

Gaines Grave Marker Dedicated

A full 21-gun salute sounded off for the dedication of the new grave marker for Captain James Gaines (1743-1829), who was a Revolutionary War hero and resident of Sullivan County.

The Long Island Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution presided over the ceremony recently, which included military honors by the American Legion Hammond Post no. 3 Honor Guard volley by men dressed as the Revolutionary War Militia and the

decoration of the grave by Captain Gaines' descendants.

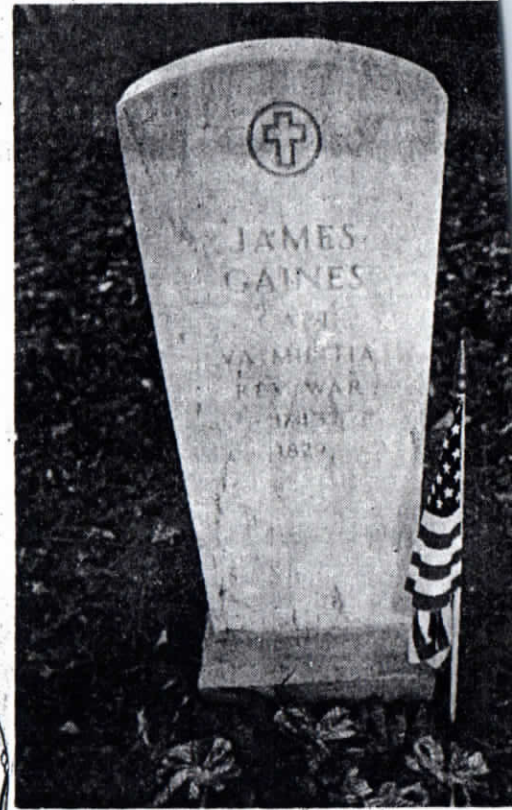
The new stone marker was furnished by the U.S. War Department and has been placed on the site of Gaines' burial in the former Groseclose Cemetery, next to Country Garden Apartments.

Descendents attending the ceremony included Mrs. John Miller, Kingsport; Mrs. Martha Williams and her daughter Laura, Johnson City; Mrs. Lucille Francis, her daughter Mrs.

Thomas North and her son Thomas Jr., Johnson City; and Miss Alta Lee Johnson City.

Also attending were Mrs. Alice Lynn Howell, Knoxville; and Miss Mary Margaret Trimble, Arlington, Va.

Captain Gaines participated in several engagements against the British in the Carolinas while serving in the Virginia Militia. He later served as justice of the peace for Sullivan County.

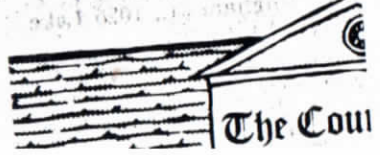

DAR To Dedicate Gaines' Gravestone

A new gravestone for Captain James Gaines, Revolutionary War soldier and long-time Kingsport area resident, will be dedicated by the Long Island Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution June 21, at 3 p.m., at Groseclose Cemetery.

The original stone marking was destroyed several years ago, and a new one has been furnished by the U.S. War Department. Descendants and guests who plan to attend the dedication ceremony are asked to inform Mrs. P. T. Nottingham Jr., 1025 Lake Ave., Kingsport.

During the Revolutionary War, Gaines participated as a soldier against the British in many

parts of the Carolinas. After moving to Sullivan County, Tennessee, he was appointed Justice of the Peace by Governor William Blount in 1793.

Before his death in 1829, Gaines became one of the area's most prominent citizens as a money lender, real estate promoter and investor in the flatboat freighting commerce which traveled from Kingsport down the Holston-Tennessee-Mississippi River system.

Directions to the cemetery are: Go into the entrance of Country Garden Apartments off Stone Drive and bear to the right. Cross an open field until you come to a stand of trees. The cemetery is located among the trees.

CAPTAIN JAMES GAINES
(1743-1829)

Captain James Gaines, sixth son of William and Isabella (Pendleton) Gaines, was born in 1743 in Culpeper County, Virginia. He resided in turn in that county, in Surry and Stokes Counties, North Carolina, and in Sullivan, Hawkins, and Sullivan counties, Tennessee. He married first in 1761 young Miss White who died the following year. She was the daughter of James and Margaret (Abbot) White of Brumfield Parish, Culpeper County, Virginia. James Gaines married his second wife on May 12, 1766. She was Elizabeth Strother (1738-1843/5), the daughter of Francis and Susannah (Dabney) Strother of Stokes County, North Carolina. He fathered thirteen children whose numerous decendants lived throughout the United States.

During the Revolutionary War, James Gaines reached the rank of Captain as he participated in several engagements against the British in the Carolinas while serving in the Virginia Militia. He was in the Battle at Eutaw Springs and was wounded in the conflict at Guilford Courthouse in 1781.

The Revolutionary War battle at Guilford Courthouse North Carolina opened the Southern Campaigns under the patriot leadership of General Nathanael Greene. At Fullford Courthouse Greene confronted Lord Cornwallis' British Army. This bloody conflict was a victory to Cornwallis in battle but brought about his retreat to Wilmington. It was fought on March 15, 1781. Captain James Gaines survived his wounds of this battle to fight again at Eutaw Springs, South Carolina on September 8, 1781 when General Greene was sufficiently reinforced to resume an offensive. This was the last major engagement in the South and one of the hardest-fought actions of the Revolution. Although Greene failed to win the battle, he again won a campaign. The British army was so weakened by losses at Eutaw Springs that they had to withdraw to near Charleston. Liberation of the South was virtually assured.

Captain James Gaines was described by the Tennessee historian, Samuel Cole Williams, as "a man of great intelligence, considerable talent and high character." He was elected a Representative of Surry County to the North Carolina State Assembly. Before leaving this county, he served at the State Convention to ratify the National Constitution. Earlier while in Stokes County, he was an entry taker for land in Sullivan County or for land "on the western waters." Descendants have a document that James Gaines issued as Entry Taker on Feb. 21st 1780 for Sullivan County land located on the north side of Horse Creek which included a mud lick.

It is believed that Captain James Gaines moved to Sullivan County, Tennessee (then the Territory of the U.S. South of the River Ohio) about 1790. He was appointed a Justice of the Peace for Sullivan County by Governor William Blount on May 11, 1793. During the ensuing years he became one of the area's most prominent citizens. He was a money lender, real estate promoter, and investor in the flatboat freighting commerce which went from Kingsport down the Holston-Tennessee-Mississippi rivers to as far south as New Orleans. But it was his Uncle Edmund Pendleton's large land grant along Reedy Creek in this county that brought him from across the mountains.

Edmund Pendleton's largest Sullivan County grant was surveyed in 1750 and dated 1756. It covered about 4000 acres of land that straddled Reedy Creek and included much of the present city of Kingsport as well as this ground we are standing on today. Captain Gaines became an agent for the sale of this grant land by an agreement made with Edmund Pendleton and his partner, John Taylor. The agreement was dated January 25, 1790 and stated that James Gaines and his brother, Thomas Gaines could purchase all unsold portions of the 4000 acres at any time they chose.

In September 1804, after their Uncle Edmund's death, they paid Edmund Pendleton's Estate 596 pounds and 18 shillings and paid Pendleton's partner, John Taylor, 766 pounds and 8 shillings for something like 2500 acres of this valuable Sullivan County land.

By 1793 Captain James Gaines had settled in a log house located on the north side of Reedy Creek a short distance east of present-day Kingsport and about a half mile north of Exchange Place, the home of Captain Gaines' granddaughter, Letitia D. Moore and her husband and cousin, John S. Gaines. It is not known when Captain Gaines moved, but by 1805 he was known to be living with his son, James Taylor Gaines near this very spot. On May 24th, 1805, James and Thomas Gaines had sold 200 acres of this land to James Taylor Gaines. David Childress, a son-in-law of Captain James Gaines, was also living on the property. The log cabin on the Waterman property north of Stone Drive is said to be one of the Childress cabins. By 1809 James Taylor Gaines had sold this land to his brother-in-law Joseph Everett. About 1810 Captain James Gaines moved to Hawkins County to live again with his son James Taylor Gaines. James T. Gaines had a large plantation there in the present-day Silver Lake area Captain Gaines lived there until his son's death in 1821.

In 1821 Captain James Gaines with his wife and two daughters, Susannah and Sarah (Sally) moved to their final home in Christianville (Kingsport) which was commonly called The Boatyard and was incorporated as part of Kingsport in 1822. Their large log house was across Cross (now Granby Road) Street from the Netherland Inn, home of Captain Gaines' friend Richard Netherland. Captain Gaines died in this home in the fall of 1829. The Captain's son, George S. Gaines, wrote to "Miss Susanah & Sarah Gaines" on September 19, 1829 from Demopolis, Alabama

and said;

"I have received a letter from Capt. Everitt, and one from Dr. Patton communicating the sad intelligence of our worthy & excellent father's death. This distressing dispensation of Providence (although from his advanced age was to be duly expected) & was entirely unprepared for, my previous late advices having spoken of him, as being in the enjoyment of good health.....you have, both of you, the inestimably rich consolation of knowing that you have at least done your duty to your earthly parents..... I beg to know your plans for the future." etc.

They buried Captain James Gaines in the family cemetery on Joseph and Agnes (Gaines) Everett's plantation. The cemetery was later called the Groseclose Cemetery for the Joseph Groseclose family who owned the plantation from the 1850's and still own the mansion house which stands thereon at the intersection of Stone Drive (11W) and Bloomingdale Pike. The cemetery is located on the north side of Bloomingdale Pike across the highway from the Groseclose Mansion house and next to the Country Gardens Apartments.

Today Kingsport, Sullivan County and the Long Island Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution have the honor of commemorating this outstanding early settler of Kingsport and his Revolutionary War service to our nation we salute you, Captain James Gaines!
