Dear Mrs. Holleman:

I wish to acknowledge receipt of your letter of October 12th, 1967, regarding the Holleman Family.

Phonetic spelling has caused many changes in the name over the generations since they left the British Isles. My branch now spells it "Holliman", yet my grandfather often signed his name "John T. Holiman". All of this is understandable since education was limited in the early days, and the sound rather than the spelling was important.

I have done quite a bit of reading and study on the various names, and am of the opinion that the name originated in the town of DeHolym in Wales. Even in England, there are "E", "I", and "Y" spelling of the Holleman name.

George Anders Holleman, a Chicago singer, originally from Mississippi wrote a book after much study on the "Hollyman" family. He is now deceased. I have a copy of the book and also donated two copies to the Southern History branch of the Birmingham Library. Your Jonathan Holleman line is mentioned in the book. Since George A. Holleman is dead, I know of no place you could buy the book unless from his widow who lives at Greenville, Mississippi. I have some correspondence with her, and will see if I can find it, if you wish to communicate with her.

Your Jonathan Holleman was the great-grandson of Christopher Hollyman, of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. Christopher died in 1691. His wife Mary died about 1700. I have a copy of his will. One of the children of Christopher and his wife Mary was Christopher C. Hollyman of Isle of Wight County, Virginia. He died in 1731. His wife, Susanna died in 1755. They in turn had a son John, who married Elizabeth. I have a copy of his will. John, last mentioned changed the spelling of the name from "Y" to "E". Their son, Jonathan, born 1787, married on 3-13-1809 Nancy Caldwell. They lived on Cary Road at Raleigh, North Carolina. Jonathan was burned to death in an accident. I have the information as to his children, but it is lengthy so will not undertake to include this. I am trying to give you basic information, so that you can continue research if you wish to.

I am sure that the county records of Raleigh, N.C.

would be revealing and interesting. I strongly urge you to get a copy of George A. Holleman's book "The Hollyman Family", if you can locate one. Your branch as well as mine is written up there. However my branch has some breaks in it, which I have worked over the years to tie together.

I am descended from James Holliman, born 1750 in Johnston County, ~~North~~ N.C. His sons, and other relatives moved to Alabama from Anson County N.C. in 1836. Some of them settled in Fayette County, Alabama, where I originated. Others of the brothers and cousins, went to Choctaw and Carroll County, Mississippi, and still others went on to Arkansas and Texas, as well as Oklahoma. These Hollimans were probably descended from the original Christopher Hollyman, according to data given me by George Anders Holleman, the author. It is difficult at this late date to trace the line, so I have not yet completed my work.

I hope that this information will be helpful to you, and if I can further assist you, feel free to write me.



Dear Mrs. Hawkins:

In reply to your inquiry of February 22nd, regarding Aaron and Samuel Baker of the Tirzah Church congregation of Lancaster County, South Carolina, and Jenima Baker 1753-1831, I must advise that I have no data which would relate.

My relationship to the Bakers comes through George Baker and wife Mary Robertson Baker of Tuscaloosa County, Alabama, early settlers who arrived there before 1820, along with other relatives, probably John Baker and Michael Baker. George and Mary had three sons and two daughters, and were shown in the 1819 Census of Mecklinburg County, North Carolina. According to the 1850 Census of Tuscaloosa County, George Baker was then 67 years of age, born in South Carolina. He died before 1860 as did his wife. I have done considerable research on this Baker family through the local library and by reference to some very old letters, but have not been able to go to Mecklinburg County, North Carolina, and Lancaster and Chesterfield Counties, South Carolina, to finish my work, on account of family illness. My ancestor, the Blakenys, Hollimans came from this area. I think my Baker line came from Lancaster and Chester County, S.C.

I will keep your inquiry in mind, and if I run into any related data, will advise you. If I can be of any assistance, will be glad to have you contact me.

My mother, Jennie Belle Davis Myers, was born March 16, 1896 and died on October 15, 1971. She married Henry Clay Myers on December 29, 1913. He was born October 31, 1892 and died January 14, 1968. Both are buried at the New Hope cemetery. They both received 9th grade educations. There were four children born of this marriage.

Raymond Byron Myers was born June 24, 1915 and died February 26, 1966. He also is buried at New Hope. He was married to Doris Augusta Kirkpatrick on August 28, 1937. They were born September 3, 1939. The parents are buried at New Hope. The sons are buried at Providence near Parrish, Alabama. He worked for TCI in Fairfield until his death.

Sara Francis Myers Williams, born April 12, 1920, died September 28, 1970. She received a high school education and also took a business course. She worked for Allied Chemical. She had one son, Hugh Don Myers and he was raised by our parents.

Hugh Don was born on March 1, 1937 and is married to Margaret Key Myers. They have two children, Sandra Laverne, born February 24, 1961, and Don Alan, born August 28, 1963. Both are high school students.

Johnnie Mae Myers Thomas was born April 19, 1924 and is married to Marcel Thomas. They have two children. Loyal Jean Thomas Key married to Gerald P. Key. They have three children, Mark, Tracy and Todd. Maurice Thomas is married to Doris Ann Martin Thomas. He has no children.

I was born Lillian Geneva Myers on March 14, 1922 and married Elmer Martin Diehl on May 16, 1940. Elmer died on August 12, 1963 and worked as a Dental Technician until his death.
