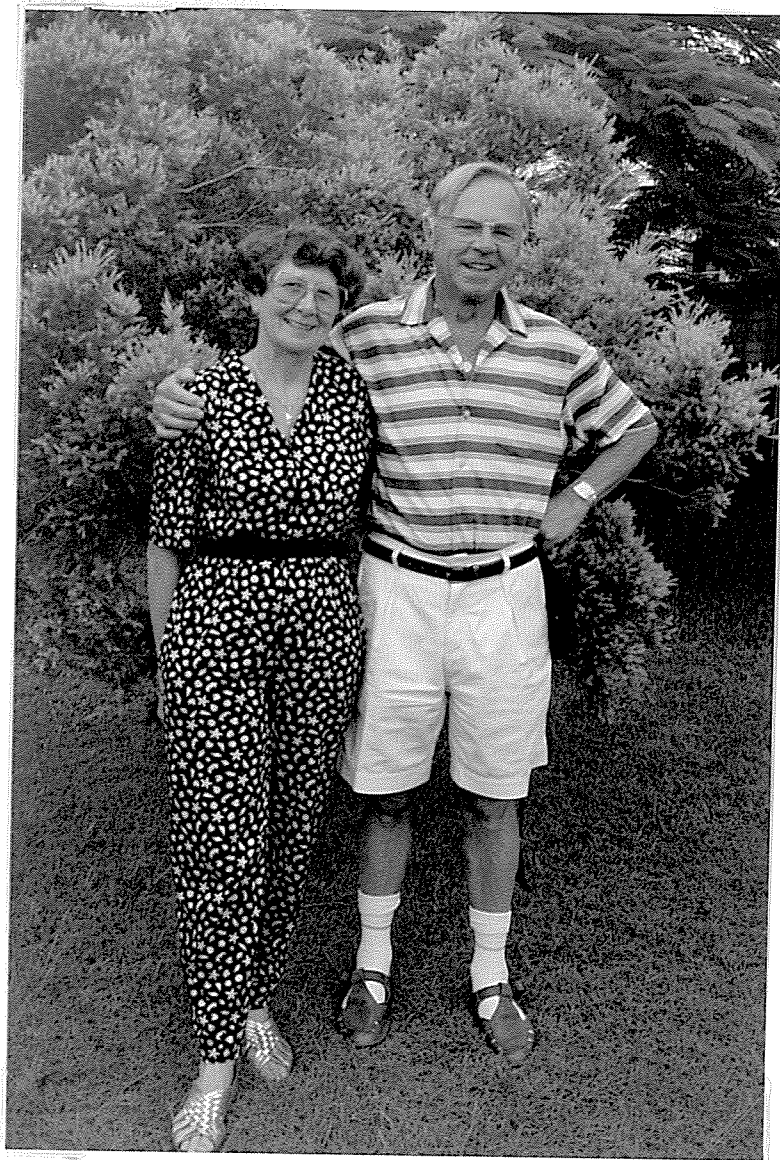

When We were English, Part XIII

A Visit to Fred Cooper of Bristol, England - a Hollyman Family Researcher Extrordinaire by Glenn N. Holliman



As I have written on more than one occasion, meeting and visiting with cousins, near and far, is one of the delights of family history. Thanks to a generous introduction by Bob Hollyman-Mawson, an English cousin who lives in Wales, my wife and I enjoyed a November 2011 day touring with Fred Cooper, a retired engineer, living in Bristol, England.

Although the showers flowed from the heavens during much of our expedition, we all three enjoyed a pub lunch and looked upon the many monuments of Hollymans in Somerset who have lived before us.

In 2011, Fred Cooper with an ubiquitous British umbrella led us on a fascinating tour of various cemeteries and parish churches where his wife's ancestors, Hollymans, are resting. This photo was taken at the parish church in Abbots Leigh on a hill overlooking the Gordano Valley.

Fred's late beloved wife, Sheila Wallace Cooper, is a Hollyman, descended through her mother, Caroline Hollyman Wallace, late of Abbots Leigh, a small farming community west of Bristol, Somerset, England.

Right, Fred and Sheila on their wedding day in the 1952. It proved to be a most happy marriage producing two surviving sons. Sheila's grandfather was Alfred William Hollyman and great grandfather, John Hollyman. All were farmers living in the community of Abbots Leigh in Somerset.

Since the 1700s, this family of Hollymans have lived also in other Somerset villages such as Kenn, Clevedon and Clapton overlooking and in a picturesque valley known as Gordano. Today the busy M-5 runs through the lush green valley south to

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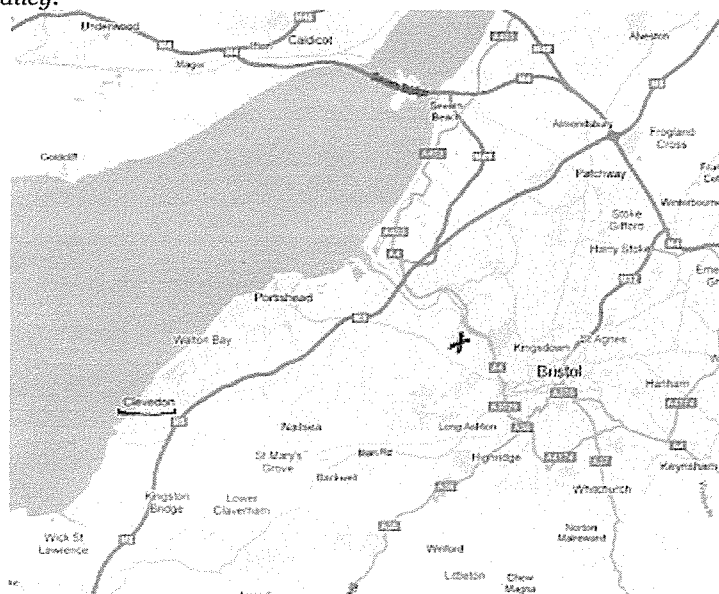

In the 1800s, part of the family crossed the Severn Estuary, and settled in Wales, ancestors of Peter Hollyman of Pwllheli, whose story and pictures were displayed in an early blog article. (Go to the Archives feature of this blog and type in Peter's name to refresh one's memory.)



Below the map helps our understanding of places. X marks the location of Abbots Leigh, just west of Bristol, England. Further west and south is Clevedon, where another major Hollyman branch settled and thrived. The body of water bordering Clevedon is the Severn Estuary which divides England from Wales. Note the major motorway, the M5 running north and south through the Gordano Valley.

Maxine Wright makes available a Warren Holliman Family History

Holliman cousin, Maxine Wright, recently sent me a booklet prepared several decades ago by the late Mavis Williams and the late Chester Bullock, a Baptist minister. Most of this 65 page manuscript highlights the life of Warren Holliman and his descendants in Arkansas. Ms. Williams was a great granddaughter of Warren Holliman (1801-1876), one of the three Holliman brothers who left Lancaster County, South Carolina in 1836 to move their families to Alabama.

Warren was restless and after several years, left his brothers Charles and Cornelius in Alabama and moved his family and others by wagon train to Arkansas in 1840. The brother, Charles Holliman, is Maxine's great

Criminals in your family? Surely not?

The following newspaper extracts show how some of our ancestors, in the first half of the 19th century, were, unhappily, the victims of crimes, either from muggings and highway robberies whilst travelling; or from burglaries in their houses or shops. Despite the awful deterrent of capital punishment or transportation, many of these crimes were very violent and must have been shockingly frightening for the victims. Some of the robberies from houses resulted in the theft of a considerable amount of property. Substantial rewards were frequently offered for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the offenders, and the stolen property (especially jewellery) was then often listed in great detail. The audacity, or desperation of the crimes, is well illustrated by the fact that the value of just one stolen item was usually sufficient to sentences a convicted person to death.

Saturday, 6th December, 1817*

"We have received the following account of a robbery at Kenn, Somerset – about seven o'clock on Tuesday evening last, Mrs. HOLLYMAN, hearing a knock at her door, opened it, when a quantity of quick-lime was thrown in her face and she was immediately seized and dragged to the cellar, she supposes, by three men. The villains then tied a handkerchief over her mouth, her hands across, and her gown over her head, and whilst one of them, armed with a poker, stood over her, uttering the most dreadful threats, they plundered the house and shop of property to a considerable amount. They remained in the house for eight hours, during the greater part of which time they were seated around the fire, regaling themselves with bread and cheese and wine. Of the latter they drank eight bottles. Mrs. Hollyman contrived to free herself about six o'clock and alarmed her neighbours, but the thieves had got clear off. A Reward of £50 (subscribed by Mrs. Hollyman's friends) has been offered for the apprehension of the offenders."

(In the same edition of the newspaper, the Reward of £50 is advertised together with a list describing all the articles stolen from Mrs. Hollyman.)

"FIFTY POUNDS REWARD

WHEREAS the House of Mrs. HOLLYMAN of Kenn in the County of Somerset was on Tuesday night last, the 2nd of December, feloniously entered by two or three Persons, who after knocking at the door, and throwing lime in the face of the said Mrs. Hollyman, robbed the House of the following articles viz:

One silver Tea-pot marked 'AH' on both sides in cypher: one silver Cup marked 'JW' in a cypher: seven large Table-spoons marked 'SAH' in a cypher: 12 Tea-spoons marked 'SAH' in a cypher: four ditto (sic) marked 'AG': one metal Watch and gold Seal marked 'H' in a red Stone: one gold Box-ring marked 'H' in a cypher: a silver Nutmeg Grater marked 'EAH' in a cypher: a large silk orange and blue Shawl of a damask pattern: 21 yards of twilled Calicoe: two or three pieces of fine Calicoe: several pairs of Shoes and Stockings: 10 or 12 yards of twilled Nankeen: a white split straw Bonnet: one white plaited straw Bonnet: a boy's blue cloth Dress with silver metal Buttons: a number of Bills and some Silver with a quantity of Irish Cloth, Muslins, wearing Apparel and other shop articles.

Whoever will discover the Offenders so that they may be apprehended, shall receive Ten Pounds of the above Reward upon commitment, and the remaining FORTY POUNDS upon conviction, by applying to Mr. GREVILLE, solicitor, High Street, Bristol.

An Accomplice, making a discovery, will be entitled to the same Reward and exertions made to secure a Pardon."

"A most daring attempt at house-breaking was made a few nights since at Bagborough House near Evercreech, occupied by Miss HILL and Miss SALMON. The robbers first attempted to gain an entrance through the roof of an outhouse, and not being to able to effect their purpose there, they procured a ladder from a neighbouring farm and endeavoured to force out the window of the room where the ladies slept, in which a light was burning; the ladies hearing the noise, made an alarm, and the villains decamped, after throwing several stones into the bedroom."

"As Mr. TUTTON of Coxley Pound was returning from Wells Fair on Friday evening about nine o'clock, he was attacked by two men, who, without making any demand of him, struck him a violent blow with a hedge-stick, which brought him to the ground. They then knelt on him and robbed him of upwards of £20; besides the cash they rifled him of a pocket book with memorandums, which on the following morning, was found in a field near the spot where this diabolical action took place. We understand that hopes are entertained of Mr. Tutton's recovery, which, at first, was very doubtful."

"House-breaking: On Tuesday night the 2nd instant, or early the following morning, the dwelling house of Mrs. Elizabeth HERBERT in the Parish of Bedminster in the county of Somerset, was broken and entered and the following property stolen therefrom, viz:-

A gold chased antique watch with a bird at the extremity of the minute-hand: a large Pinchback watch deficient of the outside case: seven silver Teaspoons, belonging to different sets, some plain and some marked 'EAH': one pair of silver Spectacles with green side glasses and white glass in front: a pair of diamond drop Ear-rings, the drop composed of nine stones set in silver: an old-fashioned Tablespoon: five silver-handled Knives and six ditto Forks, with the crest of a Griffin. A quantity of papers, accounts and receipts of no value but to the owner. Also a pair of coral Bracelets: a pair of silk and beads Bracelets: and a pair of topaz Ear-rings set with pearls.

Whoever will give information as to cause the offender or offenders to be apprehended, shall receive the sum of £10, and the further sum of £10 on application to the said Mrs. Herbert of Bedminster, Somerset."

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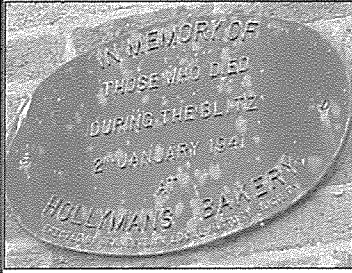
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JANUARY 2 1941 - A DARK DAY OF WAR



Let's start with the blackest day in Grangetown history. It came in the Second World War on 2 January 1941, when an air-raid during the full moon caused widespread casualties across at teatime - 6.37pm. Around 100 German planes were involved and Grangetown was the first and worst area to be hit. The 10-hour raid was said by the Nazis to be in retaliation to the 1 Bremen.

Hollyman Brothers Bakery, on the corner of Corporation Road and Stockland Street, saw its large cellar used as a bunker for local people. But the premises took a direct hit by a landmi in the shelter were killed. The bomb, which ended up in the cellar floor, exploded and left an 8ft pile of rubble.

The Hollyman baking family were well established. The family business had started with Charles Hollyman - son of a Somerset one-time butcher and publican - in Bute Street in the 18; his sons at various times becoming bakers. His younger brother Robert was also a baker with his own business in Roath. His eldest son Alfred John Hollyman, after a short time in Roa bakery in Corporation Road by the late 1890s. By 1941, Alfred, was 74, a widower, and he lived above the shop in Corporation Road with one of his daughters, Ethel, 43. The bakery itse building in the yard, along with a stable for one of the bakery's two delivery horses by the lane in Stockland Street. The business was run by eldest son Bill, 38, who lived with his wife M their 12-year-old daughter Joan in a house next door at the end of Stockland Street. The bakers would call in passers-by and neighbours to use the Hollymans' shelter in the cellar durin night it was packed, including Alfred, Ethel, and Bill and his wife and daughter. All were killed. Alfred's brother Bill, 72, another baker, survived, as he was apparently sheltering elsewh Jack, 40, who eventually re-started the business, was living in Lansdowne Avenue, Canton. Others known to have died in the shelter included Elizabeth Williams, 56, and Thomas Willi from Stockland Street; Philip and Lilian Morgan; and Magdalene Maude Wells, 51, from Llanbradach Street.

It was thought the remains of those who perished were buried on the site, but descendants later discovered two Hollymans were buried in a city cemetery. Around 20 unknown victims at the spot. Many could have been children, as Alfred was heard to be calling children into the shelter after the air-raid siren was heard.

There were at least another 30 casualties in Grangetown that night, during 10 hours of bombing, until the all-clear sirens sounded after 4.50am on 3 January.

They included nine people in nearby **Clydach Street**, including Thomas and Caroline Lyons, 56 and 48, and their 14-year-old son John at No 8. Next door at No 10, David and Emma, their 80s, were killed along with their three daughters Blanche, Annie and Emily, aged between 47 and 50.

There were also a number of homes destroyed in **Jubilee Street** in Saltmead - with Thomas and Nellie Nicholls, their 20-year-old daughter Muriel and a four-year-old boy, Neil Chiar: No 66 - he was an only child and his mother a widow, according to the funeral notice a few days later. Three blocks of maisonettes were later built in the place of the damaged houses.

According to the school records from the time, as well as damage to Jubilee Street from a land mine, **Compton Street**, **Stafford Road**, **Allerton Street**, **Monmouth Street** and **C** sustained heavy damage. A bomb fell in **Maitland Place** demolishing part of Saltmead Hall. Court Road School was also closed due to the extensive damage. Three were killed in the a **Bromsgrove Street**, while the Grangetown National School was forced to close, because of an unexploded bomb 20 yards away. All families from St Fagans Street, Knole Street and V were evacuated.

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HISTORICAL ITEMS-THE 17th CENTURY AND LATER

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The Hollymans of Somersetshire

Those Hollymans with which this work is concerned, came originally in the late 17th century from the south of the county, from, I suspect that area known as The Horethorn Hundreds.

In the South Somersetshire Subsidy Rolls, we can see that a John Hollyman (Assessor) paid £10 Poll Tax. The village mentioned was Stowell. The date was 1641

Although this initial information is, at the moment, pure supposition, what provides a distinctive clue is that John Hollyman was an assessor which I take to be concerned with Land Taxes.

Leaving this John for a moment, I find an 'Indenture' signed by another John Hollyman in 1684. This document concerns the acquisition of land 'above and below the church of St Michaels in a tiny village situated in what is known as The Gordano Valley and within the Portbury Hundreds.

At the close of the year 1698, in this village called Clapton in Gordano, a John Hollyman is presented with a son by his wife, Rachael. Within a few months, John, his wife Rachael and baby son, John are living in Westbury on Trym on the other side of the river Avon from Clapton where the elder John is, as is discovered later, buying yet more land only this time in a small fishing village called Clevedon located a few miles from Clapton.

But before this family settle there, Rachael dies and was buried in the parish churchyard of St John Westbury on Trym. She was buried in 1700 and must have been quite young even though John, her husband, as we will see later was thirty seven years old when his son, John was born.

In due time, John Hollyman and baby John arrived in Clevedon and it was here that he took a second wife named Anne. The loss of many pages of parish registers deem that we shall never know more about her.

John Hollyman was to sire three more children by his second wife but, sadly two died at an early age. The surviving son, named Hezekiah was born in 1711.

John, his half brother became a tax assessor and collector and a churchwarden and married Martha.

Leaving Hezekiah for the moment, we discover that John and Martha produced just one child, a son named as was the custom after his father, John, born in 1734. By this year, the elder John and his wife were dead and buried inside the church of St Andrews an event which to future generations would bless.

But son John and his wife were to die at an early age too. It appears to be some generative fault that this line was to suffer early deaths. For, at the age of thirty nine, John born in Clapton died. His widow Martha managed to reach twenty five when she joined her husband and father-in-law in 1737. They left their only son aged three to the tender mercies of those few Hollymans available to be brought up.

But John did survive to marry a Wraxall girl named Hannah Emery and they married in Nailsea in 1754. But there was not to be without their share of sorrow. Of the four children they had, only one survived past the age of two years old. These three daughters were all buried in Nailsea as indeed, was their father in the year 1766. He died leaving a widow and one son aged six years old.

Within the year, Hannah remarried and in time, John her only son met and married Anne Tagg of Abbots Leigh in 1782. The generative fault seemed to have been overcome when these two were blessed with five children but it was the youngest, Reuben born in 1792 who died aged two and became the first Hollyman to be buried in Abbots Leigh.

This family was to help populate this village for the next two hundred and eighty years ending in the burial of Caroline Alice Wallace nee Hollyman in 1981.

Returning to Clevedon, Hezekiah Hollyman and his wife, also Ann were to have five children but once again, they lost two in their infancies.

The eldest named John married late in life and died sine prole, without issue. The next, Reuben or Robin as some clerics had spelled it also died young. Then along came their only daughter, Mary born in 1742. Mary was to provide an event which has caused some genealogical problems for she gave birth to the first Hollyman 'base' child. Samuel, for that was his name was born in 1763 but so far, no record of his baptism has yet been found although a burial has.

This appears somewhat of a puzzle for in 1790 a Samuel Hollyman of Clevedon, married a Puxton farmers daughter and they settled in that village.

Samuel was described as a 'gentleman' so he must have had an income from land and did not 'work' for his living so therefore was of this family of Hollymans who had settled in Clevedon in about 1704.

However, with Samuel well and truly out of the way of Clevedon's possible wagging tongues, there still remained Mary's other siblings, the youngest being Thomas Hollyman born in 1747.

By the turn of the century, the Hollymans grew from strength to strength. They owned a great deal of land in Clevedon and were closely associated with that other landed gentry, the Elton family who had arrived in Clevedon about the same time as John Hollyman.

But there were other members of this family of John Hollyman who had arrived in Clapton at the close of the 17th century. Three brothers and a lone sister. Of these, the son of one, Roger eventually joined his kin in Clevedon to become associated with Clevedon court.

Another, Reuben was to become involved with the Bath family of medics, the Baves whose forebear had been born in Germany but this line of Hollymans, as far as I know died out in the early 19th century. Their visible memorials can be seen in Tickenham parish church.

Many of the early Hollymans, that is the sons and daughters of those who were living at Clapton in Gordano have dissappeared from the locations where they settled. Emmanuel and Hannah as already stated settled in the village of Backwell close to where one Hollyman had married, Barrow Gurney. But apart from one or two burials registered in the Wraxall parish registers, there are no further signs of them.

They may of course, ventured to nearby Bristol or even Bath. Only a search of the 1841 census returns will show if they did.

However, back in Clevedon the youngest son of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman was to start his own progeny which would 'set the seal' on that towns own population of Hollymans. Of the five children of Hezekiah, only two were to produce. Had it not been for the birth of Hezekiahs only daughters 'base' child, the number of Hollymans in this part of the county would have been far less than it was.

Thomas Hollyman it was with the help and cooperation of course of Martha Phillips and his second wife, Hannah Wall formerly Griffin who began to build up the fortunes and wealth of the Hollymans in general. His youngest son, by Hannah, his second wife, was the one who really made a name for himself as a builder of some renown.

But the intermarrying with others was to be the cause of much loss of the original wealth and property of the Hollymans. I could not help but consider the second marriage of the widow of Doctor Hezekiah Hollyman to be instrumental in the loss of the Hollyman property.

But the years rolled by: the Hollymans of Clevedon grew less in number and even in Abbots Leigh, they were to leave for pastures new. Bristol and Cardiff being two of the main 'ports of call' for migrating former sons of the soil. Within these pages are events of birth, baptism, death, marriage and burials of hundreds of Hollymans. There are names of parishes and churches; locations and trades to which many were apprenticed.

The surnames into which they married are far too numerous to mention.

From yeoman farmers to butchers:coopers to miners:the medical profession and civil engineering:hairdressing to railway platelayers:grocers,publicans, process artists and mere common labourers.

Within these pages one can see they died all too young yet some lived to a ripe old age.Like almost all family groups of yesteryear,they 'played the odds'with their offspring.They knew they would lose some and in one or two instances,they lost all.

Living conditions of the centuries prior to the 20th were not exactly conducive to good health and it was a wonder any survived the harsh realities of everyday living but they did.They overcame the dreaded maladies of the infections of smallpox,diphtheria,cholera and typhoid:they overcame the machinations of the quacks,the charlatans and the bogus doctors who grew rich on the fears of the populace.

I have spent over four years researching these Hollyman families without any financial reward,with a love of history and a feeling of success at the result.This research is far from finished but finished as much as I can. There are many omissions and many errors but not important ones.There remains much scope for anyone else to continue:its is only a matter of searching,detecting and sorting out who is who and what is what and how.

I am NOT a Hollyman but my offspring do have this bloodline.I leave this 'study' for their benefit and for the benefit of those who are already here and who come after.

Memorials to the Hollymans and those related to them.

The BAVE chapel. St Quiricus & St Juliette. Tickenham.

Floor stones:

Here lies the Body of Mrs Isabell Bave. Relict of Anthony Bave Clerk who died the 20th Feb. 1708/9 aged 67 years.

Also in Memory of Joseph and William sons of Reuben Hollyman of this parish Yeoman by his wife Elizabeth Ann Mary. Joseph died January 31st 1758 aged 14 years. William died February 27th 1758 aged 17 years.

Also here lieth the Body of the Aforesaid Reuben Hollyman who departed this life December 11 1763 aged 63 years.

Upon another stone:

Also here lieth the Body of Elizabeth Ann Mary wife of Reuben Hollyman of this Parish Yeoman and daughter of Mr Samuel Bave, Gent. who died March 18th in ye 36th year of her age.

Also, Mary their daughter who died March 20th 1733 Aged 13 months. Also Samuel Hollyman Reed who died June 20th 1837 aged 54.

Wall plaque:

In Memory of Samuel Bave, son of Samuel Bave late of this Parish, gent. deceased whose remains are interred near this place. This monument is erected by his inconsolable and afflicted mother Elizabeth Bave. Also in Memory of Samuel Bave Hollyman of this Parish, Gent. son of Reuben and Elizabeth Ann Mary Hollyman. He died April 19th 1813 aged 82.

Also of JOHN REED of this Parish, Nephew of the above Samuel Bave Hollyman. He died June 10th 1837 aged 34.

Yatton Churchyard.

In loving Memory of Samuel Hollyman who passed away April 15th 1919 aged 59 years. Also his beloved wife Emma who died January 4th 1933 aged 71 yrs. At Rest. Loves last gift. Remembrance. Treasured Memories.

Holy Trinity.Nailsea Churchyard. Near main gateway.

To the Memory of Martha daughter of John and Hannah Hollyman of the Parish of Kenn who died 1st March 1758 aged 2 years. Also Betty their daughter died March 24th 1758 aged 2 months.

Here lies ye Body of John Hollyman aforesaid who departed this life 1st April 1766 aged 31 years.

St Andrews Clevedon.

In Remembrance of PHOEBE BEES who died June 15th 1856 Aged 66 years. In the Midst of Life, we are in Death. Also in loving memory of Elizabeth Ann, Beloved daughter of Walter and Agnes HOLLYMAN who after a painful illness died April 11th 1894 aged 14 years.

Here lyeth the Body of Hezekiah Hollyman of this Parish Yeoman who died the 23rd of December 1749 Aged 38 Years.

"All flesh is Crass y Glory of a Man FADES like a flow'r MANS life is but a span Man like a Vappour doth appear to Day And in a Moment vanisheth away. Also ANN his Widow who died March 2nd 1795 Aged 75.

Here lieth the Body of John Hollyman son of Hezekiah & Ann Hollyman of this Parish Yeoman who died Aug. 23rd 1781 aged 44.

Also underneath are interred the Mortal Remains of THOMAS HOLLYMAN of this Parish, Gent. son of HEZEKIAH and ANN HOLLYMAN. who died September 2(?) 1820 aged 74 years.

Here lyeth the body of John Hollyman of this PARISH YEOMAN who departed this life the 27th of February 1727 Aged 66 Years. ALSO here lyeth the BODY of ANNE the wife of ye abovesaid JOHN HOLLYMAN who departed this life the

28th of December 1720 aged XLVII Years.

CLAPTON COURT, SOMERSET



This photograph taken c.1990 is the location of the Clapton Court referred to in the "Assignment" signed by John Hollyman in 1684 for the lease of farming land from Henry Wynter for an annual rent of one hundred and ten pounds and for a term of seven years. Pages 9, 10 and 11 refer to this subject.

The dwelling must have changed during the past 300 years and looking at the photograph it appears as if only the arched entrance and possibly the castellated tower are original.

John Hollyman takes over this.

All items of household or husbandrie particularly one furnace, one wheat mow and staddle and one iron fork/lack/back....and, lastly, whereas the said Nathaniel Wade has fallowed three acres of land in part of said premises and sowed same with wheat, that John Hollyman should pay a reasonable sum to him for it.

This land was next to St John's School, Old Church road, now the site of a row of shops. According to the Clevedon Rates of 1832 & 1840, Harriet Hollyman was the owner of a house and lands occupied by Thomas Maynard. THIS was Childs and Mainstones. There is no doubt that it was handed down the family. This Harriet was the widow of Dr Hezekiah Hollyman who died in 1820. The John Hollyman mentioned here was, of course he who was known as the elder and a signee of an Indenture between him and one Henry Wynter of Clapton Court in 1684.

John was still there in Clapton at the end of the 17th century but moved to Westbury on Trym by the summer of 1700 when his wife Rachael died. Nathaniel Wade has also been noticed (by me) when he paid to have the south porch of Holy Trinity church in Nailsea.

The same Nathaniel Wade who became involved in the Monmouth Rebellion and who later became Town Clerk of the City of Bristol ?

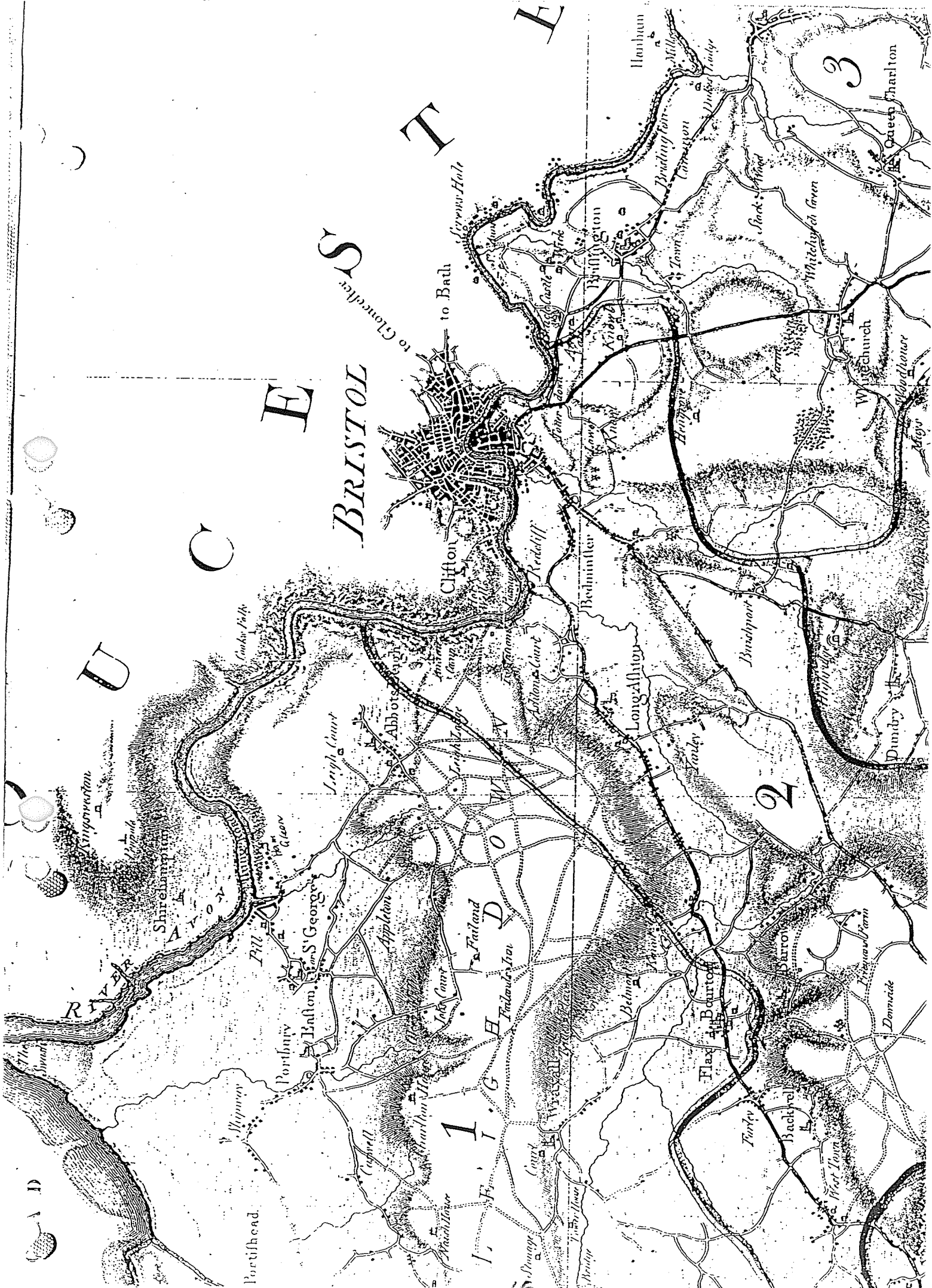

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The Parish Registers

The word, parish is a term used originally for the district assigned to a bishop or priest usually formed on the basis of a previously existing manor or township.

There are about fifteen thousand civil parishes in England and Wales and fifteen hundred in Scotland varying greatly in extent and population.

The Parish was for many years the unit of administration for the poor, law and highway purposes but is no longer so. Parishes included in the area of rural district councils have through the parish council or parish meeting certain powers in local government and can for instance complain to the county council when the rural district council is held at fault on matters of housing or public health.

The Parochial church council deals with matters connected to the parish church. If we take a look at some cases of bastardy contained in this work, the position of the parish church council becomes clear.

Parish registers were and still are in many areas kept as a matter of law brought about by Thomas Cromwell but as there were far more churches than there were and still are in some outlying villages, ministers to preach, the cleric as they were known in early years, became confused or indolent in his recording of the events of his ministry.

One particular parish brought to mind is that of All Saints, Wraxall where I feel certain no Hollymans lived yet record the burials of fourteen of them.

Situated in the parish churchyard of Weston in Gordano is a 'double bedder' grave which has obviously more than one occupant yet its registers record only one that of Sarah Hollyman. It seems strange that a wife should be buried alone when her husband and childrens burials have been recorded in a church registers only a short distance away.

There were many Hollymans living in Clapton in Gordano during the end of the 17th century yet many were recorded as being buried in Wraxall. There also appears to be only one marriage (Phoebe Hollyman) yet this parish church was most popular, people coming from miles around in order to have the notable singers perform at their weddings.

Many Bristol parish registers have recorded Hollymans as being of this parish (B.O.T.P.) yet we know many weren't.

Amongst family tracing enthusiasts, the loss of many of the registers of St Andrews church, Clevedon is well known. Although I have contacted the office of the bishop of Bath and Wells, nothing fruitful emerged.

Many, if not all parish registers in those early years, i.e. 16th century gave very little information with regards to whose child or whose son it was who had been baptised or buried. In the recording of burials, the age of the deceased was not given. The only clue was if that had been an infant. Even the marriages only gave the two participants and the date as with Roger Holliman and Rachael Vinpeny of Yatton.

In the transcripts of Bristol Marriages 1800 - 1837, the couple's places of residence was not given but all were 'of this parish' which, I doubt very much was correct. Unless the women lived with their prospective husbands before the wedding.

The Parish Church of St Andrews.Clevedon

Also known as The Old Church, St Andrews was named after the patron saint of fishermen and it is probable that there was a small fishing community at the foot of two hills, Church Hill and Wains Hill between which it lies. St Andrews was possibly built between 1060 and 1190 and although Norman, was built on Saxon foundations.

Within the church are two Sanctuary rings and in Medieval times, a person fleeing from summary justice could take refuge in the church by holding on to a ring until his case was held in a proper manner.

Edith Cavell was confirmed here on March 15th 1884 and at the time, she was attending school at Belgrade House in Elton road. Edith became an outstanding heroine by aiding Allied escapees during the Great War 1914-1918 whilst she was serving as a nurse in Belgium. On October 12th 1915, she was shot by the Germans. She was nearly fifty years old.

Although the church is twelfth century, the parish records have been lost prior to 1727. Some say those early scraps of parchment were used to block up holes in the church rafters. There are burial records much earlier and have been transcribed into easy readable pages. The first date and event of these transcriptions is the baptism of Anthony son of John Halse which took place on May 10th 1607. The first marriage is of John Raine and Alice Bradford on May 7th 1607/8. The first burial was of William Ashe on July 25th 1607/8.

Amongst those early 18th century churchwardens are:-

According to the date, the last named Hollyman would have been the grandson of John Hollyman the Elder. He was buried in Nailsea in 1766 and was the father of John who first settled in Abbots Leigh.

The Hollyman family burial vaults inside St Andrews have in the main, weathered the countless tread of feet throughout the ages, only one beneath which lie the remains of the eldest son of Hezekiah and Ann, John does one see erosion which has obliterated the remainder of the wording. John lies here but there must be others. For instance, we can find no signs of the last resting places of Oswald and his wife, Elinor nor of John's wife or widow, Hannah nee Churches.

At the time of writing, most of the aisles in the church have been covered with a protective carpet. This may do just what it is intended, that is to protect but it also hides from view some, in my opinion very decorative memorials to the Hollyman families.

Early Hollyman Marriages.

Locations as yet,unknown

John Hollyman the elder married Rachael at some time before 1698 or during that year.

John Hollyman the elder's second marriage to Ann may have been celebrated in St Andrew's Clevedon around the year 1704.

Emmanuel Hollyman married Hannah probably around the year 1705 but it is not known where.

Oswald Hollyman. The son of Roger and Rachael probably married Elinor in Clevedon in about the year 1729.

Hezekiah Hollyman, the son of John Hollyman the elder and his second wife, Ann took place possibly in Clevedon in around 1733.

John Hollyman of Clapton, eldest son of John Hollyman the elder married Martha in Clevedon in around 1732.

The loss of many of the pages of the St Andrew's parish register means that the events above may never be known.

Only two of the marriages of those early Hollymans have been found, those being Roger Hollyman who married Rachael Vinpeny in Yatton and Reuben Hollyman yeoman of Clapton who married Rachael Fosskett in Bristol's former abbey, St Augustine in 1698.

Thomas Hollyman, son of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman was found to have married in Yatton in 1771 a fact which was not discovered until after five years of searching.

In the Quarter Sessions Court transcripts we find evidence of local lifestyle. In 1616,Mary Gaynard was sentenced to be publically whipped for bearing an illegitimate child.She and the man she claimed to be the father had to give money to the Parish to raise a fund for the child's upkeep and if she refused to keep the child herself,she was to pay 12d weekly.Since Thomas Blake refused

to confirm he was the child's father was not punished by the Court but left to the censure of the Church.

This punishment was unusually severe but it did not discourage the populace at all since further cases of illegitimacy appeared regularly in the Court records and Parish registers.

This brings to mind, the alleged illegitimate son of Mary Hollyman in Clevedon in 1763: the son who does not appear to have been baptised but whose 'burial' was. Mary was the daughter of the parish overseer and a churchwarden and also the grand daughter of the elder John Hollyman

On one of the pages of parchment comprising the register of St Michaels and all Angels, Clapton in Gordano there is an account of the building of a new pew. Dated. 1699, it reads:-

This year in the month of October was built the Pew between the Church pew and the Chancel for the use of those who belong to the Society of Singers for ever no other persons (although they are of the posterity of those that built it) being ever to be admitted to sit therein except they are actually of that Society. It is erected at the expence of ye persons underwritten who gave the several sums following:-

The next event concerning John was when his wife, Rachael presented him with a son on September 30th 1698 whilst he was either living at the court or close by. Two years later, he was, together with his wife and son, in the village of Westbury on Trym to the north of Bristol for it was at this time, Rachael died and was buried in the parish churchyard of St John.

During the year 1703, he appears to have still been here for he signed for a mortgage on land situated in Clevedon on the mouth of the Severn. Having checked both the parish of St John, Westbury and Henbury for his second marriage to a Ann, I presume he married her in Clevedon.

From this union, there were three children but two died in their infancy and buried in the family vault inside St Andrews church, Clevedon.

The surviving son, Hezekiah was to become the parish overseer and church warden. There are no signs regarding when these children were born and certainly not in the case of the infants but from his death and age at the time of Hezekiah, I know that he was born in around 1711.

Ann died in the December of 1720 and was laid to rest with her infants. John reached the age of sixty six years and was buried in the February of 1727. He too was laid to rest in the family vault.

I have written separate studies of each son of John Hollyman and can be found in this work.

The search for the birthplace and baptism of John Hollyman known as the Elder and for his parents, continues.

Reuben Hollyman. - 1725

One of the five Hollymans who arrived at Clapton in Gordano at the close of the 17th century. But from whence is not known. Yet.

Married Rachael Foskett who was either a sister or daughter of the rector of St Michaels parish, one John Foskett. They were married on February 2nd 1698 in the private chapel of the bishop of Bristol of St Augustine's abbey in Bristol. Some say that what is now the 'buttery' was the site of this chapel.

The couple lived out their lives in Clapton where Reuben died aged unknown and buried on March 28th 1725. That event was registered in the parish registers of All Saints, Wraxall. Rachael died in 1729 in Clapton.

There were seven children of this union who were:-

Hannah Hollyman. Born on November 14th 1698 and was baptised when she was nine days old. Nothing else known...for certain.

Reuben Hollyman. Their first son was born on January 5th 1700 and baptised on February 24th 1700. He became a yeoman farmer and married Elizabeth Ann Mary Bave the daughter of Samuel Bave and his second wife, Elizabeth. No record of that marriage has been discovered although it could have been 1729.

John Hollyman. Born on November 28th 1701 and baptised on February 2nd 1702. John died when he was thirty five years old and buried on March 21st 1736. (See Wraxall parish registers)

Rachael Hollyman. Born on November 20th 1705 and baptised on December 26th. She died aged twenty and buried on October 24th 1725.

Stephen Hollyman. Born in 1708 and appears to have died an infant.

Phoebe Hollyman was baptised at the parish church of Tickenham on June 8th 1712. She survived to adulthood to marry by licence, Arthur Gregorie on January 4th 1734.

Stephen Hollyman. Baptised in Tickenham on March 11th 1714: married Joanne

Rawlings, a Portbury woman in Barrow Gurney, August 10th 1739.

There may be some perplexity why these two who lived not a mile from each other should travel all the way to Barrow Gurney to get married. Having been to this particular church and having observed the position of it from the usual footpath, I feel more puzzlement.

Roger Hollyman - 1751.

Spelt Holliman in the Yatton parish register when he and Rachael Vinpeny were married on June 7th 1695, they were living in Clapton, we know in 1705. Roger and his wife appeared to have lived out their lives in Clapton with Reuben and his wife, Rachael. This couple were, it seems not 'blessed' with many children. Roger died in 1751 and buried on August 2nd: Rachael lived on for four more years: she was buried on March 1st 1755.

(See Wraxall parish registers)

Of this union, there was only two children...as far as is known.

Oswald Hollyman. Baptised on December 8th 1701 at St Michaels in Clapton.

He settled in Clevedon where his uncle was already well known and had established as a 'Gentleman farmer'.

He married Elinor (Eleanor) but of that marriage record, there is no sign. We know Oswald was also established in Clevedon by 1732.

Hannah Hollyman. Born in 1711 in Clapton but died whilst still an infant.

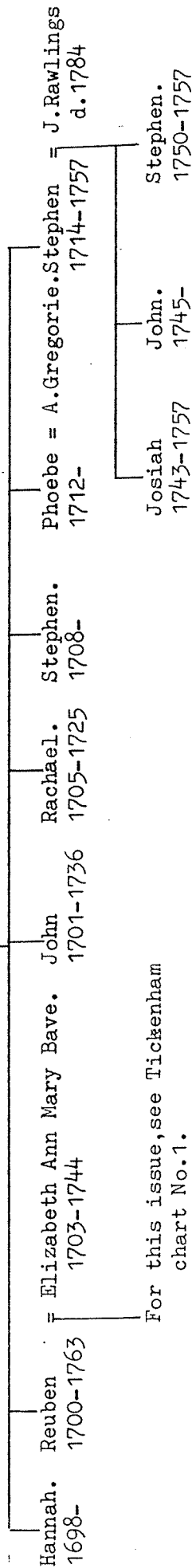
I have 'picked' up a burial of an Oswald Hollyman, August 14th 1749 but the problem is, which one?

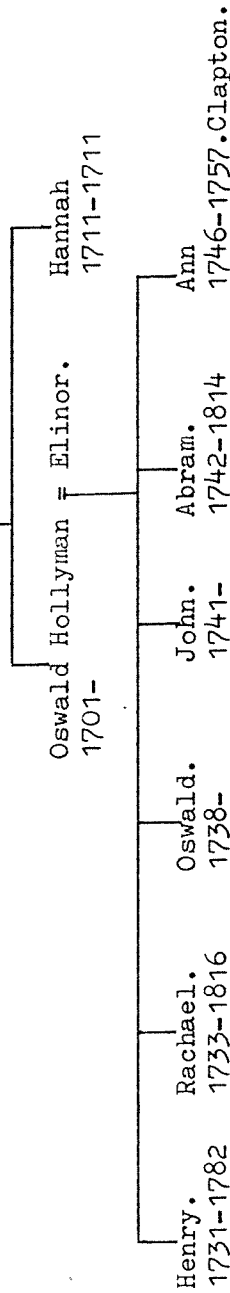

Clapton chart No. 1



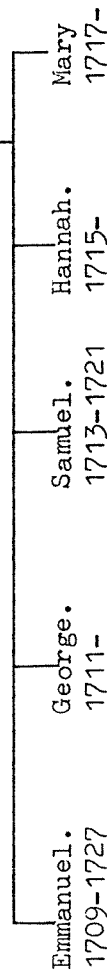
The Genealogical Chart of:-

The Issue of Emmanuel Hollyman and Hannah.

Emmanuel was most likely the youngest Hollyman of those who settled in Clapton in Gordano at the end of the 17th century. He stood bond for his brother, Reuben at Reubens marriage in Bristol in 1698. We know very little else about Emmanuel but one thing is certain, he was living at Clapton Court with a servant named William Smith in 1707. An entry in Wraxall parish register of burials tells that he was 'of Backwell'. Presumably he and his small family settled there in about *1708. The marriage record of the union of Emmanuel and Hannah have not yet been found but they could have married far from the valley. He died in March 1733 and buried on the 30th of that month but exactly where is not certain. Their first child, a son was baptised in the parish church of Tickenham on February 7th 1709 and the record of his burial also in Wraxall on October 3rd 1727. This was:- Emmanuel Hollyman who died at the age of 18 years old.

George Hollyman was baptised in Backwell in 1711: nothing else known.

Samuel Hollyman was also baptised in Backwell but on August 25th 1713.

He also died young, at eight years old and buried on the 17th of September 1721.

Hannah Hollyman was baptised in Backwell on June 12th 1715 and thats all

I know of her.

Mary Hollyman their youngest child was baptised on March 23rd 1717: that is also all I know.

A search has been made of the parish registers of Backwell but there are no more events which record the Hollymans. Not even the burial of Hannah. There are also no visible memorials to the Hollymans in this parish. It is quite possible, of course that they may have travelled to Bristol, or even Clevedon.

* For 1708, read, 1710.

John Hollyman. 1698 - 1737

John was the only son of John the elder and his first wife, Rachael. He was born in Clapton in Gordano on September 30th 1698 and baptised into the church on October 5th that year. Before he was very old, he was taken to Westbury on Trym where his mother died and was buried in the local church on July 29th 1700. There is no visible memorial to Rachael or, at least, after two searches, I could not find any. It is not known how long he stayed in this village where his father was obtaining land located in the small fishing village of Clevedon but we do know that they were still there in 1703. Some time afterwards, the pair settled in Clevedon where John the elder married a possibly local girl named Ann who was twelve years younger than he.

John was a tax collector and churchwarden. His duties were to collect church tax, poor tax and land taxes. He married also possibly a local girl named Martha but due to the loss of many pages of the parish registers, we may never know. The wedding may have taken place in around 1733 for their only son, John was born the next year. Events appear to have been most tragic for both these died young and in the same year whether with smallpox or one of the many infectious diseases, of course we don't know. John of Clapton was also much older than his wife. Martha died in the February of 1737 aged twenty five years old and her husband died in December aged thirty nine. Both were buried inside the parish church of St Andrews where their last resting places can be seen.

John Hollyman 1734 - 1766

The only son of John and Martha Hollyman was baptised in St Andrews on September 10th 1734. He married Hannah Emery of Wraxall, the daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Emery in Nailsea on May 27th 1754 at the church of the Holy Trinity. They lived in Kenn where their children were born.

Like so many families during these times, John and nearly all his children did not live many years. John died at the age of thirty two and was buried in the old church of Nailsea where he had married only a few years before. The Hollyman grave in which lie, John and three of his children lies close to the gateway leading into the churchyard. He was buried on April 21st 1766. Hannah, now a widow with a young son to care for did not remain in that state for long: she married Richard Owen who was of Kenn in St James's church, Bath in 1767. Richard was mentioned in the Will of Thomas Hollyman (1820) Of the marriage between John and Hannah nee Emery were:-

Martha Hollyman the first daughter who was baptised in the parish church of St John the Evangelist Kenn on May 4th 1756 but she died aged two years and buried in Nailsea on March 3rd(?) 1758.

Betty Hollyman, spelt that way in the parish register, was baptised also in Kenn on May 22nd 1757 but died on March 24th 1758. There does appear to be an error for she was recorded as being two months old when she died. She lies in the same grave as her sister.

John Hollyman was the only child to survive and was baptised in Kenn on April 2nd 1760. He was to found the Abbots Leigh Hollymans by being married to Nancy (Anne) Tagg of that village in 1782. John died in 1828. (See his family synopsis re Abbots Leigh Hollymans

Martha Hollyman. Martha was the eldest child and was baptised on February 14th 1796 in Kenn but she too died aged two months and buried in Nailsea on April 26th 1763. The wording referring to Martha lies just beneath the level of the grave and could be missed to anyone seeking them.

A truly tragic family but John Hollyman, the grandson of the 'elder' did at least produce one son to carry the Hollyman bloodline further afield.

A father and three of his children lie together in Nailsea and only too

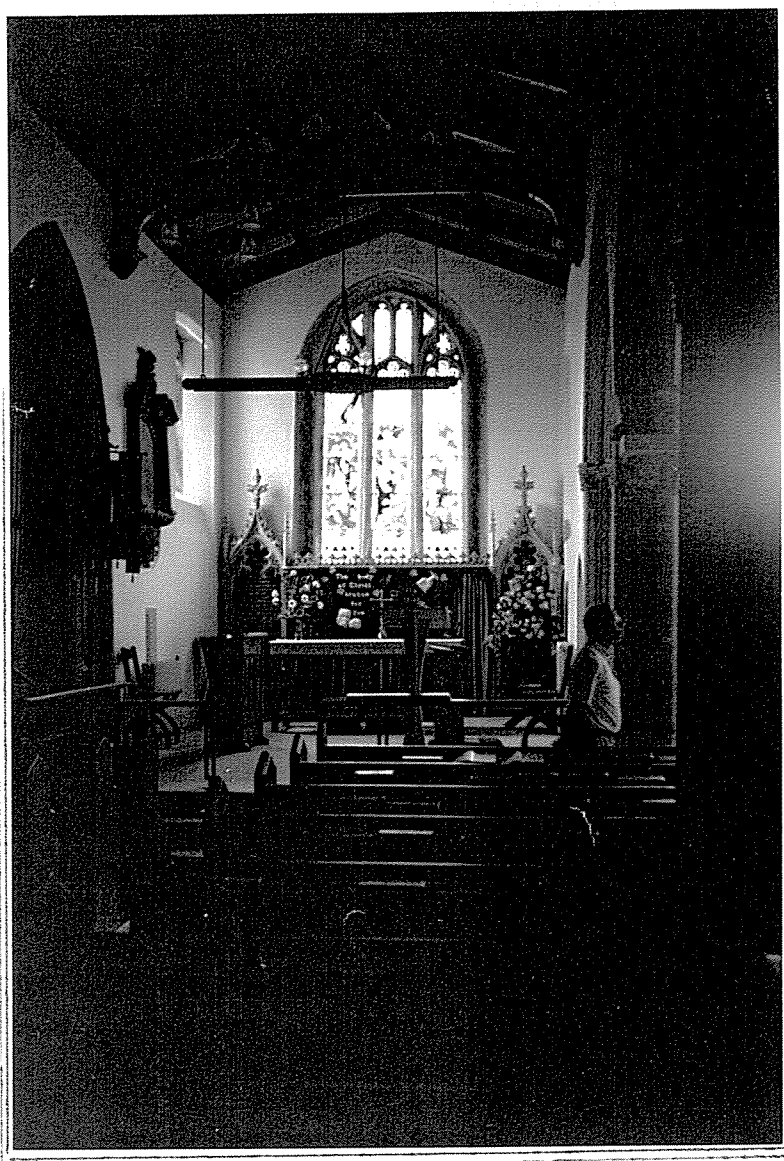
familiar headstone which tells of the tragedies which occurred too often the maladies and diseases which struck at the very young and not so young in those years.

There still stands an abode in Kenn known as the Hollyman house which, if I am not mistaken, would/might have been John and Hannahs home for a short time.

It might be of some interest to find out what became of Hannah now Mrs Owen for Thomas Hollyman did state that the money bequeathed to him was owing. But why these two married in Bath is difficult to understand unless it was too soon after John's death. But Hannah must have been like so many widows with little or no income. John was most likely have been a farmer but it is not known what sort: yeoman or farm labourer. The fact that his son did settle in Abbots Leigh could mean he had to start at the beginning. The Tagg family had been resident there for many years and who better to welcome into their family but a well known family member, the Hollymans?

By the time John did marry Anne, those Hollymans were well and truly making names for themselves. It was Thomas Hollyman who had so many children who married well and into already prosperous families such as the the Days, the Brookes, the Wilmots etc.

This John Hollyman born in Kenn in 1760 was to found the Abbots Leigh dynasty which lasted nearly three hundred years culminating with the demise of one Caroline Alice Wallace who decided long before she died not to record even her own forenames but only the single, 'Wife of above!...nee HOLLYMAN.

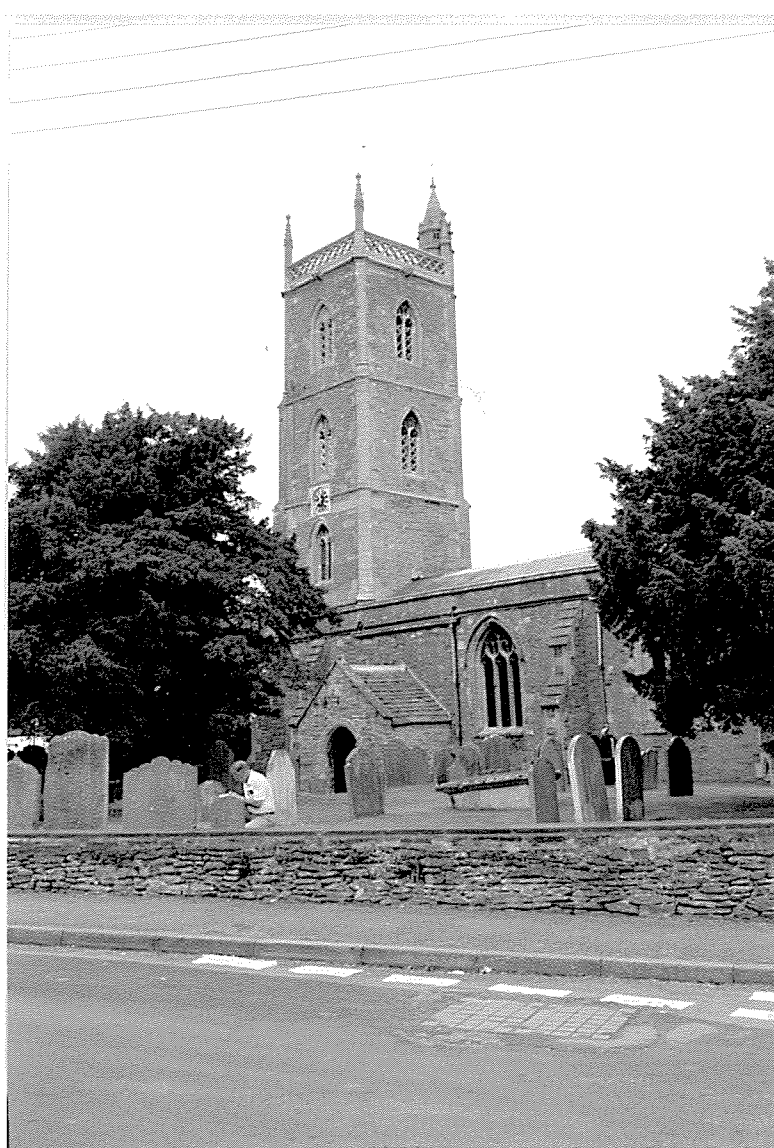

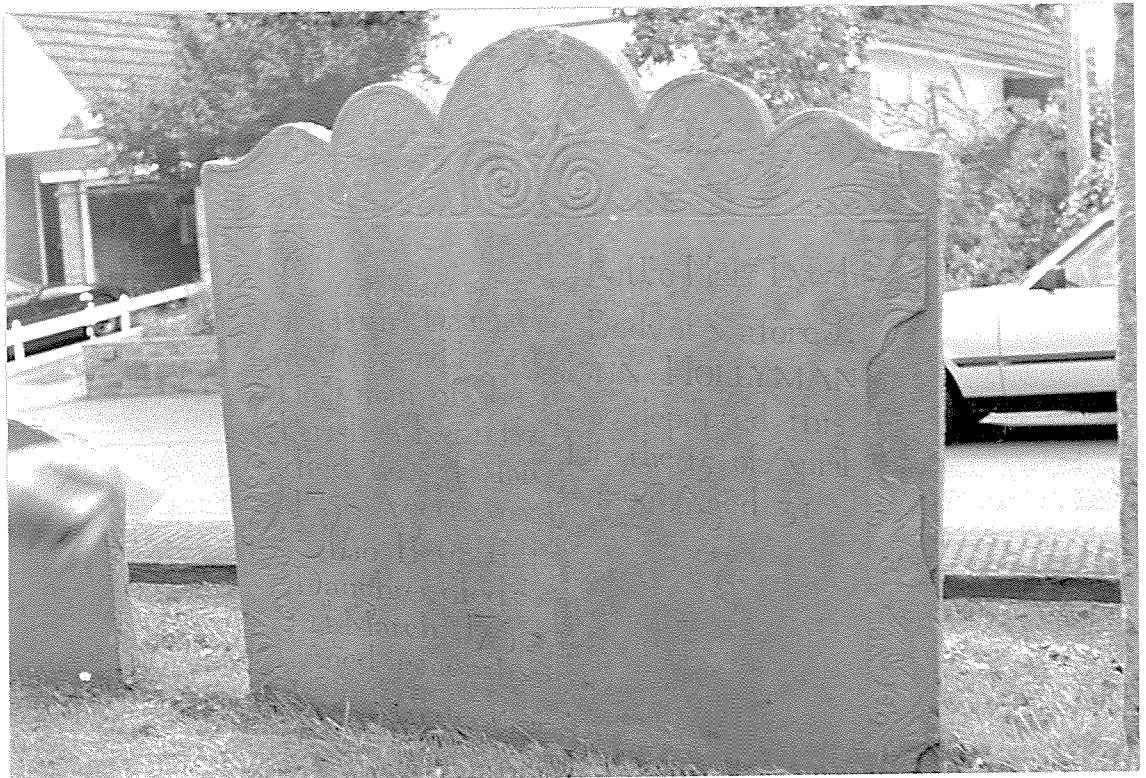

The eldest son and second child of Reuben and his wife Rachael nee Foskett was born and baptised in Clapton in Gordano, in 1700. He married the daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Bave of Tickenham, Elizabeth Ann Mary who was also known as, Maria in around 1727-28. I have not found any record of this marriage. They lived in Tickenham where their seven children were brought up. Elizabeth died in 1744 the year their last child was born and was buried in the family vault in the Bave chapel in the parish church. She was just 35 years old. Her husband lived until the age of sixty three when he died on December 14th 1763. He was the local land assessor and was a yeoman farmer. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Hester Bave Hollyman the eldest was baptised on December 22nd 1729 which suggests her parents were married the same year. Her baptism was recorded in the parish registers of Wraxall as, 'Hester babe daughter of Reuben Hollyman'. She died unmarried aged 40 in Tickenham on January 5th 1769.

Samuel Bave Hollyman was baptised on February 8th 1731 in St Andrews church Clevedon. He too remained unmarried and inherited Barrow Court after the death of his father. He died in Tickenham and was buried on April 25th 1813.

Mary Hollyman. Fated to die at a very early age was baptised on May 27th 1734 but died aged 13 months and buried inside the parish church on March 30th 1735

Elizabeth Bave Hollyman. Baptised on January 8th 1735. She was married to John Reed in c.1770 but no records have been found of this event. They had at least one son, John born in 1774 who was married to Elizabeth Rogers by whom he had four children and one son by a Miss Ann Needs. These daughters (see chart) eventually inherited Barrow Court lands which were divided into three. Nothing else known of Elizabeth Bave Hollyman.

Reuben Hollyman was baptised on May 12th 1738 and was also a land tax
885 assessor:remained unmarried and died aged 50.Buried and
registered as Rubin Hollyman on October 6th 1788-9

William Hollyman.Born in 1741 died of smallpox aged 17 years old and was
886 - buried on March 12th 1758.

Joseph Hollyman.Born in 1744 the year of his mother's death and at the
887 age of 14 years also died of smallpox.Both sons were laid
to rest inside the parish church of Tickenham.
Joseph was buried on February 2nd 1758.

After the death of Samuel Bave Hollyman who had inherited Barrow Court,
there being no sons,the estate was shared between the grand daughters of
his sister Elizabeth Reed.

Barrow Court. Tickenham

The manor of Barrow Court is situated under the hills on the Tickenham
road leading to Clevedon. There remains very little of the original house
but there is a modern farmhouse which does contain a few ancient features.
A twin light cinque-foiled stone window in the eastern gable and in the
northern wall,two arched and chamfered doorways:the south doorway,the
chief entrance in all probabilities still exists hidden from view by a
coating of plaster.A portion of the house is still styled,the chapel and
the adjoining fields 'Chapel Field and 'Chapel Ripple'

The park,which surrounds the house was enclosed within a stone wall of
which considerable parts remain but its limits greatly narrowed,the property
having been subdivided in 1837 between the three sisters,their respective
shares being distinguished as 'Blue Rocks'(Barrow Court)'Middle Rocks and

'Brown Rocks' farms all near each other.

Over an inner door in 'Middle Rocks' farm, is the date 1590 and over the entrance to 'Brown Rocks' farm the Bave Arms are boldly carved on a stone shield. But the lion looks more like a wild cat or heraldic tiger.

In the kitchen is an ancient fireback ornamented with fleurs-de-lys with the date, 1625 and the initials, R.C.

Dr Samuel Bave M.D. was German born in Cologne (Koln) in the year 1590. He was at Christ Church, Oxford and in 1628 he practiced in Bath and Gloucester. He bought the manor of Barrow Court, Tickenham in 1656 and, in the year of his death in 1668, he bequeathed the manor to his son, Anthony Bave. Samuel was buried in Bath abbey (no visible memorial) and his wife, Hester daughter of Alderman Robinson of Gloucester, councillor-at-Law died in 1682.

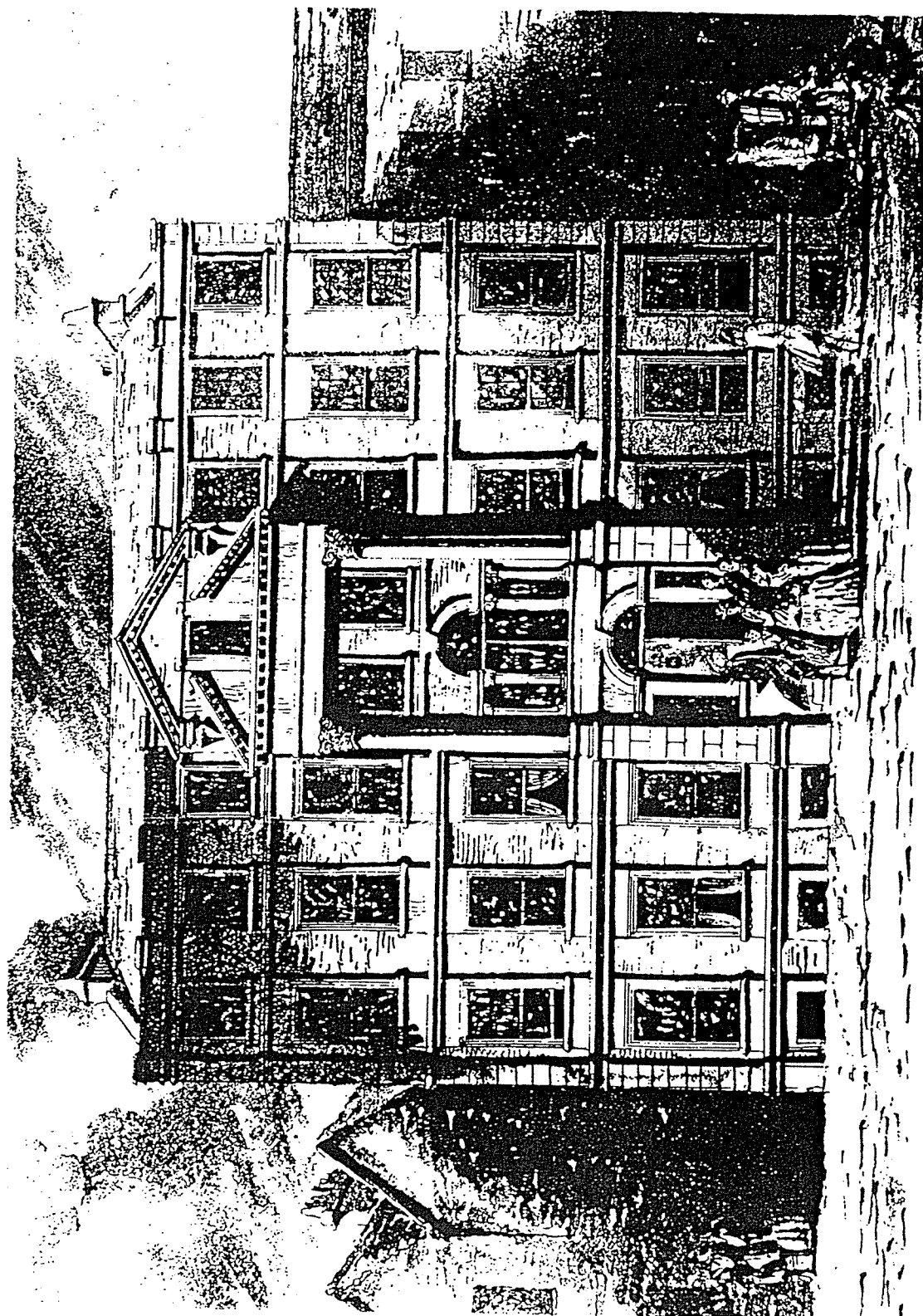
Anthony Bave became vicar of the parish church of Tickenham 1708/9 and upon his death, the manor passed to his son, Samuel. Samuel married three times and died February 23rd 1731 aged 58. He was buried in what was known then as the Bave Chapel: he was succeeded by his eldest son, Dr Anthony Bave M.D. In 1756, Anthony died without issue and the manor came into the possession of REUBEN HOLLYMAN (1700 - 1763), widower who had been married to Elizabeth Ann Mary Bave otherwise known as, Maria who was buried in the Bave chapel on March 21st 1744 aged 34 years.

Reuben's eldest son, Samuel Bave Hollyman (1731 - 1813? inherited Barrow Court in 1763 upon the death of his father, Reuben.

Samuel Bave was succeeded by his nephew, John Reed who died in 1830 aged 56, leaving one son and three daughters.

Upon the death of the son, Samuel Hollyman Reed in 1837 aged 34, the property was divided between the three daughters.

N.B. Barrow Court is accessible by a narrow private road from the main Tickenham to Clevedon road. (B3128)



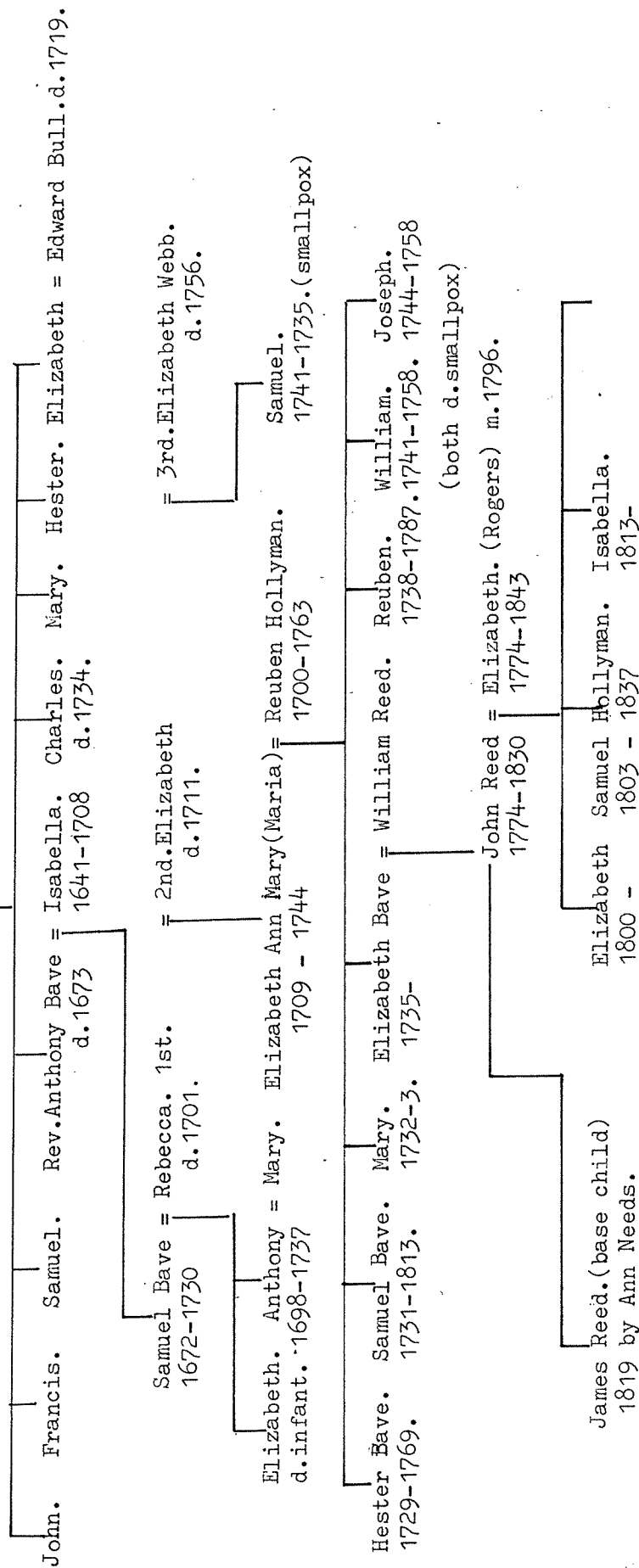
Dr Samuel Dave's residence in Bath.c.1800. Original painting priced at £400.

The HOLLYMAN line died out with the demise of Samuel Bave Hollyman son of Reuben and Maria Hollyman.

" 6th September 1774 Earl Poulett to Samuel Hollyman Yeoman of Tickenham and Ruben Hollyman Yeoman of Clevedon Doth demise grant unto Samuel and Ruben Hollyman All that Lodge House and large piece or parcel of Pasture Ground commonly called or known by the name of Walton Park containing by estimation about Five Hundred acres ... Together with the Stock of Rabbits and Covies thereon ... Together with all Outhouses Edifices Buildings Ways paths pafsages commons common of Pasture watercoursers Fences Except and always reserved out of this present lease all and all manner of Royalties Privileges Franchises Liberties and Jurisdictions and all manner of Wrecks of the Sea and also all and all manner of Mines and Quarries as well opened as to be opened and the produce Issue and profits thereof arising or to arise therefrom and full free and ample right for the said Earl to and for every such person or persons as he shall at any time or time impower order employ direct or appoint from time to time and at all times to enter into and upon the said hereby demised premises or any part or parcel thereof and there to pursue and work any old or opened as well as to open any now or at present unopened Mines or Quarries of Copper Brafs Lead Tin Lapis Calaminaris Coal Culm Stone Slate Shingle or any other ore metal or Mineral whatsoever and to make build erect and set up or cause and procure to be made built erected and set upon the said demised premises or any part or parts thereof one or more Dwelling house or Dwelling Houses with necessary and convenient outhouses and offices for the Dwelling and habitation therein and use of such person and persons as shall be from time to time employed or concerned in the management working or conducting such mine or mines and also all and all manner of Smelting Houses Forges Engines Sheds and other Houses and erections whatsoever necessary and convenient for the cleansing working Smelting depositions and keeping all such Coals Culm Stone Slate Shingle and other Minerals which shall from time to time be raised or produced from such More Quarries ... And also except all Timber Trees and other Trees and all young saplings and Stundils? likely to become trees and the Tops Lops Branches Shreds prunings and parings thereof now or hereafter to be standing growing or being in or upon the said demised premises ... with the full and free Liberty of Ingress Egress and Regress to and for the said Earl .. and to and for all undertakers and adventurers in the said Mines and Quarries his her and their respective agents Worman Miners Gruffers Labourers and Servants as well with as without any number of carts carriages Horses Oxen and other Beasts and all necessary Machines Tools and instruments from time to time ... And also Except full and free Liberty .. for the said Earl his Heirs and Assigns and their Agents Workmen and Servants into and upon the said Premises from time to time and at all time .. to dig raise work cleanse fell cut down take away the said excepted wrecks Ore Coal Culm Stone Slate Single and other Minerals and also the said Trees Saplings and Standils? and the Tops Lops Branches Shreds

"Prunings Paring thereof without molestation hindrance or denial And also Except ... for the Earl full and fre liberty of Hunting Fishing and Fowling at all times at the free will and pleasure of the sais Earl his hirs and assigns Yielding and paying Yearly and every Year during the said Term the Yearly rent of one hundred and ten pounds at four of the most usual feasts or days of payment in the Year that is to say the third day of May the first day of August the second day of November and the second day of February in every year. Also yielding and paying unto the said Earl his heirs and assigns the further rent of Ten Pounds for every acre or any part

of the said premises which the said Samuel Hollyman or Ruben Hollyman shall cause to be plowed or tilled or to be Cropped with any sort of Corn or Grain without at the time of such Plowing thereof or immediately previous heretofore drefsing and manuring the same with a sufficient Quantity of Dung or Earth and Lime well mixed together according to the method of good Husbandry ... or take above or more than Crops of any sort of Corn or Grain succefsively without either renewing such drefsing or suffering such Premises to lye fallow one year or in some artificial Grafs two year succefsively that shall be own thereon sow Ten Pounds of good Glover seed and two Bushels of good over ? Grafs Seed tp every acre thereof .. Also th further Yearly rent of Two Pounds for very acre that at any time shall be sown with Hemp Flax Rape or Mustard Seed Which said Sums of Ten Pounds and five Pounds per acre shall be by way of increasae of rent over and above the said yearly rent of one hundred and Ten Pounds without consent of the Earl be guilty of a breach have again repofses and Hollyman to expel put out. The tenants shall not carry off from the premises into other lands any of the Hay Straw Haulm Dung Soil or Compost ... Before the 2 February 1775 build on a convenient part of the premises a good strong and firm barn all the walls whereof to be of Stone and Lime and of the same thicknefs lenght and height as a certain barn lately erected at Combe Farm in the parish of Crekerne belonging to the said Earl and will well and sufficiently thatch and cover the same with good reed being allowd sufficient and proper timber to be had on the lands of the said Earl now rented by Widow Hedge but to be felled cut down worked and drawn to the place of the said building at the expence and costs of Samuel and Ruben Hollyman and also the sum of one hundred and fifty Pounds to be retained out of the reserved rent which shall accrue due in the two first years of the terme ..."

Dated, September 6th 1774.

Stephen Hollyman. 1714 - 1757

The second child of Reuben and Rachael Hollyman nee Foskett to be given this name was born in Clapton in Gordano yet baptised in Tickenham on March 11th.1714.The first Stephen was born in 1708 and appears to have died an infant.For some reason,Stephen travelled all the way to Barrow Gurney to the church of the Blessed Virgin Mary to marry Joane Rawlings a Portbury born girl,on August 10th.1739.They did,we know live in Clapton where Stephen died at the age of forty three and yet buried in Wraxall on May 19th.1757.His widow,Joane,lived for many more years and died 'poor' and buried,Wraxall on February 16th.1784.Of this union,there was issue of:-
Josiah Hollyman.Born in Clapton in 1742 and baptised on January 5th.1743.

He died at the age of 14 years and buried in Wraxall on January 10th.1757,the same year as his father.

John Hollyman. Born in Clapton and baptised there on May 20th.1747.Nothing else known.

Stephen Hollyman.Named after his father,was born in Clapton in 1750 and baptised there on June 19th.Nothing else known.

There appears to have been a great deal of smallpox about at this time, considering the many children of the Bave family who died of it and it could be that Stephens issue were victims. This is a mere conjecture on my part.Another point I make is that,although many Hollymans were registered as being buried at All Saints,Wraxall,it does not necessarily mean they were.These registrations might well have been convenient to the cleric who could have been resident in Wraxall.

The only son of Roger Hollyman and his wife, Rachael nee Vinpeny was born in Clapton in Gordano and baptised into the church on December 8th 1701. We know that four years later, the family lived in a cottage not far from the court and it was here that his parents lived out their lives.

By the time Oswald had reached his teens and began to work, his uncle had settled in Clevedon on land bought in Westbury on Trym about the year he was born and so Oswald joined him there. Documents show that he had a lot to do with the Elton family who owned Clevedon court for one account written in 1732 tells of his dealings with that family and its estate.

Oswald married a woman by the name of Elinor but due to the loss of many pages which comprised the parish register, we shall never know her maiden name or when they married. Neither do we know when or where he was buried. Both parents were alive in 1746 when their youngest child was born so it looks as though more searching is required.

Oswald and Elinor had six children of which four were sons.

Henry Hollyman the eldest was baptised in St Andrews on April 8th 1731 which may indicate the approximate date of the wedding of his parents. He settled in the same village where his grandfather had married and died, as far as is known, unwed and buried on April 4th 1782 aged 51 years.

Rachael Hollyman their first daughter was baptised also in St Andrews on April 12th 1733: she too settled in Yatton and does not appear to have married. She lived to a ripe old age in spite of the social adversities prevailing for she died aged 83 and buried on January 2nd 1816.

Oswald Hollyman. Baptised on June 12th 1738: nothing else known.

John Hollyman. Baptised in Walton in Gordano parish church on March 29th 1741. His fathers name is written, Ozell. Nothing else known.

Abram Hollyman. Baptised in St Andrews on December 26th 1742. He too appears to have remained in a single state. He was buried on February 24th 1814 and that event was recorded in the Nailsea parish register, as Abraham Holloman.

Ann Hollyman the youngest child was baptised on June 17th 1746 but she died aged 11 years and buried in Clapton (or recorded) on a date unknown but the year was 1757.

Roger and Rachael Hollyman did have one other child, a daughter Hannah born in 1711 but she died whilst still an infant and buried in Clapton in Gordano.

There is on record a burial of a Oswald Holliman on August 14th 1749 but, the question arises, which one?

The remark at the end was most likely of Abram Elton.

The kuzen so mentioned would be Hezekiah Hollyman and the John Hollyman was without a doubt, John born in Clapton in 1689.

The quarry mentioned is still there, located along the Walton road past what is now, Weston in Gordano.

NB. This appears to be the only surviving document from the period, according to the Elton family

Translated by Robert Mawson of Caernarvon. North Wales.

From the ELTON archives, Clevedon Court:

The document of 1732, sees mention of the Colepit at Clapton. The coal was obtained from an opencast pit by removing the topsoil and rock, then digging out the underlying deposits. Coal was sent to South Wales from here long before the Welsh exported their produce.

John Hollyman, to whom Oswald paid 'ye kings tax' Poor rate and Gift money was a tax collector. He would be Oswalds first cousin, John born in Clapton in 1698, whose mother was, Rachael (d. 1700 Westbury on Trym)

Kuzen Hollyman, to whom Oswald paid 'Church Rate' and Window tax was also a tax collector. He was most likely Hezekiah Hollyman half brother to John of Clapton and the son of Ann, John the elder's second wife.

Hezekiah was like many of the Hollymans, a yeoman, Churhwarden (1736) Overseer (1741-2) According to the Rev Abraham Elton's ledgers, he was paid by him for killing a fox in 1733.

The 'grene Cort' mentioned lies to the left of the Manor house as one faces it. Other extracts from these ledgers include:-

1812 - 1814: William Hollyman. Thatching oxhouse: Blacksmith, lime walls: plastering & roughing and rough casting: house: building stable, Brew House: furnace boiler oven: pig sties and flogging kitchen.

1819 - 1821. Thomas Hollyman had licence to keep and lease, Clevedon Inn.

The 'William' was probably the 'gentleman' mentioned in the Clevedon Jury List for 1810 and the same who was mentioned in the Will of Hezekiah, 1786 - 1820. William was the only son of Thomas and his second wife, Hannah nee Griffin formerly, Wall. During 1830 - 1840, William lived at Park House (Old Park House) which was owned by Elton and situated along a rough track off Kings road on Dial Hill.

Thomas Hollyman, son of Thomas and Elizabeth (nee Pitt) was also on the Jury

Oswald Hollyman born 1701, the only son of Roger Hollyman and Rachael Vinpeny of Clapton was to become the "agent" of Sir Abram Elton, Bart.

Pages 105 to 111, extracted from the Elton Archives, give us intriguing details of the running of a landed estate of those times i.e. 1732.

Page 112 in particular reveals the role of the Hollyman family as collectors of "the kings tax", the Window Tax and the Poor Rate tax

The Accounts also reveal that coal was mined on the estate or perhaps, more correctly, was dug out of "a cole pit" i.e. a primitive form of opencast mining, where the coal measures rise to the surface. Following the industrialization of England in the 19th Century the Somerset Coalfields were to become an important coal producing area until its decline and closure in the 1950's.

list for 1810. As landlord of the Clevedon Inn he was mentioned in the Calendar of Recognisances for 1822-3 and 1826-6.

A Thomas Hollyman was appointed Superintendent of Works on drainage and the building of a bridge over a new rhyne (reen). He was paid £568 in all and obtained some land under the 'allocation'....whatever that was.

Historical note.

The mention of the 'Window Tax' brings to mind the numerous instances where windows were blocked up with brick in order to avoid this iniquitous tax. Originally, windows were exactly what the word suggests: to allow the passage of wind to pass into the rooms etc. But in later years, glass was used to do the reverse, keep the wind out and allow the light to enter. During 1695 in the reign of William 3rd, that time when all five of the Hollymans with which this 'study' is concerned, lived in Clapton in Gordano, this tax was imposed and again later to provide income for special purposes. As late as 1850, the sum of £1,832,684 was raised. In the year of the Great Exhibition, 1851, this tax was removed from the Statute Books.

It must have been quite an astute mind to think up a tax to curtail light into one's home.

Note. The William mentioned as 'in the Clevedon jury' would NOT be the son of Thomas and Hannah.

Whilst searching for a Hollyman marriage which I knew had taken place in one of the Bath parishes, I tried the back numbers of the newspaper, BRISTOL INTELLIGENCER for any announcement but without success. I did, however come to the following which caught my eye. This item mentions a female member of the REED family and knowing that the Hollymans married into this family I noted:-

December 30th 1749

On Tuesday was married Abraham Isaac Elton Esq. barrister at Law, son of the late Sir Abraham Elton Br. deceased who represented this city in Parliament on several sessions, to Miss Reed daughter of Mr James Reed an eminent merchant of this city: an agreeable young lady with a large fortune.

Wednesday April 18th 1750

To be sold at Auction at Clevedon. The Household Goods of Sir Abraham Elton Bart. who is going to leave off housekeeping there. Consisting of Turkey and other carpets: a large Quantity of China of all sorts: One Bedstead with crimson worsted damask. Furniture and other divers sorts one couch bed for a parlour, feather beds Quilts and blankets tapestry and other hangings. Per Sconce and other glasses. Mahogany square and oval tables. casks and brewing utensils a large Quantity of fine pewter copper brass and all sorts of Household Goods.

All to be sold without any reserve and the sale to begin at ten o'clock in the morning till all are sold.

I will resist to put down my comments, but I wonder if this young lady so agreeable with her large fortune gave up some of it to.....?

Hezekiah Hollyman.(1711-1749) Overseer.

With regard to the duties of an overseer to a parish, it was the son of John the elder and his second wife, Ann to whom this position was given for a few years.

Overseers were appointed during the reign of Elizabeth under the Poor Law of 1601 that directed overseers of every parish to raise money by taxation in order to provide work for the unemployed, to relieve the aged and infirm and to apprentice pauper children and build poor houses. This system continued almost unaltered but much abused down to the passing of the Poor Law Amendment Act 1834. By this Act, parishes were grouped together under elected Boards of Guardians but each parish continued to be financially responsible for its own poor.

Able-bodied paupers could receive relief only if they moved into a workhouse. These workhouses were dreaded by the poor: they were dirty and disease ridden and no attempt was made to separate the sick, the senile and the mad from the rest of the inhabitants. The very low rates of relief made it almost impossible for people, once reduced to poverty to escape from it again.

I have found only one Hollyman who had died in such a place, places commonly called, Unions and that was Thomas Hollyman who died at the age of 35 years in the Ashton Union in March 1855. This was the eldest son of Thomas and his wife Phoebe Hollyman.....Phoebe married John Bees soon after she was made a widow.

The old Poor Law was gradually superseded by the introduction of nationally administered schemes for old age pensions (1908) and insurance against not only sickness and unemployment. (1911). It was not abolished until the National Insurance Act of 1947 which transferred responsibility for the relief of the poor from local authorities to the National Assistance Boards.

Hezekiah Hollyman. 1711 - 1749

The only surviving son of John Hollyman the elder and his second wife, Ann was, according to his age at death, born in 1711. He was a yeoman farmer as was his father and also the parish Overseer and churchwarden. His marriage to Ann must have taken place during those years when pages of the parish registers are missing. This could have been around the years, 1735-36. Ann was then about sixteen years old considering her age at her demise. This, of course, was not unusual for these times. Hezekiah enjoyed only fourteen years of their marriage before he died at the age of thirty eight and buried in December 1749 inside St Andrew's church. Ann survived him by many years when she died at the age of seventy five in March 1795 and buried near her husband.

Of this union, there was issue of:-

John Hollyman. Born in 1737 and baptised on August 25th was also a yeoman farmer. He married at the age of thirty six to Walton born Hannah Churches in Clevedon on September 7th. 1773. After a few years, John died aged forty four and buried near his father on August 28th. 1781. He died without issue. I have found no trace at all after their wedding, of Hannah. But there are other words on John's tomb which are worn too much to be able to read.

Reuben Hollyman. Born and baptised in 1739, died whilst still an infant. His name is spelt as, Rubin or Robin in the parish register.

Mary Hollyman. Their only daughter was baptised on September 6th 1742. She gave birth to a so called base child, a son in March 1763 whom she named, ^{*}Samuel Durbin Hollyman. There does not appear to be a baptism of this child but there is a burial unless he was baptised elsewhere.

Mary, as Mrs Mary Griffin died aged 71 and buried in Clevedon

on September 11th 1813. Mary married Joseph Griffin in 1767
in Clevedon and from this union, there were four children one
of whom, married Mary's niece, Mary Hollyman, the daughter of
her brother, Thomas and Martha.

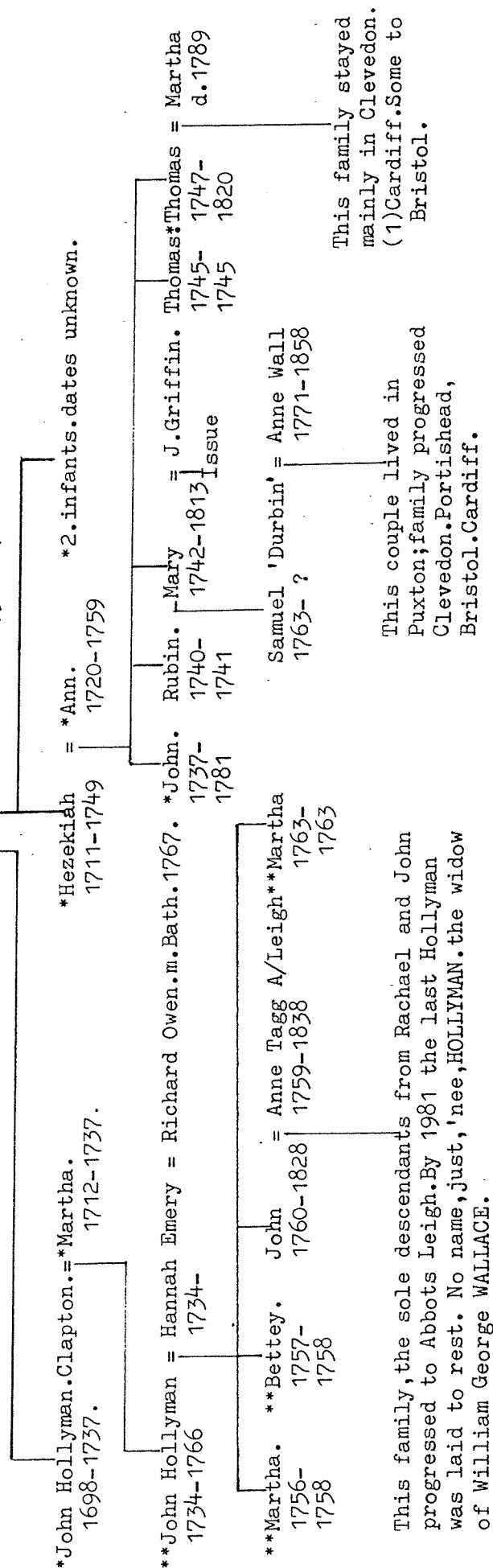
Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on June 5th 1745 died in April 1746 and buried on
the fifth at St Andrews church.

Thomas Hollyman. The youngest child was baptised on March 20th 1748. Thomas
became a very successful farmer and a wealthy one. He married
twice. Firstly to Martha Taylor in 1771 in Yatton and by her,
had many children before she died in 1787. Thomas then married
Hannah, the widow of Thomas Wall nee Bayly in Clevedon in 1790.
Of this union, there was one son, William born in 1791.
Thomas died in 1820 and buried in the family vault inside St
Andrew's church on September 30th aged 74.
Hannah outlived him by ten years and was buried on Christmas
Eve, 1830.

Many of these families have been traced to the present day. At the time of writing, there were more Hollymans in the Welsh capital city of Cardiff than anywhere with a total of more than 165 born since 1841 with the birth of the eldest daughter of Clevedon's Hezekiah Hollyman and his wife, Mary nee Maggs.

Thomas Hollyman 1746 - 1820 ✓

The youngest son of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman was born in 1746 and baptised at the parish church of St Andrew's Clevedon on March 28th 1748. He was the second son of Hezekiah and Ann to be named Thomas after the first had died. It appears that it was this Thomas Hollyman who added to the land holdings which had been acquired by his father. Thomas's Will gives much details of these lands. He married twice, firstly to Martha Taylor in Yatton in 1771 and by her, had ten children. At the age of about thirty six, Martha died and was buried in Clevedon on March 17th 1787. After her death, Thomas married for the second time to Hannah Wall, nee Bayley, the widow of Thomas Wall a Puxton farmer and of this marriage, there was just one son, William born in 1791. Thomas died aged seventy four in 1820 the same year as his youngest son, Dr Hezekiah Hollyman and was laid to rest inside the church of St Andrews in the family vault. But why in the same vault as a Phillips is not readily understood although the Ann Phillips was once, Ann Nethway who gave birth to a base child, she named Ann Hollyman.

Of the children of Thomas and Martha, the firstborn was:-

Hezekiah Hollyman. Born in 1771, baptised on April 18th 1773 died 1777 and buried on April 14th.

Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on July 13th 1774 became a farmer and married to Elizabeth Pitt in Bristol. He died on December 25th 1807 and buried on December 28th.

Martha Hollyman. Their first daughter was baptised on October 3rd 1775. She married John Griffin, the son of Mary Hollyman (her aunt) and Joseph Griffin on November 18th 1793. She died in Clevedon on August 2nd 1858 aged 62 years.

John Hollyman. Baptised on February 23rd 1777 was also a yeoman farmer. He married Sarah Parsley of Portishead in Bristol. I have not found any record of his death and subsequent burial although I assume he was buried in the same grave as Sarah in Weston

in Gordano. Sarah died aged fifty one in 1830 and was buried I suspect with her two children but, once again, there is no proof. (See photograph of the memorial stone.)

Ann Hollyman, the fifth child was baptised on April 13th 1778 but she died aged twenty three years old and buried at St. Andrews on June 14th 1801.

Hannah Hollyman. Baptised on May 6th 1780 married Richard Brookes of Kingston on January 31st 1802.

Mary Hollyman. Baptised on February 6th 1781 married William Parsons in Bristol. Due to a Mrs Carol Parker, I have included the lineage of Mary Parsons nee Hollyman in this study.

Elizabeth Hollyman was baptised on June 12th 1782 and married William Wilmott Stokes in Bristol at the church of S.S. Philip & Jacob on 8th of September 1804.

Sarah Hollyman, the youngest daughter was baptised on January 12th 1784 and married John Parsley in Clevedon on July 29th 1805.

Hezekiah Hollyman. The youngest child and fourth son was baptised on January 9th 1786. He became the medical officer for St George's now known as, Easton in Gordano. He married the youngest daughter of his stepmother, Hannah nee Bayley who married Thomas Hollyman. Hezekiah Hollyman died in 1820 aged thirty four. Many of his children were born/baptised in St George's.

These were the children of Thomas Hollyman and his first wife, Martha and have their own individual families described herein.

After the death of his wife, Martha, Thomas married Hannah, widow of Thomas Wall of Puxton. Hannah, nee Griffin was the mother of Anne Wall who married Samuel Hollyman of Clevedon in Clevedon. Her youngest daughter married Thomas's youngest son, Hezekiah. Thomas and Hannah were married in Clevedon on August 12th 1790. A copy of the 'notice' of marriage can be seen at the end of the lists of marriages. The sum of £200 was paid by Thomas to the bishop of Bath and Wells. No wonder this diocese was considered to be a very powerful one.

But of this marriage there was only one son:-

William Hollyman who was born the year after the wedding and baptised in Clevedon on December 22nd 1795. He became a builder of some note and became wealthy. He married Ann the daughter of Samuel and Nancy (Ann) Day of Kewstoke in that parish on March 24th 1814. When William died aged 59, he was buried on December 28th 1850 at the rear of St Andrews close to the pathway. Ann died nineteen years later and buried on March 27th 1869 aged 74 years. There was no issue. Much of the estate of Ann Hollyman was left to her own kin, the Days. A copy of this Will is available in Bristol's Records Office.

Quote by JANE LILLY of TALKING POINTS

CLEVEDON MERCURY

The 'GROVE' in Walton road was built by William Hollyman and, although he owned it, he never lived there but let it to Joseph Sheppard. This imposing residence stands on the 'Waste' on the west side of Walton road, Clevedon.

This house still has its oval domed stair light with classical embellishments fit for a miniature palace. The fireplaces alone are worthy of comment one of white and one of black marble both showing the Regency liking for the Egyptian, Greek and Roman styles mixed well together. A nice touch is that the porcelain bell handles beside each fireplace match the marble.

Formalised Tudor roses have been used throughout the house: on the ceilings, fireplaces, bookcases, grilles and elsewhere. There is still a massively heavy locking door to the old wine cellar and two pantries with the original shelving still intact.

William built the 'Grove' opposite the Old Inn in 1827 according to the deeds on the property at Somersetshire Records Office. He also built Trellis and Ibex cottages in East Clevedon Triangle about 1824 and Rose cottages No 1 and 2 in 1837, also at East Triangle.

Between 1832 and 1839, William Hollyman was known to have been living at Old Park House which was owned by the Elton family: one of the oldest houses in Clevedon, it was built 1650 and stands around the corner from Castlewood Close.

During the 1830's he appears to have owned a number of properties occupied by persons by the name of HEATH, LUKINS and MAYO. In 1832, he owned Champion House occupied by Mayo and an orchard and PILTONS 3 acres occupied by Sam Day who was most likely his father-in-law. This was West End farm, the larger of the two thatched cottages in Old Church road. In that year, Hollyman and Newton were owners of the Royal hotel in Hill road now the Friary. It was occupied by Stokes and William may have been the senior partner with Newton.

By 1841, William and Ann were living at Cliffe House with two servants and one manservant. After the death of William, Ann, now known as a 'Proprietor' of Lands, continued to live at Cliffe House until she died in 1869.

The 1861 census returns for Clevedon will bear this out.

TRANSCRIPT OF THE WILL OF THOMAS HOLLYMAN OF CLEVEDON.

Dated. September 30th 1820

Thomas Hollyman died at the age of 73 - it would suggest he was too ill to write as his Will was signed with a cross. He was survived by his widow Hannah, who was his second wife, he having been married to Martha. He was also survived by his two Sons, John and William and five daughters. Apart from infant Sons, he was also predeceased by Thomas and Hezekiah. In his Will, Thomas left his House, Lands known as "Barbers" to his Son, John. To his Son William, he gave his House called "Brocks" in which William was living.

To John and William, he left his House and Butchers Shop but subject to their paying £16 per year Annuity to Richard Owen of Clevedon. This Annuity he states he is bound to pay him. (All properties were in Clevedon)

To his daughter-in-law, Elizabeth, Widow of his Son Thomas, all the premises known as the Moor Eight Acres in Clevedon for and during her natural life for the support of herself and her children. After her death, to her children.

The Will goes on to state:

To Charles Abraham Elton, House, Offices and outhouses and also the Orchard called "Home Orchard" and the Orchard lying near the Bow, called "Kenway" Orchard, also a close of pasture called "Garstons" part of his Estate, called or generally known by the name of late Hezekiah Hollymans UPON TRUST to allow the Widow of Hezekiah Hollyman (Harriet Phillips) to receive the rents and profits to support herself and her four children until his grand son, Alfred Hezekiah reaches 21. When he reaches 21, to the use of his Grand son after his grandsons death, to the eldest Son of his Grandson.

The residue of his Estate to be divided between his children or Grandchildren. He states that as the comforts of several of his children will depend so much upon the due and regular payment of the rents, that the Tenant or Tenants shall not only execute a Lease but procure sufficient Surety for the due and regular payment of the rent to be reserved in such Lease. He further states that in case any dispute arises regarding the property, such dispute shall in

all instance be submitted to his great friend the Rev'd Sir Abraham Elton Bart. whose long and unremitted attentions to the best interests of himself and family I have for many years experienced and whose good wishes for the welfare of his Children will I know live after I am dead.

John and William were appointed executors.

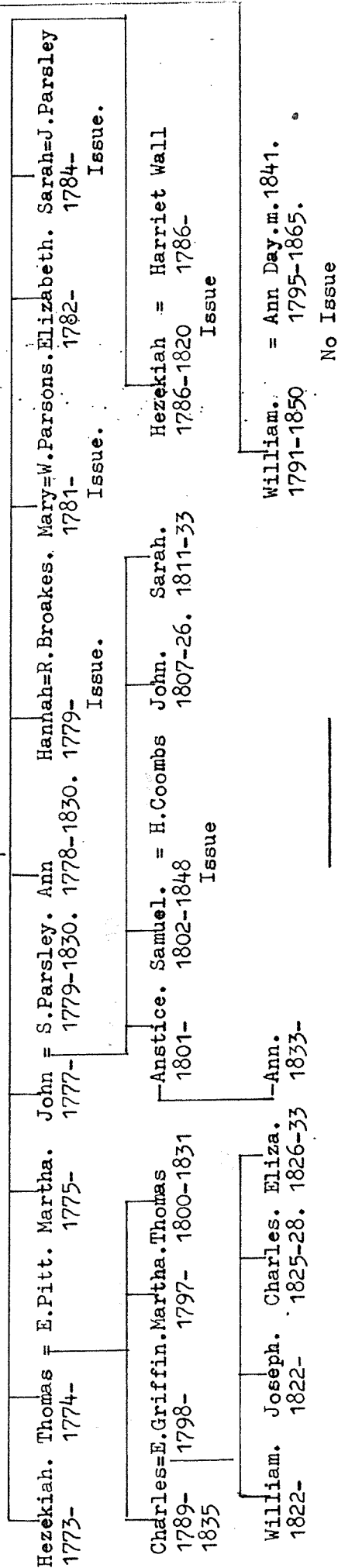

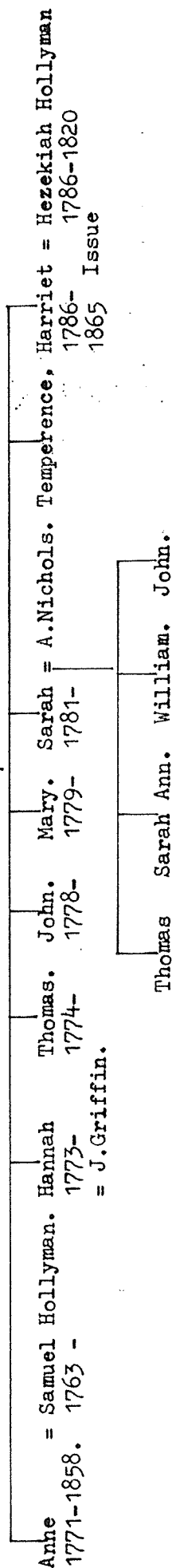

These charts show the relationships between the HOLLYMANS and the WALLS.

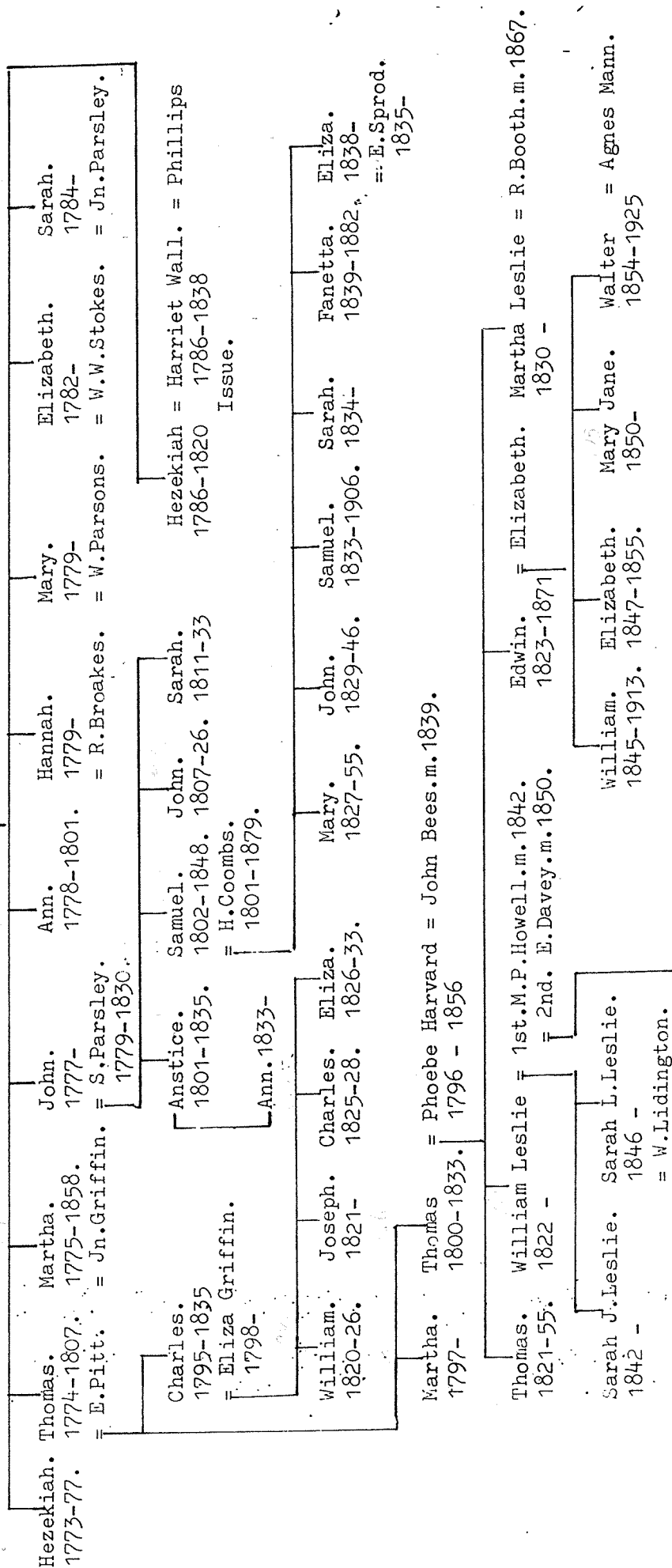

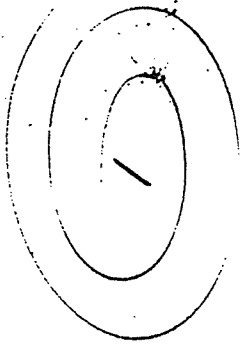



John Hollyman. bn.1777.

John, the fourth child of Thomas and Martha Hollyman nee Taylor, was born in 1777 and baptised on February 23rd in St Andrew's, Clevedon. He married Sarah Parsley in Bristol on September 11th. 1795 and lived in Clevedon where he became a farmer like many Hollymans. I have yet to find out where John died or when but Sarah was buried in the parish of Weston in Gordano at the age of fifty one on December 18th. 1830. Her headstone has eroded to such an extent that only her name and John's surname is readable. When one considers the fact that 'Sarah' is on the right hand corner, it may be likely that there must be other information on the left of the stone.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Anstice Hollyman who was born on March 4th. 1801 and baptised on February 1st. 1807. She died aged 35 years and buried on January 10th. 1835. Although she does not appear to have married, she left a daughter:-

Ann Hollyman who was baptised on September 8th. 1833 and was three years old when her mother died. As there were so many Ann Hollymans, I cannot be certain what happened to her. But it is possible that she lived at 'Woodbine' cottage in 1851.

Samuel Hollyman. The eldest son was born on December 27th. 1802 and he was baptised on the same day as Anstice. He was also a farmer and married in Bristol to Hester Coombs and, in 1841, they were living at 'Newhouse' farm along Moor Lane. Between 1841 and 1851, they moved to Nailsea where Hester had been born. Samuel died aged forty five and buried there on November 17th. 1848. Hester survived him by thirty years when she died at the age of 72 and buried on March 8th. 1879. Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Mary Hollyman who was baptised on May 20th 1827. Very little is known of Mary for she seems to be missing from the 1841 census as is John also. Mary died aged 27 and buried in Nailsea on February 9th 1855.

John Hollyman. The eldest son was baptised June 14th 1829 but died aged 17 years old: buried in Nailsea on May 13th 1846.

Samuel Hollyman. Baptised on May 6th 1833 which, if at age on his headstone is correct, he must have remained single. He died aged 76 and buried in Kenn on October 11th 1906.

Sarah Hollyman. Baptised on July 20th 1834. Nothing else known.

Eliza Hollyman was baptised on March 30th 1838. She married Edward Sprod a tallow chandler in c 1863. I have included their family in this study.

Fanetta Hollyman was baptised on December 25th 1839. Fanetta or Fanny did remain a spinster. She died aged 41 and buried in Nailsea on January 24th 1882.

John Hollyman, the second son of John & Sarah nee Parsley was born on the 6th of January 1807 and baptised with Anstice. He died aged twenty and most likely buried with his mother in Weston in Gordano November 6th 1826.

Sarah Hollyman the youngest child was baptised in Clapton in Gordano on October 10th 1811. She too died young and was buried on March 1st 1833 aged twenty one.

NB. I fail to understand why Sarah should have been baptised where she was unless of course this is yet another instance where the 'cleric' has found it convenient to record this baptism in the parish register of St Michaels in Clapton in Gordano.

Although mentioned before, Mary daughter of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman was born in 1742 and baptised the same year on September 6th in the local church of St Andrews in Clevedon. When she was twenty one years old, she gave birth to Samuel Durbin Hollyman a base child. Strangely enough, there is no record of a baptism but there is a record of a burial. The date of this burial is March 6th 1763 but, as there was no age given, we will never know when he was born.

Yet in the records of Land Taxes and the particular account for Jane Battman for 1781 in Walton in Gordano, one of the assessors was a Samuel Hollyman. Considering that many Hollymans were tax assessors and collectors, can we assume this assessor was none other than Samuel born to Mary in 1763? At the end of 1790, Samuel Hollyman who was described as a 'gentleman of this parish of Clevedon' married the eldest daughter, Anne of Thomas and Hannah Wall. During that period between 1748 and 1773, a twenty five year space of time, there should have been only one baptism or, there was only one Hollyman birth and that was this Samuel Durbin in 1763. It must be concluded therefore that this Samuel was none other than Mary Hollymans son.

Four years after this event, Mary married Joseph Griffin in Walton in Gordano and I feel that these two, now married brought up the baby Samuel, and that Joseph accepted him as his own.

The Issue of Mary Hollyman and Joseph Griffin

Not having searched this family, I will refer to the information given me by a lady whose direct lineage comes from the marriage of Mary and Joseph Griffin. They were married in the parish church of Walton in Gordano on March 7th 1767. The two witnesses were, William Plumley and John Hollyman who I submit was the brother of Mary born in 1737. He too was married in the same church. Mary died aged 71 years and was buried in Clevedon on September 11th 1813:

Joseph had died previously and was buried inside the church of St Andrews in the south aisle near the font on August 1st 1811. They had issue of:-

Nancy Griffin. She was baptised in Portishead on June 11th 1768: she married Abraham Battman Pritchard at St Andrews church Clevedon on December 7th 1789 by licence. Hezekiah Pritchard, was baptised on August 9th 1807. He too died an infant and buried in Weston in Gordano on December 27th 1807

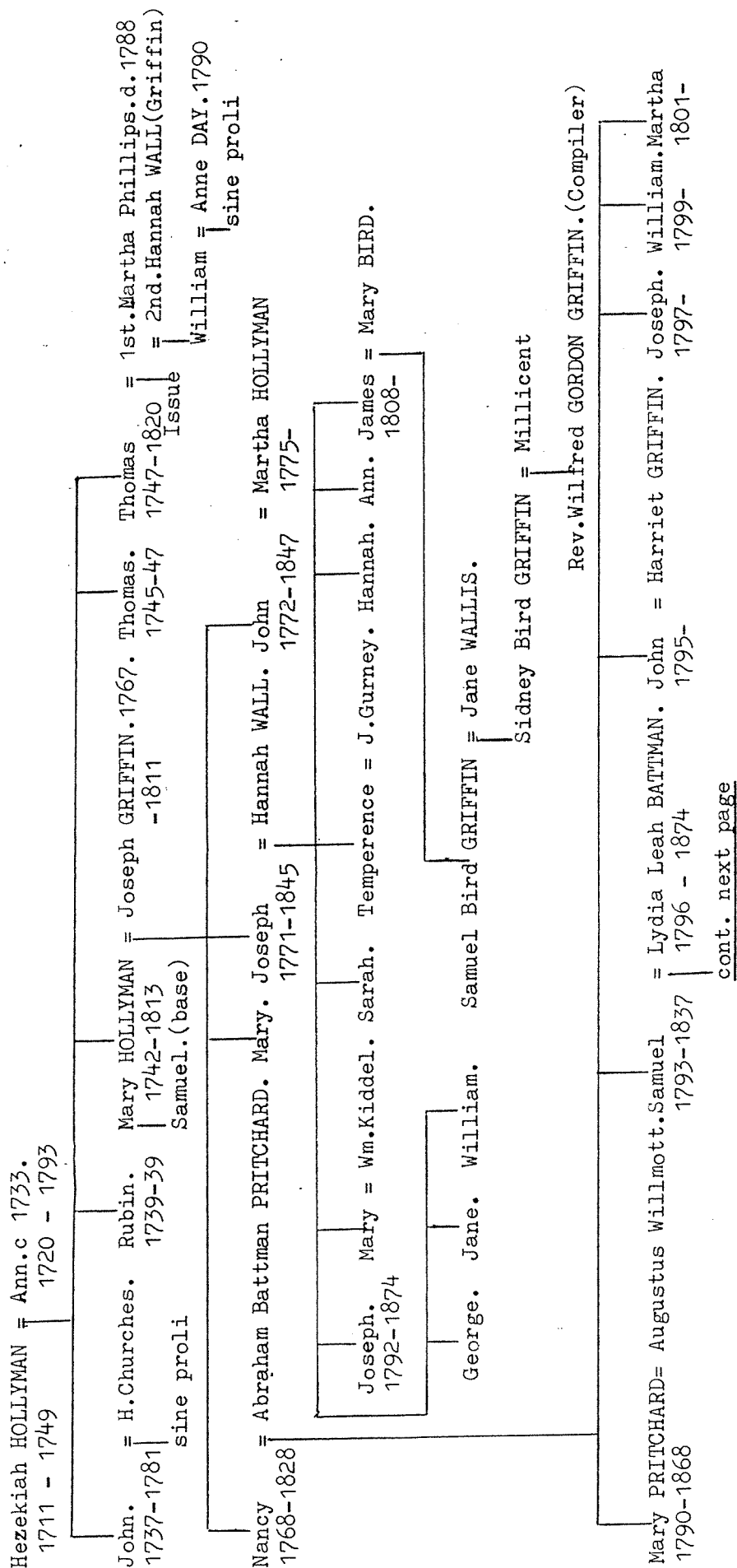

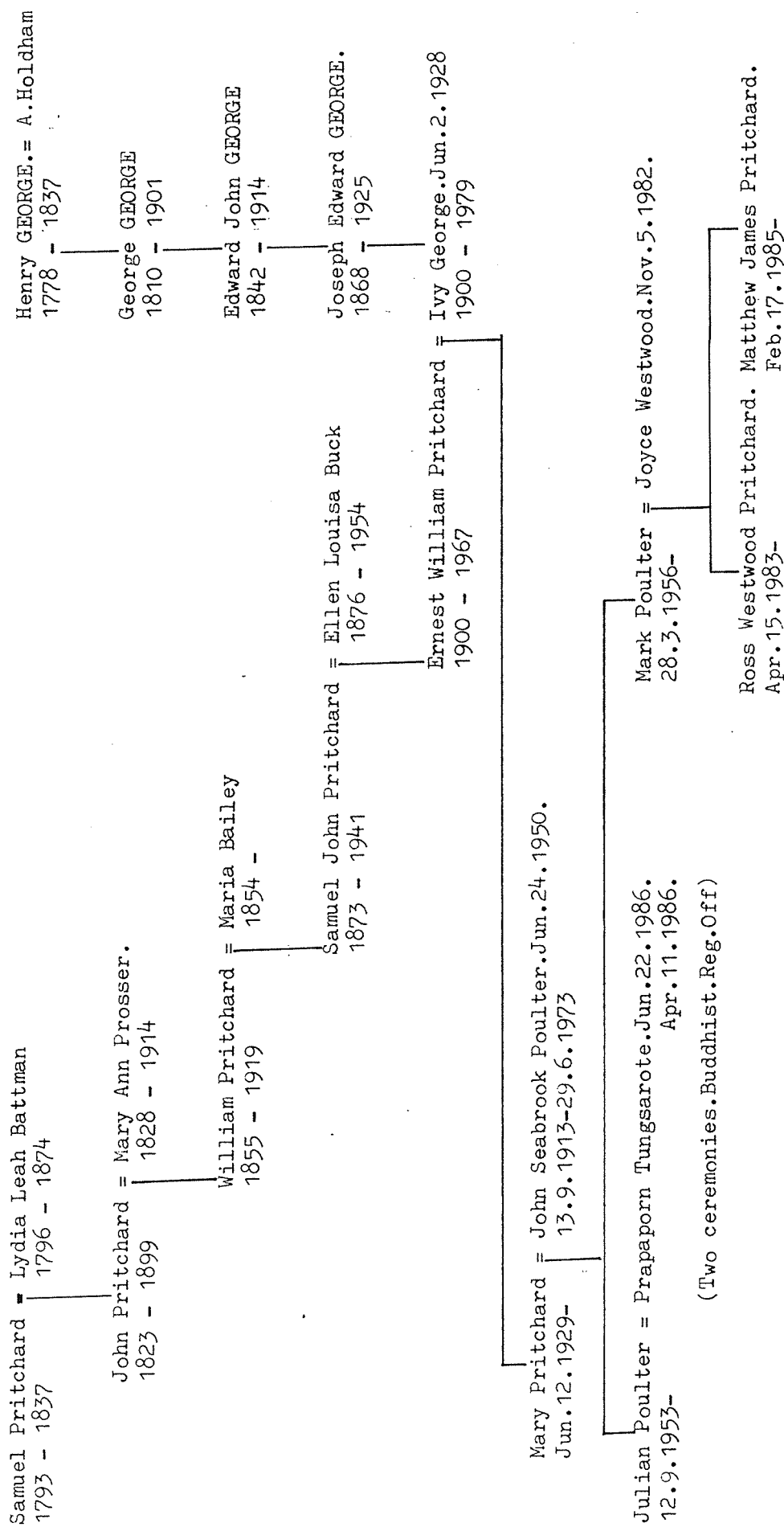

Mary was the sixth child of Thomas and Martha Hollyman nee ~~Bayley~~ born in Clevedon in 1780 and baptised in the church of St.Andrews on February 1st.1781.She was one of the first Hollymans to be married in Bristol from Clevedon in the 19th century.¹⁰⁰⁶ She married William Parsons at St.James Barton on November 16th 1802 when she was twenty two years old.It appears that five years would elapse before the birth of their first child in 1807.

Mary Parsons was born the year her grandfather Thomas Hollyman died,1820

He became the medical officer for the county and was titled, Dr H. Hollyman, surgeon in the parish registers. Harriet was born in Puxton on June 16th. 1786 and baptised there on January 10th. 1787. In 1790, her mother, who had been widowed by the death of Thomas, married Thomas Hollyman, Hezekiah's father which made Hannah, his mother in law and stepmother and making the the young people, half brother and half sister in marriage.

Based for some years in St George's, otherwise known as, Easton in Gordano, it must follow that some of his children were born and baptised there. Dr. Hezekiah also had a house in Clevedon situated on Hill road which, at the time of writing is the site of a convent school.

After his death and burial on May 22nd. 1820 aged a very young thirty four years old, his widow, Harriet married a Mr Philips, a fact which has been reached by her headstone which bears the inscription, Harriet, relict of Dr. Hezekiah Hollyman.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Albina Hollyman. Born the year after the wedding, possibly 1808, married a farmer, Thomas Maynard. See next page.

Louisa Hollyman. Another whose baptism has not been found was born ca. 1809 is likely to be the Louisa Hollyman who married Thomas Tripp in St Augustine (the less) on January 30th. 1831.

Harriet Hollyman. Born in Clevedon on June 27th. 1814, was baptised on May 13th. 1821 after the death of her father. Nothing else known.

Temperence Hollyman. This name probably chosen by her mother after her own sister, Temperence Wall died aged nineteen months old and buried in Clevedon on March 2nd 1816.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman their first son was born in 1818 but he too died an infant and was buried in Clevedon on February 1st 1819 five months old.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman their youngest child and only surviving son was born on February 27th 1820 about three months before the death of his father and was baptised on the same day as his sibling, Harriet. He was also a farmer and was known as the Elder in later years.

I feel certain that it was this Harriet Hollyman who after the death of Dr Hezekiah travelled to Yatton in 1827 (see that parish's registers)

In her Will, Hannah second wife of Thomas mentions her grand daughter Louisa Tripp and the only Hollyman with that forename was this, the daughter of Harriet and Dr Hezekiah.

Albina Hollyman married to Thomas Maynard had issue of:-

Ten children all born and baptised in Clevedon.

Thomas Maynard was a farmer,publican,nurseryman,confectioner and baker.
He was born in Clevedon in 1806.No further searches made but it looks as
if many of his children died at an early age.

"Doctor H.Hollyman lived in a house,the site of which is now a catholic
school and it is said that the Big Room overlooked by the footpath between
Marine Hill and Hill road was the music room of his time.His three daughters,
known as the 'Beautiful Miss Hollymans'played the harp,violin and piano,no
doubt to the delight of passers by.

They were,of course,Albina,Harriet and Louisa Hollyman.

The Clevedon Mercury. December 10th 1982. 'Moorman'writes,

"I think the Hollyman families must be amongst the oldest surviving in the
district along with the Crossmans and the Eltons.I believe there is a Rev.
Crossman among the vicars listed in the parish church.

NB. MY comment,There was,in 1666. And the Hollymans were in Clevedon before
the Eltons bought the court,but only by a few years.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman. 1820 - 1881

The only surviving son of Dr. Hezekiah and Harriet Hollyman, nee Wall was born on February 27th. 1820 the year his father died. He died aged sixty one in Yatton and buried in Clevedon on June 7th. 1881, close to the church itself. He was married twice: the first to Mary Maggs in or near Dursley in Gloucester in 1839 by whom he had six children. The first years of their lives were spent in Cardiff at an address in Ebeneza street where, presumably their first child was born. Alfred was working as a clerk at the time and the couple returned to Clevedon for the birth of the next four children. They then travelled back to south Wales to Briton Ferry near Swansea where their last child was born. This proved fatal for Mary for she died either from the birth or some other malady and her body was brought to Clevedon for burial on December 13th. 1851 at the age of thirty four.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Mary Louise Hollyman. Born in Cardiff and baptised at St John & St. Mary church on October 16th. 1841 but she died an infant the same year.

Mary Maggs Hollyman. Born in Clevedon and baptised at St Andrew's on January 7th. 1844 eloped with a local man named Edward Bacon to Bristol where they were married on May 5th. 1862 at Temple church. The couple lived in Clevedon. Edward died whilst out at sea near Clevedon and buried next to his Hollyman kin in 1902 aged 66. Mary died in Glastonbury aged 92. 1935.

Louisa Hollyman. Baptised at St Andrews on December 29th. 1844 same year as her sister, Mary but died at age of 10 months in 1845.

Louisa Hollyman. The second daughter to bear this name and was also ill-fated. She lived for just two days and buried on January 5th. 1846.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman. This, their first son was born in 1847 and baptised on Jan. 1st. He married Mary whose maiden name is not known in Bristol in 1868.

Thomas Edward Hollyman their youngest child was born in Briton Ferry in 1851 the year his mother died. Thomas was living in East street Bedminster working as an apprenticed butcher in 1871.

Notes.

The Clevedon Mercury. 1985. 'Spade and Plough'

All of us love a romantic story and when Mr and Mrs George Hollyman called the other afternoon, he had a letter to show me telling of a local romance of many years ago. The letter came from Marjorie Moorhouse of Burnham near Slough who sees the Mercury and tells us that her grandmother ran away to get married at St Mary Redcliffe church in Bristol.

The runaway lady had fallen in love with a Clevedon man, a Mr Bacon, said to be a fisherman here and the couple had been pursued by her angry brother who disapproved of the match. He had hurried to Bristol but arrived too late to stop the wedding.

What interested me was the fact that George thinks the fisherman lived in the little stone cottage down by the sea wall known as 'Gull House' before it was demolished.

Why that cottage was there has always puzzled me. I'd been told that it was a herdsman's place, the man who looked after farmers cows but now, I like the fisherman's story better. After all, they do make good catches off Blackstone rocks, a few hundred yards seaward of 'Gull House'

Sadly, Mr Usher (Moorman) has passed away and his column has been replaced by 'Talking Points' Jane Lilley who has supplied me with much valuable information.

This elopement would have taken place in the 1860's and the brother who had tried to prevent the wedding was George's grandfather, Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman. He was accompanied by their father also Alfred Hezekiah. (1820 - 1881).

Writer's comment:

This wedding actually took place at the Temple church in 1862 and the man in question was Edward Bacon, son of Henry Bacon.

I have been in touch with Mrs Moorhouse but have NOT told her of my findings.

The second marriage.

About two years after the death of Mary, nee Maggs, Alfred's first wife, he married for a second time to Sarah whose surname is not yet known. That marriage was registered in the first quarter of 1853 in Long Ashton. From this union, there were five children:-

Betsy Hollyman who was baptised on December 31st 1854 but she died whilst still an infant and buried on January 14th 1855.

Louisa Hollyman. Baptised on January 27th 1856: mentioned in the census of 1861 but that's the last event known.

George Hollyman. Baptised on July 29th 1857 but he too died an infant. Aged 3 weeks and buried, August 21st 1857.

Samuel Hollyman. Baptised on December 12th 1858 and became a publican in Yatton. He was married to Emma Parsons. This event took place in Yatton parish church on January 30th 1890, the same church where Roger Hollyman wed Rachael Vinpeny in 1695. Samuel died aged 59 and was buried in Yatton on April 19th 1919 and Emma was buried on January 9th 1933 aged 71. It is not thought there were any children of this union.

Betsy Hollyman. The second daughter to bear this forename was baptised in Clevedon on September 30th 1860 and lived for twenty four years: she was buried in Yatton on February 16th 1885.

Although there were no sons to carry on the Hollyman name in this family, Alfred did leave a son of the same name from his first marriage.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman 1846 - 1906

Born in 1846 and baptised in Clevedon on January 1st 1847, Alfred was the son of Alfred Hezekiah and Mary Hollyman nee Maggs. He was a farmer and married to *Hannah Fry, an event which was registered in the Bristol area. Alfred died aged 60 on November 20th 1906.

Of his widow, nothing else is known. Of this union there were:-

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman who was born possibly at Houghton near Carlisle in 1876. I say, possibly for this was where this birth was registered. Alfred grew up to marry Mary Tye. He died aged 68 in 1944.

May Ann Hollyman. May or, Mary was also registered in Houghton but in 1877.

Nothing else known but searches continue. Upon enquiries, it was learned that Alfred and Hannah did spend some of their time near Carlisle but that was considered an opinion.

* As explained on the previous page, Alfred married a woman named, Mary.

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman 1876 - 1944

As explained above, Alfred was born/registered as being born in Houghton. He married Mary Tye in the Long Ashton area of Somerset in 1899. The couple lived in Clevedon along the Old Church road. Alfred worked as a wheelwright, a vocation which caused him much travelling, which explains why one of his sons birth was registered in Mere.

Alfred died as the direct result of a fall he sustained whilst working on the roof of their home in 1944. Mary lived a widow for nearly twenty years til she died aged 90 in 1963.

Of this union, there were :-



Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman. Born in 1900. Married Eveline Golding and had two sons:-

Kevin Hollyman. Born in 1924.

John Hollyman. Born in 1926 ?

Alfred Charles Hollyman. Born in 1901. Married Elsie Ashe. Nothing else known.

Albert Thomas Hollyman. Born in 1902. Married Gladys Brimble on June 2nd 1924.

Gladys was born in 1898 and died in 1981 one year after Albert.

There were three children of this marriage:-

Betty Mary Hollyman. Born in 1926 and married John Thomas Richards who was born in 1923. This couple live in Congresbury. Of this union there was/is seven children. See appropriate chart.

Phyliss Joan Hollyman. Born on January 25th 1927. Married to Clifford

Robert Brown on June 10th 1950. Nothing else known

Margaret Hollyman. Born in 1934. Married to Dennis Moxham and has one daughter, Sarah Moxham born on September 6th 1965

Arthur Hollyman. Born in 1904. Married Ann Varney who was born in 1906.

Arthur died in 1977 aged 73 and had issue of:-

Jean Hollyman. Born in 1940. Married to Robert Gooding in 1963. They have children:-

Susan Gooding. Born in 1964. Duncan Gooding. Born in 1966.

Colin Hollyman. Born in 1941. Married to Sandra Mendham in 1967. Of this union there are three children:-

Frank Hollyman. Twin brother to Arthur. Married Florence. Nothing else known

Walter George Hollyman. Born in Monkton Deveraux, Wiltshire on November 18th 1905 and, at the time of writing, still living at 77 Kenn road, Clevedon with his wife, Frances nee Hawkes, who was born in 1904. Of this union, there are:-

Dennis John Hollyman. Born in 1933 became Personnel manager for a Chemical company at Sasolburg, Orange Free State, S. Africa.

Ann Hollyman. Married 1st Colin Butler and had daughter, Leslie. Nothing else known. Searches continue.

Ernest Vincent Hollyman. Born in 1909. Married Florence Maunders. Of this union there was one daughter:-

Mary Elizabeth Hollyman. Born in 1931. Married to Aubrey Willcocks who was born in 1927. There are two sons from this marriage:-
John Gilbert Willcocks. Born in 1956.

Andrew Scott Willcocks. Born in 1961

Frederick John Hollyman. Born on January 10th 1904. Married Millicent Mason. They have three children:-

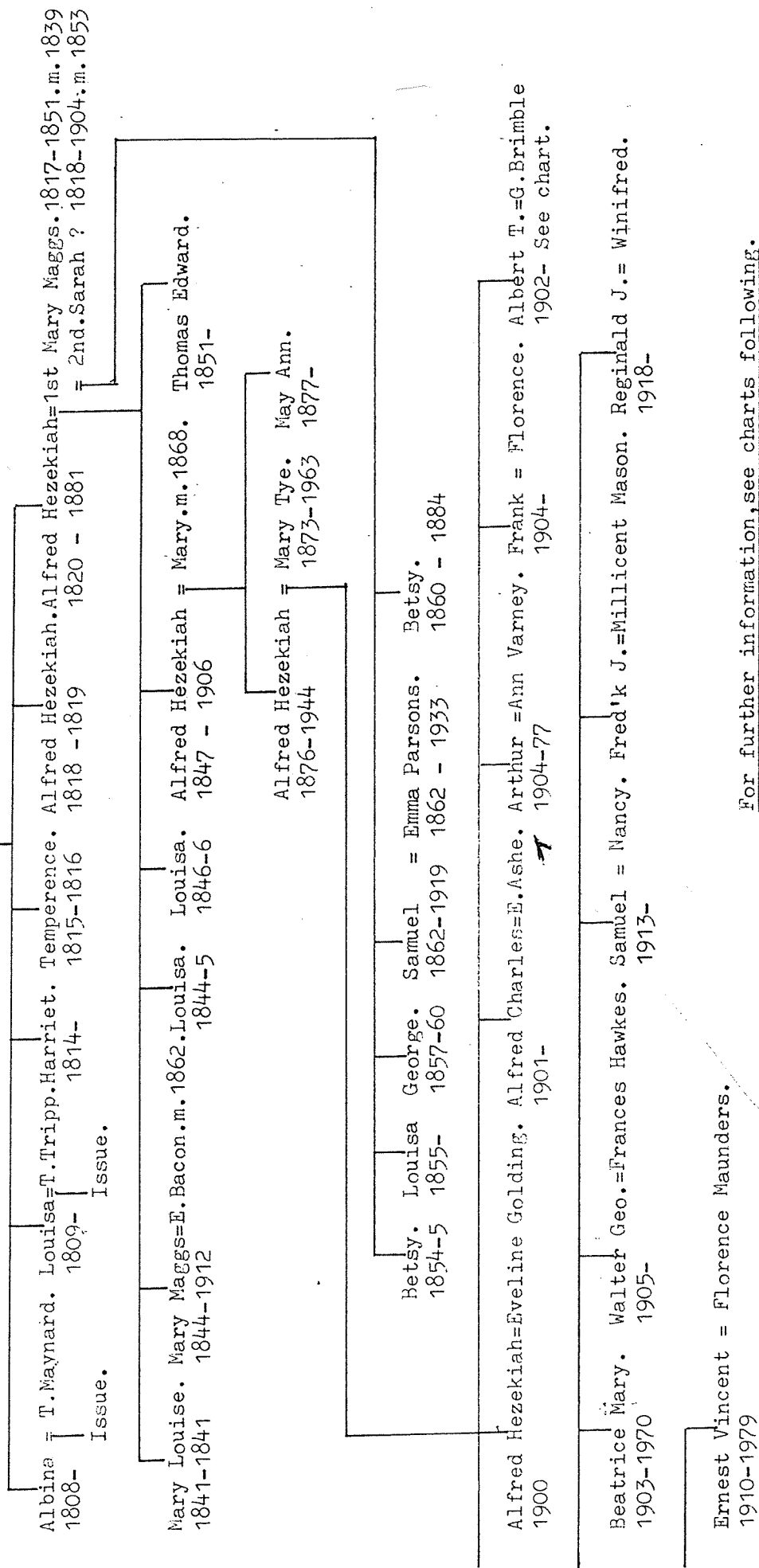

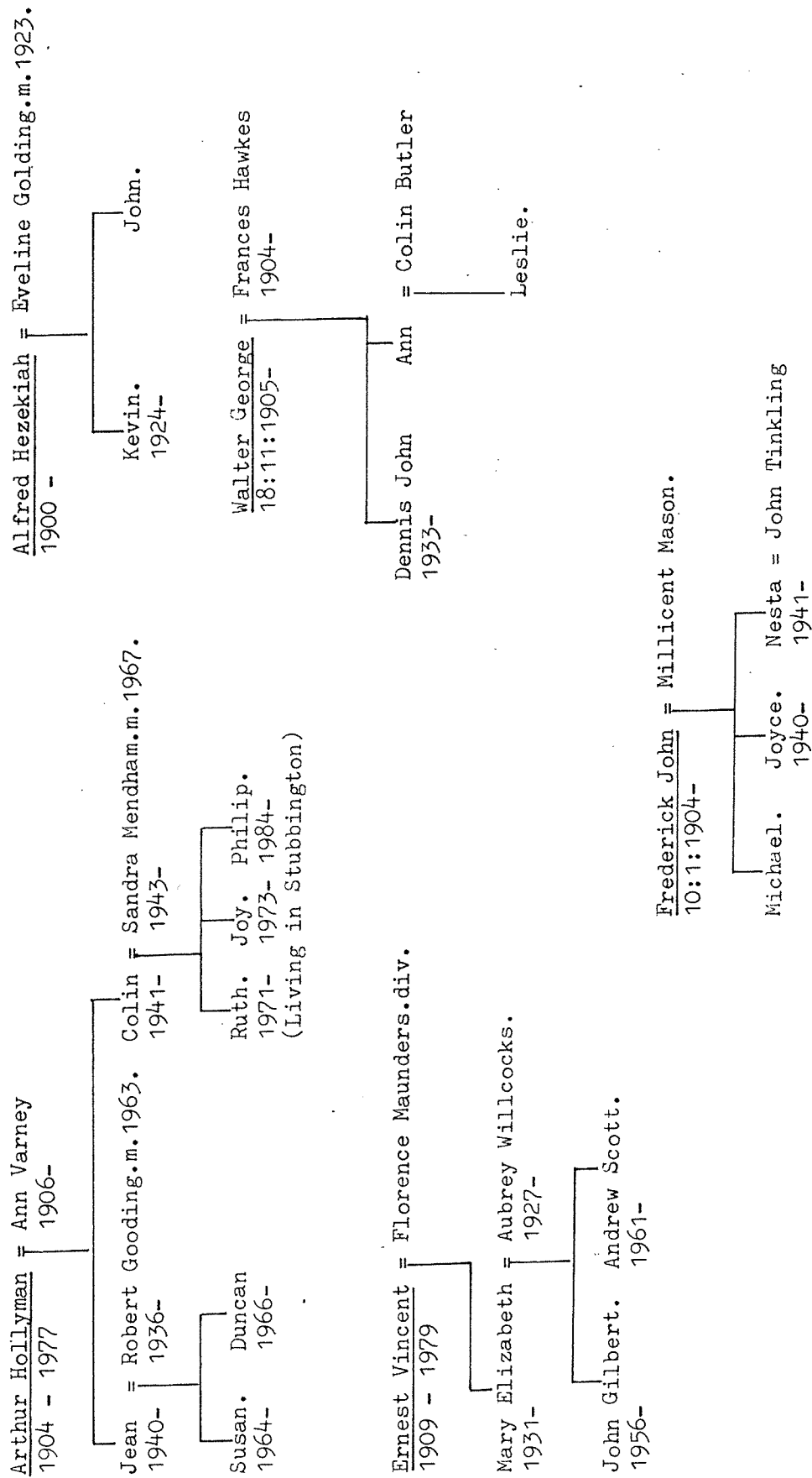

Very little is known of Alfred and Elsie Hollyman

William Hollyman. 1828 - 1873

The second son of Thomas and Esther Hollyman nee Lyons was born in the village of Clevedon and baptised at St Andrew's parish church on August 24th.1828.He worked as a butcher for much of his life and lived in Old street. He was married to Myra,daughter of Isaac and Elizabeth Heath by banns at the church of St Stephen on Broad Quay on September 16th.1856. He died of tuberculosis on October 1st.1873 aged 44 and Myra predeceased him on August 29th.1872 aged 42.

Of this marriage,there was issue of:-

Annie Jane Hollyman who was baptised on February 14th.1858 but she died at the age of five years and buried on March 5th.1863.

Myra Louise Hollyman.Born in 1860 and baptised on April 22nd.Married John Winstone in Bristol in 1886.She 'took'over the Bell Inn in Gloucester lane during the latter half of the 19th cent.

William Thomas Hollyman.Baptised on February 23rd.1862.Nothing else known.

Arthur Heath Hollyman. Baptised on March 12th.1865 married Selina in Bristol in 1890.They settled in Banwell where they had a shop dealing in leather goods and ironmongery.Arthur died in 1934 and Selina went to live in Bristol where she died in 1948.This couple lived at 'Butstone House.Banwell.

Walter Hezekiah Hollyman. Baptised on August 25th.1867 married Alice Maud Adams in 1898.For a time he 'kept'the Bell Inn,Gloucester lane,Bristol and when he gave it up,his sister took over. Walter died aged 34 in 1902 and his widow remarried,1903. As with his brother,Arthur,there doesn't appear to be any children from either union.

Lillie Beatrice Hollyman.Baptised on November 28th.1869.died an infant and buried on September 1st.1870 nine months old.

CLEVEDON MERCURY. October 4th 1873.

Death announcement of Mr William Hollyman of Clevedon at his residence of consumption. Aged 45.

One week later,

CLEVEDON MERCURY. October 11th 1873.

Notice re. Mr William Hollyman. deceased. "All having claims against the estate of the above to furnish particulars thereof either to Thomas Hollyman of Bristol, Licenced Victualler or Charles C. Woodforde of Clevedon of Clevedon aforesaid, gentleman, the Executors and in the same issue. Mr Thomas Hollyman Executor of the Will of Mr William Hollyman deceased begs to announce that he has disposed of the business carried on by his late brother to Mr Hezekiah Parsons.

CLEVEDON MERCURY. October 18th. 1873.

Notice that, Hezekiah Parsons, Purveyor of Old street has taken over the old established business of the late Mr William Hollyman and will conduct the two businesses at the late Mr Hollyman establishment in Old street and at the Clevedon Market.

It transpires later that, Mr Hezekiah Parsons was buried on July 30th 1873 aged 47 years.

NB. The Clevedon Market was restored in 1986 and reopened to the public as Traders studios.

William Hollyman married Myrah HEATH in Bristol in 1856.

see parish registers.

This, the second son of Thomas and Martha Hollyman nee Phillips was born in Clevedon in 1774 and baptised on July 13th at St Andrews church. When he was three years old his brother, Hezekiah died. Thomas grew up to marry Elizabeth Pitt at the Bristol church of St Peter on April 12th 1795. Not a great deal is known about Elizabeth but, unlike her husband, she was alive when her father in law died in 1820 for she is mentioned in his Will. Thomas was a young thirty three when he died in 1807 and was buried on December 28th that year. I have found no proof of the demise of Elizabeth although there is an Elizabeth who died aged 77 in 1837 which if she was the former Miss Pitt would make her fourteen years older than Thomas. Clearly more searches would be required re. Miss Elizabeth Pitt. However, this couple had only three children:-

Charles Hollyman who was born on August 1st 1795 and baptised on January 1st 1798. He was married to Eliza Griffin on April 7th 1818. A copy of the original notice of intention of marriage has been included in this study. Charles died aged 40 and was buried on November 26th 1835. Nothing so far of the demise of Eliza has been found but she may have remarried for her husband must have been fairly well off. (See Sale. page

Martha Hollyman the only daughter was born on October 9th 1797 and was baptised on the same day as her brother, Charles. Nothing else known.

Thomas Hollyman the youngest was baptised on May 5th 1800. He was married to Phoebe Harvard at St Paul's church, Bristol on May 25th 1820, the year his grandfather, Thomas died. He was a farmer and publican who kept The Old Inn along the Walton road. After his death at the age of thirty one, and burial on February 25th 1831, Phoebe married another farmer, John Bees eight years later. (This is the first Hollyman marriage recorded in the General Register, London)

Phoebe, now Mrs Bees, died aged sixty six and was buried on June 19th 1856. Of the union with Thomas Hollyman, there were four children.

CLEVEDON POOR RATE. 1807

In the same year that his father, Thomas senior paid poor rate, Thomas, junior paid the same for, Highdale, Dales, Naphouse, Hide, Luthill (or Whiles) Stones, Chaffins and Haskins. Highdale farm was, in pre-Reformation times, the site of a Chantry chapel of St Nicholas and was first mentioned in 1297. This chapel would have been dissolved by Henry 8th in 1545.

The 'Stones' mentioned above would be part of 'Childs and Mainstones' the property which came into the possession of John Hollyman in 1703.

NB.

A Chantry chapel is one endowed for priests to sing masses for a founder's soul. In this case, St Nicholas who was bishop of Myra in Asia Minor (d. 326 AD) He is the patron saint of sailors and children and Russia is commemorated on December 6th.

Considering that Clevedon was once a fishing village, perhaps the priests would pray for the safe return of the fishermen with their catches.

1819 - 1821. Thomas Hollyman had licence to keep and lease the 'Clevedon' Inn, now known as the 'Old Inn' and in 1821, he had 4 acres on moor for which he paid £8 per year. In 1823, he received £51 for stubbing horses.

Charles Hollyman. 1795 - 1835

The son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hollyman, nee Pitt was born on August 1st. 1795 in Clevedon and baptised at the parish church of St. Andrew, January 1st. 1798. He rented Highdale farm and was married to Eliza, daughter of John Griffin when she was seventeen years old. This licence to marry was dated April 2nd. 1818 and states that they could marry immediately with consent by her father. Charles died, I suspect in Portishead in 1835 aged forty and buried in Clevedon on November 26th. Of Eliza, nothing else is known.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

William Hollyman. Born on September 3rd. 1820, was baptised on March 17th. 1822.

He died aged six years and buried on August 7th. 1826.

Joseph Hollyman. Baptised on the same day as William but nothing else has been found of him.

Charles Hollyman. Baptised on June 24th. 1825 died an infant and buried on August 7th. 1828, exactly two years after William.

Eliza Hollyman. Baptised on August 24th. 1826 died at the age of seven years and buried on March 29th. 1833

It appears that Charles and Eliza had had enough of deaths here so they sold all their farming implements and went to Portishead where:-

Eliza Hollyman was born and baptised at St. Peter's on September 29th. 1834

One year and two months later, Charles died.

Eliza, Charles's wife was the daughter of Martha Hollyman and her mother was Mary Hollyman who married Joseph Griffin in 1767. Significant?

March 30th. 1833

Notice of Sale of farming stock and household effects of Charles Hollyman of Highdale farm, Clevedon. Declining business....

The Sale includes:-

14 prime young dairy cows, some near calving. 4 2 yr old heifers in calf, 1 capital 2 yr old Hereford bull, 6 2yr old steers 6 weaning calves, a capital cart horse, 2 capital cart mares, one rising 4 yrs old, 1 hacking mare in foal, 1 hacking horse fit for riding or harness 1 cart colt rising 2 years, 1 sow in farrow, 4 fat pigs, a Coburg cart and harness, a quantity of ham, 50 sacks prime potatoes in lots, a capital potato washer, 2 waggons, 1 broad wheel putt with iron axles, 1 broad wheel cart, a capital field roller, pair drags, pair harrows, iron plough, 1 other field plough, 2 field drags, 3 sets breech harness nearly new. 4 sets trace harness, 1 set double plough harness, yokes, bows and chains, chaff box, ladders and hay knives, winnowing fan and sieve, wheelbarrow, together with a large assortment of husbandry implements. Dairy utensils, 5 milk-leads, 3 cheese presses, 2 cheese tubs, barrel and tub churns, trendles, milk pails tins vats cheese bowl and sieve, butter scales, prints etc. etc.

Household items.

Excellent carved mahogany four poster bed and tent bedsteads, with chintz and dimity furnishings, stump and cross bedsteads, 4 prime goosefeather beds 4 milpuff beds, counterpanes, quilts, blankets, mahogany commode and other chests of drawers, mahogany and deal basin, stands with basins and ewers, painted deal night tables, swing mirrors, bedside carpets, set of mahogany dining tables on pillars and claws. Mahogany Pembroke and card tables. Mahogany bureau, sofa with chintz covering, set of mahogany chairs with hair seats and brass nails nearly new, a large Brussels carpet, a large Kidderminster carpet, an eight day clock in mahogany case, 3 sets of handsome china, a large assortment of blue and white earthenware, decanters and rummers, wine and other glasses, a set of castors with stand, parlour fender and fire-irons, mahogany tea caddie, mahogany tea and other trays, a barometer, a telescope, double barrelled gun with percussion lock, single barrelled gun, a hachney side saddle and bridles, alarum, beams and scales, kitchen tables and chairs, washing and other tubs, buckets pails pots etc. Double roller cider

press with hair cloths complete together with a large assortment of empty casks in good condition.

A fascinating insight into the household of a Somerset farmer of over 150 years ago. This farm stands/stood below Christchurch between Highdale road and Highdale avenue, Clevedon.

Clevedon Rates 1832


Shows that Charles Hollyman occupied Highdale farm 'owned by Elton' not, as I have stated by Charles. It appears that either Charles or one of his family sold this land to the Elton family. There was a great deal of buying and selling of land in this area after the passing of the 'Enclosure Act'

In this same year, Charles is shown as occupying a house, shop and garden owned by William Hollyman. William was a landowner and builder, the son of Thomas Hollyman and his second wife, Hannah Wall nee griffin. So Charles's father and William were half brothers.

Charles also appears in the Clevedon Rates for 1840 but he died five years earlier and it cant have been his son for he died in 1828.

① The Issue of Samuel Hollyman and his Wife, Anne Wall

I am of the opinion that this Samuel Hollyman is the same Samuel who was the base child of Mary Hollyman born in 1763. He was never baptised or at least, if he was then that baptism has been recorded elsewhere for it does not appear in the parish registers of St Andrews Church, Clevedon where the birth, presumably took place.

Recorded on a Land Tax Account for Jane Bateman of Walton in Gordano in the year 1781, the tax assessor was none other than Samuel Hollyman who, if he was Mary's son, would be nineteen years old and we know that more than one Hollyman was of that occupation: one that occurs in families.

Furthermore, the Samuel Hollyman who married Anne Wall was recorded as a 'Gentleman' of Clevedon and as this sort of citizen were not exactly abounding in this part of the county, who could this Samuel Hollyman be but Mary's son.?

Samuel had obviously dropped the 'Durbin' by the time he was recorded a tax assessor and so, at his wedding which took place in the local church of St Andrews on December 1st 1790, the event took place five months after his uncle Thomas's, Mary's brother married Anne's mother, Hannah Wall.

Hannah became stepmother to Thomas's many children and aunt and mother in law to Samuel. I have found no trace of Samuel's death and subsequent burial which still creates some doubt, however slight on the non appearance of his baptism. I am of the opinion he died in or near Puxton.

Anne lived to a ripe old age in Clevedon and buried there on March 19th 1858 aged 87. The couple settled in Puxton where their children were born and raised....or most of them. Of this union there was issue of:-

* John Hollyman who was born on April 15th 1791 and baptised on January 17th 1792 at St Saviours church, Puxton. He married Ann Turner at St Augustine (less) Bristol on August 12th 1815.

Samuel Hollyman the second child was born on April 15th 1792 and was baptised on January 8th 1794. It appears that he died aged thirty six and buried in 1828.

Thomas Hollyman was born on May 22nd 1793 and baptised the same day as his brother, Samuel. He married Esther Lyons in Bristol on October 24th 1820. He was a butcher. See 178

Ann Wall Hollyman their first daughter was born on October 18th 1794 and was baptised on January 7th 1795. Very little is known about Ann who may have dropped the 'Wall' in her name. I do know she attended the wedding of her younger brother Sydenham in Bristol in 1825.

Sydenham Hollyman was born on July 3rd 1796 and baptised on July 29th the same year. He married a Portbury girl, Harriet Rowles in Bristol on February 7th 1825.

James Hollyman was born on January 6th 1799 and baptised on May 14th 1799. Very little has been searched of James but he was found in the Clevedon census returns as an accountant.

George Hollyman, Born on February 13th 1802 in Clevedon. He was baptised in Puxton on March 12th 1802. He was married to Hannah Hole in Bristol on December 28th 1829.

Edward Hollyman, born on April 14th 1805 in Puxton and baptised there on June 4th that same year. He married Harriet, whose maiden name is not yet known, in 1832.

Henry Hollyman the youngest child was born in 1810 and baptised on December 25th that same year. He married a local girl named Sarah Arnels on April 19th 1840 at St Andrews, Clevedon.

Sydenham Hollyman of Puxton. 1796 - 1849

Sydenham was the fifth child and fourth son of Samuel and Anne Hollyman nee Wall. He was born in Puxton on the 3rd of July 1796 and baptised in the parish church of St Saviour on July 29th the same year.

The next date of any event in his life is that of his marriage to Harriet Rowles in Bristol on February 7th 1825 when he was in his twenty ninth year.

After the wedding, the couple settled in Portishead where he worked as a butcher. It was here where the first seven of their children were born and baptised, the eldest being:-

Harriet Hollyman who was baptised at the parish church on June 1st 1828.

Nothing else known.

William Hollyman baptised the same year as his sister on October 22nd.

As with Harriet, nothing else for certain, known. d. 1873.?

Sydenham Hollyman. The first to bear this name was baptised on July 25th 1830 but it is most probable, he died young.

Ann Hollyman. Their second daughter was baptised on June 10th 1832 but, nothing else known for certain.

X Samuel Hollyman. Baptised on March 15th 1835. A Samuel Hollyman of this age has been located as being married to a Long Ashton woman named Louise but searches continue for confirmation.

Eliza Hollyman. Baptised on September 19th 1834. Nothing else known.

Louise Hollyman. Baptised on April 2nd 1837. Nothing else known.

It was at this time of their married life that Sydenham and Harriet moved to Waters's Buildings in Bedminster a Bristol suburb on the Somerset side of the river Avon where on the 18th of December, Sydenham Hollyman was born. This son was to replace that who had died in Portishead. He was baptised in

the parish church of St Mary'Redcliffe on July 5th 1840. (More later)
Searches continued for any other offspring of Sydenham and Harriet until:-
Sophie Hollyman. Was baptised in the parish church of St John Bedminster on
October 16th 1842.

Emma Hollyman. Baptised in the same church as Sophie but on October 20th
1844. It is possible that Emma died aged three years old
for she was not recorded in the next(1851)census.

In the searches of the General Register (State) it can be safely assumed
that Sydenham Hollyman the father died in the summer of 1849 because his
name also is missing from the 1851 census.

Although searches have been going on to find the burials of both Sydenham
and Harriet, nothing certain has been found but the searches continue.

Of all the parish registers of Bristol that are available to family re-
searchers, ~~those~~ of St John, Bedminster, St Mary Redcliffe and St Michaels
and all Angels in St John's lane, Bedminster can only be perused for a fee
which is considerable. £5 per hour although there are bishops transcripts
in Bristol Records Office, which cover many years.

Harriet Hollyman nee Rowles was the daughter of Robert and Elizabeth
Rowles of Portbury and was baptised there on March 25th 1805 which makes
her at least nine years younger than her husband.

ABBOTSLEIGH and THE SOUTH WALES CONNECTION

Abbotsleigh is a small village on the Southern outskirts of Bristol in the Parish of Bedminster in the County of Somerset.

The Hollyman line commences with the arrival of John, born 1760 in the village of Kenn near Clevedon, and his marriage to Anne Tagg who was of an Abbotsleigh family. They and their issue were to populate the village for 200 years until they were to diminish by emigration to other parts until today there is no trace of the name in the village.

Their passage is recorded in the Parish records and on the memorials in the Parish Church of the Holy Trinity.

This then is referred to as the "Abbotsleigh line" to distinguish it from the Hollymans of Bristol or Clevedon.

Finally it should be mentioned that research has shown that Five of the sons of Reuben and Mary Ann Locke who settled in the village in 1839 were to migrate to South Wales in search of work and new opportunities-this is dealt with in the following Section

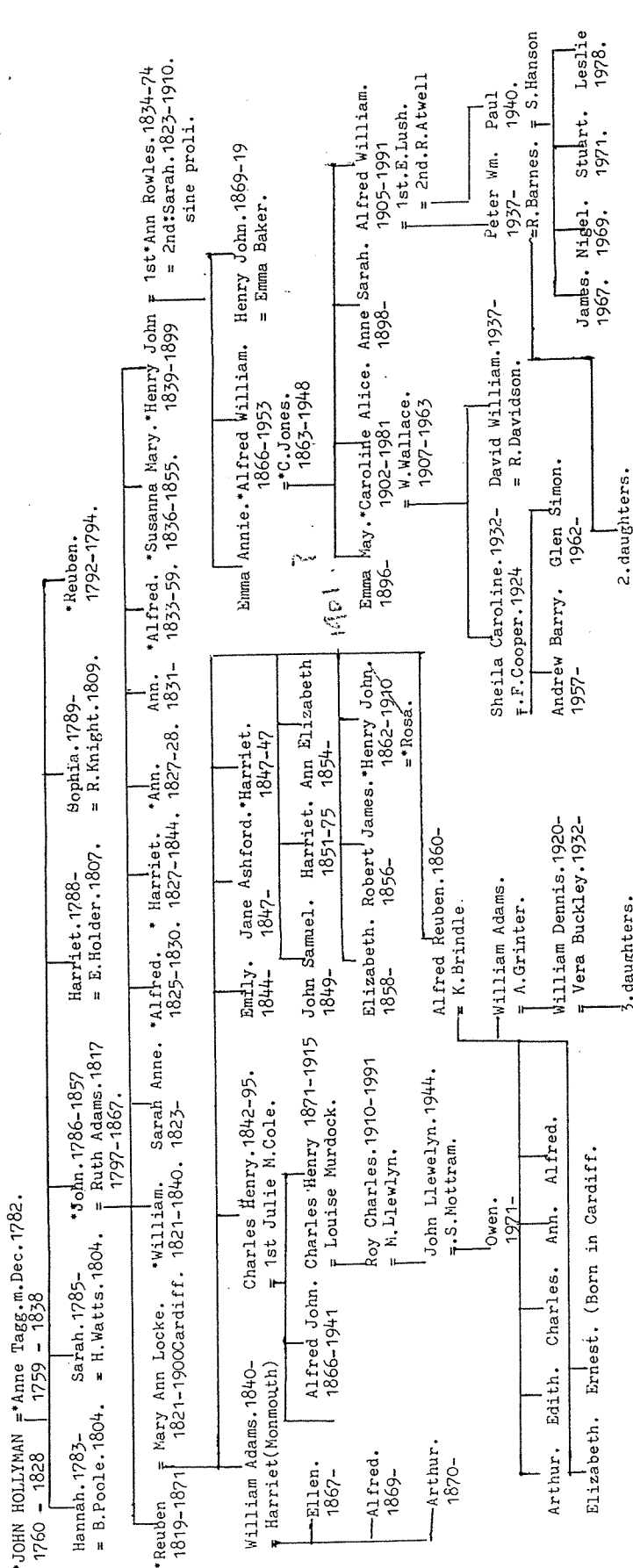

ABBOTS LEIGH.



The John Hollyman who founded the A/Leigh family was born in KENN. His father died in 1766 and his mother married Richard Owen of Clevedon. His grandfather was known as the elder who died in 1727 and was laid to rest inside St Andrews church, Clevedon (north aisle). This Hollyman born in 1661 is believed to have originated from south Somerset in or near Stowell (Horethorne Hundreds). Alfred John (1866) was killed, together with four of his family on Jan. 2nd 1941 in Cardiff blitz. The number of Hollymans who are directly descended from John (1661-1727) amount to hundreds and now live far afield: Cardiff; Bridgend; Bristol; New Zealand; Australia; S. Africa; North Wales; Dewsbury; London etc. etc. The A/Leigh Hollymans lasted almost 300 years. The kin of the Clapton Hollymans once owned Barrow Court, Tickenham but died out in 1813. A short history of the Hollymans has been compiled and completed by me and will be given to Bristol Record Office.

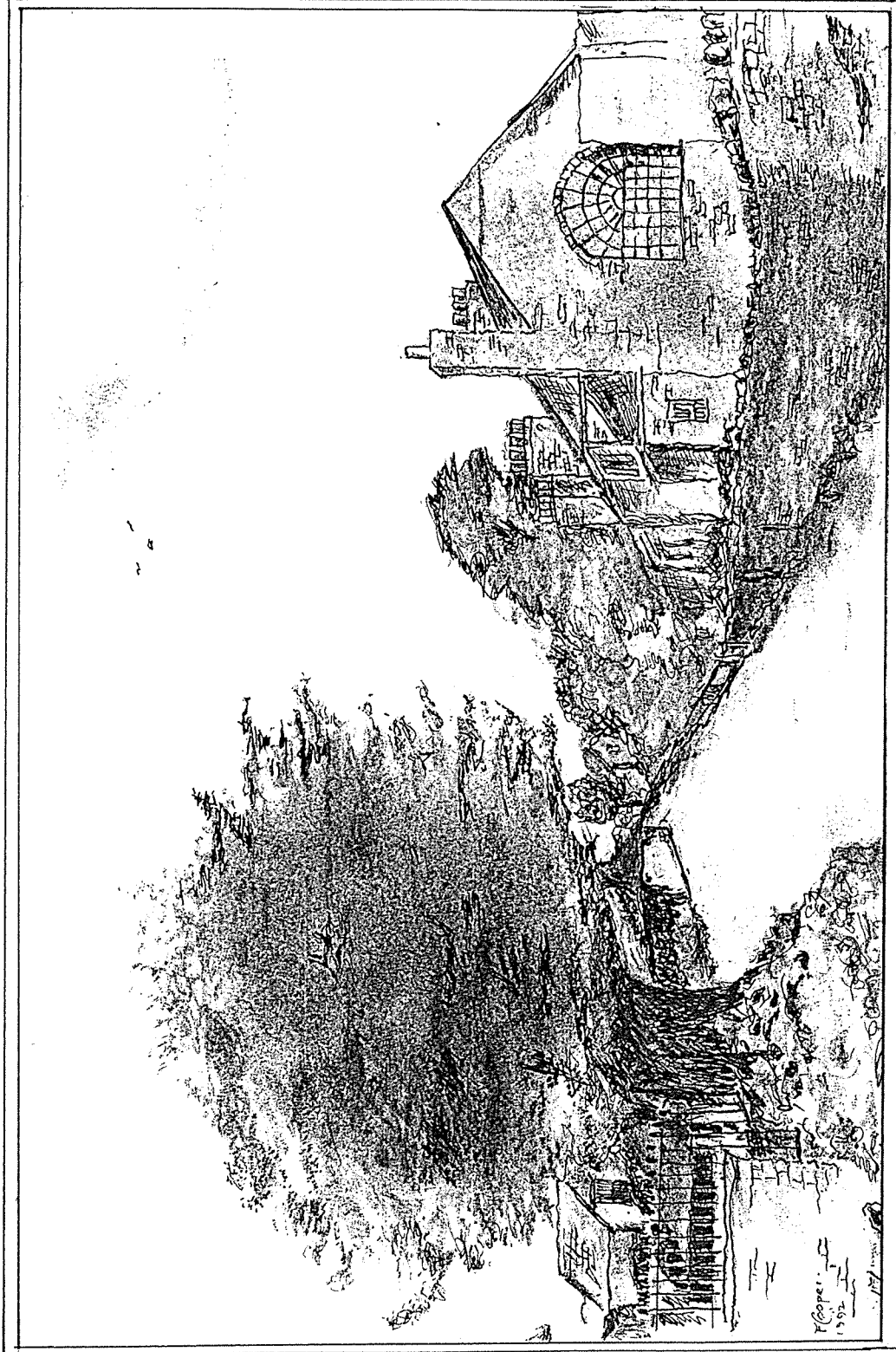

John Hollyman. 1760 - 1828

Born in the year, 1760 in the village of Kenn and baptised on April 2nd. 1761, John was the only surviving son and child of John and Hannah Hollyman nee Emery. Hannah was born in Wraxall the daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Emery. John's three sisters did not reach over the age of two years and all were buried at the Holy Trinity church, Nailsea where his father was also buried. When he was just six years old, his father died and Hannah married Richard Owen of Kenn in Bath in 1767. At some time later, John met Anne Tagg of Abbots Leigh where her family had lived for many years. They married at S.S. Philip and Jacob in Old Market, Bristol on December 12th ¹⁷⁸²~~1882~~ and settled in Abbots Leigh. We do not know exactly where they lived but John was a farmer and some time later, owned Leigh farm which was then a small abode and which later, much later joined the next cottage. Of this union, there was issue, all of whom grew up to marry at the same church, St James, Bristol, of:-

- ✓ Hannah Hollyman who was born six months after the wedding and baptised on June 11th. 1783. She married a Kenn farmer, Benjamin Poole on October 21st. 1804 and believed to have settled in Kenn. There happened a hanging in Kenn in ca. 1820 and a Benjamin Poole, a farmer gave evidence. This, I suspect, was Hannah's husband.
- ✓ Sarah Hollyman. Baptised on January 30th 1785 grew up to marry Hugh Watts on September 4th 1804. Nothing else known.
- ✓ John Hollyman. Their first son was baptised on November 5th 1786 and married Ruth Adams who was ten years younger on December 29th 1817.
- ✓ Harriet Hollyman. Baptised on March 23rd 1788 married to Edward Holder on November 1st 1807. I believe they settled in Bristol but this is not proven.
- ✓ Sophie Hollyman. The youngest daughter was born in June 1789 and baptised

on July 25th. She married Richard Knight on April 27th 1809. No further searches made.

✓ Reuben Hollyman. The youngest child of John and Anne Hollyman was born in 1792 and baptised on May 6th. He died at the age of two years and buried near the south porch of the church on July 13th 1794.

John Hollyman, the first Hollyman to settle in Abbots Leigh, died at the age of sixty eight and buried close to Reuben, his son on June 30th 1828. His widow, Anne (Nancy) died aged seventy nine and buried on June 21st 1838 almost exactly ten years later.

John Hollyman. 1786 - 1857

This John Hollyman was the son of John and Anne Hollyman nee Tagg. He was born in Abbots Leigh and baptised into the church on November 5th 1786. He married Ruth Adams who was ten years younger at St James church, Bristol on December 29th. 1817. He must have taken over the lands which his father farmed and also added to it by renting or buying on mortgage, land from the lord of the manor of Abbots Leigh, Philip John Miles who built the mansion in the Palladian style. I believe the cottage that John held was Leigh farm and the cottage next to it which were numbers one and two Church road. In front of which was the village post office probably later during Johns life. A look at the 'Appointments' book held by Miles tells of the various plots worked by John Hollyman, lands which later were owned by them. In her Will, Ruth mentions lands and tenements in her ownership which she left to her sons. John died at the age of seventy and buried in the family plot on March 17th 1857. Ruth died at the age of seventy also and ten years later. She was buried on March 6th. 1867.

From this marriage, there was issue of:-

Reuben Hollyman. Born in 1819, was baptised on May 2nd in the village church.

He worked as a gardener and butcher and was also a census taker. He married ^{*}Mary Ann Locke, a Welsh girl in Cardiff in 1839 and then returned to the village to settle down. He died at the Merchants Arms in Clifton in 1871 at the age of fifty two and his body brought back to Abbots Leigh for burial on December 20th.

William Hollyman. Baptised on June 17th 1821 lived and worked in Cleeve where he died at the age of nineteen. He too was brought back to the village of his birth for burial on October 20th 1840.

Sarah Anne Hollyman. Their first daughter was baptised on September 14th

1823. Nothing else known,

Alfred Hollyman. Baptised on November 18th.1825 died at the age of five years and buried on April 28th.1830.

Harriet Hollyman. Baptised on February 26th.1827, stayed in the village where she most likely worked as a maid in one of the large houses or in the farm itself. She died aged twenty and buried on March 27th.1848.

Ann Hollyman. Baptised on December 16th.1828 died an infant and buried on January 20th.1829 two months old.

Ann Hollyman. Named after the first, was baptised on January 18th.1831. She was certainly in the village in 1841 but further news of her is unknown. There were many Hollyman daughters named Ann so to find and trace them would prove difficult.

Alfred Hollyman. The second to be given this name was baptised on August 8th.1833. He did reach twenty four years old before he died and was buried on October 27th.1857.

Susanna Mary Hollyman or Susan as she has been recorded, was baptised on 9th. of January 1837. She died at the age of eighteen years and buried on July 15th.1855.

Henry John Hollyman. The youngest child of John and Ruth Hollyman was born in 1839 and baptised on February 3rd, and married Ann Rowles in 1864. He took over Leigh farm from his father. More of Henry John and his life, later in the work.

These then, were the children, the second generation of Hollymans in the village of Abbots Leigh and the offspring of John and Ruth Hollyman.

Dobbs sister in law of Alma Lane Rockhampton. Ann and Theodore must have come to Queensland in 1871.

William Hollyman mentioned here was the son of John & Ruth. He died in Cleeve the year he was presented with this book. ie. Oct 1840 aged 19 yrs. His brother Henry John eventually took possession of it for he took over Leigh Farm from his father, John.

Reuben Hollyman 1819 - 1871

Born in the village of Abbots Leigh, Somersetshire in 1819 the son of John and Ruth Hollyman nee Adams. He would most likely have been born in Leigh farm situated along Church road and baptised in the local church on May 2nd that same year. He left the village to travel to Cardiff for reasons unknown and here he married a butchers daughter, Mary Ann Locke at the Bethany chapel (which has been partly preserved inside Howells store) in 1839. They then made their way back to Abbots Leigh to bring up the family of twelve, six sons and six daughters.

During the late 1860's, they had all but left the village for pastures new and at this time, only Reuben, Mary Ann and one daughter, Harriet remained. Some time at this time also, they moved to the Clifton area where they lived in Merchants road possibly in the public house of that name. It was here in 1871 that Reuben Hollyman died and his body was brought back to the village for burial. Harriet Hollyman the one remaining daughter also died here and she too was buried in Abbots Leigh.

Mary Ann Hollyman, born in Cardiff decided to return to the city of her birth. She lived with Charles Henry Hollyman, a baker until her death at the age of 77 in 1900.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

William Adams Hollyman who was given the name Adams after his grandmother.

He was baptised on Nov. 20th 1840 and later, married Monmouth born Harriet in Bristol in 1863. They then travelled to, firstly, Caerwent where their daughter was baptised and thence to the city of Cardiff where they lived in Planet street. Since then, nothing except for one event, has been found of them.

Ellen Hollyman. Born in Clifton was baptised in Caerwent in 1867, she died aged 10 years in 1877 in Clifton.

Alfred Hollyman. Born in Cardiff in 1869. Nothing else known.

Arthur Hollyman. Born in Cardiff in 1870. Nothing else known.

Charles Henry Hollyman was born on March 21st 1842 and baptised on April 17th that same year. He settled in Cardiff and married Julie Marie Cole. (More of Charles in his own history, later)

Emily Hollyman. The first daughter was baptised on June 16th 1844. No record of her burial or marriage in the Abbots Leigh parish registers so most likely settled elsewhere.

Jane Ashford Hollyman. An unusual forename which should be easy to search, was baptised on July 26th 1846. Nothing else known.

Harriet Hollyman was baptised on August 27th 1847: she died aged six weeks and buried on September 12th 1847.

*John Samuel Hollyman. Baptised on August 19th 1849. Has been traced to Cardiff in South Wales. Nothing else known. Was discovered in one census working as a haulier.

Harriet Hollyman. The second to bear this name was baptised on October 5th 1851. It appears that she did not marry but stayed close by her father, Reuben. In fact, it is possible that she was with him when he died for she too died in Clifton on July 2nd 1873 twenty two years old and buried in Abbots Leigh

Ann Elizabeth Hollyman. The 8th child was baptised on January 15th 1854. Nothing else known so must have settled in Bristol.

Robert James Hollyman was baptised on May 25th 1856 and he too settled in the Cardiff area of South Wales where he too became a baker in Roath. Trade and civilian directories record Robert James in the year 1884 as a confectioner living at 77 Harriet St. St Mary's. In 1910 he is living at 32 Crwys Street. A Robert James Hollyman married in Cardiff in 1882 but I have yet to seek out his partner. I have a suspicion that he settled in Weston Super Mare for it was here in 1930 a Robert James Hollyman died aged 74. Searches will continue.

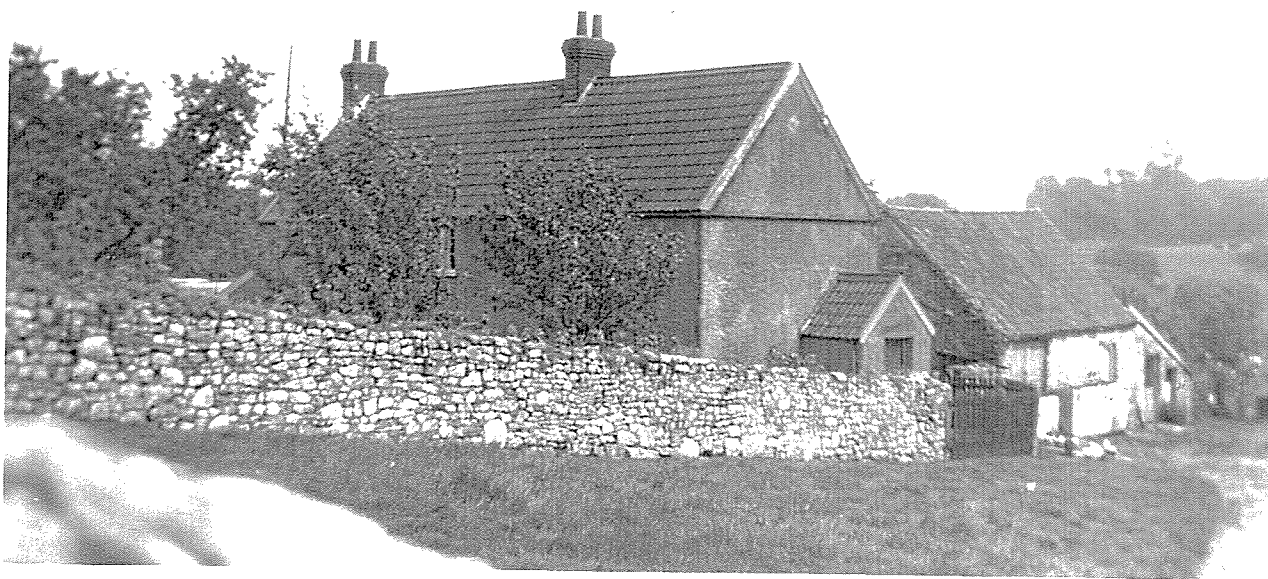
Elizabeth Hollyman.Baptised on July 4th 1858.Nothing else known.

Alfred Reuben Hollyman was born on June 15th 1860 and baptised on July 22nd.He too settled in Cardiff where he worked as a very skilled coppersmith.He married Kate Ellen Brindle who had lost her mother in childbirth so was brought up by her grand mother.Alfred died in Cardiff in 1933 aged 73.

Henry John Hollyman was the last born of the children of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman.He was baptised on August 24th 1862.He married Rosa who was from north Bristol and they settled in Bristol in Melbourne road Bishopston where he died in 1901.They had one son as far as I know for certain.Searches continue for this son.Henry and Rosa were buried in Abbots Leigh.Rosa on September 6th 1938 aged 75 and Henry was just 37 years old when he died. Their grave lies at the rear of the church and with them is their father and father in law,Reuben Hollyman.

These then were the children of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman nee Locke.
As mentioned earlier,Mary Ann Hollyman returned to her native city of Cardiff where she died.In any case,this was where many of her sons and probably some of her daughters settled.

Subsequent enquiries have unearthed some very interesting facts with regard to these Abbots Leigh Hollymans who,finding their accommodation and chances of employment somewhat limited in the village of their birth had migrated to where there was work in plenty,the docks,mines and iron foundries of South Wales.A great percentage of Hollymans now living in that part of the British Isles are descended from Abbots Leigh.

William Adams Hollyman 1840 - ?

Born in Abbots Leigh on November 1st 1840 was baptised in the village church on the 20th. He was given the name, Adams presumably after Ruth Hollyman nee Adams. William married a Monmouth girl named Harriet in Bristol in the autumn of 1863. A few years later the couple moved towards south Wales where in Caerwent, their firstborn was baptised in 1866. William worked as a 'cordwainer that is a worker in cordwain, a Spanish leather' He most likely made shoes etc.

I found them in the Cardiff census of 1871 living at Planet street just north of Adamsdown but since then, nothing. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Ellen Hollyman who was the eldest was born in 1865 and baptised in Caerwent the following year. Nothing else known.

Alfred Hollyman was baptised in Cardiff in 1869; as with Ellen, nothing known.

Arthur Hollyman. The youngest child was also born and baptised in Cardiff but as the Cardiff parish registers are difficult to find all I know is that he was born in 1870

My contact has tried in vain to find this family in the 1891 census returns but without success.

Once I find William Adams's registry of death, then will I be able to seek his family.

In late 1994 I place an entry in the 'Big R' (a list of people researching in the U.K.) and much to my surprise I received a letter from a Dennis Hollyman giving a lot of information about A Hollyman Family that was being researched by a Fred Cooper of Bristol and himself. I wrote and gave him the line I had researched back to the late 1790's. The next letter I received from Dennis started with "Where have you been? We have been looking for this family for four years" Arthur arrived in Australia on the "Chyebassa" that sailed from London on the 18 November 1884 arriving in Brisbane on the 13 January 1995. The family consisted of his Father. Mother and five brothers. One brother was deaf so came as a sterage passanger. the family think that his passage had to be paid for by the family the others were one of the Governments schemes.

As only one of Leslie's aunts was living she got the lot. When I started to find the family after receiving all the information from Dennis and Fred the first question I was asked was 'How much did your husband get?' I said nothing, as his mother had been deceased for many years. When I contacted Mrs Kopettke who was a second cousin from Alma's mother's family she told me the same story with regard to her side of the family.

In 2004 after an article showing the Hollyman family tree was published in The Courier Mail Brisbane a fellow member of the Genealogical Society of Queensland Eris Powell nee Wills told me she knew Alma Hollyman and as a young woman had been in the G.F.S. (Girls Friendly Socieity) and Anglican orgainiation for young women and that they had worked together cleaning up a tennis court so they could play tennis. She told me Alma was a very active member of the Anglcan Church all her life. The following is from The Wynnum-Central State School Magazine.

Alma Hollyman was the longest serving teacher of Wynnum Central, teaching years one and two for thirty five years. Alma was a local having grown up at Manly, attending Manly School and then Brisbane State High School, and except for a short period in the country, continued to live unti! her untimely death in 1980?.

Her teaching career began in 1940 at Greenslopes State School. In 1942 she was transferred to Silverdale's one teacher school and was there until August 1945 when she was appointed to Wynnum Central. During her years at the school she completed her Batchelor of Arts degree as a part-time student at the University of Queensland. She chose to remain teaching in the lower school believing her expertise was best suited to early childhood education.

She had a special place in her heart for the underprivileged or neglected child.

"He/she just needs a lot of loving", was her oft repeated statement. She endeavoured to provide a class room atmosphere that fostered a love of learning and compassion for fellow classmates. With firmess and fairness she class was soundly taught and well prepared for the following years.

Alma was a very private person and fiercely independant. Her home vegetable garden was more like a mini market garden which she lovingly tended. The produce was often offered to teaching partners with a cheerful "would you like some celery, beans... etcetera. She cared for her aged father (her mother had died much earlier) until his death. She also undetook repairs to her home, car and boat. She spent her holidays in her holiday shack on Bribie Island, spending many hours fishing from her little runabout. A very fit and healthy person she had been a keen tennis player and tried her hand at squash in her mid-fifties.

As a girl she had cared for the newly hatched chickens on the families' property and as a result she had 'never been able to eat chicken'. She kept her "chooks" for eggs, but they were never killed off when they passed their 'use by date' - she

looked after them until their natural passing. When she went to Bribie they were packed into their portable pen and transported on the top of her van. Always looking on the bright side she was so sure she would overcome the cancer that attacked her boby - for two years she battled against it, a lesser person would ahve given in long since. Only a week before her death she was at school discussing her plans for the following year. At 58 years, Alma departed this lift having left a lasting impression on her colleagues and many hundred of Wynnum residents who had passed through her classroom, so much so that a citizenship award was created in her honour.

William Adams Hollyman 1840 - 1921

William Adams Hollyman the first child of Reuben Hollyman and Mary Ann Locke was born in Abbots Leigh on the 29 October 1840 and baptised in the village church on the 20 November, 1840. He was given the name, Adams presumably after Ruth Hollyman nee Adams his Grandmother. On the 31 January, 1856 he was apprenticed to William Strong of Paul Street, Kingsdown in the City of Bristol a Cordwainer. The term of the apprenticeship was seven years. (The original Indenture is held by Mr. Harry Hollyman, Dew Street, Runcorn. Brisbane.) On the 30 August, 1863 William married Harriet Davis daughter of Thomas and Margaret Davis of Caerwent, Monmouth in the Parish Church of St. Michael, Bristol after Banns had been called. The witnesses were John Joseph Goodenough and Mary Ann Vowler. A few years later the couple moved towards south Wales where in Caerwent, their firstborn Ellen was baptised on 16 June, 1867. A 'cordwainer that is a worker in cordwain, a Spanish leather' he most likely made shoes etc. The family settled at 16 Planet Street, Roath, Cardiff where five more children were born. On the 1881 Census the family was living at No. 69 Blewitt Street, Newport with two more sons. William showed his occupation at Shoemaker. On 18 November 1884 the family of consisting of William, Harriet, Alfred, Arthur, Henry, Sidney, Charles Henry, Edgar, Christopher and Hubert left London on the "Chybassa" for Queensland Australia arriving at Brisbane on the 13 January, 1885. On the passenger list William showed his County of Origin as Somerset. William and the three eldest boys were shown as Shoemakers. Sidney although on the same ship traveled in "Steerage" whilst the rest of the family came out under the heading of "Remittance". It must have been a frightening experience for an 11 year old who was Deaf and Dumb but he could read and write as could the other boys with the exception of the younger two boys. Nothing is known of the first few years the family spent in Brisbane but it seems likely William was sponsored by someone and he was employed as a Shoemaker and Repairer. In the 1889 copy of the Post Office Directory William is shown as a "Bootmaker" Ipswich Road, South Brisbane. A photo of the shop with William and Harriet standing on the verandah is held by members of the family. The shop was between Juliette Street and Victoria Terrace, Ipswich Road, South Brisbane. Sometime in the early 1900's William purchased 20 acres of land in the Runcorn area of Brisbane. (Harry Hollyman son of Hubert, William's youngest son still lives on part of the area originally purchased by William). When William died on 23 August, 1921 he had Freehold land valued at five hundred and thirty five pounds ten shillings (\$1071.00). So I think it can be said that the family prospered in Australia. Harriet died on the 16 June, 1928. They are both buried together in the Dutton Park Cemetery, South Brisbane. Qld. Australia. A simple headstone now marks their grave erected by their descendants.

Ellen Hollyman

Alfred Hollyman

Born in 1865 and baptised in Caerwent in 1867. She died at an early age. Was baptised in Cardiff in 1869. Came to Queensland with the family in 1885 and was shown as a Shoemaker on the Passenger list. On the 6 June, 1891 he married Charlotte Elizabeth Cushway. There were two children Ruth Hollyman born 29 April, 1893 and Leslie Hollyman born 6 June, 1895. Family members have said he was a Hotel Keeper and liked to play the organ. The 1910 Post Office Directory shows him as a Grocer in Stanley Street, South Brisbane. In the 1915 Post Office Directory his address is given as Milson Street, Coorparoo. Charlotte died on 3 August, 1936 and Alfred died on the 25 March, 1953. Ruth was unmarried at this time but family member say she married late in life. Leslie married a L ? and they had one daughter Gloria. Leslie died on the 2 April, 1953, his occupation was shown as Truck Driver and his daughter Gloria at that time was living in Perth, West Australia.

Arthur Hollyman

Was born on the 19 February, 1870 at 16 Planet Street, Roath. He was baptised in Cardiff. Arthur married Jane Laver 3 November, 1897 and he was a Cobb & Co Coach driver. He told stories of his trips to his Grandsons Bill and Les Duncan in later years. Jane died on 7 September, 1898 in child birth and she is buried with an unnamed child in Dutton Park Cemetery, South Brisbane. After the death of Jane Arthur is said to have gone to the Boer War as a Medical Assistant but no records of this can be found. He married Adeline Simmonds on 3 July, 1901 and had three daughters Edith Alexander Hollyman born 29 April, 1902. Edith never married and for many years she was a Supervisor at Jackson's Furrier in Brisbane. She died on 24 June, 1966. Helen Isobell Hollyman was born 7 November, 1903 and Winifred Alice born 12 July, 1906. Helen or Aunty Nell as her nephews called her, married a Thomas Seipel and they had one daughter Rita Seipel born 1 November, 1930. Helen Seipel died in October, 1989. Winifred Alice Hollyman married David Leslie Duncan on 15 September 1931 and they had three sons William Arthur Duncan born 8 December, 1933. Leslie Noel Duncan born 11 December, 1936 and David Ian Duncan born 29 April, 1943.

Winifred Duncan died on the 15 November, 1951. In the 1910 Post Office Directory Arthur Hollyman is shown as a "Tinsmith" at 184 Roma Street Brisbane. The Duncan family have a Copper Kettle and Stainless Steel Jug made by Arthur and still in use to day. Arthur died on 7 August, 1958 and his occupation was Sheet Metal Worker. Adeline Hollyman died on 14 November, 1950. Both were are buried at Mt. Thompson Crematorium.

Henry Hollyman

Born in Cardiff in 1872. He died on the 1 November, 1912 and his occupation was shown as Printer. He is shown on his death certificate as William. He was living at Runcorn at the time of his death. He never married. In 1996 whilst at the State Archives an entry was found of a William Hollyman applying for Admission to the Benevolent Asylum, Dunwich in June 1908. William was in the Muttaborra Hospital and had been in hospitals in Townsville and Hughenden in 1906 and in Herberton hospital in 1904. He was suffering from a Valvular disease of the heart, with myocorditis and he was unable to work. He gave the names of five brothers, (he did not name Christopher) and a lengthy inquiry was carried out by the police and all his brothers and parents were interviewed to see who could help with his upkeep. On returning to Brisbane in August, 1908 he went to live at Runcorn. (His niece Winifred Alice Duncan nee Hollyman also died of the same heart complaint)

Sidney Hollyman

Born in Cardiff in 1873. At the age of three years he apparently had some illness and this left him deaf and dumb. He was drowned on the 19 February, 1893. He suffered an Epileptic fit whilst watching the flood water in Ann Street, Brisbane and his body was found in the office of Messrs Macdonald, Patterson & Co. Edward Street Brisbane. At the inquest into to his death it was stated he was employed by Civil Service Co-operative Stores. The flood of 1893 was one of the biggest Brisbane has seen, the Victoria Bridge over the Brisbane River was washed away and lots of damage was done in the City.

Charles H. Hollyman

Born in Cardiff in 1876. He was a market gardener and had his farm were the Warrigal Road Primary School is today. He died 15 February, 1950. He never married.

Edgar J.Hollyman

Born Newport Monmouth 1878. He married Isabell Miles on 7 August, 1900 and they had seven children. Doris May Hollyman born 10 March, 1901 died 15 March, 1985. She never married. Olive Hollyman born 17 February, 1903, Gwendoline Hollyman born 27 December, 1906, Edna Hollyman born 16 May, 1909. Sidney Hollyman born 3 August, 1912, Elsie Grace Hollyman born 15 December, 1915 and Jack Hollyman born 28 August, 1918.

Christopher Hollyman

Born Newport Monmouth 1881. In 1912 at the time of his brother William's death he was living at Torrens Street, Ipswich Road, South Brisbane. He married Lucy Lydia Ford 5 April, 1915 and had two children. Alma Hollyman who died in 1980 and Leonard Christopher Hollyman born July, 1921 died 24 April, 1922. Fathers occupation shown on death certificate was Carpenter and the address was Ernest Street, Manly. More research to be done.

Hubert Hollyman

Born Newport Monmouth 1883. He married Ellen Bains 5 April, 1915 and they had three children William H. Hollyman died 28 May, 1943 Prisoner of War in W.W.II and is buried in Thanbyuzayat. S.E. Asia. Henry Hollyman married to Theresa Gaven and Ellen Hollyman who married Alexander Buchanan. Henry(Harry) and Theresa have one son Shane William Hollyman

Three men are most responsible for researching the British Empire Hollyman lineage – Fred Cooper, William Dennis Hollyman in Wales and Kenneth James Hollyman in Orakei and later in Okoroire in New Zealand. In the United States Glenn N Holliman & Jeanette Holiman Stewart have played a major role in researching and cataloguing the Hollyman tree on Ancestry by way of its US heritage of manifold spellings.

THE STRANGE AFFAIR OF MARY'S BASE CHILD

'...had the wild oat not been sown,
The soil, left barren, scarce had grown
The grain by which a man may live.'

In Memoriam...Alfred Lord Tennyson

Having spent a decade tracing paternal ancestors in an area mainly west of Bristol...not without difficulties and diversions...the trail had led through the Gordano Valley into Clevedon and the marriage of Abraham Battman PRITCHARD and Nancy GRIFFIN on 7th December 1789 at St.Andrew's Church. Nancy was baptised on 11th June 1768 at Portishead, daughter of Joseph GRIFFIN and Mary nee HOLLYMAN who were married on 7th March 1767 at Walton-in-Gordano. The baptism of Mary...my 5X great grandmother...appears in the register of St.Andrew's on 6th September 1742, the only daughter of Hezekiah and Ann.

HOLLYMAN...a new name to throw into the excellent BAFHS network. It was through Ron Lewin's administration of the M.I. Index that the roots of the PRITCHARD tree could be followed further. Next, as well as sending the requested details of HOLLYMAN inscriptions, he kindly put me in touch with a fellow researcher Carol Parker. She in turn passed me on to Fred Cooper of Downend who proved to be a veritable mine of information on the HOLLYMANs on whose history he has been concentrating for several years.

It was from Fred that I first learned of Mary's 'fall'. Aged 21 and four years before her marriage to Joseph GRIFFIN she had apparently given birth to a son. An entry in the register of St.Andrew's under Burialls for 1763 reads... Saml DURBIN Base Child of Mary HOLLYMAN March 7th. Not a particularly unusual occurrence, either an illegitimate birth or the early death of a misbegotten child. Yet...in this case it seems that Samuel HOLLYMAN not only survived but married and founded a dynasty...fathering eight sons and one daughter. From the sixth son George born in 1802 descends Bob Mawson of Caernarfon who is putting the finishing touches to his own extensive HOLLYMAN research project. Both Fred and Bob have been generous in sharing their information and correspondence back and forth , as is so often the case in my experience enriches our hobby.

Before my arrival on the HOLLYMAN scene these two had speculated on the mystery of the burial entry. A clerk's error perhaps...a baptism entered as a burial. Possible but unlikely. An attempted 'cover up' by Mary's family. Her

baptism to prove his origin. Nevertheless circumstantial evidence does fall heavily in favour of this Samuel HOLLYMAN (no further use of the name DURBIN) being Mary's son. Joseph GRIFFIN a witness to the marriage must surely have been Mary's husband...indicating that even if Samuel had not been taken into his household and brought up with his own children by Mary, born in wedlock, Joseph obviously had accepted him by 1790. Could Joseph have been persuaded as to the advantages of marrying into the influential HOLLYMAN clan? Did they put pressure on Mary so she could keep her base born son within a respectable marriage? Had he been taken away or did Mary leave Clevedon with her child, returning to get married? If so how would she explain his presence if he was supposed to have died? Was the marriage a love match and not arranged at all? So many questions, possibilities and the truth can only remain in the realms of conjecture.

After the marriage of Mary and Joseph on 7th March 1767 at Walton-in-Gordano at which a witness was John HOLLYMAN (either Mary's cousin or brother), Joseph appears for the first time in the Clevedon Churchwardens' Accounts in 1769 when he was paid 2s.11d for Bread and Wine. GRIFFIN research has not been without its problems...but each stage has provided new contacts and opened up wider avenues. Mary's story becomes more convoluted as a complex pattern of intermarriages emerges and cannot rightly be told without some further reference to the GRIFFINs.

Again through the BAFHS network...Index of Members' Interests...fellow GRIFFIN researcher Wendy Manning sent me a copy of a family tree that had been produced by the Reverend Wilfred Gordon GRIFFIN who descended from Joseph and Mary's son Joseph. (1771 -1845) In a letter to 'all my GRIFFIN and other cousins' the Rev. Wilfred states that 'Joseph (1744 -1811) established a Family Vault in the S.W. corner of the parish church, St.Andrew's (underneath the present position of the Font).' Unfortunately the Rev. Wilfred had died and the source of this information is not given in his notes. A letter to the Incumbent was passed to the Reverend E.Noel T.Sandford who wrote the current guide to St.Andrew's. Interested in family history himself, his reply was most informative. Although he has no knowledge of a GRIFFIN vault (and no reference has been discovered so far)...coincidentally not many months previously he had come across a reference to vaults in the stated area. From a 'Memo of Repairs' effected between 1886 and 1890 he quoted the relevant excerpts...

'An unpleasant smell was complained of around the Font; it was thought that waste water from the Font had found its way into some of the vaults.'

'The Font was taken down entirely, and some of the vaults opened, when no cause for the smell could be traced, not the slightest smell being perceptible.

a local landowner whose daughter Elizabeth born 1757 married the Reverend Sir Abraham ELTON in 1776. The 5th Baronet already known to us and as previously mentioned his son Drax was Minister at the marriage of Mary's brother Thomas. The HOLLYMANs and Sir Abraham Isaac ELTON 4th Baronet associated as Churchwardens and a friendship continued between the two families. In 1782 Samuel (Bave) HOLLYMAN was an Assessor at Walton. 'Bennetts'...land owned by Sir John DURBIN at Walton as shown in the Land Tax assessments for 1791 was occupied by Abraham Battman PRITCHARD who had married Mary's daughter Nancy. William HOLLYMAN, Mary's nephew became Estate Agent for the Reverend Sir Abraham ELTON and built extensively in Clevedon from 1823.

Sir John...a handsome young Lord and a pretty Yeoman's daughter...involved in an idyllic rustic romance. A charming picture, but the truth could have been very different. Another DURBIN who might qualify for the position of Mary's paramour (supposing Samuel's father was a local man) was George, who appears in the Churchwardens' Accounts from 1751 when he was paid 2s.0d for 'fixing locks to the Chest and other work and Nailes'...through to the end of the century. From the registers we learn that a George and Jane DURBIN were baptising children from 1746 to 1760. John HOLLYMAN's Disbursements for 1762, the year Samuel would have been conceived (presuming he was newly born at the time of the burial entry) show no payments to George DURBIN but in 1761 he was 'Mending the Tenor stock and the Wheel of the bell' for which he was paid 6s.00d. 'Nailes and Oyl for the bell' were 04d. In 1763 no mention of George and his name does not appear again until 1770...three years after Mary's marriage to Joseph GRIFFIN. In the Disbursements of Sir Abraham Isaac ELTON his note for 6s.02d is paid and in 1771 he receives the same amount for ' severalls jobs done at Sevearall times'. Was he perhaps sent away from Clevedon for eight years between 1762 and 1770?

By 1775 another John HOLLYMAN had taken over the Accounts from Sir Abraham. Probably Mary's brother (1737 - 1781) Brother Thomas succeeded him in 1782 serving at least until 1801. During these years George DURBIN several times mended the Moor Geates and in 1784 'For halling Lime and Cole ashes and timber from DURBINs and scaffold Poules' 10s.00d was paid. It seems that George had progressed from being employed as a jobbing labourer/carpenter and may have built up his own timber business. If he was Samuel's father he was apparently accepted as a valued member of the small community that was Clevedon in the 18th century. Mary's family would no doubt have had enough influence to ensure that he was kept away had they wished.

Sydenham Hollyman. 1839 - 1904

The head of the first Hollyman family to settle in Miskin, south Wales, was born on December 18th 1839 at Waters's Buildings behind Bedminster parade close to what was known as, Harper's bridge at the bottom of Redcliff Hill, Bristol. He was baptised at St Mary Redcliff church on July 5th 1840.

He was the seventh child of Sydenham and Harriet Hollyman, nee Rowles and worked as a mason. He married Alvinia, the daughter of Francis Young a farmer of Michel Troy near Monmouth on September 1st 1862 at All Saint's church, Long Ashton.

It appears that the couple lived in or near Kingswood where, according to the relevant census returns, their first child a daughter was born. She was registered in Clifton, Bristol. But they did not remain here in Kingswood for very long for they migrated to a small village in south Wales named, Llanwanno where in 1866 their second child was born. By the year 1868-9 they had moved again across the hills to Miskin in Mountain Ash where they settled at number 5. Bailey street a row a terraced houses built on an alarming slope. Sydenham worked 'down the pit' until his death at the age of 64. His widow survived him by many years until she died in 1921.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Sarah Ann Hollyman. Born in Kingswood near Bristol in 1863 she was taken to south Wales when she was a baby but died aged fifteen years old.

William A. Hollyman. Not ascertained if he was really the son of Sydenham and Alvinia but as we know there were no other Hollyman families near this part of the country surely must be of their issue. He died an infant, in 1866.

Harriet Eliza Hollyman. Born in Llanwanno as was William two years after her brother George. She married Robert Davies and, at the time living in Springfield place.

Sydenham George Hollyman known as, or referred to as just George was born in 1869 but died aged three years.

Frederick Charles Hollyman. Born in 1871 most likely in Bailey street

married Leah Browning and for the last years of their lives lived at 211 Penrhiwceiber road. They had seven children, six of whom were girls. Fred'k died in 1949 and Leah sold the house and went to live somewhere on the south coast of England.

Searches continue.

George Henry Hollyman. Born in 1873 was baptised on May 1st that year. He

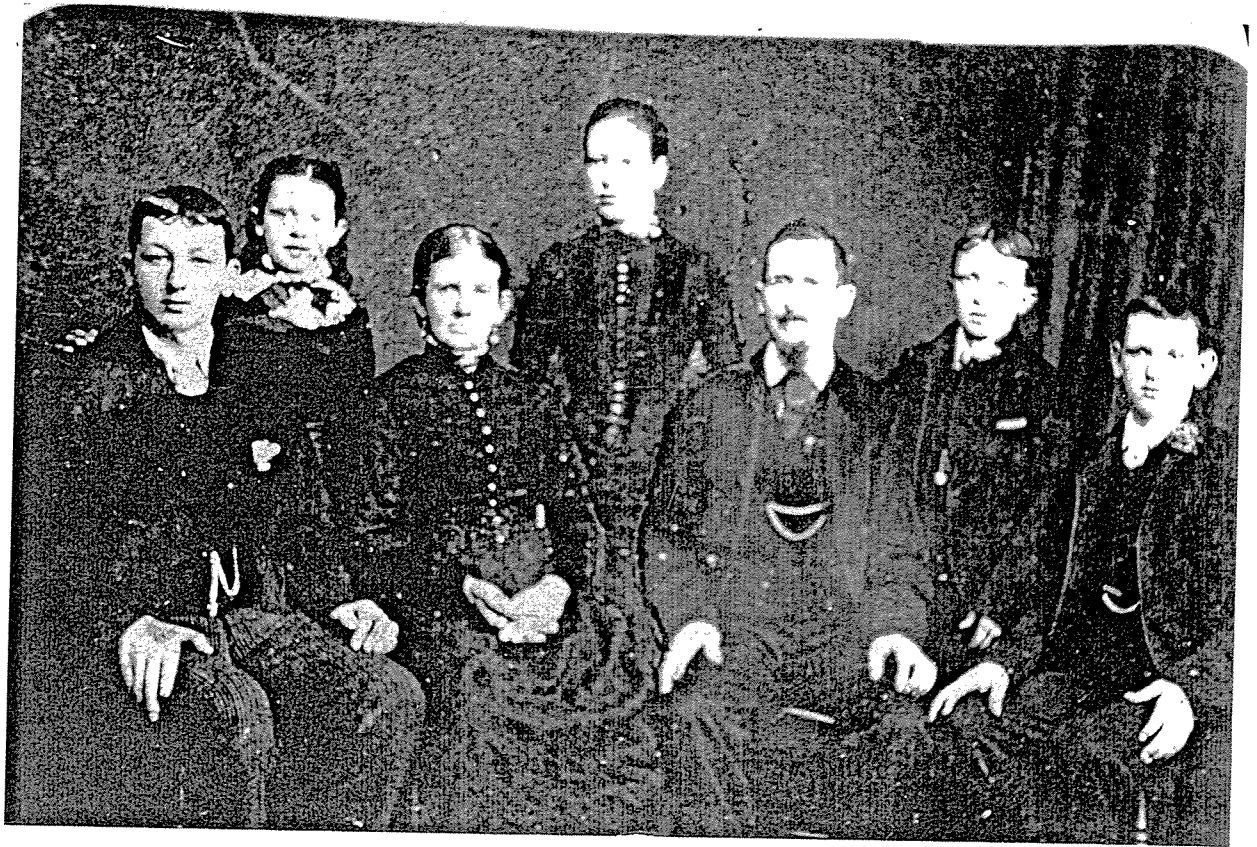
married Eunice Lewis in or near, Narberth in 1900. They had one son, Clifford and Eunice died the next year aged 27 years old. George remarried in 1906 to Alice Brookes and by her had three children. He died in 1961.

Mary Louise Hollyman. Born in 1875 in Miskin died aged four in 1879.

Samuel Francis Hollyman. Born in 1876 married Eleanor Morgun. They had, it is thought one son Samuel Levi born in 1899 and died the same year. They appear to have given up adding to their household. One member of the Hollyman family suggested that 'there was something very mysterious) Samuel died in 1929 but of his widow, I have no information. Searches continue.

Edith Emma Hollyman. The last child was born in 1878 and married George

Nathycombe in Miskin in 1898. They have two children, Norman Douglas born in 1914 and Nora born in 1918

Samuel Hollyman. 1835 - 1891

Although he died in Miskin, Samuel Hollyman was born in Portishead and baptised at St Peter's church on March 15th. 1835. He was the fifth child of Sydenham and Harriet Hollyman nee Rowles and whilst still a baby, the family moved to Waters's Buildings in Bedminster. He was fifteen years old when his father died in 1849 and, ten years later, married Louise, a Long Ashton girl in around 1860. They settled in 43. Bleachings Yard where their two sons were born. Samuel was recorded as being a quarryman but in 1881, he kept a shop at No. 6. North street where now stands the Star public house. Soon after this year, they moved to Miskin where his brother had moved about twenty years previously; to 68. Cardiff road. Samuel left the eldest son in Bedminster where he was most likely in lodgings and employed. Samuel died at the age of fifty five in early 1891 and Louise must have left for in that years census, she was living in Greville road, Bedminster. This meant that, Alfred Ernest the youngest son was still in Miskin living in Cardiff road. I have yet to find out where and when Louise died. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Frederick William Hollyman. Born in 1867 in Ashton Vale Bedminster. Married Emily Elizabeth Brown. He died in Bristol in 1899.

Alfred Ernest Hollyman. Born in Ashton Vale in 1869 was taken to Miskin at an early age of about thirteen years old and lived at No. 68 Cardiff road where he left to marry, Minnie in the early part of 1891. Their son, Samuel Alfred was born in 1891 and baptised in 1896 in Miskin and much later married Edith Elizabeth Hawkings on Oct. 23rd 1917 in Bristol. He died, sine prole in 1985 and his widow died at the age of ninety eight in December 1990. They lived at 28 Maple ave. Bristol.

FREDERICK WILLIAM HOLLYMAN. 1867 - 1899.

Born to Samuel and Louise Hollyman in the Ashton Vale suburb of Bristol in 1867 he was the elder of just two sons. When his parents and younger brother went to Miskin in South Wales, he was left in Bedminster so must have been of an age when he could look after himself.

At the age of about 24 he married Emily Elizabeth Brown in 1891. This was the year when his brother, who married in Miskin, had his first son, Samuel. Some six years were to pass before the arrival of their first child, named Frederick John, in 1897. Sadly Emily died the same year and so the baby was brought up by the Brown family.

FREDERICK JOHN HOLLYMAN 1897 - 1955, son of the above, married Ann Matilda Barry in 1926. She had been born in 1904 and she died in 1988. The five children of this marriage were:-

1) Emily Elizabeth. Born in 1926 and married Barclay Edgar Goodsir in 1947. He was six years older than her and whilst these searches were going on in 1990 I met Mrs Goodsir at her home in Nutgrove Avenue, Bedminster - after I had already met her brother Gerald. Emily, known as Betty had children but I did not enquire about them.

2) Ronald. Born in Bristol in 1930 and he married Doris Smith and died in 1983. They had issue of Barry born in 1957, John in 1959 and Graham in 1967.

3) Michael David Rodney. Born in 1944 and married to Judith Lilley in 1962. They emigrated to New Zealand in the 1970's and live in the Auckland area. It is believed that there were three sons, Mark born in 1963, Paul in 1964 and Martin in 1967.

4) Pamela. Born in 1932 and died in 1982. Nothing else known.

5) Gerald Thomas. Born in Bristol in 1927. He spent many years in Kenya and it was from Gerald that I learnt much about this family. He now lives in Minehead Road where Mrs Ann M. Hollyman died in 1988.

A look at the various publications of Kelly's will reveal where many of the family lived.

"Betty Goodsir lives alone except for regular visits from her children and grandchildren.

Samuel Alfred Hollyman. 1891 - 1985

Samuel was born in Miskin in the Mountain Ash Area of South Wales on November 24th 1891. He was the son of Alfred and Minnie Hollyman. Samuel was baptised on January 8th 1896.

Descended from Sydenham Hollyman of Puxton, his father, Alfred was the younger of two sons born in Ashton Vale, Bristol and taken to south Wales by his father and mother, Samuel and Louise, there being already other Hollymans there.

Samuel obviously knew of his parents origins and decided to make his way to Bristol as soon as he was able. In 1917, he met and married Edith Hawkings at St Lukes church on October 23rd whilst he was living in Ware street. This was his home although at his wedding he was serving in the A.S.C (Army Service Corps)

For much of their married life, Samuel and Edith lived at 28 Maple avenue Hillfields Bristol and it was here that I tracked Edith to. Even though she was ninety eight years old, she was quite lucid and conversational. She told me about her neice who lives in Downend who, eventually gave me Samuels birth registration and death certificates.

Samuel worked for the last few years of his life as a storeman at what was E.S. & A. Robinson in Fishponds. He died aged 94 at Manor Park Hospital on February 5th 1985.

There was no issue from this marriage.

Samuels uncle was Frederick Hollyman.

Frederick Charles Hollyman. 1871 - 1949

Born in Miskin in the parish of Llanwanno, Mountain Ash in south Wales most likely at number 5. Bailey street in the summer of 1871. He was the fifth child of Sydenham and Alvinia Hollyman nee Young. In adult life, he ran a small dairy business until his liking for gambling caused it to fail. He married, presumably in Miskin to Leah Browning in 1893 and for the latter part of their lives resided at Alma Cottage, 211. Penrhiw-ceiber road where in 1949 at the age of seventy eight, he died. Leah, his widow then sold the house and went to live in Bournemouth.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Millicent Maud Hollyman who was born in 1894 and married Mr Davies in 1913.

They have at least, one daughter, Murial.

Elsie May Hollyman. Born in 1895, married a Mr Beecham in 1915.

Sydenham William Hollyman. Their only son was born in 1898. He married Sarah

Ponting in 1923 when he was twenty five years old.

He died in Ilford in 1962 as a result from an accident on the road. See next page.

Gertrude Hollyman. Born in 1900 and married Reuben C. Mann in 1921.

Elizabeth Florence Hollyman. Born in 1902. Nothing else known.

Sylvia Constance Hollyman. Born in 1910 and, at the age of eighteen, she left

Miskin for Barry where she took a course in teaching.

She then went to Dagenham to take up a position and married Donald Bond and, at the time of writing, lives in Romford, Essex. They have one daughter, Susan.

Stephanie Hollyman. The youngest child was born in 1912. She married Mr.

Taylor in Bournemouth in the summer of 1935.

Sydenham William Hollyman. 1898 - 1962

The only son of Frederick Charles and Leah Hollyman nee Browning was born in Miskin during the spring of 1898. It appears that during his childhood, he lived at 'Alma Cottage', 211. Penrhiwceiber road. During 1923, he married Sarah Ponting and when he became unemployed in the 1930's, his aunt Sylvia who was living in the Ilford area of London, got him a job in the local Y.M.C.A. as caretaker. Whilst on his way to work in 1962, he was knocked off his bicycle and received injuries from which he did not recover. Of the union with Sarah, he had issue of:-

Frederick William Hollyman born in 1924 and who married Danish born Inge Larsen. They went to live in Denmark where he died in 1990. Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Kenneth Hollyman born in the early 1950's and lives in Denmark.

Raymond S. Hollyman born in 1954 in Ilford who is married.

Wyndham Hollyman born in 1926 and married Brenda Jones in Harrow: they have issue but now divorced. The two children are:-

Max Hollyman and Claudine Hollyman who is now married.

Haydn Hollyman born in 1929 and married to Elizabeth Catherine Scotney and, at the time of writing, live in Shadwell, Leeds. They have two sons:-

Gareth Hollyman born in Essex reg. area in 1959 who is married with three children, Thomas: Jonathan and Jessica Louise Hollyman. At the time of writing, they live in Horam. Heathfield. E. Essex.

David William Hollyman. Born as yet at a time unknown but is married with one son, Adam Hollyman and 'one on order'

Kenneth Hollyman the youngest son of Sydenham and Sarah was born in 1932 in it is thought, Miskin. He married Edna and has issue of:-

Robert Hollyman. Married and has issue of:-

Jack (or John) Hollyman and Samuel Hollyman.

Joanne Hollyman.

At the time of writing, this is all the information known.

As indicated, the sons of Sydenham William and Sarah Hollyman left Miskin in South Wales and lived for a time in the London borough of Ilford. After they were married, they went their separate ways. Gareth Hollyman, the son of Haydn lived for a few years in my home town of Northampton and it was this fact which encouraged me to write to him which has resulted in the information gathered since.

The eldest son, Frederick died in Denmark but his brothers are still with us.

Searches continue for other salient facts.

But there are questions arising with regard to other Miskin born Hollymans. Samuel Levi Hollyman was born here in 1899 and I am convinced he was the son of Samuel Francis and his wife, Eleanor. There was also Harold Abraham born in 1901. The name suggests he too was sibling to Samuel Levi. But these two died infants.

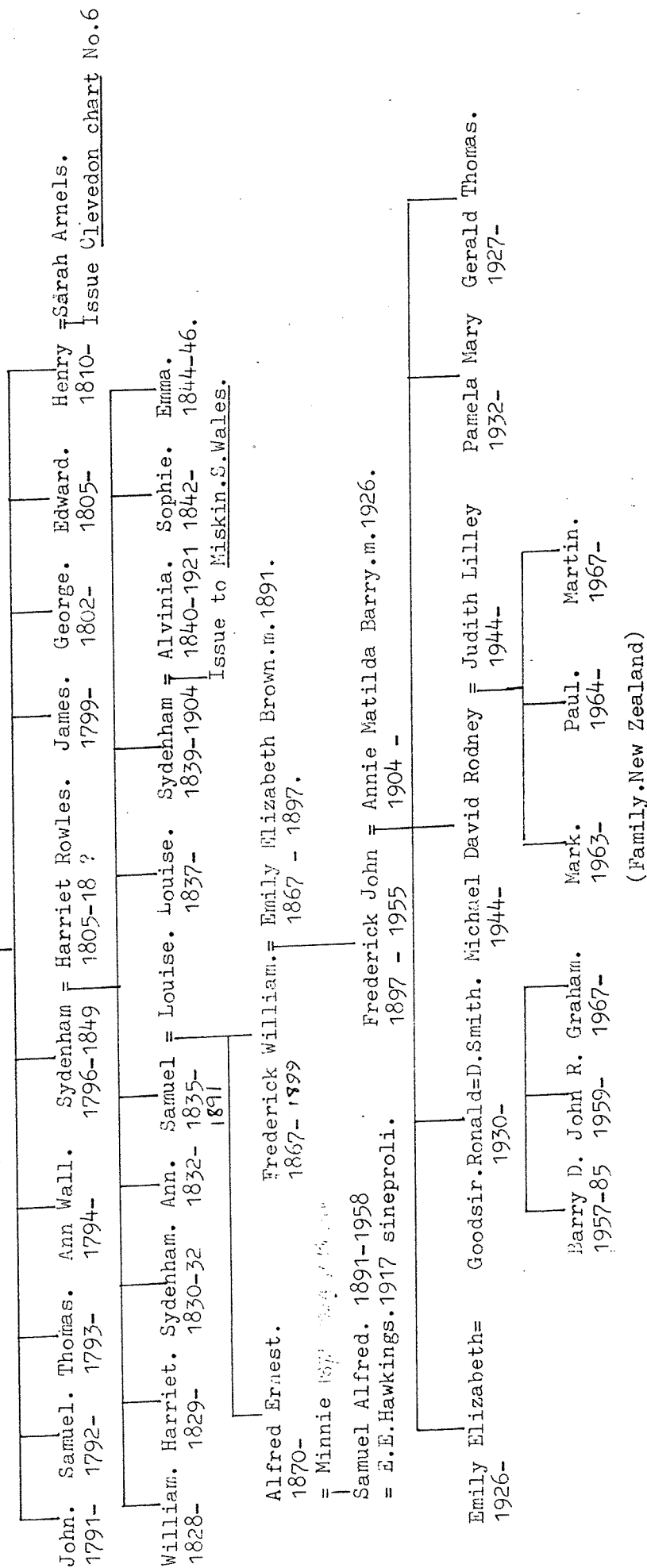
Albert Hollyman born in 1903 also creates a mystery.

Thomas Hollyman. 1793 - 1867

He worked from most of his life as a tailor and married Hannah Hole in Bristol in 1829. After his death at the age of fifty one and subsequent burial on February 21st. 1853, Hannah remarried to William Woolford and settled in Clevedon next to the Waggon and Horses public house with two of Hannah's children.

Of the union with Hannah, George had issue of:-

Ann Hollyman. Baptised on February 20th 1831. Very little is known of Ann.

Charles Hollyman. Baptised on April 5th 1833 in Clevedon. He married Martha the daughter of Charles Wilmot of Tickenham on February 11th 1861. Martha died in Tickenham aged 60 and buried on January 16th 1895. Charles lived for nearly twenty years longer and died in 1914. Of this union, there appears to have been one daughter, Elizabeth Jane Hollyman born in c. 1857. She married William Crane on January 26th 1880.

Eliza Hollyman. Baptised on September 6th 1835 but died aged four November 1839.

Alfred Hollyman. Baptised on December 21st 1837 also died young. Buried May 13th 1841.

Frederick Hollyman. The youngest child of George and Hannah Hollyman was born in Clevedon and baptised on August 22nd 1852. He became a carpenter by trade and married Ellen Burnell Bathe of Lyng in Cardiff in 1875. They settled in Cardiff where thir children were born. Fred. died at the age of thirty nine and buried on November 21st 1891. (See notes on Frederick & Ellen Hollyman)

CLEVEDON MERCURY. Aug. 26th 1871. On August 19th at the parish church, Clevedon. By Rev. E. H. Fothergill, William Turner of Fairford, Glous. to Clara, daughter of the late George Hollyman of Clevedon.

Selina Hollyman was the eighth child of George and Hannah Hollyman born in 1847. She is mentioned in the 1861 census of Clevedon as aged 13 years old, a general servant. With her was her sister Claire aged eleven yeras old. Selina, as stated, married Moses Gould a gas fitter and bell hanger. In 1881, the family were living in Prospect Lane. See over.

Selina and Moses Gould had four children as far as I know, the eldest being, Alice G. Gould born in 1868.

William H. Gould born in 1872.

Clara A. Gould born in 1873.

Selina L. Gould born in 1875.

From information available, I have the distinct impression that Selina must have been a lonely girl for at the age of six, she lost her father George in 1853 and three years later, her mother remarried and so became stepdaughter to William Woolford. She was to experience the loss of four of her siblings too. Her youngest brother Frederick settled in Cardiff and her sister Claire most likely settled in her husband's home town. Whilst still children, they are shown as living with each other and Selina working as a servant. (1861) It seems that the best way of succeeding in social life was to marry. Within six years, this is what she did.

She lived long enough to see her daughter marry her brother's son. This can be seen in Puxton chart No 1.

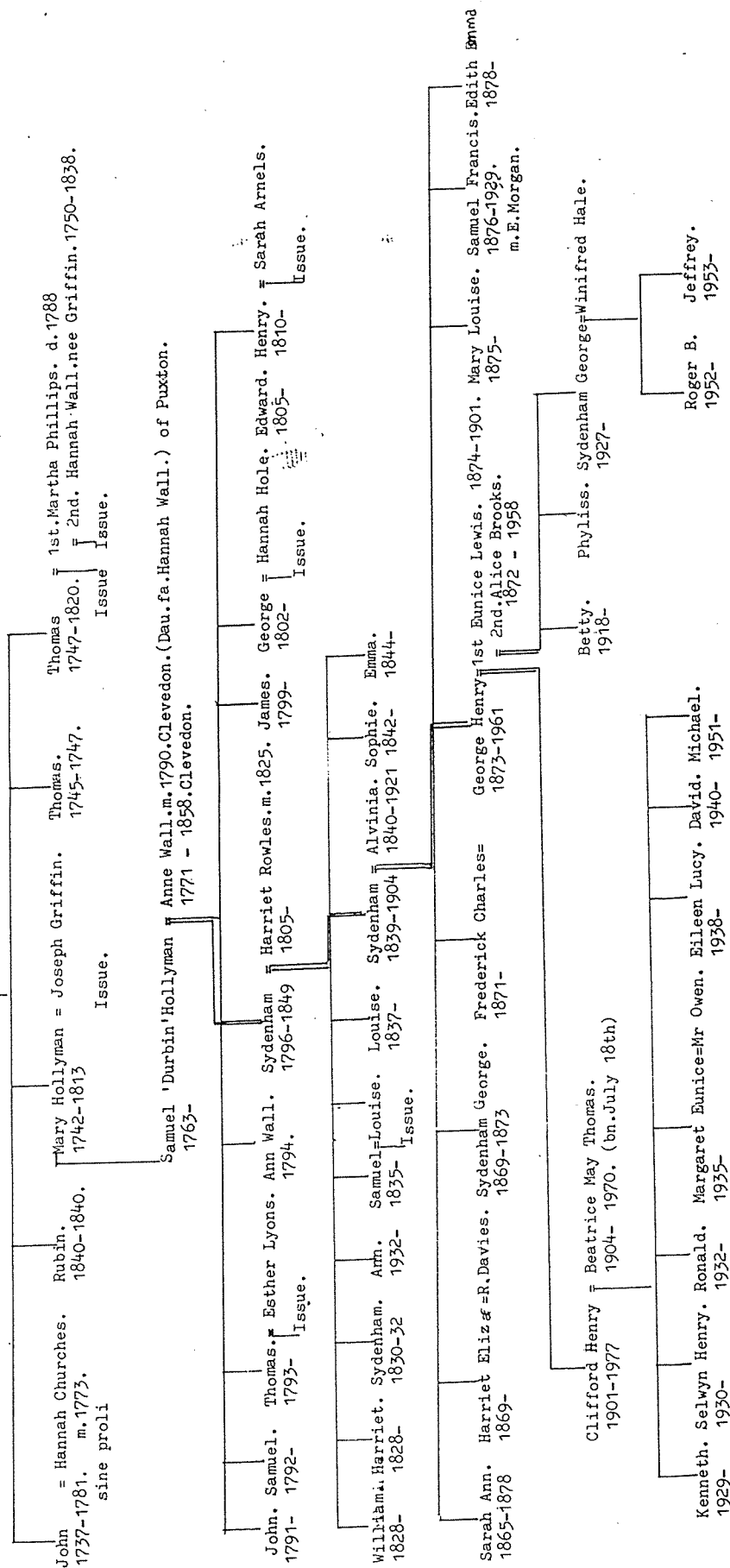
CLEVEDON MERCURY. May 27th 1939. Obituary. 'A Dear Old Lady of Clevedon'

The funeral of Mrs Selina Gould who resided with her daughters at St John's Cottage, Queens Road. Mrs Gould was in her 92nd year and was a member of one of the oldest Clevedon families being the daughter of the late Mr and Mrs George Hollyman, a name which has been connected with the town for several centuries.

Writer's note. The first Hollyman to set foot (as far as is known) in Clevedon was John Hollyman the elder who arrived in about 1703 six years before the 'court' was bought by the Elton family.

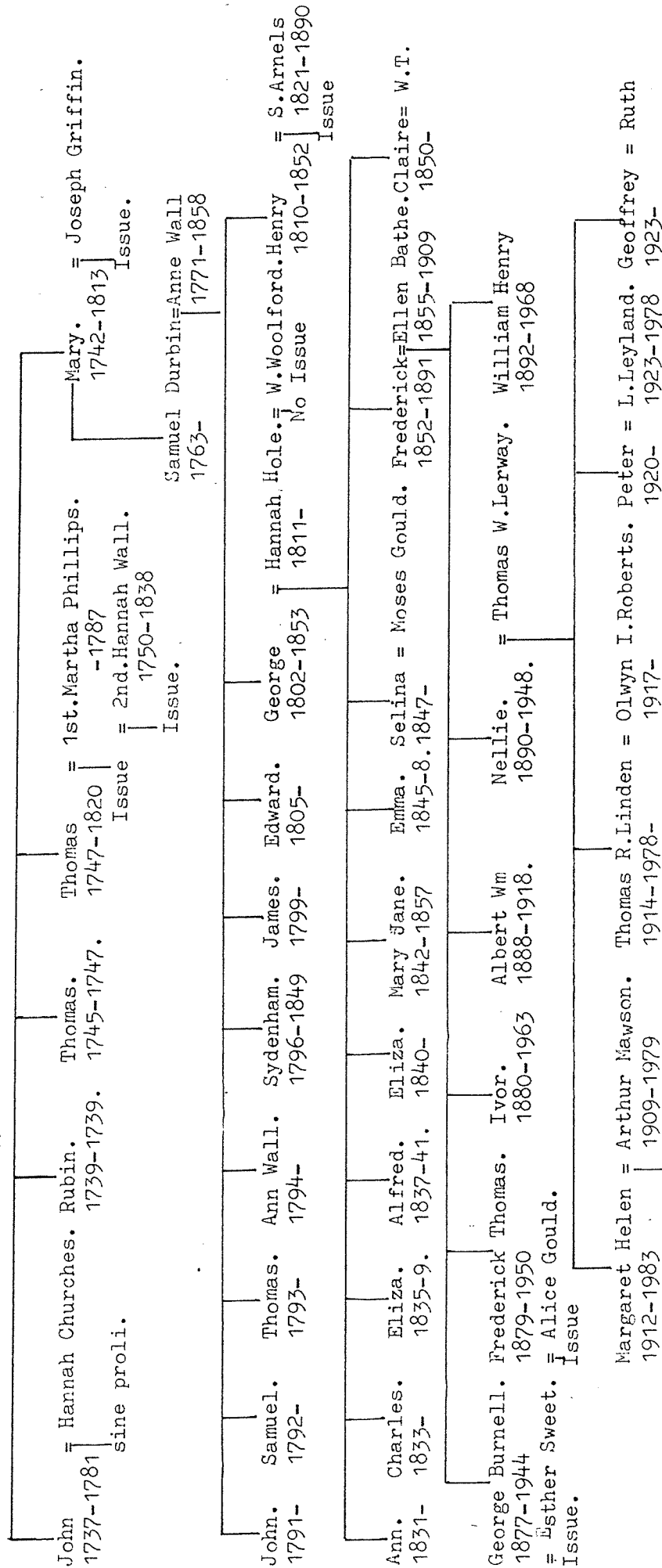

Edward Hollyman.1805 - 1842

Born in Puxton on April 14th.1805 and baptised in the local church of St.Saviour on June 4th.Edward was the eighth child of Samuel and Ann Hollyman nee Wall.He married Harriet Knowles on May 20th.1832 at the church of St. Mary in Congresbury.Edward and Harriet were to know what tragedy is all about for not many of their children grew to adulthood and even Edward died at the age of thirty seven.He was buried in the same parish where the wedding took place. Of Harriet,little else is known but of this union,there was issue of:-

Richard Hollyman. Baptised in St.Andrew's,Clevedon on December 16th.1832.

He was obviously expected at the time of his parents wedding but died at the age of three and buried on April 10th.1836.

Maria Hollyman.Baptised on August 10th.1834.Nothing else known.

Ellen Hollyman.Baptised on June 27th.1836 died aged fifteen in January 1852.

Frederick Hollyman.Baptised on November 5th.1837 also died young and buried on March 25th.1842 aged,four years.

Samuel Hollyman. Baptised on June 23rd.1839.Nothing else known.

The family,or what was left of it moved to Congresbury where:-

Frederick Hollyman the second to bear this name must have been born for in the St.Andrew's church register,he was buried as,of that village at a week old on April 25th.1842.

Ann Knowles Hollyman. Born and baptised in Congresbury in 1843,died at the age of almost two years and buried on February 18th.1845.

Edward worked as a carpenter for most of his short life. I have yet to search at length this parish of St.Mary.Congresbury.

Henry Hollyman

1810 - 1852

Henry was the youngest child of Samuel and Anne Hollyman born in 1810. He was baptised on December 25th in Clevedon, the same year. He died at the age of 42 years and buried on July 2nd 1852.

He was married to Sarah, daughter of John Arnels, a local soapboiler on April 19th 1840. For most of his life, Henry worked as a painter, plumber and a butcher. They had issue of:-

Samuel Hollyman who was baptised on August 1st 1841 whilst living in 'Elm Tree' cottage in Clevedon. Samuel married Martha the daughter of Frances Huish in the Langdon street chapel in Bristol in 1863. He died aged 70 years old in 1911.

George Hollyman. Baptised on November 12th 1843 died unmarried aged 83 and was buried in Clevedon on June 12th 1927.

Louisa Hollyman was baptised in 1847. Nothing else known.

Sarah Hollyman. Although born in 1849 was not baptised until August 8th 1852.

Fanny Hollyman was baptised on the same day as her sister Sarah but she died when she was three years old.

Frederick Hollyman was also baptised on August 8th 1852. Nothing else known.

Henry, his wife Sarah, daughter Fanny and son, George were all buried in the same family grave. The headstone of which is situated by the side of the path leading to the main entrance to St Andrews church, is very corroded but still the names can be read.

Samuel Hollyman 1841 - 1911

Samuel was the eldest son of Henry and Sarah Hollyman born in 1841. He was married to Martha Huish, the daughter of Frances Huish. Martha was born in 1840. She died fourteen years after her husband in 1925. This union which lasted forty eight years produced seven children, the eldest being:-
Ada Hollyman who was born in 1864 but she died an infant and buried on Sept. 6th the same year.

Annie Hollyman. Born in 1865 married George Baker and settled in Barry, South Wales.

Gertrude Hollyman. Born in 1867 on February 20th died unwed in 1944.

Emily Hollyman was born on January 6th 1869: she married a Mr Ackrill and they had two children, Eileen and Bernard.

Henry Hollyman was born on June 6th 1870. He settled in South Wales where he married and raised his family. See his own family notes.

George William Hollyman was born on February 23rd 1874. He became a butcher and later married Ada Louise (maiden name unknown) He is thought to have died aged eighty five years old in 1960. There were three children of this marriage:-

Dorothy May Hollyman born in 1898 married Ernest Henry Russell and had two children being, John Russell and a sister, Vera. Vera married Desmond Taylor and they also have two children, Colin and Martin.

Vera Ada Hollyman born in 1905, married B. Rogers.

Dennis Walter Hollyman, the third child was born in 1911 and married Rosina Manning who was one year younger. She died in 1985. Of this union, there was one son:-

Terence George Hollyman born in 1939 and who is married to Frances Moseley who was born in 1944; they have two children, Rosemary Hollyman born in Germany on May 20th 1967 and her

brother, Martyn Dennis William Hollyman born in Cyprus on
October 23rd 1970.

Louise Hollyman the youngest child of Samuel and Martha was born on June
18th 1876. It is possible she married a Mr Perry and has
two sons and a daughter. Searches continue.

NB. It has been confirmed that Henry Hollyman did in fact settle in South
Wales. On the next page can be seen his own family notes.

Terry Hollyman now lives in Nailsea and we have become much acquainted
since I started to seek out this particular line of Hollyman.

The Issue of Henry Hollyman and Elizabeth Anne Stone.

Henry Hollyman was the fifth child born to Samuel and Martha nee Huish in 1870. He married twice; firstly to Elizabeth Anne Stone from which there was issue of eight children. The second marriage was to the widow of Mr Gough, the owner of Goughs caves of Cheddar, Caroline Mary Hannah. Of this marriage there was no issue. Caroline predeceased her husband by one year in 1952. Henry died in 1953. His first wife, Elizabeth died at the age of sixty years. Their marriage lasted for thirty six years. This couple went to live in south Wales where:-

Louisa Florence Hollyman their first child was born in 1895. She married Mr Herbert (Bert) Moire in c. 1915.

Henry Arnold Hollyman the only son was born in 1897 (reg. Cardiff) in Swansea and married to Eleanor Cridge on January 20th 1923. Eleanor was born in 1895 and died in 1974. They had two children. Henry died before his wife in 1970.

Hilda Ruth Hollyman was born in 1899 also reg. Cardiff and died in 1980. She married George Baker and they lived in Cheddar.

Elizabeth Hollyman. Born in 1899 but died an infant. This may be the daughter registered as Elizabeth Winifred in Swansea.

Elsie Beatrice Hollyman born in 1901. She died in 1982. Married to William Baker of Cheddar.

Alexandra Violet Hollyman was born in 1902 in Swansea. It is not thought she married and the last time I know of her, she was living in Clevedon possibly in an elderly people's home at the age of ninety years. It is to this lady I owe much of this lineage of Henry Hollyman.

Lily Irene Hollyman was born in 1904 and died in 1923 aged nineteen.

Rose Enid Hollyman the youngest child of Henry and Elizabeth was born
in 1913. She married Trevor Williams in Swansea.

They have four children but little else known.

Merlin Williams: Richard Williams: Royston Williams
and Sylvia Williams who is married to Paul Brown
who have two children, Tanya Brown and Jason Brown.

NB.

Of the information regards to the Baker families of Cheddar, one couple related to the Hollymans, Edwin and Martha Baker were married in the church in Cannington on May 23rd 1839. Annie Hollyman sister to Henry (1870) did marry George Baker, one of their sons. They lived in Barry where their son also named George married his cousin Hilda Hollyman. Elsie Beatrice Hollyman married William Baker in Cheddar on August 11th 1924. He was originally a Derby steeplejack. They died, sine proli.

I wrote to Clevedon's local newspaper asking about the Hollyman families. Miss (I assume this) Violet Alexandra Hollyman, although ninety years old, had a clipping sent to Henry Clifford Hollyman who lives in Cheadle who, in turn sent me much about his side of the family. So, in some way, are genealogical charts made.

The Issue of Henry Arnold Hollyman and Eleanor Cridge.

The Hollyman name continues with Henry Arnold, the only son of eight children born to Henry and Elizabeth nee Stone in 1897. He was born in Swansea as was his wife, Eleanor. It is known that Eleanor's father was born in Stoke St Gregory near Taunton. Of the union of Henry and Eleanor, there were just two children:-

Lillian Florence Hollyman born in 1923 and married Raymond Matthews.

Of this marriage there were four children:-

Jennifer who married John Evans with two children, Tony and Debbie.

Pauline who married Michael Pritchard and have two children, Fion and Cerys

Andrew who married Karen ? and have two children, Jonathan and Adrian.

Robert who married Valeria ? and has one daughter, Vanessa.

Henry Clifford Hollyman who was born in Swansea in 1926. He married Audrey

Elizabeth Bailey at St John's church, Skewen on the 18th of November 1950. At the time of writing, they live in Cheadle. Of this union, there is:-

Carol Hollyman born in 1951 reg. W. Glamorgan and is married to Robert Symonds and has one daughter, Gemma Louise Symonds born Sept. 13th 1985.

Ian Richard Hollyman, the second child was born in 1955 and is married to Julie Williams who was born in 1953. They have twin children, born on May 31st 1989. Rachael Suzanna Hollyman and Philip Richard Hollyman.

The Hollyman name continues with the son, Philip Richard Hollyman.

Henry Arnold Hollyman died in 1970 and his widow Eleanor survived him by four years.

The only other male to continue the Hollyman name from the lineage of Samuel and Martha nee Huish is the son of Terence George and his wife, Frances nee Moseley, Martyn Dennis William Hollyman born in Cyprus in 1970. At the time of writing, it is not known if he is married.

I have typed a letter I recieved from Henry Clifford Hollyman which does give in more detail of this particular family.

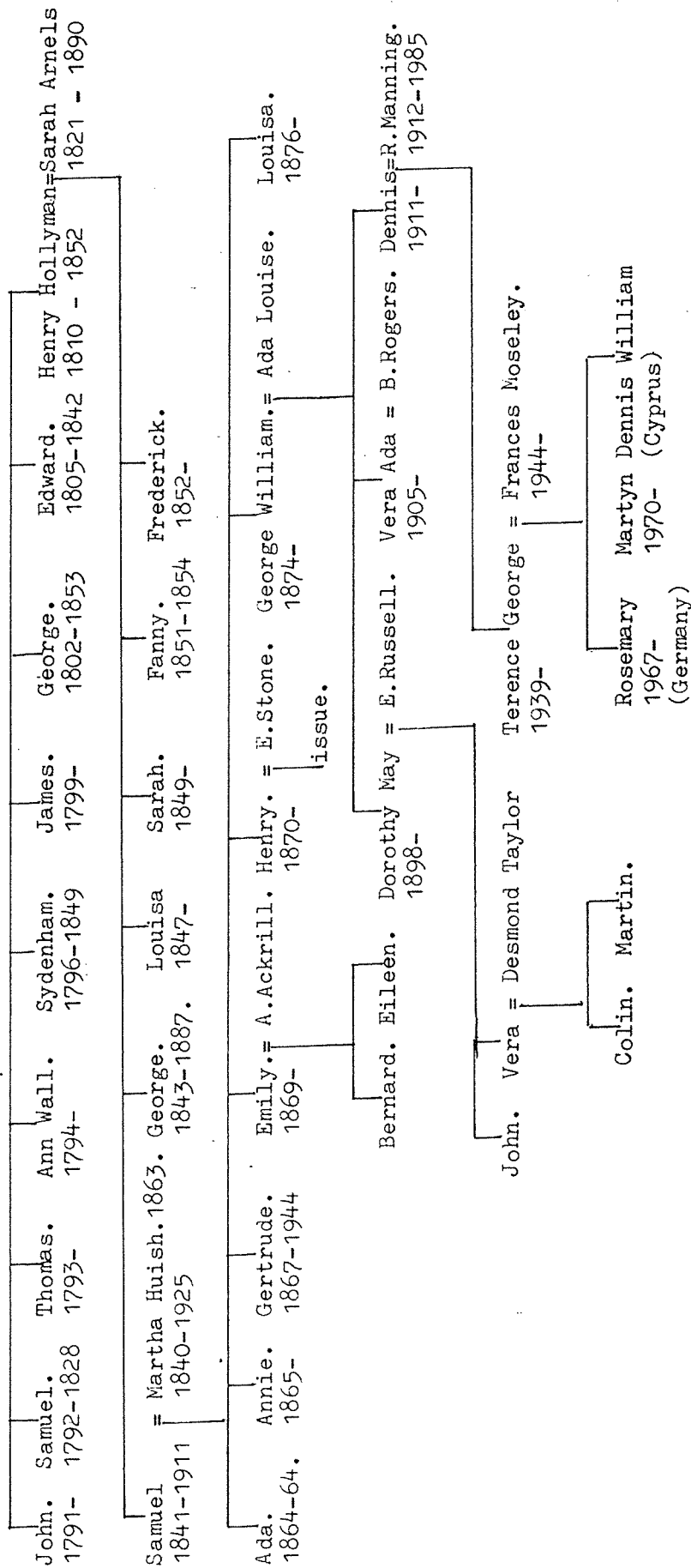

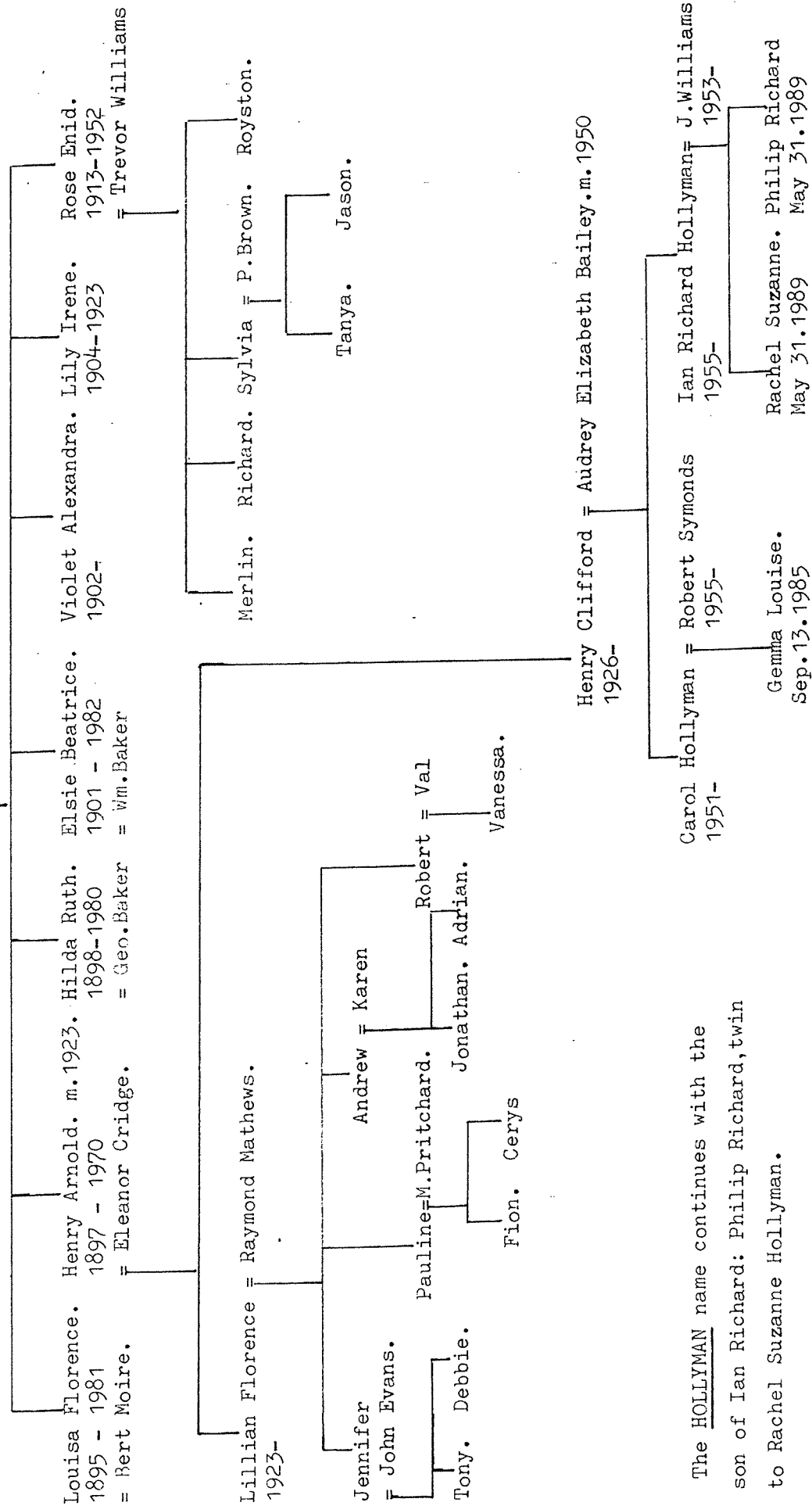

Dear Mr Cooper,

I have recently received a cutting from a Bristol Newspaper about your work on the Hollyman family tree.This is a subject which has been 'on my list'ever since I retired over two years ago but to date have not made a start.

However,I do have some records and information which may be of interest to you.

1.Bible inscription.

"To Samuel Hollyman from his father, Henry Hollyman. 1852"

2.Family bible inscription.

"From Frances Huish to her children, Samuel & Martha Hollyman who were married on the 16th of March 1863"

The children of Samuel and Martha are listed.

Ada.	died.Sept. 3rd.1864.
Annie.	born.Feb. 23rd.1865.
Gertrude.	born.Feb. 20th.1867.
Emily.	born.Jan. 6th.1869.
Henry.	born.June 6th.1870.
George William.	born.Feb. 23rd.1874.
Louise.	born.June.18th.1876.

I have no contact with the descendants of any of the above other than those of Henry who was my Grandfather.

I know that George who had one son, Dennis remained in Clevedon. Annie married George Baker and they lived in Barry and had one son, George who did not have any children. Gertrude did not marry. Emily married an Ackrill and they have a daughter, Eileen who, I believe still live in the Bristol area.

Louise married a Mr Perry and they had two sons and one daughter.

I have no information on Samuel's father Henry except that his children included a daughter Louise who married a Moire and a son. George was born. Samuel and Martha lived in Culmstock cottage, Walton road Clevedon. The cottage still stands but the name has changed. I understand there is a book which contains a lot of information about the family, the title may be "History of Clevedon and Walton" but I am not sure of it.

Writer's note.

With regard to the graves mentioned above, I fear that Henry C. Hollyman has been sadly misinformed for these graves are located in St Andrew's churchyard and that the name 'Nellie' should or rather, is Lily Beatrice.

These graves are nothing to do with Mr H.C. Hollyman's lineage other than the fact that William Hollyman was nephew to Henry Hollyman born in 1810 who was married to Sarah Arnels.

This line did descend from one, Sydenham Hollyman born in Puxton to whom we believe Mary Hollymans base born son, Samuel 'Durbin' who married Puxton born, Anne Wall.

Frederick Hollyman.

1852 - 1891

The youngest son of George and Hannah Hollyman nee Hole, was born in Clevedon on July 5th 1852 and baptised into the church of St Andrews on August 22nd that year. He settled in Cardiff where he married Ellen Burnell Bathe of Lyng on July 17th 1875. He died in Cardiff and was buried on November 21st 1891 aged thirty nine years old. (Other references have been made elsewhere in this work)

These two were living in Wood street at the time of his death but also lived at 6. Gough street during 1881. He followed his trade of carpenter which he learned in Clevedon. Ellen, who was born in Lyng on July 26th 1855 was formerly a schoolmistress in Clevedon. After the death of her husband Frederick, she married a second time to Charles William Purnell, a mason. Ellen died in 1909 aged 58 years. She and Frederick had seven children (as far as is known) although there was no issue from her second marriage.

Geogge Burnell Hollyman. Born in Cardiff in 1876. He died c. 1945. He was married to Esther Mabel Churchill Sweet at St Mary's.

Frederick Thomas Hollyman. Was also born in Cardiff in 1878 and died shortly before the year 1950. Searches continue.

Ivor Hollyman. Born on July 22nd 1880 and died May 2nd 1963 aged 82 years.

Charles Henry Hollyman. Born in 1882. Nothing else known.*

Albert
Alfred William Hollyman. Born 1888 and died in W.W.1. October 21st 1918.

Police officer and also served with 1st Bat. Welsh Guards.

Nellie Hollyman. Born 1890 and died October 16th 1948 aged 58 years.

William Henry Hollyman. Born May 22nd 1892 and died April 6th 1968. age 75.

He was a Publican and Transport Officer.

* Discovered later, Charles Henry Hollyman died aged two in 1885

George Burnell Hollyman. 1876 - 1945. Cardiff.

The eldest son of Frederick and Ellen Burnell Hollyman nee Bathe was born in Cardiff in 1876 and baptised on June 29th the same year. He was married to Esther Mabel Churchill Sweet also known as, Hetty at St Mary's Cardiff around the year 1899. At the age of nine years old, he was put to work in the mines in the Llantrisant district. After an accident from which he recovered, he went to sea on the Sailing ships sailing to many corners of the earth including San Francisco at the time of the 1906 earthquake. He then became a noted horse dealer having a flair in their handling and becoming proficient in dealing with their ailments. Once more working with coal, he became a trimmer in Cardiff Docks. Hetty died at 14. Bloom street, Canton about five years after her husband and they lie together in Cathay cemetery Cardiff. Of this union, there were ten children.

Frederick Charles Hollyman the eldest was born around 1902 and was reputed to have been the Romeo of the family and also fond of horses whether riding or driving them. He is thought to have lived in Avon street, Canton and married Edith, a Cardiff girl. They had three children. Frederick: Brian and Geoffrey.

Nothing else known.

Ivy May Hollyman. Born around 1904 married Thomas Howells in 1926 who held a prominent position at the Cardiff G.P.O. They lived in the Fairwater area of the city. There was no issue from this union.

George Burnell Hollyman was born in 1907 and served in India during the Second World War. He married Florence Byrne, an Irish girl from Dublin in 1926. Their son, Peter was baptised in Llandaff cathedral in 1927. Later, they were divorced and George married a Miss Thomas and by her had, Maria: Gloria b. 1938 and Max b. 1940. George, also known as, Bernie left home at an early age and had a tough war later settling down in Nuneaton as a

miner. His first marriage may have broken up because of the severe depression in the Cardiff area during the 1920's. He was a prisoner of war of either the Japanese or the Germans in North Africa. Bernie died in 1978. (January 3rd.)

Nellie Clara Hollyman Born in 1909 was said to have worked as a linen keeper at a London hotel. She once worked and lived in the Royal George hotel, Cardiff with the Lerway family. Nell also lived at 30. Kevin's Drive, Yateley near Camberley in Surrey.

William Albert Hollyman. Born in 1910 married a Scots girl named, Mabs who was a widow with one daughter. They were married around 1938. During the war, he was an aircraft inspector attached to RAF. After the war, he travelled to the Gulf, then to S. Africa and finally settled in Southern Rhodesia where he set up business dealing in horses. It is possible that he died in Johannesburg in 1967 leaving two daughters. One, Avril married a farmer and has five children. The other, Margaret Churchill Hollyman married a police officer and both live in Harare with their children.

Ernest Guy Hollyman. Army officer and a cavalryman. 7th Queens Own Hussars. Subaltern with the Fife and Forfar Yeomanry. Captain in 7th Battalion Royal Tank Regiment. He was born on May 9th 1912 and married Amy Alice Mary Fawn in Aldershot in 1945. Of this union, there was no issue. See further notes at end of this family synopsis.

Olive Jane Hollyman. Born in 1913. Married Kenneth Watkins, an army officer and Chief Detective Superintendent. Ken served in the police Force then was commissioned into the Parachute Regiment. He served in Norway prior to the end of the war. Afterwards, he returned to the police force in Llanelli and retired as,

C.D. Superintendent. Olive and Kenneth had two daughters,
Susan and Jennifer Watkins.

William John Hollyman. Born in 1915, married Edna Norris of Upper Hale, Farnham,
Surrey. William enlisted in the Queens Bays Dragoon regiment
and ended up in Greece and it was there he 'went into the bag'
when we ran out of land, as he put it and finished the war
as a prisoner in Germany. He and Edna had three children,
Brian, Rodney and Lorraine.

Edward Ivor Hollyman. 'Ted' as he was known as was born in 1919 and married
Violet Ward who lived in Canton during 1944. He was called
up and served in Norway where he had a nasty time. He did get
selected for Sandhurst but declined a commission for he did
not wish to order his friends into a position of 'no return'
whereas he would, if necessary go himself. A man of great
principles. He died in 1975. Of this marriage, there were,
Robert Hollyman b. 1946: Ann C. Hollyman. b. 1948 and Philip
Hollyman b. 1949. (Reg. as Ivor B. Hollyman)

Josephine Hollyman, the youngest child of George and Hetty Hollyman was
born in Bloom street, Cardiff on September 27th 1921. She
married Desmond Philpott, a survey officer at All Saints,
Llanelli in 1958. Desmond was a first cousin of Trevor
Philpott, the television reporter of the Philpott File, one
who can speak fluent Welsh and works for B. Telecom.
'Des' says, his grandmother had twenty one children and that
many of their descendants are now living in New Zealand.
During the war, Josie served in the WAAF until she was
demobbed. Whilst in the forces, she often visited other
Philpotts in Bridgwater and Stourbridge.
Says, Ernest 'No one person became anyone out of the ordinary

run of the mill in his family, but, quote Bob Mawson, who interviewed Ernest, 'This can be viewed as an understatement when one considers his father's maritime experiences before the mast and his family's rise from poverty.

At the age of nine years, George was put to work down the pits in the Llantrisant area and used to have to walk many miles home to hand in his wages to his mother. (Frederick, his father died in 1891) The journey was about ten miles each way and the only time he had a lift was when a horse and cart was going his way, which wasn't often.

After an accident at the pit, he recovered and went to sea in the sailing ships of the time. He was once a member of a windjammer, 'The Inchcape Rock' a fully rigged ship of the James Cornfoot Rock line. This ship loaded the first cargo of silver ore out of Tchio in New Caledonia to Greenock on the Clyde in 129 days. She was later wrecked in the Great Gale at Algoa Bay on September 1st 1902.

After his years at sea, he became interested in horses being clever in their handling and training of them. Then about 1921 whilst he was working as a coal trimmer, the bottom fell out the coal market and the Cardiff docks began to fail.

Ernest Hollyman wrote to Bob Mawson and told him that information had been handed down the family that the Hollymans were of the yeoman stock of England and were represented in the higher echelons of agriculture and the church. As I have discovered, he was 100% correct. Individual family welfare rose and fell and families drifted apart; the war intervened and contact between them became less frequent although good memories remained.

Ernest enlisted in the 7th Queens Own Hussars at Colchester in 1930 which later was to serve on the Egyptian borders in 1940: Beda Fomm and Sidi Rezegh in 1941: North Africa 1940-41 and Ancona, Rimini Line in Italy from '44 to '45. During 1942, he was taken prisoner and endured the long trek home via Italy and Germany, minus one elbow joint. His promotion to Captaincy came along two

months before his capture and when he eventually arrived home, he was informed that his rank had not been held for the required substantive time, he was a subaltern. He then had to serve another two years before regaining the rank of Captain which he retained until he resigned.

George Hollyman, the father, was never bitter about life's buffeting, despite the miseries of the 'Depression' years and was a wise man but ruled with a rod of iron when necessary. Very conscious of the Hollyman family name but if his life had been harder, then his wife's must have been even harder with so many years with little income for there wasn't much going for any woman with a large family.

Frederick Hollyman. 1879 - 1950

The second son of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman was born in 1879 and, by marriage once again, connected the family with Clevedon. He wed Alice Gould the daughter of Moses Gould, a wheelwright in 1903. As this event was registered in Long Ashton, these two must have met in this area. Alice's mother was the daughter of George and Hannah Hollyman of Clevedon and she had married Moses Gould in 1867. Alice, their daughter was born in 1867-9.

Frederick and Alice were first cousins.

Alice, who became a schoolmistress died leaving no issue and Fred. married Ethel James. Of this union, also, there were no children.

At one time, Fred. may have lived in the Llandaff road, Cardiff and he was very interested in the Hollyman family history. He knew about John Holyman the bishop of Bristol (1496 - 1558) but could not pursue the family in any detail because of the expense of obtaining documents from Somerset House at the time.

He would usually wear a bowler hat and whilst tending his garden, would wear a smoking cap. Perhaps that habit brought disapproval from his wife. He had a bible which he gave away. In it, there was an inscription. 'Peggy.

In Memory of her Confirmation. June 15th 1926. Uncle Fred.

CLEVEDON MERCURY May 23rd 1931.

On Friday May 15th. Death of Mrs Alice Hollyman in Cardiff, wife of Frederick T. Hollyman. Eldest daughter of the late Mr M. Gould of Queens road, formerly on the teaching staff of Clevedon C. of E. Infants school, then lived in Lyme Regis. Married and moved to Cardiff. Church of St Dyfrig. Amongst the mourners were Mr & Mrs S. T. Lerway.

Ivor Hollyman. 1880 - 1963

Third child of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman was born at 6 Gough street Cardiff on July 22nd 1880. He married Martha Wilson who was born on May 17th 1886 and died on February 10th 1943 aged 56.

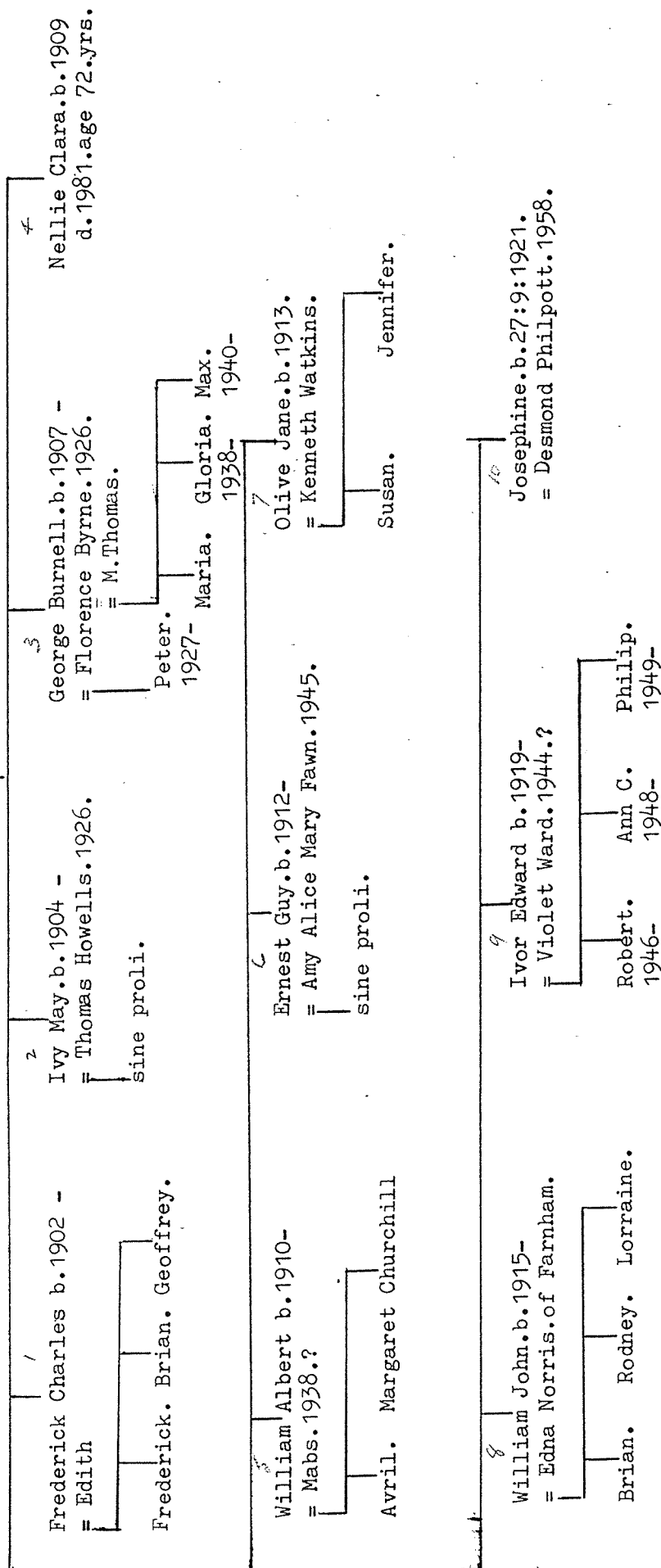

Ivor and Martha had three children. Ivor who married Ethel and had one daughter, Anne. Richard who was married to Gertrude: no issue. Betty who married John Willis. Their son, Paul who worked for Rolls Royce as a design draughtsman married Anne, his cousin and they have two sons, Martin and Kevin. Peter Willis who was born on May 18th 1984.

Albert William Hollyman. 1883 - 1918

The fifth child of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman was born in Cardiff in 1883. He was married to Gladys Gwendoline Lewis who was three years older than he. The marriage took place in the Salutation hotel Newport in 1906. Albert once lived at 141 Woodville road Cardiff in 1912-13 and that year, he moved to 63 Teharris street Roath. He became a member of the Cardiff Constabulary and after that a guardsman in the Grenadiers in 1914. Later, he joined the 1st Battalion Welsh Guards. (No. A.103 E 1652595) One of the many who did not return home from this war to end all wars. He died of pneumonia in France in 1918. Gladys Hollyman died in the September of 1966 aged 80.

Albert and Gladys had issue of a daughter and two sons. The daughter was:-
EDNA MAY HOLLYMAN who was born at 141 Woodville road, Cardiff on April 11th 1912. She married window dresser Peter Sydney Poole who worked for Wills's Tobacco Company. Sydney, as he was known was born in 1907 and died in 1960. Bob Mawson tells me that from his enquiries, Edna used to visit Nellie Hollyman her aunt every Wednesday afternoon at the Royal George hotel where they had long chats about the family. An elegant lady, she used to model furs in her youth for a Cardiff departmental store and on occasion met by chance actors Keiron Moore and Ronald Reagan who, as President of the USA is well known.

Her favourite pastimes were, knitting, crocheting, sewing, making lampshade covers and embroidering pictures. When she was living at Victoria Park, she would enjoy sitting in her front garden taking tea and listening to the band playing in the park.

In about 1972, she was diagnosed as having cancer but she recovered. Her next door neighbour was Christopher Morgan the BBC Wales newscaster who

'roped' her into appearing on television in a series called The Big 'C' Diana Dors also took part. Edna said, it was meant to bring it closer to people, not to fear it. I still run my house and do all the painting and decorating: not bad for 72 coming up for 73 years of age.

She was 76 years old when Bob Mawson last met her at 28 Victoria Park road East. After a while she moved to 6. Alexandra Court, Llandaff road, Canton and, latterly, 53 Pendyris House, Mortimer road, Pontcanna, Cardiff. She and Sydney had twin daughters, Suzanne and Jennifer born August 6th 1939.

Nellie Hollyman. 1890 - 1948

Born a couple of years after Albert, Nellie married Thomas William Lerway, a licenced victualler and freemason who served in R.A.S. corps. He was born in Bristol on August 24th 1883 and died in Cardiff on November 12th 1959 aged 76 years. Nellie and Thomas were married in Cardiff on January 22nd 1912 where George Bernard Hollyman was one of the witnesses.

One of their daughters, Margaret Helen worked as a supervisor at 'Boots' in Cardiff. She was born at the Lansdowne hotel on August 18th 1912 and died in Caernarvon on February 16th 1983 aged 70 years. It was Margaret who married Arthur Mawson, an engineer in the gas industry. Arthur Mawson was born in Otley on October 23rd 1909 and died in Caernarvon April 27th 1979 aged 69 years.

Robert, their only son was born in Kirkby-in-Ashfield, January 26th 1948. Nell died in Cardiff on October 16th 1948.

N.B. It is this Robert Mawson to whom I am indebted to all of the issue of his immediate line to Nellie Hollyman. The history of the children of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman has been documented by him and much passed on to me. I hasten to say that, I am much appreciative.

William Henry Hollyman

1892 - 1968

The youngest child of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman was born in Cardiff on May 22nd 1892 in Pen-y-Peel road. He was a licenced victualler and later a transport manager, and married to a widow, Clare Davies who had been married to Thomas Henry John. He died in 1916 aged 31 years old. William and Clare had one son, William Bert Hollyman born in Cardiff January 10th 1919. William, his father was fond of horses and it is said, worked as a cowman at 'Ventre Farm' St Mellons. About the time that William junior was born, they took over as licensees of the Lansdowne hotel in Cardiff. In later life, they lived at 'St Clare' 2, Heol-tyn-y-Cae, Rhiwbina, Cardiff. Later becoming a warehouseman at 'Howells' Willimam gained employment at 'Larkins Wholesalers' then aquired a position as a storeman for 'Cliff Smart in Rhiwbina. After Clare died in January 1958 He went to live with Mr and Mrs John at Birchgrove where he died on April 6th 1968.

William Bert Hollyman

1919 - 1973

William, the son of the above, William Henry Hollyman born in 1919, married twice. The union with Thelma Bush lasted a year after their marriage at St Margaret's church Whitchurch Cardiff. Of this union, there was no issue. On April 8th 1950, he married Elizabeth Probert at the Welsh Baptist chapel Barry.

Betty and Bert lived for each other and he was a good father. He had a dreadful phobia of cats but overcame this for the love of Betty by giving her a present of a Siamese kitten. He also bred canaries for showing. He died on February 3rd 1973 aged 54 years old.

Elizabeth Probert was born at 23 Alun terrace Cardiff on March 31st 1922. She was the daughter of Charles and Mabel Probert. Charles was a stonemason. Of the union with William Bert Hollyman and 'Betty', there were three children. The eldest being:-

William John Hollyman who was born on July 26th 1953 and who also married

twice. He worked mainly as a taxi-driver. Of his first marriage, I know nothing but at the second marriage, his wife was, Roz whose surname is not known, yet. They had two children: one son, Michael Hollyman born in Cardiff on March 7th 1975. Daughter, Emma Hollyman was born on July 13th 1977

The other two children of Bert and Betty were:-

Glenys Ann Hollyman born February 13th 1955. She married Alan Davies who had been married previously and by him, had, Lianne Elizabeth Davies born November 29th 1983 and Thomas Benjamin Davies born on May 13th 1987.

Susan Jennifer Hollyman was born on July 20th 1957 and also married one who had been married, Peter Fletcher, in 1988.

Alan Davies's first wife was Christine and by her, had twins born in Cardiff on July 20th 1965:- ~~Andrew~~ and Tracy Davies.

Albert William Hollyman. 1913 - 1978

The second child of Albert and Gladys Hollyman nee Lewis was born just prior to the Great War in 1913. He joined the Merchant Navy and later became that familiar Hollyman vocation (it seems) a Licenced victualler. Married to Patricia Cole, they had two daughters, Alexandra Hollyman born in c.1955 who married Michael Devlin and by him, had two sons, Macmillan and Jason.

Jaqueline Hollyman born in 1957 and married 'John' and has, so far, one son, Jordan. Nothing else known. Albert William died in south Wales 1978.

Douglas Haig Hollyman. 1917 - 1987

The youngest of the children of Albert William and Gladys Hollyman nee Lewis was born in 1917 in Cardiff. He married Amelia Cerrato who was from Pontcanna and was Portuguese. This event took place during the Second World War c.1940 in Cardiff. They had eight children as far as is known:-

Robert William Hollyman. Born in 1942: John Hollyman born in 1944:

Olive D. Hollyman born in 1947: Angela Rose Hollyman born in 1948 who married Richard Nee and now has two children of her own.

Monica Hollyman born in 1950: Marilyn Hollyman born in 1952 and married Gerrit Biji in Pretoria on April 30th 1988: Nicholas Hollyman born c.1955 and, finally, Mark Hollyman.

John Hollyman & Ruth Adams married here 29 December, 1817

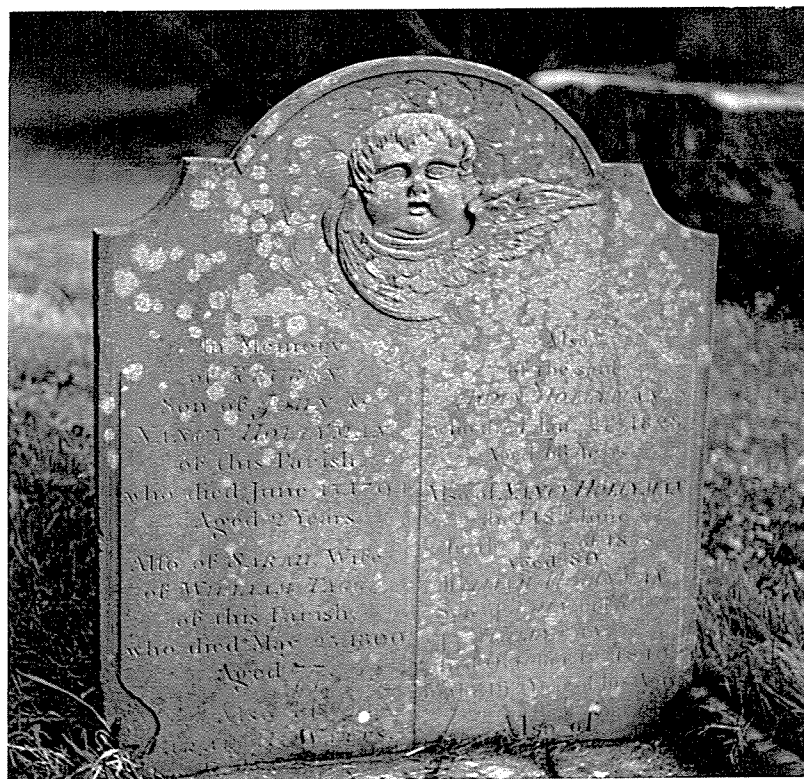


Grave of Reuben Hollyman, Abbotsleigh. Somerest



Above. The south porch of the parish church, Abbots Leigh with the graves of many of the Hollyman family.

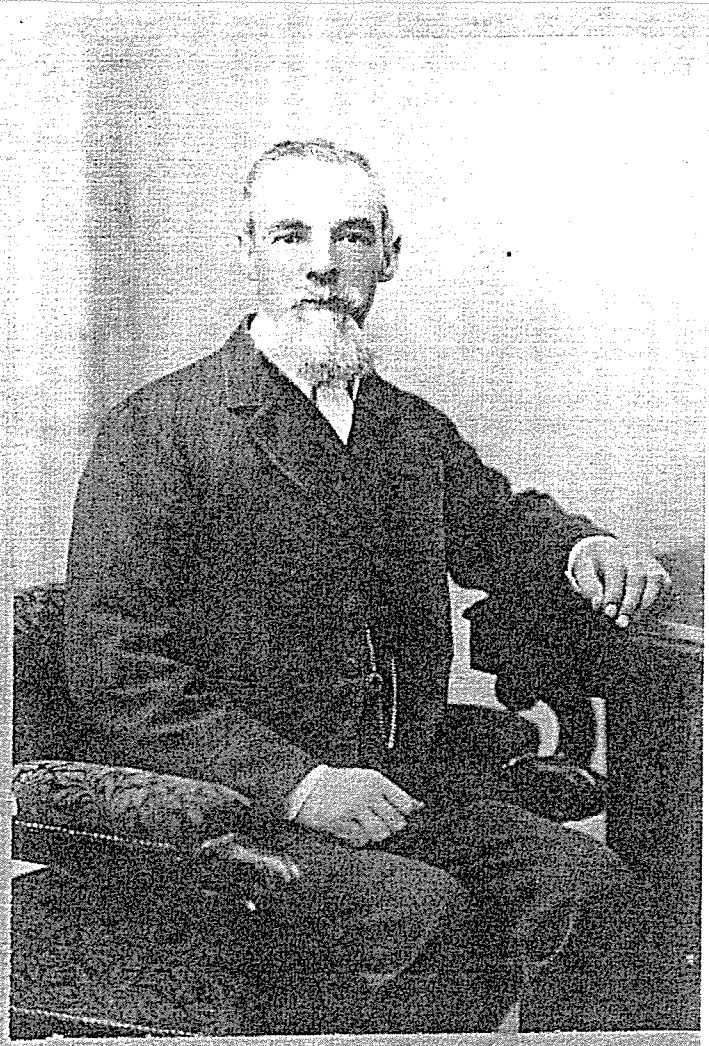
Below The headstone of more Hollymans including Reuben, the first to be laid to rest in 1794 aged 2 years old.





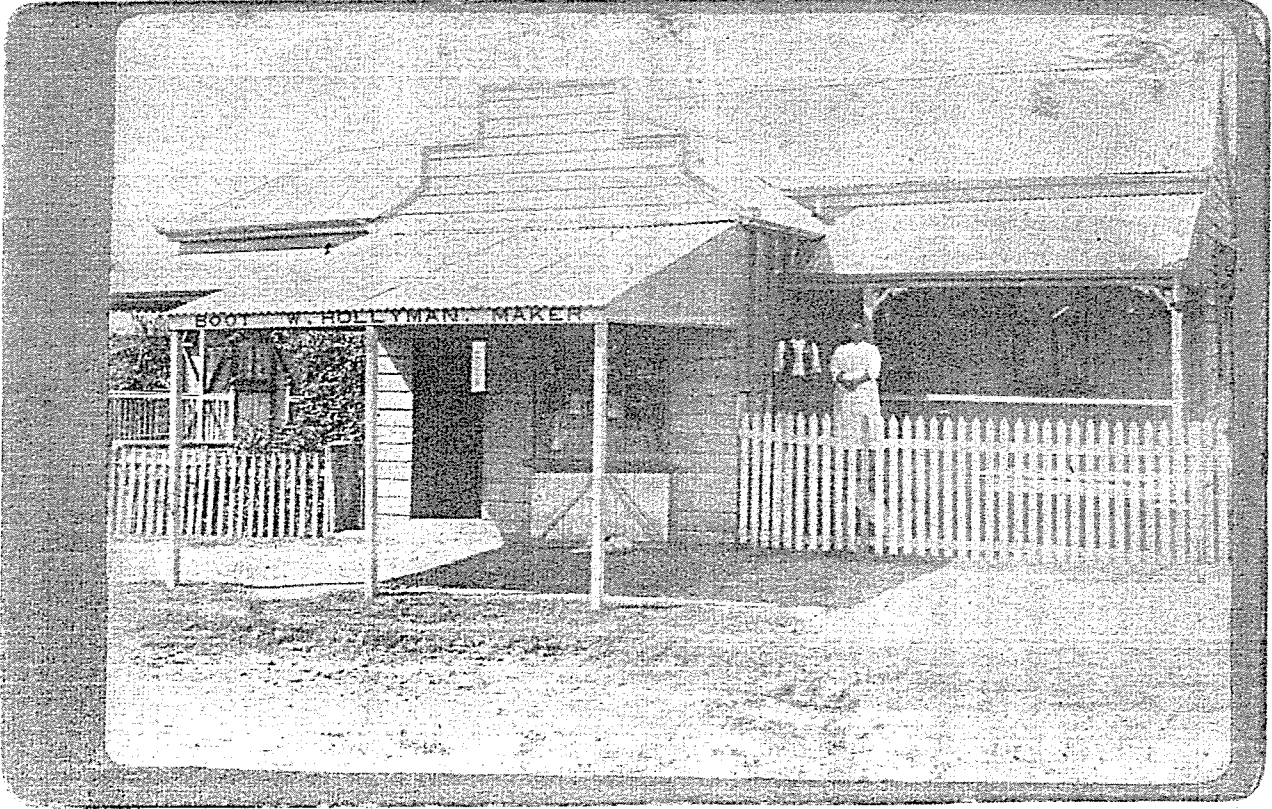

The second son of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman nee Locke was born on March 21st 1842 and baptised into the church on April 17th the same year. It seems that before the age of fifteen, he migrated to Cardiff the city of his mother's birth. He joined the baptist chapel of Bethany at the age of sixteen and married there to Julia Marie Cole on January 19th ¹⁸⁶³~~1895~~. At the time of his wedding he lived at number 16 Trinity street, Cardiff where he worked as a confectioner. Julia lived along the Canton road. Her father was John Cole once a carpenter. It may be that later, they opened a shop at 189 Bute road close to the railway. Although on the birth certificate of their son, also Charles Henry in 1870, his address was given as 185 Bute road which could have been an error. Incidentally, this son died the same year.

Julia died aged 40 years in 1881 after having so many children in almost as many years. Charles then remarried on the 9th of August, 1886 to a widow Mrs Priscilla Ponting Gow nee Monk who was two years older than he. One can see that as witnesses at his first wedding, his father, Reuben and the other a Mr John Anderson who lived to be one hundred years old. Although he was recorded as a great uncle, I must presume he would have been on Julia's side of the family. At his second wedding, his younger brother Robert James was in evidence and was to join him in his endeavours as a master baker. Mrs Ponting Gow now Mrs Hollyman was the daughter of Charles Monk, once a stone merchant who lived at 20 Castle road, Roath.

After all the searches of Charles Henry, it can be safely assumed it was his eldest son, Alfred who was to found the Hollyman Bakery at 64 Corporation road which suffered an untimely end during the Cardiff air raid on that city on January 2nd 1941.

But Charles Henry died in 1895 aged fifty three years. Of the union with Priscilla, there was no issue but of that with Julia there was issue of:-

Bessie Julia Hollyman who was born in the spring of 1864. For a time, she worked in the shop with her father until her marriage to Lewis Hallott in 1886. No further searches made.

Emily Marie Hollyman. Recorded in one location as, Mavis was born in 1865 and eventually married Walter Chatsworthy in 1890.

CHAT WORTHY

John Alfred or Alfred John Hollyman was their first son and he was born at 17 Tredegar street on April 4th 1866. He also became a baker and was most likely he who founded the Hollyman Bakery at Corporation road. He married Susannah whose maiden name I have yet to discover but she died in 1918.
(more later)

Florence Harriet Hollyman or, as one census has recorded, Frances, was born during the first half of 1867: she was married in 1890 but it is not yet known to whom.

William Charles Hollyman Born in the spring of 1869, worked with his father according to the 1891 census returns. Nothing else known. ✓

Reginald Hollyman. Born in 1873 and he too worked as a baker. (More later.)

Charles Henry Hollyman was born in 1871 and that birth was registered in the September quarter. He worked as a printers compositor's apprentice. He married Louise Jane Murdock. (more later)

Lillian Hollyman was born in 1874 and became a dressmaker. I believe she married Walter H. Jeffries but she died before the Great War and her husband remarried the widow of her brother, Charles Henry, Louise Jane Hollyman nee Murdock by whom he had one daughter whom they named, Mary known as, Molly in 1919.

Robert Hollyman. Born in 1881 yet not mentioned in the 1881 census of the city for some reason. In the 1891 census he was, as a twelve year old schoolboy. I feel certain that he married a woman

named Olga Mabel. He was also a baker and towards the end of their lives lived in the new suburb of Roath along Stallcourt avenue where he died. Olga lived on for a few more years and died in 1964 aged 86.

But there was still another son who was born in 1870:-

Charles Henry Hollyman who died an infant.

A study of the 1891 census of Cardiff shows a great uncle John Anderson who lived to a ripe old age. I would like to find out exactly who he was. With the family was a servant, a young woman named, Elizabeth Webber who was born in around 1866 so the same age as, Alfred John and who was born in Falmouth. Another helper, aged fifteen was a baker's boy named Edward Eskland who hailed from Bridgwater, Somerset.

Whether she was living here too as a boarder or a music teacher, was Minnie Monks from Stapleton with her, possibly, young son, Henry aged five.

It is possible too that this Stapleton is the village near Bristol; this can, of course be easily be verified.

NB. Since I wrote this synopsis, I found that William Charles Hollyman did in fact marry, a girl from Liskeard named Della Irene and William died in 1915. Della returned to her home town where she died in 1961. There were no children as far as I know.

John Samuel Hollyman 1849 - 1895

Since I wrote the synopsis on the family of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman, more information has been found about John Samuel the sixth child. As already stated, he was born in Abbots Leigh in the year 1849 and baptised there on August 27th. He married Mary Kate Parslow in 1872 at St James's church in Bristol. At the wedding was his sister, Emily who acted as one of the witnesses.

The couple lived in the Barton hill area and, as was discovered later, stayed there for about ten years until they migrated to Cardiff where he worked as a carrier or haulier. From the various directories I notice they lived in number 6 Machen street in the Grangetown area of Cardiff. By this time (1884) the family had grown to a total of eight including parents.

These directories were not consistent in the spelling of John's name, one of which was spelt, Hollaman, another Holman and the other, Hollyman. The many addresses include, the one above, 36 Stuart street and 8 Devon street all in the same location.

John Samuel Hollyman born in Somersetshire died the same year as his elder brother, Charles Henry in 1895. His widow outlived him for many years and died aged 64 in the summer of 1918 just before the ending of the Great War 1914 - 1918. Of this union, there were as far as I know, nine children:-

Ernest William Hollyman born in Bristol registered Clifton in 1874.

Robert James Hollyman also born in Bristol and registered in Clifton, 1876.

Annie Elizabeth Hollyman their first daughter was born in Bristol and reg.

in Barton Regis in 1878 which suggests the family may have changed addresses.

Francis Hollyman was born in 1880. Nothing else known.

Arthur Hollyman was born in 1882. As above.

By this time, the family migrated to South Wales where:-

Edwin James Hollyman was born in Cardiff in 1884. Died in Cardiff in 1960.

Emily Eliza Hollyman was born in 1886. Nothing else known.

Walter Hollyman was born in 1888 and died in Cardiff in 1964 aged 76.

Edith Hollyman the youngest child was born in 1889. Nothing else known.

Searches continue for the progress of the children of John Samuel and Mary Kate Hollyman nee Parslow who were born in Somersetshire and who joined their kin to settle in South Wales.

According to the 'General Register of Marriages':-

A Mr Francis Hollyman married in Cardiff in the year 1907 who could be of this family.

A Mr Walter Hollyman was married in Cardiff in 1910 who could also have been of this family.

A Mr Robert James Hollyman was married in Cardiff in 1920 to a Miss Winifred M. Smith and could also have been of this family. I have checked the lists of births from 1920 which gives the mother's name but there are none with the name, Smith so it certainly looks as though there was no issue from this couple.

Robert James Hollyman 1856 - 1930

Born in Abbots Leigh, the tenth child of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman nee Locke in 1856 was baptised in the village church on May 25th the same year. He followed his elder brother Charles to Cardiff and worked for him before settling down on his own at 32 Crwys street as a baker. At the age of twenty seven, he married a widow who already had two daughters of her own in 1883 in Cardiff. Mary E. James (maiden name unknown) hailed from Cornwall and also worked in the bakery as a confectioner, a job which was done by many women. Robert retired and moved to the county of his birth to Weston super Mare to 110 Walliscote road not far from the sea front in a large detached house. He died in 1930 aged 74. The two stepdaughters of Robert were:-

Irene B James who was born in 1876: May A. James born in 1874.

Of the union with Mary, there was issue of:-

Robert Hollyman. Born in 1884: nothing else known but a Robert J. Hollyman was married in Cardiff in 1920 but it is not known who he was.

William Henry Hollyman. Born in 1885 married Della Irene Veale in 1916 who was born in Cornwall. William was killed in the war, 1917. Della Hollyman died in Cornwall on February 12th 1961.

Edgar Hollyman. Born in 1886. Nothing else known.

Alice B. Hollyman. According to the census return of 1891 born in 1889 but for that year, there is only Olive B. Hollyman. She died in 1893.

Francis Hollyman. The youngest child was born in 1891. At the time of writing, there appears in the W.S. Mare directory, a Mr F. Hollyman but who exactly he is is not yet known.

ALFRED REUBEN HOLLYMAN.1860-1933

Alfred Reuben the eleventh child of Reuben and Mary Ann, nee Locke, was born in Abbotsleigh on June 15th 1860 and baptised there on July 22nd. He migrated to Cardiff c1881 where his two brothers Charles Henry and William Adams were already settled. It will be recalled that his mother Mary Ann was a native of that town and that it was where she and Reuben his father were married in 1839 in the Bethany Baptist Chapel before their return to Abbotsleigh.

Before Alfred made the move to Cardiff he married an orphan, the base child of Kate Ellen Brindal who was given her mother's full name following her death in childbirth. Kate, born in 1858 was brought up by her grandmother somewhere in the Clifton area of Bristol.

The couple were married in Bristol in the Spring of 1880 and their first child, Arthur, was born there before they set off for Cardiff. Alfred, it has since been learnt, disliked his second name of Reuben and never used it. He worked throughout his life as a sheetmetal worker and coppersmith and it was his custom to make a set of copper kitchen utensils for each of his children on their marriage. Indeed a small item has survived to this day. A copper kettle can be found in the house of his great-granddaughter Mrs Jennifer Sutton in Dinas Powys.

Old postcards have shown that Alfred and some of his brothers were wont to visit their native village during the summer; some to help with the harvest and others most likely just to visit.

Alfred Rueben died aged 73 in 1933 and was buried in Cardiff. It is believed that Kate Ellen died the previous year on the 28 August. They lived the latter part of their life at 46 New Zealand Road, a pleasant part of what now was a city.

Their issue were as follows:-

1) Arthur. Born in Bristol in 1881 and as stated above was taken to Cardiff whilst still a baby. He became a skilled draughtsman and for much of his life he was the manager of a steel fabricating firm. He married Margaret, the daughter of Thomas Mogg on December 1905 in the Parish of Eastover, Bridgewater. After a long life Margaret died on the 15th Feb. 1959 at No. 62 Princes St. and Arthur just a few days later, of a broken heart it was said. There were two children of this marriage- *William Arthur* born 1906 and *Phylis* in 1918.

2) Alfred Henry. Born December 9th. 1885 in Cardiff and married Edith Riorden. He became a blacksmith and it is believed had a very hard life and died at 58 years old. There were three children. *Audrey*, born 1913, *Thelma*, and *Alfred Leonard*, born November 20th 1919.

3) Ernest Henry. Born November 1887. He worked as a coachbuilder for a Cardiff company when passenger vehicles were built by hand. He and his wife Ethel lived most of their married life at No. 72, New Zealand Road and there were two children *Arthur* and *Kathleen*. Ernest died on July 29th 1964. 1075

4) William Adams. Born January 19th 1889 was the second to bear this name for the "Adams" comes from Ruth Adams who married John his great-grandfather at Abbotsleigh in 1817. Prior to W.W.I. William was a shipping clerk on Cardiff docks but for the greater part of his life he was with the Welsh Board of Health. He used to tell about the fact that he was naturally left handed but at school he, like all similar children, was forced to write with his right hand by having his left hand tied behind his back. A common occurrence in those days. (they say left-handedness always skips a generation -

well,his granddaughter is also left-handed).Despite this harsh treatment he developed a very beautiful style of handwriting. He married Alice Maud Grinter at St Andrews Church ,Sept.9th 1914. Alice was the daughter of Simeon James Thomas Grinter, a stonemason who later became a housebuilder in Cardiff during the late 19th century.(This family is the subject of a separate Study going back many years to Martock in Somerset). Of this marriage there was only one child - *William Dennis*, born in 1920. He like many of his age was caught in the events of W.W.2 but by adult life became qualified as a Chartered Engineer and was able to pursue that profession in far off places.He married Vera May Buckley of Ludlow in 1957 and they settled in Dinas Powys.They had three daughters - Jennifer,Claire and Valerie,all of whom are now married with families of their own and live in the same area.

5) Elizabeth Ellen.The first girl in the family was born on February 17th 1890.She became a dressmaker, never married and lived out her life at No.46 New Zealand Rd.with her two unmarried younger sisters,their father having thoughtfully ensured that the parental home would be passed on to the three unmarried girls after the parents death.

6) Esther. Born on April 13th.1892. She lived out her life with her two sisters and died on March 18th.1974 aged 82 years

7) Sidney James.Born on October 29th 1893.Very little known about him as he appeared to be somewhat removed from the rest of the family.Believed to have had poor health and to have suffered unemployment for most of his life. Married to Hilda and they lived on the Ely housing estate; there were five or more children.Sidney died 1965 at the age 75 years.

8) Ann Grace. Their youngest daughter, born on July 14th 1895 and was the only daughter to marry and in fact she married twice. Her first husband was Percy Tranter and of this marriage there was one child, *Doreen* born in 1924. The father died whilst the child was quite young. In latter life Ann Grace married Sunni Morgan but of this union there were no children. *Doreen* was brought up by her Mother at the family home at No.2 Soberton Avenue and it was from here that she married "Pano" Lambadores, the son of a Greek family living in the Cardiff Docks area on May 7th 1945. It was into this house that the young couple were to move and it was where their two children Christopher and Penelope were born.

"Pano" was a cheerful easy going person and a good father and it is easy to understand that this was a happy arrangement and particularly so for Ann Grace who could enjoy the company of and could assist in the upbringing of her grandchildren.

But tragedy was to strike for the beloved Pano died suddenly in 1963 whilst the children were still in their teens and the funeral service was held in the Greek church where the couple had married in 1945. Subsequently the son married and moved to Newcastle. Penelope, who had the happy disposition of her father married Derek Hopgood and they live on a farm to the west of Cardiff. They have two sons, Mark and Carl, both in their twenties and at university. There was a very close relationship with the grandmother but despite these happy events there was to be a further tragedy. In her later years *Doreen* married a widower Cliff Amey who had founded an upholstery business but in the early days of their marriage he developed Parkinsons disease and became invalid. For years *Doreen* looked after her stricken husband in addition to caring for her mother who was

practically bedridden. On December 27th 1991 Ann Grace Morgan formerly Tranter nee Hollyman died. She was 96 years old and her mind and memory were as sharp as a needle right to the end. And so Doreen and her invalid husband were now alone in the house. Some 6 months later Doreen's daughter, Penny was trying to ring her mother but without response. Doreen and her husband were found collapsed on the floor. Doreen was dead, Cliff was unable to move. This was July 24th 1992. Cliff bravely attended the funeral in his wheelchair the following week.

9) Charles Ewart. Born on October 1898 and married "Nell" in 1921 and of this marriage there was one child, Beryl. The family shared the house at No. 46 New Zealand Road with the unmarried sisters. Charlie as he was always known was a general foreman with a well known Cardiff building firm. He was a bright and cheerful man, always the life and soul of the party and shone at funerals. He died at the age of 79 in 1977.

10) Edith. Born December 5th 1900 was the last of the family. Frail and in poor health she spent her time dressmaking with her sister in the back bedroom of the house at No. 46 where this work was done. She died on September 29th 1941 at the age of 41 years.

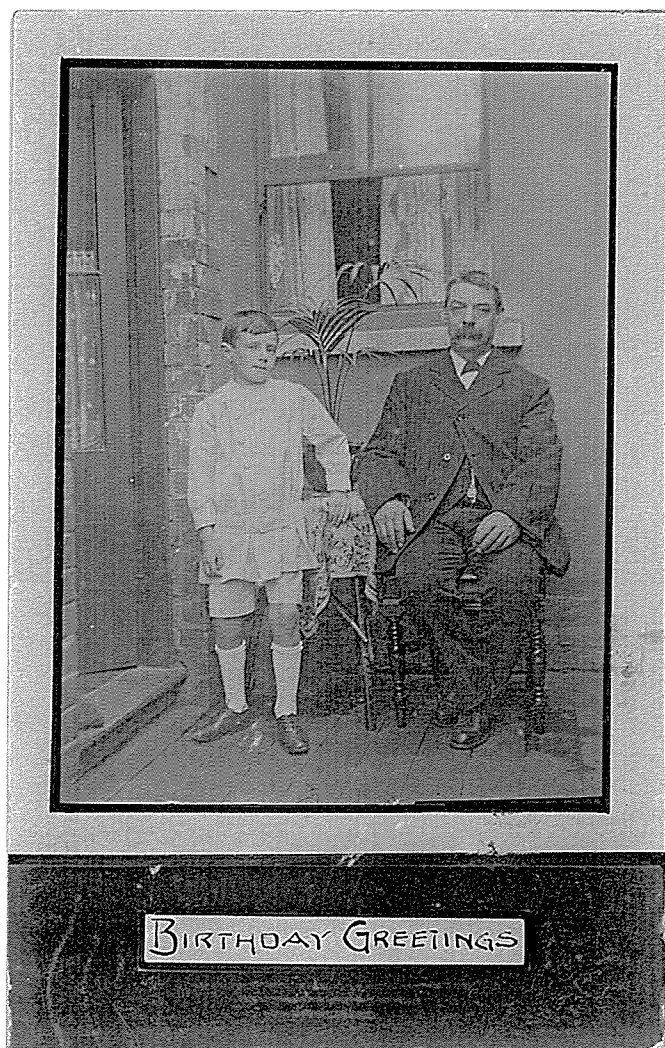

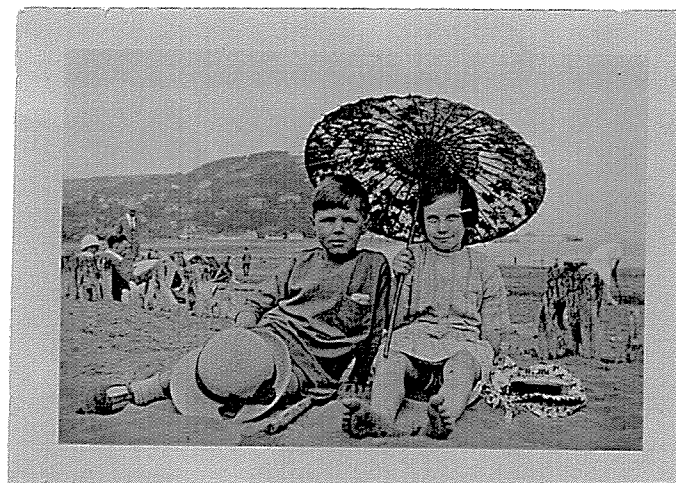

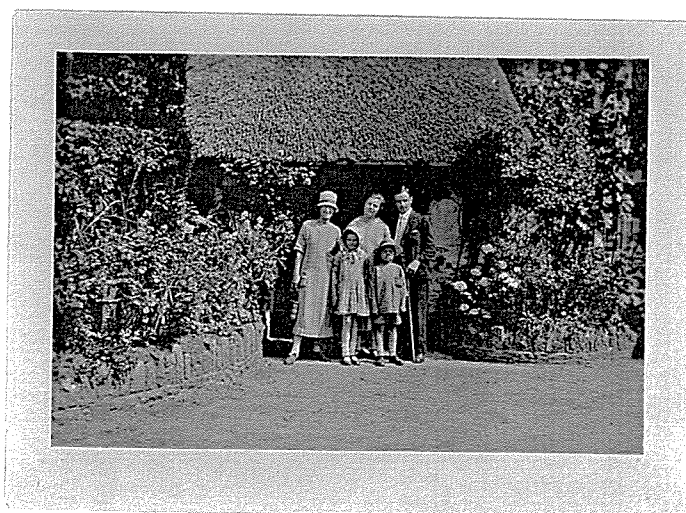

Henry John Hollyman. 1862 - 1901

Born in Abbots Leigh in 1862, Henry John Hollyman was baptised that year in the village church on August 4th. He was the youngest son of Reuben and Mary Ann nee Locke and they lived on the opposite side of the main road from Leigh (Hollyman) farm close to what is now known as the Manor.

Like many of his brothers and sisters, Henry John moved away from the village to find work. I know at least two brothers went to Cardiff where they became bakers and confectioners and, for some reason, although by this time, Henry might not have even met Charles, he was also a baker most likely working for a large bakery. Soon, he became what is known as a Journeyman baker, living in Sevier street, Ashley Hill.

He married Rosa, the daughter of John and Mary Lansdown of Elberton in that village on May 31st 1887. They even took both their children there for baptism. At some time, they moved to 54 Melbourne road in Bishopston where in 1901, Henry John Hollyman died aged a young thirty seven years old. He was buried in the village of his birth on May 3rd 1901. Rosa also died at the same address and she was laid to rest beside her husband on September 6th 1938. She was seventy five years old. An old photograph of her and the two children shows her dressed in black (as the children were too) her face still young, her raised eyebrows, possibly a family trait. The children aged about thirteen and eleven years old looking as if they had just attended a funeral. Of this marriage, as I have already stated, there were:-

Ethel Louisa Hollyman. The eldest and only daughter was born in Bristol and baptised in the church of St John, Elberton on August 5th 1888. Her parents were living in St Werburgs Bristol. There is on record a marriage of Ethel Louise Hollyman but I have yet to find who she married.

Frederick James Hollyman the only son was also born in Bristol but at an address in Station road but which one is difficult to say.

He too was baptised in Elberton on September 7th 1890.

It certianly looks as though the grandmother had some say in where these two would be baptised for the journey must have been most uncomfortable and long especially with at the second time,two young babies.

Fred worked for some of his life at least as a tram driver for it was in this occupation that one of his cousins recalls him,on a visit from Cardiff. Fred never married and before I had been married for long,I met him in Ashton Vale when he visited my wife's mother.

Frederick James Hollyman died in the autumn of 1967 but it is not known where:he was seventy seven years old.

It was mere chance which enabled me to find the baptisms of these two children.The 1891 census of Bristol tells that Rosa was born in Elberton and with that knowledge,I found the wedding location. Upon a chance,I found Rosa's baptism and on the next page was the baptisms of these two children of hers. Which shows nothing is logical when looking for the locations of any baptism.

This then is the last of the children of Reuben and Mary Hollyman.The Hollyman name ended in this line with Frederick James.

The eldest son of Henry John and Ann Hollyman nee Rowles was born in 1866 and baptised at the village church of Abbots Leigh on November 30th 1866. He married twice: firstly to Caroline Jones of Yate in the village on September 4th 1895. When his father died, he took over Leigh farm where he had worked for many years, until the late 1930's when he sold it. Before that time, he had built a pair of houses on the site fronting Church road to where he retired. Caroline died in 1948 aged 85 and was buried on the 9th of December. For some reason best known to himself, Alfred married Ida Day. This was only a few years before he died and the marriage was much against the family's advice. 'Oak Leigh' the house in which Alfred died was sold after his death and the two daughters shared the proceeds. The other daughter, Caroline was left the house next door, 'Sunny Leigh'. So, with the farm gone the way of many (refurbished and practically rebuilt by a wealthy antiques dealer (both No's 1 & 2) the Hollyman properties were all but gone. Soon after the death of his son in law, William Wallace, even 'Sunny Leigh' was sold thereby ending the Abbots Leigh dynasty in that village.

Of the union of Alfred and Caroline Hollyman there were issue of:-

Emily May Hollyman. Born in 1896 and baptised on August 9th. She married 2nd Lieutenant Joseph James Austin of the Tank Corps on July 9th 1918. No further searches made but the couple lived in either Pill or Portishead. Emily inherited half of the house, 'Oak Leigh' in Abbots Leigh.

Annie Sarah Hollyman. Born in 1898 and baptised on August 21st that year.

She married Raymond Bayliss. This couple were staunch members of the Plymouth Brethren who adopted a girl named Doris who was not so taken up with this severe religious sect. Doris died before her adopted parents. At one time they kept a shop in Fishponds and lived for a while in Downend. Raymond also

worked at David Grieg in what was Castle street just off Old Market street in 1950. Annie also shared in her father's house sale. Searches may continue due to the fact that these are aunt and uncle of Sheila Caroline Cooper.

Caroline Alice Hollyman. The youngest daughter was born in 1902 and baptised on February 9th in Abbots Leigh. She did not wander far from the village but married a merchant navy seaman, William Wallace on December 11th 1930. They had three children but one died an infant and was buried in the village churchyard but I have failed to find any sign of a headstone.

Alfred William Hollyman the youngest child was baptised on March 12th 1905 and died in Dewsbury in 1991. He also married twice. Firstly to Eveline Lush by whom he had two children. Geraldine born in 1934 but died an infant and Peter William born in 1933. Eveline died of TB soon after the birth of her son. Alfred then married Ruby Attwell by whom they had two children but once again one died an infant. The other almost died but didn't. This was Alfred Paul who was known as, Paul born in 1940. Ruby also died in Dewsbury: more later.

These then were the children of Alfred William and Caroline Hollyman nee Jones.

The Issue of Henry John Hollyman and Emma Baker.

Henry John was the youngest child of Henry John and Ann Hollyman. He was born at Leigh farm, Abbots Leigh and baptised on Sept. 12th 1869. It was thought by some younger members of the Hollymans that he had died at an early age but I found he did in fact marry and settled in Bristol. He met a maid who worked at one of the mansions on the Downs, Emma Baker and they were married in 1900 in Bristol. For a time they lived in Pembury road in Bedminster and then settled at 207 West street near Parsons street railway station. It was from here Henry bought coal to sell around the district. He was well known for his skill in repairing saddles often working til late at night. They had four children all born whilst at this address. At the age of 59, Henry died and was buried in Arno's Vale cemetery in April 1929. His widow Emma survived him by ten years and was buried in the same grave on April 26th 1939 aged 68 years. This grave lies near the pathway leading to the war memorial on the hill from the main entrance.

Henry John Hollyman was the eldest child born in 1903: married firstly to Kathleen Mary Jennings by whom he had one son, Michael John born on May 5th 1937. Michael married a widow, Mary Langley who was born Oct. 27th 1935. Of this union there was no issue. Henry John's second marriage was to Mary Murphy but of this union there was no issue. At 50 Islington road, Bedminster, Henry John died on November 3rd 1981.

Edwin John Hollyman the second child was born in 1905 and lived, when he married at 30 Wick Crescent Brislington. He worked as an electrician. He married Dorothy Brown and had one daughter, Juliette born in 1938. Edwin died in 1985. At the time of writing, his widow is alive and well.



✓ Kathleen Ann Hollyman their first and only daughter was born on August 3rd 1907 and at this time, still alive and well and is resident at Kingswell House, Broadfield road Knowle. She married Ernest Harris born on May 20th 1905 and who died on May 6th 1990. Of this union, there were two children, Jean Anne Harris born in 1936 and who married firstly to Anthony Rendall and by him a son was born in 1965 Martin Anthony Rendall. The second marriage to Joseph Laycock did not result in any issue.

✓ Hubert Victor Hollyman born on November 4th 1909 is also alive and well and living at Hobbs Court, Nailsea. He married at Holy Trinity church West street Bristol to Violet Irene Wakeham who was born November 25th 1909 and who died aged 75 years on Sept. 7th 1984. Hubert Hollyman was a plumber by trade. Of this marriage there were three daughters:-

✓ Vera Hollyman born July 11th 1935.

✓ Patricia Hollyman born July 5th 1942. Married Roger Michael Strange and now resides in Backwell.

✓ Beryl Ann Hollyman who was born on February 18th 1945.

NB As there were no male issue which produced no male heir, the Hollyman name ends with Michael John Hollyman son of Henry John and Emma Hollyman.

I have yet to search for any further information about Juliette Hollyman.

Henry John, son of Henry John and Emma Hollyman was born Sep. 21st. 1902.

Kathleen Mary, his first wife, died in December 1969 aged 69 years old.

Charles Henry Hollyman 1872 - 1915

There seems to be much perplexity with the many Charles Henry Hollymans born in Cardiff. I know that the Charles Henry born in Abbots Leigh in 1842 did have a son named Charles Henry and he was born in 1870: to be exact on the 7th July at 185 Bute street(road) St Mary. But according to the General Register in London, he died that same year. In the 1881 census for Cardiff there is no Charles Henry Hollyman except the elder. I also know that in 1915 a Charles Henry Hollyman died in Cardiff aged 43 which puts his year of birth at 1872. Yet in that year, a Reginald Hollyman was born: a twin brother?

A Charles Henry does appear in the 1891 census of that city and of the same family and his age given at the time would put the year of his birth as 1872. I am wondering why wasn't he included in the 1881 census?

However, at the time of the 1891 census, Charles Henry was a printer's compositor's apprentice which was a far cry from his father's occupation. In the early summer of 1900, he married Louise Jane Murdock by whom he had as far as I know, five children only one of which was a son. Charles Henry died at the age of 43 as already mentioned and his widow remarried to a Mr W. Jeffries. Incidentally, there was one daughter of this particular union, Mary Jeffries born in 1919.

One other Charles Henry Hollyman was born in Cardiff in 1882 and this was the son of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman who were originally of Clevedon. But this Charles Henry does not appear in the 1891 census so it looks as though he was, like the two others, fated for a short life.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Roy Charles Hollyman. Noted first for he was the only son, was born in 1910

and married to Miss Margaret Llewelyn. Roy died quite recently in 1991 but nothing else known of his widow. Roy and his wife had just one son:-

John Llewelyn Hollyman who was born in 1944 and married Miss Susan

Mottram who was the same age. They were married in 1966 and now have two children:-

Fiona Hollyman who was born in 1970 and

Owen Hollyman who was born in Epsom in 1972.

This family live in the Stoke Bishop area of Bristol and neither children are married.

The other children of Charles Henry and Louise Hollyman are:-

Phyliss Hollyman born in 1901. Nothing else known

Hilda Hollyman born in 1903 and married to Robert Mazey.?

Louise Hollyman. Born in 1906. Nothing else known

Mona Megan Hollyman. Born in 1914. Married A. Ford.

I have written letters which were from Mr John L. Hollyman in order to give more enlightened knowledge on this family.

Alfred William Hollyman.1905 - 1991

Known to many as,uncle Fred was born at Leigh farm along Church road, Abbots Leigh and baptised on March 12th.1905. He worked as a farmer for much of his life starting work for his father,Alfred William Hollyman who owned the farm. His mother was Caroline nee Jones of Yate Rocks.He married Evelyn Lush in the summer of 1931 and settled at Weston farm in North Weston.Evelyn died of tuberculosis in 1934 when their first child was a baby.Of this union,the only child was:-

Peter William Hollyman born at Duncan House nursing home in Clifton and baptised in Abbots Leigh on May 15th 1933.He married an Ipswich girl named Rosemary Barnes in Ipswich and lived in Severn Beach to raise their family of:-

✓ Gay Rosemary Hollyman born on April 29th.1957 who married Louis Simpson of Rochdale and have issue of Leister Simpson:
Cole Simpson and Carrie Simpson.

Claire Ruby Hollyman born Sept.13th 1958.

Whilst living at Weston farm,uncle Fred met a nurse who was working at a private nursing home in Clifton,Ruby Kate Elizabeth Atwell,daughter of Herbert Atwell,farmer of Congresbury and they married in Bristol R.O.on September 29th 1937.After many years in one place or another,the couple lived out the remainder of their lives in Dewsbury where Ruby died by misadventure from an overdose of feeding fluid in a local hospital aged 81. Fred became blind and very degenerated and died in 1991. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Alfred Paul Hollyman born at Duncan house,Clifton on January 31st 1940.
who married Beryl but they were divorced two years later.
He then married Susan Pamela Hanson of Dewsbury and has
issue of:-

James Paul Hollyman born in Weston super Mare July 30th 1967

Nigel Philip Hollyman born in Yate on July 3rd.1969.

Stuart Edward Hollyman who was born in Southmead, Bristol on
October 19th 1971. The family lived at 126. Stanshaw Cres.
Yate at this time.

Lynsey Jane Hollyman. Born at Staincliffe General hospital in
Kirklees on February 10th 1978. Their address at this
time was, 34. Highfield Mount. Thornhill. Dewsbury.

Alfred William and Ruby Hollyman nee Atwell lived in many locations during
their marriage but mainly on various farms. I first met them at Pilning where
they farmed for the last time before uncle Fred retired. They then moved to
Station road, Coalpit Heath after giving their house in the same village to
Paul and his then wife Beryl. But this marriage did not succeed. After selling
the bungalow in Station road, they moved yet again to Weston Super Mare where
they bought an apartment. Uncle Fred's health was becoming low and, after an
operation of some kind and after Paul had decided to live near his in-laws
in Dewsbury, Ruby and Fred followed.

There was something about her death in hospital but the verdict was misadventure. Fred lived a few more years but was not 'himself' and died in 1991.
I got to know this couple rather well. Ruby was a houseproud wife who kept
the home immaculate even those farmhouses they lived in even though they
had no modern lighting. They used oil lamps for lighting and cooking.
So, the last farmer of Abbots Leigh was the father of the last Hollyman to
be born there.
There were two more children born to them but they died in their infancy;
i.e. Geraldine and Patrick Hollyman.

The Abbots Leigh line of Hollyman will continue both in Cardiff and Dewsbury.

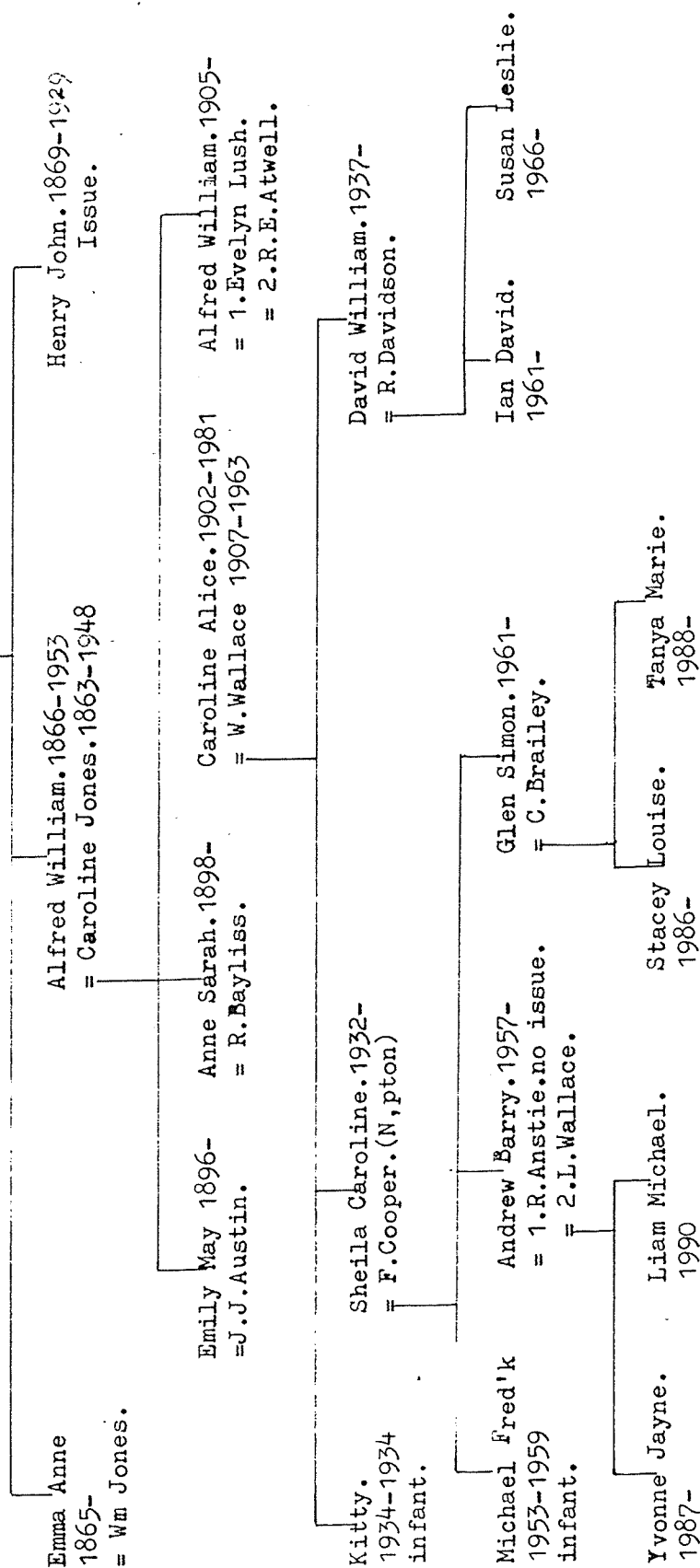

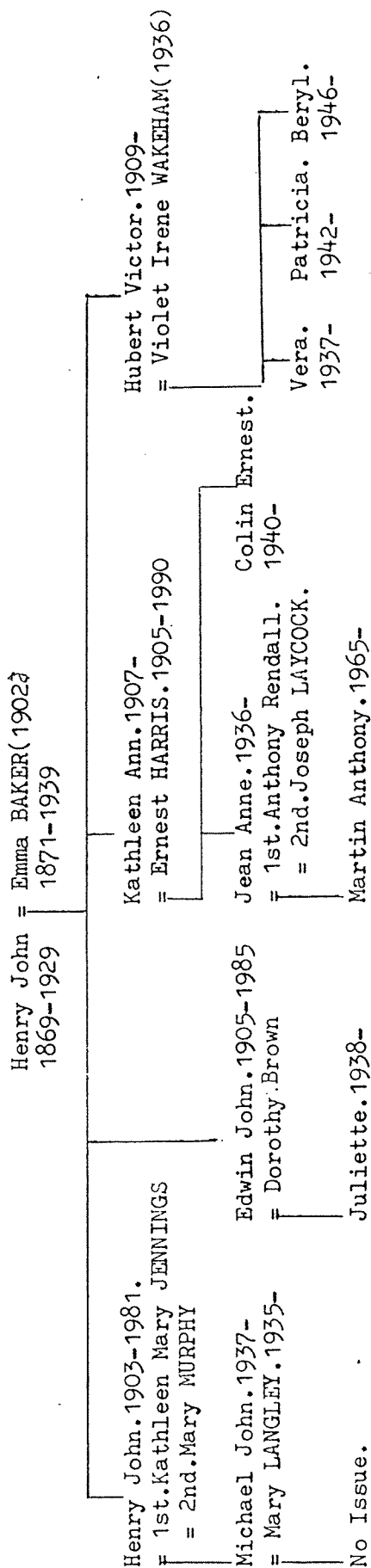

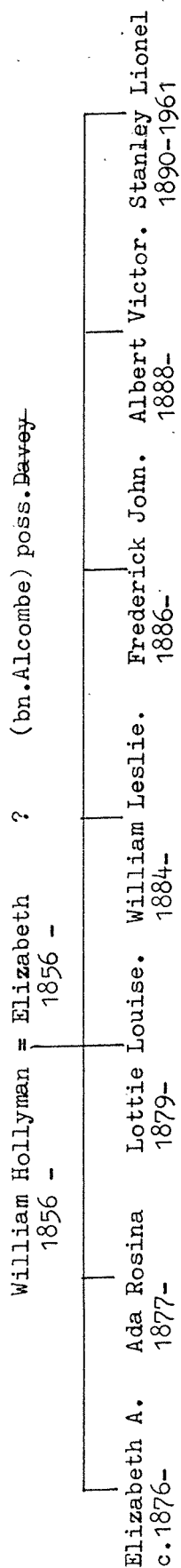

Tithe map and 'Appointment Book' once held by Miles of Leigh Court, now on deposit in Taunton's Records tell of various plots and their value held by former tenants of Abbots Leigh. Amongst these tenants was, John Hollyman.

Dated September 25th 1839

The total statute measure cultivated by John Hollyman on that date was just over 17 acres. This does not include pasture, meadows and orchards. The land owned by 'the lord of the manor of Abbots Leigh' and occupied by John Hollyman included, Plot 98, Hicks ground. Next to Sandy lane. Plot 99. Middle Hicks ground. Plot 100 was Upper Hicks ground. Plot 101 & 102, were much the same description. Plot 119 (which suggests in a different location, most likely along Church road) John held a shop, house and garden plus another house, garden and orchard. Besides these, he held Great orchard and Little orchard.

From conversations with villagers and those Hollymans living, I know that John and his son farmed land at the rear of what is now known as the manor towards the tree line: that land at the rear and side of the village school and land halfway towards Home farm. The two orchards are still there being at the rear of the semi-detached houses, 'Oak Leigh' and 'Sunny Leigh' in Church road. It must have been on this site where John held a shop for there remains the original gate which served access to the village post office before it was decided to open the second one on the main road fifty yards from the public house, 'The George'

At the time of the 1851 census, No 2 Church road was Leigh farm. John's eldest son, Reuben and his wife, Mary Ann lived along the same road as, the old poor house which I surmise as located on the other side of the main road from Leigh farm.

Much of this land was still held by Ruth Hollyman for in her Will dated February 27th 1865, she left....all my lands, tenements and Real Estate to my two sons....etc.

A FOLLOW-UP OF THE CARDIFF MIGRATION

In Sections 5 and 6 brief reference has been made to a small migration of members of the Hollyman families, from both Clevedon and Abbotsleigh, to South Wales and in particular to Cardiff. A migration sparked no doubt by the attraction of employment and opportunities in the emerging industrial scene on the other side of the Bristol Channel.

Each one that we know of was able to carry with him some sort of skill - a coppersmith, a baker, a cordwainer, a haulier, a coalminer and a shipping clerk. However the social historian might well point out that the family must have come down in the world with their proliferation of artisan occupations and obvious need to leave hearth and home in their pursuit of work.

Gone were the days of a hundred and two hundred years ago when amongst the Hollyman "Ag. Labs." were a sprinkling of successful yeoman farmers able to take on the Lease of good farming land, Tax collectors, an Overseer of the Poor, a builder of a fine house, a County Medical Officer and so on. But then that's life!

So to return to our migrants of the mid 19th Century. The first known Hollyman to appear in Cardiff was Alfred Hezikiah and his wife Mary who are recorded on the 1841 census return as living in Ebenezer Street in the Parish of St. Johns and he being shown as an "accountant" which probably means a shipping or railway clerk. Their daughter Mary Louise was baptised in October of that year and died when six months old. The parents must then have moved on as they disappear from the Cardiff records.

It was to be another 25 years before the next "sighting" occurred with Charles Henry who gave his occupation as a "Master Baker" on the birth certificate of his first born son, Alfred John, in April 1866 at No 17 Tredegar St. Charles Henry was just 24 years old at that time. The American Civil War was drawing to a close in that year - mercifully he could not have known that 74 years later the same Alfred John would be blown to bits by a bomb dropped from a German aeroplane. The second "sighting" was of course the elder brother "William Adams" the cordwainer who in the 1871 census was living in Planet St.

Census returns are a great source of information in establishing family groupings and the 1891 Census Return for 189 Bute St. on page 282 certainly illustrates the point. Unfortunately this source is limited by the 100 year Secrecy Rule and so for the present, 1891 is the last occasion when we may have a glimpse of household occupancy. The limited census and other collected information is listed on the following page.

In around the year 1984,correspondence was made with a Mrs Carol Ann Isles but she remarried later.She was known to have said that her late father, John Alfred who married a Swedish girl,Freda Swennson.They had issue of John,Edward,Sylvia,Irene,Freda Joan,Arthur James,Patricia and herself.

Although much about the early Cardiff Hollymans was known by this time, there wasn't a great deal of searches carried out of the actual baptisms. Mr W.D. Hollyman, resident in Dinas Powis and I decided that the best way of making sure of the true relationship of those we know was to check any records of baptisms.

Although this proved to be difficult for the baptismal books became elusive in tracking down. The first records checked were those of:-

St John's Parish Church, Cardiff. Book 1. 1829 - 1842.

The first Hollyman entry was that which we knew which was:-

Mary Louise Hollyman baptised on October 16th 1841. Her parents were, Alfred Hezekiah and Mary Hollyman. Alfred was a 'Railway Clerk' and they lived in Ebenezer Terrace, St John's. Mary Louise, sad to say did not live for she died whilst still an infant. We also know that Alfred and Mary were of Clevedon. They married in or near Dursley, Gloucestershire in 1839.

There were six sons of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman all born in the Somersetshire village of Abbots Leigh and this one,the third was the last to be found in the census returns.

BUT,there is William Adams Hollyman who married Monmouth born Harriet to be found.The 1871 census shows him in Planet street.

Of those killed in the Hollyman Bakery along Corporation road, Cardiff,
there were five Hollymans:-

Alfred John Hollyman aged 74 years.

Ethel Hollyman. aged 43.years.

Margaret Hollyman. aged 36 years and lastly,

Joan Hollyman who was a child of 12 years old.

Whose child was she? Twelve years old in 1941 suggests she would have been
born in c.1929; the only Joan Hollyman born/reg that year was, Joan M. Hollyman
and her mothers name was recorded as, Lewis.

During the previous year, a Joan P. Hollyman was registered and her mothers
name was, Pritchard.

In the Wills and Letters of Administrations of 1941 in Cardiff, there were,
Alfred John Hollyman of that address whose Executor was, Alfred John Hollyman.

Ethel Hollyman also of that address was a spinster and her executor was of
the same name as Alfred John, to wit, Alfred John Hollyman. This Hollyman had
not, it appears, sheltered at this location that fateful night.

Margaret Hollyman, the other adult female Hollyman had as her executor, one
Elizabeth Lewis, widow.

William Hollyman aged 39 also killed had the same executor, Elizabeth Lewis.

Joan must obviously have been the daughter of the Lewis's family, her grand-
mother could well have been, Elizabeth Lewis.

William and Ethel Hollyman were, it appears, children of Alfred John Hollyman
as was, the other, Alfred John Hollyman, he who survived the onslaught of the
German bombers that terrible night.

BUT the question remains, WHOSE CHILD WAS ALFRED JOHN HOLLYMAN, aged 74?

Was he of ABBOTS LEIGH origins? Was this man the second child of Wm & Harriet?

On the night of January 2nd 1941, the German Luftwaffe made their heaviest raid on Wales and over one hundred tonnes of incendiary and high explosive bombs were dropped on Cardiff. Grangetown was one of the targets and factories, docks and the railway system were devastated.

The Hollyman bakery situated in Corporation road suffered a direct hit and all the occupants on the premises were killed.

The March quarter index on the General Register shows the deaths of:-

Alfred J. Hollyman aged 74: Margaret Hollyman aged 36: William Hollyman aged 39: Ethel Hollyman aged 43 and Joan Hollyman a child of 12.

Nine Hundred and eighty five people were killed and one thousand, two hundred and twenty one people were injured as a direct result of air raids on Wales.

Upon enquiries made regarding the Hollyman victims, it was disclosed that of the people who were subsequently buried under the rubble, only two were recovered. A few days later at nine am, a undertaker and an official were the only ones at the burial of Ethel and Joan Hollyman. It appears strange for there were, as I have discovered, many relatives of the Hollyman victims living in that area of Cardiff.

Everyone were directly descended from the Hollymans of Abbots Leigh
through the children of Reuben and Mary Hollyman.

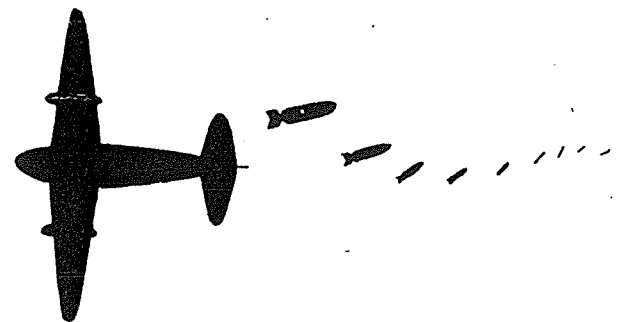


A STREET SCENE 50 YEARS LATER

The Air Raid shelter in which at least 33 people were sheltering from an air attack was located adjacent to the Hollyman Bakery and believed to be in the center of the picture. This would be in a spot between the Victorian style building on the right and the rebuilt (brick) house on the left. The space between the two is now a single storey hardware store.

There were no survivors and only 2 burials are recorded in the City records. There are no clear accounts of the aftermath but obviously the site was filled in and reused. It must be remembered that this was a time of heavy material damage and loss of civilian lives.

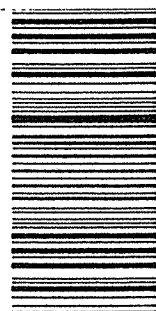

In the 1914-18 war he carried a wounded comrade 600 yards under shell fire. For his bravery in the bombed ship he was given an industrial award for heroism.

The next serious incident, on August 17th also occurred in the Docks area, when premises in Homfray Street, Crichton Street and North Church Street were damaged. One woman was killed and 19 persons injured that night.

Those summer nights of 1940 were long nights of vigil, and then on September 3rd, Cardiff had its worst experience so far, although this was limited to one area, and in its general effect, was not to be compared with some of the bigger raids that were to follow. Yet, many people living in the Albany Road area will never forget that night. Shortly after ten o'clock, side streets off the shopping centre of Albany Road were struck, and one of the houses in Arabella Street was cut from adjoining premises as if by a gigantic knife. A whole family by the name of Waters, was buried under the debris, and rescue parties struggled in the darkness to reach the victims. The guns were still barking; searchlights pierced the sky, but Cardiff's A.R.P. squads toiled through it all—and until the next morning. Angus Street, Moy Road, Claude Place (where an oil bomb set three houses aflame), and Woodville Road also suffered. The total casualties were 46—11 killed and 35 injured, amongst them six children.

A few nights later the Cardiff Ice House was gutted, and the Tresillian Hotel damaged. Two bombs also landed in Westgate Street between the high buildings of the flats and the Angel Hotel—a providential example of a "near-miss." Streets in the Roath district, particularly Orbit Street and Wordsworth Avenue had what the authorities laconically called "an Incident" on September 15th, when five citizens were killed and 23 injured. Five houses were demolished in Constellation Street, Splott, on October 10th.

This "hit-and-run" bombing by small formations or single raiders went on throughout South Wales for six months, and in the administrative area of Glamorgan County Council (which excludes the big towns like Cardiff and Swansea), it was estimated that 864 high explosive bombs and 2,410 incendiaries had been dropped, but there must have been many more.

All this was a grim "rehearsal" for the "blitz" which was to break over Cardiff on that cold, starry night of January 2nd, 1941, when the city was the target for a concentrated attack, which was vicious and prolonged. Cities like Birmingham, Coventry, and Bristol had previously felt the full fury of the Luftwaffe. Cardiff had been bombed only lightly, judged on all-out standards, but on January 2nd it was Cardiff's turn at last. The people had reflected calmly what a big attack would mean, the Civil Defence Services, always at Action Stations, were prepared for mass scale operations. Earlier raids had exposed minor flaws in the machinery, especially in the post-raid services, but on that January night, they served the city nobly. Men and women stood together in a common cause, and in common danger—brave citizens of no mean city.

There was a full moon on January 2nd, 1941, and it was freezing. The siren sounded at precisely 6.37 p.m. and almost immediately hundreds of incendiaries fell in all parts of the city, giving its noble buildings a crazy and incandescent pattern. Leckwith Woods, the Castle Grounds and Sophia Gardens resembled a grotesque scene as the little fire-bombs performed their "Dance of Death." It seemed as if the city were encircled by a screen of fire as the incendiaries burnt themselves out in the open spaces, but Cardiff was to appreciate afterwards the wisdom of having so many green and pleasant lands on the perimeter and city centre. Imaginative peace-time planning had saved the city from destruction in war. About 70 of the smaller type of high explosive bombs landed on Leckwith Woods and Common alone.

The raid quickly developed into a major attack. Those fantastic but frightening flares, with the greenish hue of the incendiaries adding to the grim spectacle, gave the whole city a flood-lit appearance. The Civic Buildings in Cathays Park, their whiteness magnified in the vivid glare, looked like a gigantic wedding-cake prepared for some ogre or monster. It was miraculous that the magnificent pile of buildings, still somehow looking dignified in their peril, escaped. Incendiaries bounced on the hard concrete roadways. Many were kicked into the canal by men and boys. A few incendiaries were smothered on the roof of the City Hall before they could do any damage.

But in other parts of the city, the incendiary attack by the first wave of bombers was so overwhelming that many serious fires broke out. No fewer than 15 fire calls were received by the Fire Brigade—the N.F.S. had not then come into being—within twenty minutes of the siren. Altogether 170 fire calls were received that night.

Amongst the first of the big buildings to be fired were Bristow Wadley's premises in Mill Lane, Noah Rees's warehouse in Working Street, the Canton Secondary School, the Leyland Rubber Works in Harrowby Street Lane, and the Paint Works at East Canal Wharf. The Fire Brigade fought the flames bravely, but just as they were mastering one fire another would break out in another part of the city. Between seven and seven-thirty, buildings in St. John's Square became ablaze; Peacock's Bazaar in Queen Street was burnt out; the Corporation Transport Offices in Paradise Place were destroyed. There were also extensive fires at the Cavendish Furniture Warehouse in Tudor Road, and at the timber yard in North Morgan Street. Yet, such was the devotion and untiring energy of the Brigade, constantly on duty under conditions of extreme danger, that every fire was subdued about midnight.

It was shortly after seven o'clock that the first high explosive fell in the Grange-town area, and that provided one of the most tragic "incidents" of the raid. Many people—the exact number has never been known because there was no trace of some of the victims—were killed in a private shelter which received a direct hit. At the corner of another street in Grange-town, a bomb dropped near a group of people, two of whom were never seen again. The Grange-town Gas Works was hit, but fortunately received little damage.

The next attack was directed on the Western end of the city. High explosives fell in Wembley Road, Ninian Park Road, Neville Street, De Burgh Street, and Blackstone Street. It was in this area that casualties were heaviest. Seven people were killed in one house in Neville Street. Most poignant was the fact that a whole funeral party sheltering in a house in Blackstone Street was practically wiped out.

Many streets in this Riverside district were a shambles. The Riverside Club was

completely demolished, and in many side streets where houses stood there was nothing but huge craters.

Still heavier bombs continued to fall on the stricken city, but through it all, Civil Defence Services, manned mainly by volunteers toiled unceasingly in their work of mercy. Women ambulance drivers drove their vehicles through the rain of death. A part of one motor car was found next morning suspended from a lamp standard in Neville Street.

It was at the height of the raid, about eight o'clock, that Llandaff Cathedral was badly damaged by the explosion of a parachute mine in the churchyard, while not far away, All Saints Church, Llandaff North, was destroyed by fire. Many thought that this fire acted as a beacon for a deliberate attack on the Cathedral. St. Michael's College also had its scars and there was considerable damage to residential property in other parts of Llandaff, particularly in Prospect Drive, Ely Road, and Fairwater Road. A parachute mine which fell at the junction of Prospect Drive and Fairwater Road failed to explode. Unexploded parachute mines were also reported at the Castle Grounds, Crawshaw Lane, Ninian Park Road, the railway near De Groche Place, and on some allotment land off Caerphilly Road, where about half a dozen civilians were seen trying with might and main to pull the infernal engine of destruction from the small crater it had made on landing. They thought it was part of an enemy bomber which had been shot down. Little did they think that they might be blown sky-high at any moment. A Royal Navy party subsequently did good work in rendering the mines harmless, but it was necessary to burn some, and the resulting explosions caused some damage to house property. That story is but one of many which reflects the drama that came into the lives of ordinary men and women in those grim days.

Two parachute mines which exploded with considerable force on landing that night might have had disastrous consequences. One hit the gas works at Grange-town, damaging three gas holders. It was an anxious time for the whole staff. All over the city, gas mains had been affected, and the gas works themselves seriously threatened, but the ordeal was survived with a resolution typical of the whole city.

The smashed Conservative club in Neville Street—a land mine had exploded just above the telegraph pole.

bombs were attacked immediately by A.R.P. workers, by the police and by the public, using sandbags piled ready in doorways and at the feet of darkened street lamp standards.

Some people caught in the streets ran to the public shelters deep inside the mighty walls of the Castle.

Not all the fire bombs fell harmlessly. Compulsory fire-watching on all buildings was not then enforced and in no time at all there were growing fires in various parts of the city.

In the first 20 minutes of the raid alone, the city's fire brigade was called to 15 big fires.

One of the first buildings to catch was the Cavendish furniture warehouse in Tudor Road. Bristow, Wadley's in Mill Lane went soon after. In Working Street, the grain and seed store of Noah Rees and Griffins burst into flames and in Harrowby Street Lane, the Leyland Rubber Works blazed. A paint works at East Canal Wharf was hit by the bombs that were to follow.

Further west, the boys' section of Canton Secondary School, comprising the entire upper floor of the red brick building, blazed furiously. A new £300 organ contributed for by the boys and their parents fed the blaze.

At the Cavendish Warehouse, two firemen, Norman Bidgood and Ivor John, broke into its tall tower to tackle the fire from a new angle. While they were there, a land mine dropped across the

main film, "Night Road to Berlin," was being shown.

Sound-track gunfire drowned the sound of the real thing outside and the audience did not know there was a raid until the manager stopped the show and made the terse announcement: "Enemy aircraft are overhead. You are advised to leave." The audience filed out in an orderly procession.

In another suburban cinema, three firebombs fell through the roof and into the crowded auditorium. The audience moved aside while the staff went into action with stirrup pumps and sand—then carried on watching the film.

"The public behaved magnificently," the Chief Constable, Mr. James Wilson, said when reporting this incident later.

Mr. Wilson himself had an eventful night. Out and about in the middle of the raid, he had to change into a fresh uniform three times.

THE BAKERY

And he was lucky to be alive. Caught in the blast of an exploding bomb he was lifted several yards across the road, a wooden shutter catching him across the head.

"If the chin strap of my steel helmet had been under my chin instead of behind my head, I would have been killed," he said laconically. With the big fires and the flares lighting up Cardiff, the bombs came in. The terraced houses of Grangetown were among the first streets to be hit.

Bill Weeks, who lived next door to Hollyman's Bakery at the corner of Corporation Road and Stockland Street, was eating his tea when the sirens went. A volunteer first-aid party worker by night, he set off at once for the Sloper Road depot.

Normally, his wife spent the raids in the cellar of Hollyman's Bakery, which had been strengthened and converted into a shelter. But Mrs. Weeks was expecting her first baby and on January 2 Bill Weeks left his wife with friends in the Anderson shelter erected in

the basement of their own house.

Anyway, Hollyman's shelter was full. As he left the house, Weeks heard Billy Hollyman, son of the bakery's owner, refuse admission to a woman.

"The shelter's only made for 30 and we've got 33 in there now. It's packed," he said.

Weeks was half-way to the depot when he heard the bombs fall behind him in the Grangetown area. Worried about his wife's condition, he ran back.

"I was half-way down our cellar steps when I heard a whistling getting louder and louder," he remembers. Suddenly the stairs seemed to bounce as if they were made of jelly.

He climbed back up the stairs and into the road. There wasn't a soul in sight and Hollyman's, which had been a three-storey building when it passed two minutes before, was a pile of rubble seven or eight feet high.

The bakery had collected a direct hit. The bomb cut clean through the house from top to bottom, buried itself in the floor of the basement cellar—and exploded.

When Bill Weeks, the first man on the scene, tried to tunnel his way down the bakery steps, he realised that there were no survivors. No-one could have lived for a second in the cellar that fate turned into a death trap.

The ovens of the bakery

were ready for the night's baking, and as rescue workers arrived on the site coal gas leaking from broken pipes reached them and ignited.

Desperately they tried to check the fires as they worked. There was no hope of putting them out—from the taps came only a thin trickle of water as the great pumps fighting the raging fires in the centre of Cardiff drained the household supplies.

And as they worked, icicles formed and hung from the rims of the sweating men's helmets.

THE SPRATS

In Court Road, Mrs. Ivor Jones was frying sprats for the supper she was preparing to share with her 87-year-old father-in-law when Stockland Street—since re-named Jubilee Street—was hit.

The blast brought the house about her ears, flung the painful of sprats out into the garden and left Mrs. Jones lying pinned beneath a door.

Her husband, a full-time member of one of the Sloper Road rescue squads, had gone with a party to Taff Embankment where he was to work for hours with pick and shovel, shifting tons of rubble that covered a mother and her son.

They were badly injured when the rescue team got through. In the tradition set

The Echo in January 1941 told the tale of a bed-ridden casualty who shocked a woman ambulance driver by calling, "Wait for my leg... I've left it behind," as she was carried to the ambulance.

The driver halted, horrified. Out of the house came a neighbour with the leg—a cork one.

river little over 100 yards away, shattering the Arms Park embankment and the new stand.

The blast flung firemen Bidgood and John across the room, but they recovered and went on with their job.

[Far from their thoughts at that moment was a peacetime future with Bidgood as Chief Fire Officer in Cardiff and John as his deputy. Those are the roles they are filling now.]

In the Arms Park itself, which was then under military occupation, members in the Athletic Club were bowled over by the shock of the explosion. One Army officer ended up under a pile of coal with only his feet showing.

The City's soccer ground, too, came under fire. Cardiff City players busy at Ninian Park on an evening training session put out incendiaries that fell on the stands and offices.

On a night of great fires, the cold played strange tricks. Fireman Walter Stark

HOLLYMAN THE BAKERS - CARDIFF

1863 - 1961

AN HISTORICAL NOTE

This note has been written to accompany a Family Tree Chart of the same title. It covers a period of nearly 100 years.

Introduction

During the Second half of the nineteenth Century two brothers Charles Henry Hollyman and Robert James were to leave the tiny village of Abbots Leigh in Somerset to seek a new life in the growing Port and Town of Cardiff. There was an age difference of 14 years between the two. Where they got their training and incentive to start up this trade is not known but it can be seen from the 1881 Census Returns that the younger brother was living and working with his elder brother at that time, obviously waiting to start on his own.

The first clue as to Charles Henry's progress is given on his marriage certificate where he describes himself as a 'Confectioner' of 16 Trinity Street Cardiff on his marriage to Julie Cole on the 19th January 1863. This took place at Bethany Baptist Chapel in St Mary Street and was the same Chapel as his parents, Reuben and Mary Anne (Locke), had been married 24 years earlier in 1839 before they returned to Abbotsleigh. This Chapel was demolished years ago in the building of Howells Store but there is a fascinating account in the Reference Library of the founding of the place of worship in 1806 and of the prejudice and hostility that the handful of members met trying to find premises where they could practice their non-conformatism. And so it was into this congregation - now grown to several hundred that Charles Henry was received in 1858 at the age of 16 years. Julie, his wife-to-be was to be received into the congregation 4 years later. Before leaving Charles and Julie let us look

at the 1881 Census for a glimpse of family life. By that date he was already a widower at the age of 39 with seven children to look after and note that his mother, Mary Ann had been brought back from Abbotsleigh to help with the family. Her husband, Reuben, had died by now. Note also Uncle John (Anderson) who had been a witness at his wedding to Julie in 1863. They would still be looking after John at the time of the next Census in 1891 when he was shown as being a hundred years old.

The younger brother Robert James followed in Charles's footsteps first setting up as a Confectioner and then as a baker, a business which continued for about 20 years. Very little indeed is known about Robert - the 1891 Census gives the one and only insight into his family life. They had seven children by this time, a boarder to help with the baking and a servant. It is believed that on retirement he left Cardiff and returned to his native Somerset. Nothing is known of his wife or where he died.

SOURCES OF INFORMATION

The trouble with researching family history is that it is invariably left too late. Even thirty years ago there would have been several people around who could have supplied information from living memory. So we are left with the meagre sources available from the State records of births and deaths, Post Office Trade and Residential Directories and of course the Census Returns.

THE FAMILY TREE

The limited information described above has been used to superimpose on the Chart the locations of the HOLLYMAN BAKERY BUSINESSES particularly in respect of Charles Henry's 4 sons who used their fathers training to set themselves up. Of this second generation it is thought that Alfred John and William formed the business known as Hollyman Bros. which perhaps was the most well known. Reginald was also a baker and as the father of 12 children there are many of his descendents in Cardiff today including his youngest son Kenneth who won fame during the 1940's when he played for Cardiff City. The 4th son to set up a bakery business was Robert and again very little is known about him. For 20 years or more he seems to have run his affairs in the pleasant suburb of Roath. We know of his death in 1942 because of the publication of his Will leaving his estate to his wife Olga Mabel.

THE BAKERY TRADE

It is not known what led the two brothers to enter the baking and confectionary trade but this was in essence a cottage industry type of occupation and they were but two of many who made a living in this way. A Bakery was probably a small dwelling with an oven and a bakery tucked in the back with perhaps the front room of the dwelling serving as a shop. Deliveries were made by means of a distinctive type of horse-drawn van and the writer can certainly remember seeing such a delivery vehicle bearing the name, Hollyman Bros. the Bakers, on the street of Cardiff in the late 1930's. The Hollymans were a household name in parts of Grangetown and Cathays in the latter half of the 19th Century but like so many other small family businesses their time was limited and after about 90 years the name had disappeared in the bakery trade. Their descendents turned to other occupations and in the main prospered.

THE CARDIFF BLITZ OF 2nd JANUARY 1941

No history of the baking fraternity would be complete without a reference to the events of 2nd January 1941. This was a time when the deprivations of war on the civilian population were beginning to bite. On that night over a hundred men women and children ^{were} killed and many hundreds injured and yet the South Wales Echo of that week, whilst reporting that a heavy air raid had taken place gave no details at all and certainly no list of casualties - The Ministry of Information regulations made sure of that. The facts are that the business established by Alfred John the eldest son of Charles Henry at No 64 Corporation Road received a direct hit from a German bomb. Alfred John then aged 74 years, his son William, and daughter-in-law Margaret, his daughter Ellen and son-in-law

daughter-in-law Margaret, his daughter Ethel and his granddaughter Joan aged 12 years were killed instantly together with neighbours who were sheltering with them in the cellar beneath the bakery. Subsequent records show that 33 people perished at these premises at 64 Corporation Road. Whilst the details of this event were all too painfully aware to the immediate family there were Hollymans on the periphery of the family who, when they looked back on the event after the war were disturbed at not knowing who the victims were and what their relationship was. This has now been revealed as the family charts show.

FOOTNOTE

It was always assumed that a whole family had been wiped out by the tragedy but in January 1992 some 51 years after the event the writer of this article in the course of his research was able to establish that Alfred John's other son - also named Alfred JOHN - was at another home on the fateful night and survived. This Alfred John was 40 at the time having been born in 1901 and died in 1973. His son has now been traced - he was born in 1943 and the writer has spoken to both him and his wife. They and their children the great grand children of Charles Henry are also shown on the Chart. ♣

THE POST WAR PERIOD

We now come to the conclusion of the family baking business and in this, help has been supplied by Ken Hollyman and his 2 elder sisters Elsie and Violet (August 1992). The bombing of the bakery put paid to the business and the surviving son Alfred John referred to above in "Footnote" and apparently known as Uncle Jack continued with the bread round for a few years but because the bakery was gone he was obliged to buy the bread from other bakeries. In the 1950's a business "R and H Bakers" operated from 30 Violet Place. This was infact Reginald and Harold - a Third Generation - sons of Reginald - grandsons of Charles Henry. Little is known of their activities except that their business finished on 31st December 1961 thus completing almost a hundred years since Charles Henry stepped out from 16 Trinity Street on the 19th January 1863 to marry Julie in the long disappeared Betheny chapel.

The Bakery was probably located on the left hand side of the picture now occupied by the large departmental store of Howells. This was the address that he gave on his marriage certificate where he described himself as a "Confectioner" on his marriage to Julie Cole on the 19th of January 1863.

The Bethany Baptist Chapel where they were married was but a few minutes walk away and was demolished many years ago to facilitate the extension of the above mentioned store. Interestingly enough its existence and location is marked by a plaque set in a stone memorial stone erected in the Mens Outfitting Department!

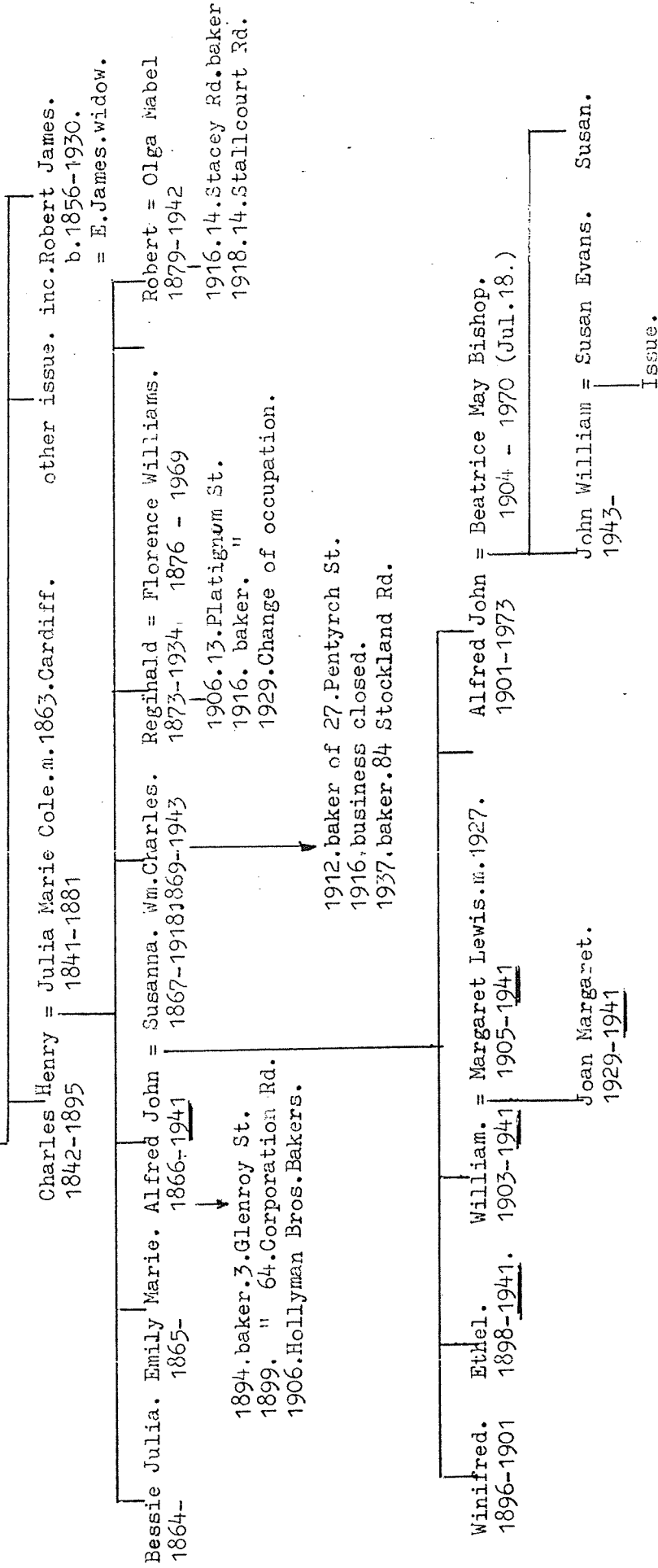

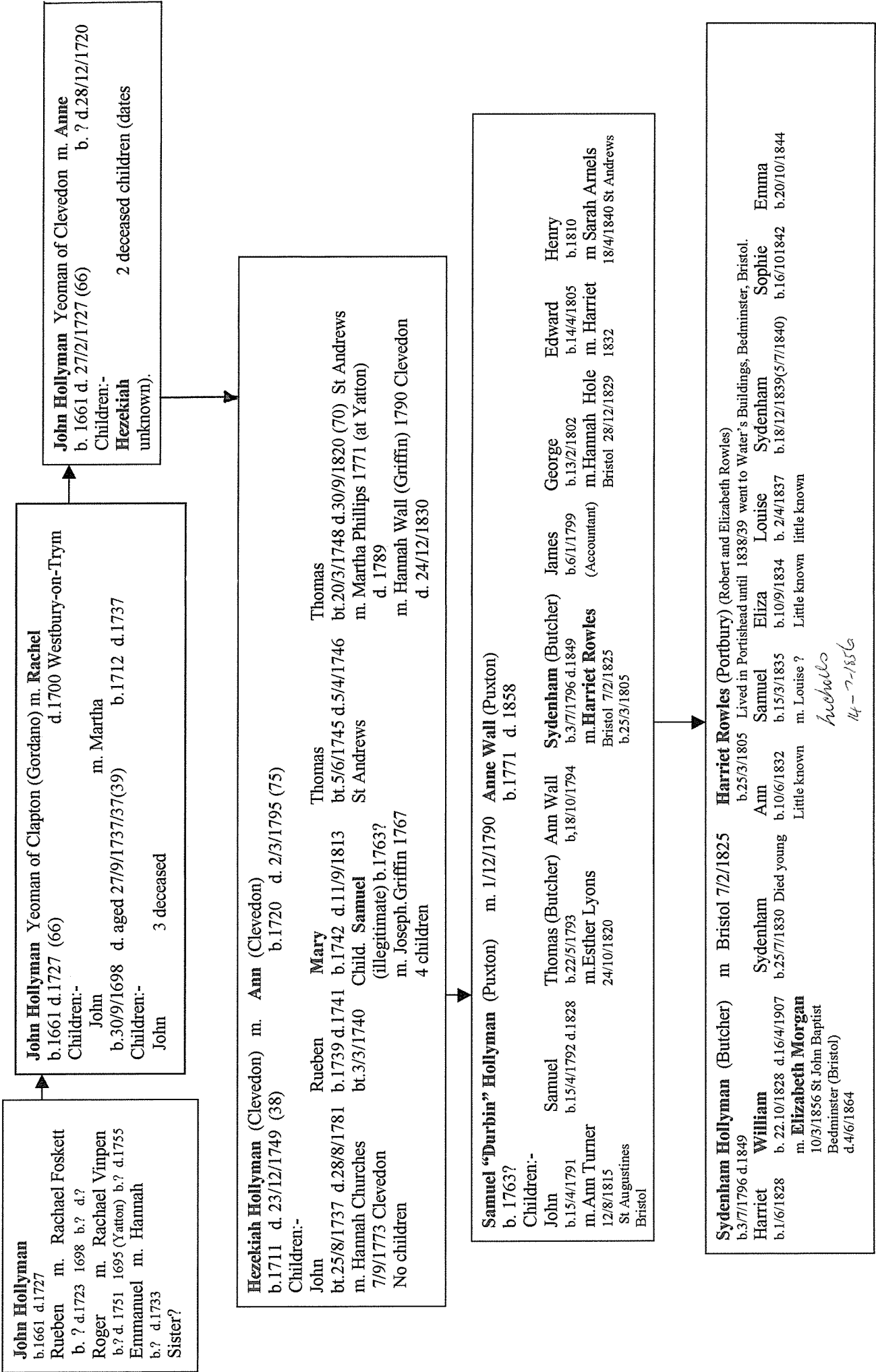

HOLLYMAN FAMILY HISTORY



THE HOLLYMAN FAMILY HISTORY

The Hollymans probably came from the south of the country from an area known as the Horethorn Hundreds. It appears that four brothers – John, Rueben, Roger and Emmanuel and a sister came to the Gordano Valley. There was a John Hollyman (Assessor) from the South Somersetshire village of Stowell who had paid 10 pounds Poll tax in 1641.

John Hollyman the elder. (1661 – 1727)

Was born at a location unknown but came to the Gordano Valley in 1684. (His signature is on a document made in Clapton when the Lord of the Manor was Henry Winter). In 1684 he signed an “indenture” concerning the acquisition of land above and below the church of St Michaels in the tiny village of Clapton in the Gordano valley and within the Portbury Hundreds. This was farming land for which he paid an annual rent of 110 pounds for seven years. His wife Rachael presented him with a son John on 30 September 1698. John the elder would have been 37 years old at this time. By 1700 he was living in the village of Westbury-on-Trym to the north of Bristol where Rachael died and was buried in the Parish church yard of St Johns. John was a Yeoman Farmer and it is known that he bought more land in a small fishing village called Clevedon.

The “Bristol Mirror” 1703 contained the following

“To John Hollyman of Westbury on Trym in the County of Gloucester, Yeoman, 620 pounds 18/6d down. A messuage or tenement called Childs and Mainstones and 60 acres of meadow and pasture, late in the possession of Thomas Bisse bought by him from Gabriel Oddingsell and Joseph Whetham. The said Estate is mortgaged to Nathaniel Wade of Bristol for 475 pounds.

John Hollyman takes over this.

All items of household or husbandrie particularly one furnace, one wheat mow and staddle and one iron fork /lack/back.... And, lastly, whereas the said Nathaniel Wade has fallowed three acres of land in part of said premises and sowed same with wheat, that John Hollyman should pay a reasonable sum for it.”

He appears to have married Ann in Clevedon where he had signed a mortgage for land in Clevedon on the mouth of the Severn. There were three children, but two died in infancy and are buried in the family vault inside St Andrews church at Clevedon. The surviving son Hezekiah (b1711) was to become the Parish overseer and Church warden. Ann died in December 1720, aged 27, and laid to rest with her infants. John died on 27 February 1727, aged 66, and was also buried in the family vault.

John Hollyman (born 30 September 1698) became a tax assessor and collector as well as a church warden. He married Martha (1712 – 1737). About 1732. They had 4 children but only one, John, born in 1734 and baptised on 10 September, survived. John died 27 September 1737 aged 39 and is buried in the family vault at St Andrews.

HEZEKIAH HOLLYMAN

HEZEKIAH HOLLYMAN (1711 – 1749)

Hezekiah was also a Yeoman farmer, parish overseer and churchwarden. It is possible he married Ann about 1735/36. She must have been approximately 16. He was only married for about 14 years before he died on 23 December 1749 aged 38 and was buried in St Andrews Church. Ann survived him for many years and died in March 1795, aged 75, and was buried with her husband.

Their children were:-

John Hollyman Born in 1737 and baptised 25 August 1737 was also a yeoman farmer. He was married (aged 36) at Clevedon to Walton born Hannah Churches on 7 September 1773. He died in 1781 and was buried beside his father on 28 August (aged 44). He died without children.

Rueben Hollyman. Born and baptised on 3 March 1740 and died still an infant. Name spelt Rubin, Robin in the parish register.

MARY HOLLYMAN. Was the only daughter and was baptised 6 September 1742. She gave birth to a “base” child (illegitimate) in March 1763, a son whom she named Samuel Durbin Hollyman. There does not appear to be a baptism, but there is a burial. She married Joseph Griffin in 1767 in Clevedon and had four children. She died aged 71 and buried in Clevedon on 11 September 1813.

Thomas Hollyman Baptised 5 June 1745 and buried on 5 April 1746.

Thomas Hollyman was baptised 20 March 1748 and became a very successful and wealthy farmer. He was married twice. 1. Martha Taylor in 1771 at Yatton and had many children before she died in 1787. 2. Hannah (widow of Thomas wall) (nee Bayly) in Clevedon in 1790. One son William born in 1791.

Thomas died in 1820 and was buried in the family vault inside St Andrews church on 30 September 1820, Aged 74. Hannah was buried on Christmas Eve 1830.

Historical Notes. 1. As collectors of taxes the Hollymans were involved with the infamous “window taxes”.

Windows were taxed at this time (C17) and as a result many were blocked up to avoid paying the tax. Originally, windows were exactly what the word suggests – to let the passage of wind into the rooms. In later years glass was used to do the reverse and to keep the wind out and allow the light to enter.

During 1695, in the reign of William 3rd, is the time when all five members of this Hollyman family lived in Clapton. The tax was to raise funds for special purposes and even as late as 1850 raised 1,832,684 pounds. It was abolished in 1851 (the year of the Great Exhibition).

2. Overseers. Overseers were appointed during the reign of Elizabeth under the Poor Law of 1601 in

every parish to raise money by taxation to provide work for the unemployed, to relieve the aged and the unemployed, to apprentice pauper children, and to build poor houses. This system continued almost unaltered, but thoroughly abused, down to the passing of the Poor Law Amendment Act 1834. By this Act, parishes were grouped together under elected Boards of Guardians, but each parish continued to be financially responsible for its own poor. Able-bodied paupers could only obtain relief if they moved to a workhouse. The workhouses were dirty and disease ridden. Once in poverty it was very difficult to escape.

MARY HOLLYMAN AND HER "BASE" CHILD SAMUEL DURBIN HOLLYMAN.

Mary was baptised at St Andrews, Portishead on 16 September 1742, the only daughter of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman. At the age of 21, and four years before she married Joseph Griffin on 11 June 1768 at Walton-in-Gordano, there was an entry in the register of St Andrews under burials of 1763 which reads Samuel Durbin, "base" child of Mary Holyman On 7 March 1763.

Other interesting information:-

1. Samuel's bride Anne Wall was the daughter of Thomas and Ann Wall.
2. Hannah Wall was born Hannah Bayley and married Mary's brother Thomas (a widower) on 12 August 1790, 200 pounds being paid to the Bishop of Bath and Wells for the licence. The Minister who solemnised the marriage was Drax Durbin (1734 – 1814) and his second wife Mary Drax (m.1761)
3. Ann's sister Harriet wall (b1786) married Hezekiah Hollyman (1748 – 1820) son of Thomas Hollyman by his first wife Martha Taylor.
4. Ann and Harriet's sister Hannah Wall (b1773) married Joseph (1771) son of Joseph and **Mary Griffin** (7/2/1791) at Clevedon.
5. Their son John (b1772) married Martha Hollyman (18/11/1793) at Clevedon (daughter of Thomas and Martha and sister of Hezekiah).

We assume the father of Mary's child was a Durbin. Sir John Durbin (1734 – 1814) is an attractive candidate. On the other hand it could have been George Durbin (married to Jane) who were baptising children between 1746 and 1760. He did odd jobs round the area as a labourer and built up a successful business. He was valued in the Clevedon area.

SAMUEL HOLLYMAN (1763 –

In 1781 there are records showing Samuel Hollyman (19 years old) as a tax assessor in Clevedon and a "Gentleman". Samuel had obviously dropped the name of Durbin by this time and he was married in the local church of St Andrews on 1 December 1790 when he married Anne Wall. This event was five months after his Uncle Thomas (Mary's brother) married Anne's mother Hannah Wall. There appears to be no trace of Samuel's death. It is believed he died in the Puxton area. Anne lived to a ripe old age in Clevedon and was buried there on 19 March 1858 (aged 87).

1. **John Hollyman** was born 15 April 1791 (baptised 17 January 1792 at St Saviours church, Puxton). He married Ann Turner at St Augustine(less) Bristol on 12 August 1815.
2. **Samuel Hollyman** was born 15 April 1792 (baptised 8 January 1794). He died aged 36 and was buried in 1828.
3. **Thomas Hollyman** was born 22 May 1793 (baptised the same day as Samuel). Married Esther Lyons in Bristol On 24 October 1820. He was a butcher.
4. **Ann Wall Hollyman** was their first daughter and was born on 18 October 1794 (baptised 7 January 1795) Little known about her. May have dropped the name Wall. Attended Sydenham's wedding in 1825.
5. **SYDENHAM HOLLYMAN** was born 3 July 1796 (baptised 29 July 1796). He married a Portbury girl Harriet Rowles at Bristol on 7 February 1825.
6. **James Hollyman** was born 6 January 1799 (baptised 14 May 1799). Little known except reported in a Clevedon census as an accountant.
7. **George Hollyman** was born 13 February 1802 in Clevedon. He was baptised in Puxton on 12 March 1802. He was married to Hannah Hole in Bristol on 28 December 1829.
8. **Edward Hollyman** was born 14 April 1805 in Puxton and baptised her on 4 June 1805. He married Harriet, whose maiden name is unknown, in 1832.
9. **Henry Hollyman** was the youngest child and born in 1810 (baptised on 25 December 1810). He married a local girl called Sarah Arnels on 19 April 1840 in St Andrews, Clevedon,

SYDENHAM HOLLYMAN OF PUXTON (1796 – 1849)

Sydenham was the 5th child and 4th son of Samuel and Anne Hollyman (Wall). He was born at Puxton on 3 July 1797 and baptised in the parish church of St Saviour On 29 July. He married Harriet Rowles in Bristol on 7 February 1825. After the wedding they settled in Portishead where he worked as a butcher.

They had seven children:-

1. **Harriet Hollyman** who was baptised at the parish church on 1 June 1825. Nothing else known.
2. **WILLIAM HOLLYMAN** was baptised in the same year as his sister on 22 October 1825. He was married to Elizabeth Morgan at St John Baptist, Bedminster on 10 march 1856. He was 28 she 26. He stowed away on the "Royal Bride" to Geelong, Australia in 1859. His wife, Elizabeth (nee Morgan - daughter of Thomas Morgan) was a passenger on the ship which left Bristol on 27 August 1859 and arrived in Geelong on 28 November 1859. He was butcher and was required to work his passage after being discovered. They settled in Malmsbury, Victoria.
3. **Ann Hollyman** was the second daughter and baptised on 10 June 1832. Nothing else known.
4. **Samuel Hollyman** was baptised on 5 March 1835. A person of this name has been found as being married to a Long Ashton woman named Louise. Nothing else known.

Obituary - Argus 18 April 1907:-

Mr William Hollyman, a very old resident of Malmsbury, has died at the age of 86 years. In the early fifties, Mr Hollyman was a pugilist of some note, and appeared under the name of "Bristol Bill" in the ring. He retired from his business as a butcher in Malmsbury some time ago. Mr Hollyman was for some time a member of the Borough Council.

Some stories told about Bill Hollyman.

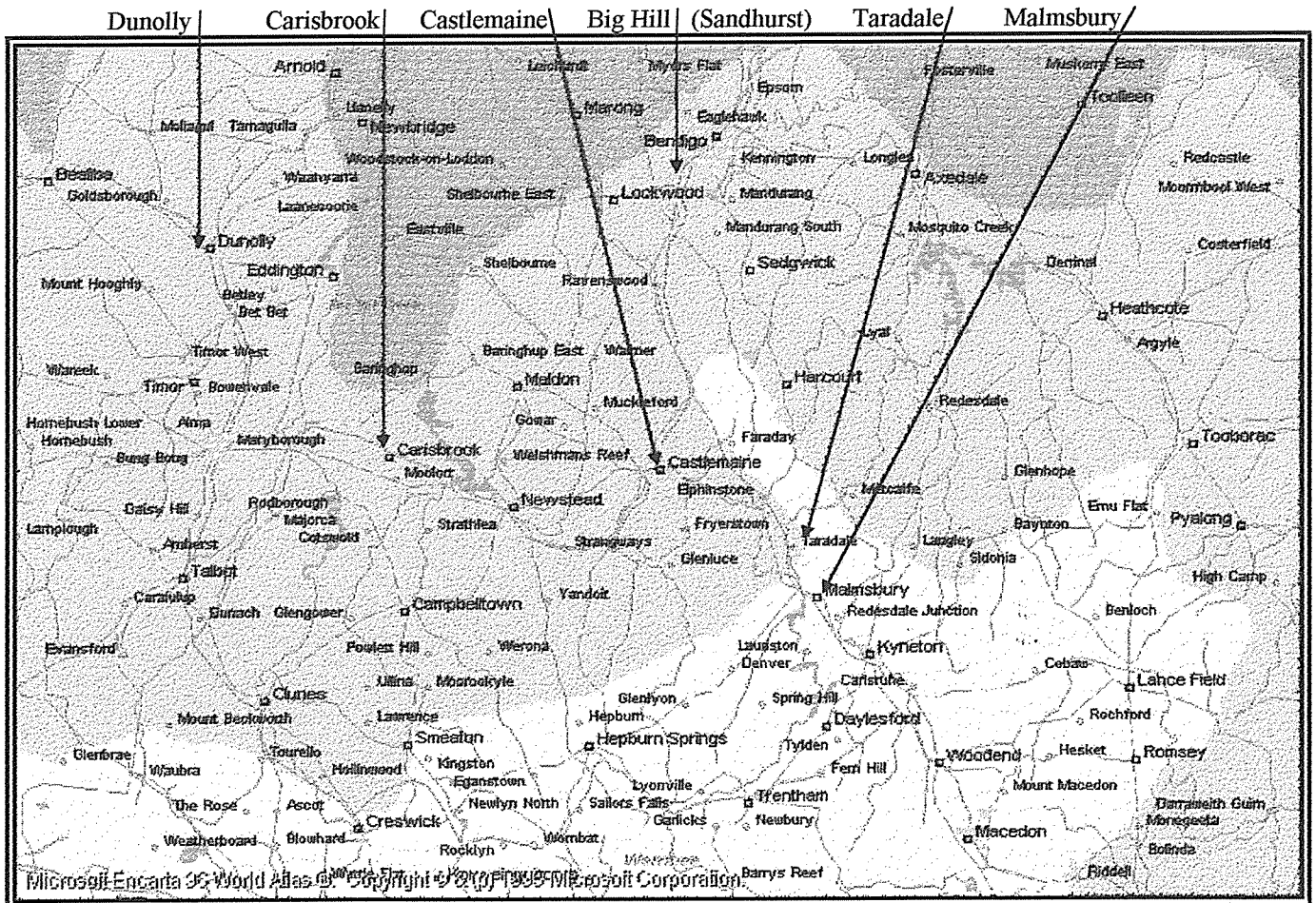
History of Malmsbury Bill, known as Bristol Bill, stowed away on the Royal bride in 1854 and survived on swede turnips until found. Instead of being thrown in irons he was made to work in his trade as a butcher. Opened a butchery and store in Malmsbury. Councillor. Ran a four wheel coach, drawn by four horses from Malmsbury to Castlemaine - the fare was 1/-

Bill Jones Dad tells the story about Bill Hollyman being asked to sit on top of the coach so that the Magistrate could ride inside. The Magistrate rode on top.

Jack Hannigan A drunk had taken over the bar at the hotel between the Mansions and the Railway Station and would not let anyone in. The publican Mrs. Ryan asked one of the lads to go and get Bill Hollyman. Bill waddled around and was confronted by the drunk who informed him that he might have a reputation as a fighter, but it would not do him any good here. Bill hit him once and the drunk was carried outside where he eventually recovered consciousness. The drinkers were able to continue unhindered at the bar.
