slightly wide nib. The deaths were added later in a different hand and different stylus. The paper is folded into quarters with all of these on one quarter and another listing several other children's births with no last name, more on that later. The paper is dark, fragile and tattered and as the original had Lydia Holloman just after Lewis makes me wonder & suspect her as a daughter. Continuing...)

(*Indicates a different hand after.)

Penny Lane Atkins was born 6th January 1774 * & died 25th February 1842

Polly James Atkins was born 5th Nov 1796

(I tried to ascribe Janice or something else to the James but it is exactly the same as James below. Maybe just having gotten ahead in thought.)

John James Atkins was born 17th March 1802

Lewis Holloman was born 25 th day November 1774*
Died 6th September 1853

Lydia Holloman was born 6th Sept 1808

William H Holloman was born 13th June 1812 *
Died 14th October 1895 (sic, '94 is correct)

Elizabeth Holloman was born 11th
unreadable departed this life _____ (page tattered)

The deaths appear to be in the same hand but different from births and were added much later.
William's brother, Joseph John is on a third page in the original hand:

Joseph J(ohn) was born 10th May 1815

I found Lydia Holloman m. Bennet Ragan on 8 November 1827, bondsman: Zachariah Mobley and witness B. S. King (he was a clerk of court & witnessed many)
Bennitt Ragan is listed in the 1830 census with wife, both in their 20's (she was 22) and slaves: male

& female in 20's & F under 4. They were in the central part of Raleigh.

I didn't find him in 1840 nor 1850 in Wake in any of the various spellings of the name.

Lewis stated in census that he was born in NC BUT Jeddia was still recorded in VA in 1774, so he was apparently born in VA.

There are, as mentioned, four others noted in the original hand:

Anna was born 7th March 1800

Lucy was born 15th May 1818

Harry was born 13th September 1798

Jiney was born 28th August 1803

Christopher Hollyman (#2, the real Chris Jr.)(the one married to Susannah Vasser): I noticed one record attached to him was titled "Christopher Charles Hollyman". I removed it. Just because he signed with a "C" as his mark doesn't mean he had a middle initial of "C". (Yeah, I've been saying this for some time, it seems all the Chris' signed with a BIG C. And it always different from the C in Christopher by the clerk or... As a former practitioner of calligraphy, I've studied things like that. I think George was the first to stick Charles on him, misconstruing the C mark.)

The Christopher Charles Holloman married to a Mary and secondly Jane McGlohon was referred to as Charles in his father's will. In land transactions, etc he is referred to as Christopher. To cover my bases, I put his name as Christopher Charles Holloman. If you disagree with that, we can certainly add a comment to his timeline stating that and why. I am always okay with that and it is important to bring attention to your thoughts so others can consider that point for themselves as well. That way they know the name is not certain.

(if there ever was a Christopher Charles, it would likely have been this one, C #3)

Probably Christopher Hollyman did not move, as the line change put him in Bertie County, NC. Many of the descendants of Christopher also lived in Bertie County, NC for many years.

(I thought we resolved this a year or so ago when I dug up and examined old maps. Chris 2 & 3, were in NW IoW on property inherited that was part of Chris 1's 1020 acres, about 35 miles from the border. When the dust settled on the line dispute, only a few east-west linear miles had been moved north only a mile or so. Here is an article about that. I have several others that are more 'academic'. This one is more fun!

...the James Holliman who was listed in the Wake Co. NC census as being James Granston Holliman. This was something I had suggested as being likely in a posting to the Hollyman Group some years ago. At that time no one responded. (I don't think anyone knew how to respond, then almost all still had him as Jesse's son and I was sayin' who th' hell is this JGH everybody is so worked up about? And when I found out, then looking at the dates, could see and said, "There ain't no way...") So I am glad to learn that at least you seem to have agreed with me. He moved to Bladen Co. by 1793 according to Wake Co. records and there are Bladen records that show both James and Samuel Holliman showing up in Bladen Co. in the early 1790s. (I'm pretty sure this is a case - unlike Bertie - where the county line change caught up with the person. JGH was in Johnston when a large part of new Wake Co. was formed in 1771, from a big chunk of JoCo, as they call themselves today.)

I don't know if this helps, I think it might. -A.

Hi All,

I do apologize for interrupting your weekend again, but we have a discovery that changes the flow of our tree. The emails have been flying between Denise, Lynn Fusinato, Joe Parker, and myself. In Joe's defense, he has been rather quietly watching from the sidelines, but is aware of the events. I can just hear the wheels turning in his brain.

As you know, Denise has been obtaining very informative documents that we have needed for the "top of the tree" , or what I fondly refer to as "the vast void". In particular we had problems with

We struggled and struggled with (what was) Christopher Charles Holloman's widow Mary becoming the wife of John Proctor and then Christopher next marrying Jane McGlohon. How could he have a widow and then remarry?? Denise and Lynn Fusinato figured out what Helen Leary was trying to say in her article. Christopher Charles Holloman was just Charles. Charles was only married to Mary who later married John Proctor. They had Christopher B1712, Benjamin Harrison Holloman B1714 and Edmund B1716. Samuel and Harmon were also listed. They were in the wrong place.

There is another Christopher Holloman. He was born 1690-1694 and died 1766 in Hertford, NC. This Christopher is referred to as Senior in records. The confusion lies in that this Christopher Sen. arrived in Bertie County about the same time as Christopher Jr. B1712. Christopher Sr was not Christopher Jr's father. Christopher Jr's father is Charles. Christopher Sr that was born 1690-1694 married an unknown person and is the father of Samuel Holloman Sr B1718 and Harmon b1729. These children are linked to him by Bertie deeds. After Christopher Sr's first wife died, he married Jane McGlohon.

We do not know who Christopher Holloman Sr's parents are, but Denise is working fast and furious to try to find records to link him.

I have a feeling that this is very confusing and will be happy to attempt to answer your questions to the best of my ability.

In the birth list I mentioned, I looked more closely last night with a good magnifying glass and realized it was only the births written in the same hand. The only death originally written was...

Thomas Atkins was born 4th January 1762 and departed this life 5th Feb'y 1803.

(As if it were an entry in a family Bible - as all of the births were & noted looking like with a quill or pen with a slightly wide nib. The deaths were added later in a different hand and different stylus. The paper is folded into quarters with all of these on one quarter and another listing several other children's births with no last name, more on that later. The paper is dark, fragile and tattered and as the original had Lydia Holloman just after Lewis makes me wonder & suspect her as a daughter. Continuing...)

Penny Lane Atkins was born 6th January 1774 * & died 25th February 1842

Polly James Atkins was born 5th Nov 1796

(I tried to ascribe Janice or something else to the James but it is exactly the same as James below. Maybe just having gotten ahead in thought.)

John James Atkins was born 17th March 1802

Lewis Holloman was born 25 th day November 1774*
Died 6th September 1853

Lydia Holloman was born 6th Sept 1808

William H Holloman was born 13th June 1812 *
Died 14th October 1895 (sic, '94 is correct)

Elizabeth Holloman was born 11th
unreadable_____ departed this life_____ (page tattered)

The deaths appear to be in the same hand but different from births and were added much later. William's brother, Joseph John is on a third page in the original hand:

Joseph J(ohn) was born 10th May 1815

I found Lydia Holloman m. Bennet Ragan on 8 November 1827, bondsman: Zachariah Mobley and witness B. S. King (he was a clerk of court & witnessed many)
Bennett Ragan is listed in the 1830 census with wife, both in their 20's (she was 22) and slaves: male

& female in 20's & F under 4. They were in the central part of Raleigh.
I didn't find him in 1840 nor 1850 in Wake in any of the various spellings of the name.

Lewis stated in census that he was born in NC BUT Jeddia was still recorded in VA in 1774, so he was apparently born in VA.

There are, as mentioned, four others noted in the original hand:

Anna was born 7th March 1800

Lucy was born 15th May 1818

Harry was born 13th September 1798

Jiney was born 28th August 1803

Perry Holleyman Family

Perry Holleyman (b. in Hancock Co., Ga., Aug. 7, 1833) was a son of Daniel A. Holloman and Rebecca Griffin Holloman.

Leaving his family in Georgia in 1853, he came to Texas. At Mt. Calm he m. Mary Jane Chaffin on the first Sunday in July, 1856. Mary was the daughter of Eli Chaffin (deceased) and Mrs. Lavena Chaffin Parker. They moved onto the land Mary inherited from the Eli Chaffin Estate. After one year, they sold that acreage and moved to Pruitt Tan Yard, where life was interrupted by the War Between the States.

Perry volunteered and was a farrier with the Anderson County Deer Hunters, which became known as Co. 1, Seventh Regt., Texas Mounted Volunteers. They were sent to New Mexico. Perry was wounded at Valverde and was left at the Socorro Hospital. He was taken prisoner and paroled at Santa Fe Hospital, Aug. 19, 1862, and was sent home.

The Holloman name was changed by Perry to read Holleyman. The family moved to Cherokee County, and Perry began to preach at various locations. While living in the New Hope area, he organized the church that bears his name, Holleyman Chapel.

Perry and Mary were the parents of (1) Sarah Emeline, no record; (2) David, "Uncle Bud;" (3) Rhoda Ellen, m. Samuel Houston McCracken; (4) Christopher C., infant buried at Pleasant Grove; (5) Flora, m. a Smith; (6) Mary Edna, m. an Earp; (7) Susan Rebecca, m. a Burns; (8) Eli Daniel, m. Ella Darden; (9) William Lafayette, infant buried at Pleasant Grove; (10) John J., m. Elnora Batten; (11) Savuna Caroline, m. W. G. Vaughn; (12) Terry Lilly, m. G. E. Brunson; (13) Lucy Ora, no record.

In April, 1903, Mary d., is buried at Pleasant Grove. Perry m. Mrs. N. D. Griffin, a widow with five children. They moved to New Mexico for two years, then moved to Hubbard, Tex., where he d. in 1924. Perry and N. D. had one daughter, Lester. On his 91st birthday Perry was given a party. Seven of his children, 88 grandchildren, and 128 great-grandchildren were at the party.

In the late 1860's Perry's mother, Rebecca, and three brothers, Frank, Lewis Monroe, and Charlie D., came to Cherokee Co., Tex. C. Frank m. Melvira Hendrick on Sept. 9, 1869. A sister, Eline Bales, and her daughter also came to Cherokee Co., Tex. Perry's mother d. Aug. 15, 1871, and was buried by the roadside near Mt. Hope. Today this is deep in the woods, because the road has been abandoned and Mt. Hope Cemetery and Church are located to the north of her grave. — Evelyn Bolton Ezell.
