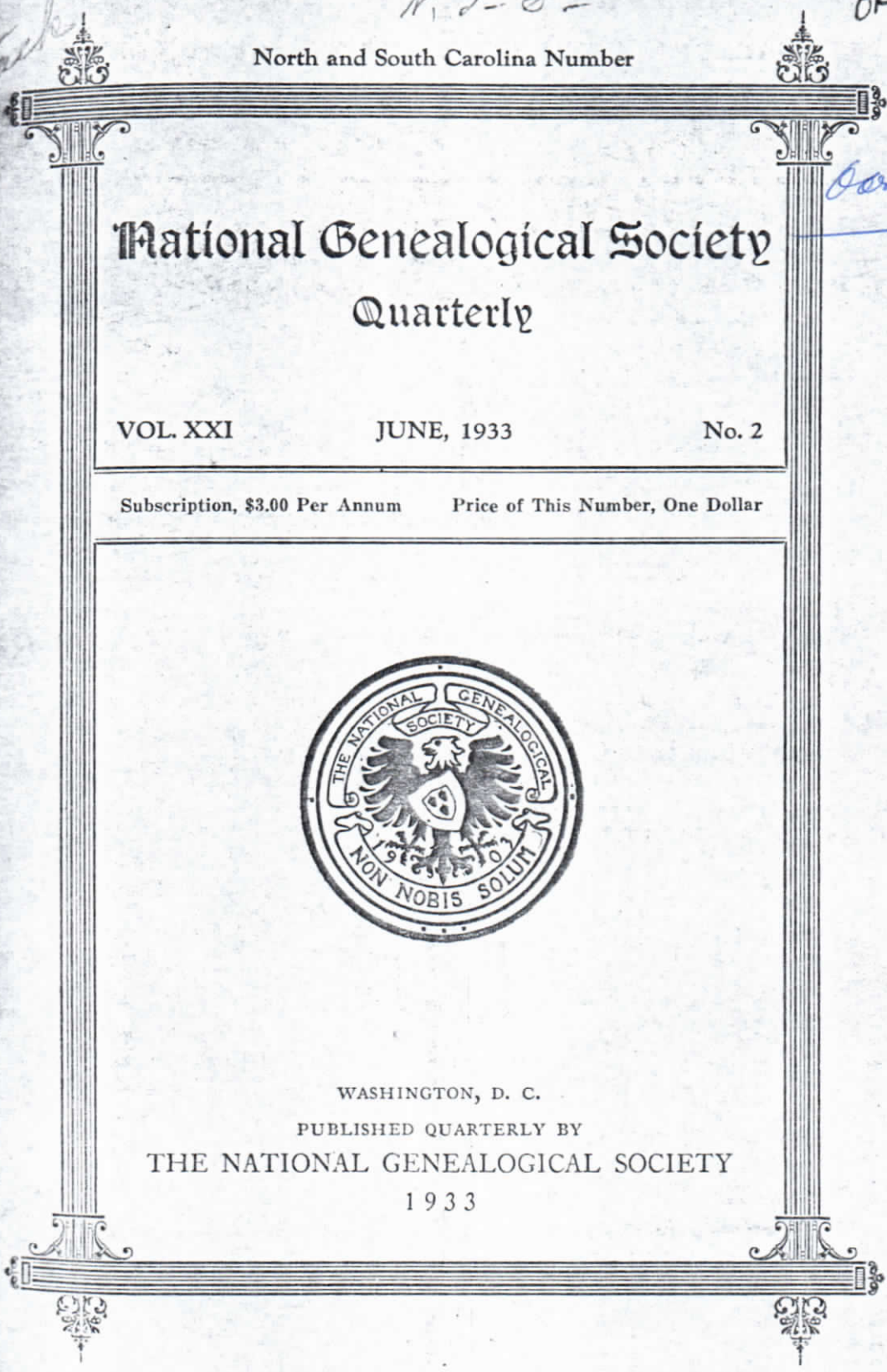

REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS BURIED IN NORTHWESTERN SOUTH CAROLINA

(Data concerning them found in Pension papers

Abstracted by RUTH W. WICKWARE AND JEAN STEPHENSON)

Of the Revolutionary soldiers mentioned in *South Carolina's Last Large Frontier*, the following appear in the Pension List of 1840:

CUMMINS, HARMON—(S-21701). He applied for a pension 25 March, 1819, while living in Pendleton District, S. C., and made supplementary statement Sept. 11, 1833. In spring of 1776 he enlisted at Sharpsburg, Frederick (now Washington) Co., Md., within three miles of where he then lived; in Capt. Cochran's Company, 8th Virginia Line, under Col. P. Muhlenberg; marched to Shepherdstown, Fredericksburg, Williamsburg; the 8th Regiment was then sent to Carolina, and he was attached to 1st Virginia Infantry commanded by General Mercer and Major Flemming; marched to Baltimore, crossed the Delaware, was in battle of Trenton; taken prisoner at Germantown where he was wounded in leg; in prison in Philadelphia about six months, then taken to New York for six weeks, then to Elizabeth Point, N. J., where he was exchanged for a Hessian; joined his regiment and was discharged in New Jersey. Returned home and moved to Virginia. Major Flemming was killed at Princetown, and General Mercer fatally wounded.

John James, planter, stated he and Harmon Cummins were raised together in Frederick Co., Md.; that he was in the Virginia Line.

Col. Joseph Grisham, Peter Keys, Esq., *Major Lewis*, and John Brice stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier. (Cert. 16.027, 23.083).

DAY, WILLIAM—(S-39416). He applied for a pension Oct. 26, 1820, while living in Pendleton District. Was then 64 years old. Enlisted with Lieut. George Holland, Captain Hawkins Co., 14th Regiment Va. Line, commanded by Col. Lewis; after six months transferred to 5th Regiment under Col. Parker, and during the next twelve months was at Brandywine, Germantown and Monmouth; then in 3rd Va. Line; sent from Philadelphia to convey prisoners to Fredericktown, Md. under Col. Webb, and, as enlistment of three years had expired, was discharged there. Was wounded in back during service. Wife was dead. Family consisted of son Reuben, aged 16, son Lewis, aged 14.

James Gains of Abbeville Dist., and *William Irby* of Laurens, stated they served with William Day in Continental Establishment.

Cert. 5557. Letter dated 1837 forwarded vouchers for pensions of

EVANS, PHILIP—(W-5272-BLWT 19727-160-155). He applied for a pension Dec. 1, 1833, while living in Greenville Dist., S. C. Was born Rowan Co., N. C. June 17, 1759; while a boy moved to Surry Co., N. C., where at age of 18 was drafted to company of Capt. Henry Smith, Col. Francis Locke, brigade of General Rutherford; marched to Salisbury, N. C., then to Purisburg, S. C., then at Lester's Ferry on Savannah River, a magazine called White House, and at Turkey Hill, where, 6 months being up, he was discharged April 10, 1779. Gives his discharge. Was in several short tours against Tories under Capt. Robert Hill. Volunteered in Surry Co. August or Sept. 1780; under Capt. Minor Smith, Major Joseph Winston, Col. Benjamin Cleveland; at Cryder's Fort (in Wilkes Co.?) injured by fall from horse and was dismissed, but on recovery joined Co. at Morgantown and guarded prisoners taken at Kings Mountain, some of whom were carried to Guilford Jail. In Dec. 1780, volunteered in militia commanded by Capt. Samuel Hampton, which at Lincoln, N. C. joined Col. Joshua (in another place stated Joseph) McDowell; marched to Pacolet River, Spartanburg, S. C., joined Gen. Morgan, was at Cowpens. Had lived in Greenville Dist. forty four years.

James Douthitt, a clergyman, and Jeremiah Cleveland stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier. He died June 19, 1849.

Gracey Evans, on Nov. 10, 1853, was living in Anderson Dist., S. C. Was 66 years of age last August, the widow of Philip Evans; married to him by Rev. Robert King, a Baptist minister, in Anderson Dist. Nov. 11, 1838, she being at the time a widow, Gracey Holland. Application for bounty land May 15, 1855, shows her maiden name was Grace King.

On Nov. 11, 1853, Robert King testified he performed the ceremony, and Francis King stated he witnessed it.

Philip Evans cert. 23.583, issued Mar. 6, 1834. Gracey Evans cert. 3230, issued Dec. 15, 1853.

GRANT, WILLIAM—(W-1757). He applied for pension March 1835, while living in Anderson Dist., S. C. Born Augusta Co., Va. Aug. 3, 1761, as recorded in father's old prayer book, now in his possession. Lived during war on Pacolet River, near Pinckneyville, in what is now Union Dist., S. C. 1st tour: Nov. 1779, volunteer in Minute service in Spartan Regiment of Union Dist., under Capt. Joseph McJenkins, Lieut. Col. Stein, Col. Brandon's Regiment, stationed 10 miles from Charleston until March 10, 1780. 2nd tour: Nov. 1780, called out under Capt. William Grant, Major Joseph McJenkins, Col. Thomas Brandon, ordered to Fooses Ford. At Blackstock an engagement and General Sumter was wounded, so all scattered and went home. 3rd tour: Nov. 1780, appointed 1st Lieut. in Capt. William Grant's Co. by Col. Thomas Brandon; joined Gen. Morgan at Grindal Shoals, Pacolet River; was a volunteer under Col. William Washington at Hammond's Old Store; was at Cowpens; went to Rutherford, Sherrill's Ford on Catawba River, and nearly to Yadkin. 4th tour: Spring of 1781, called out by Gen. Sumter; Capt. Grant was then at Neill's Mills so he as Lieut. gathered volunteers and went with Col. Brandon to

where took 80 Tories and some British under Col. Fisher; was sent home to raise men, did so and joined Capt. Jolley of Col. Brandon's Regt.; went to siege of Ninety-Six. 5th tour: August 1781, called on to raise men to join Gen. Greene, went to Ancrum's Old Place, where joined Col. Lee's Corps under Major Jolley; was taken sick, left in charge of sick there; finally went home, was sick all winter. 6th tour: Spring of 1782, as lieut. under Major Fair was on guard at Orangeburg. 7th tour: About July 1, 1782, as lieut. in Capt. Grant's Co., under Major Jolley ordered by Gen. Pickens to Bacon's Bridge. Major Jolley died soon after return.

Joseph McJenkins of Pickens Dist., S. C., on Nov. 10, 1834, stated he was Captain in Second Spartan Regiment of S. C. Militia, under Col. Thomas Brandon in Nov. 1779, and testified to William Grant's services.

Aaron Guyton on March 2, 1835, testified to Grant's service and that of Major Joseph McJenkins. In letter, Joseph Grisham mentions Captain Aaron Guyton. Grant mentions *John Harris*, Esq., and Col. *John C. Kilpatrick*, as Revolutionary soldiers. Sanford Vandiver, clergyman of Anderson Dist., John Harris, Esq., and Miles Norton all testify to reputation of Grant. Certified copy of indents nos. 2331 and 2837 filed.

Mrs. Mary Grant, of Pickens Dist., June 29, 1853, stated: she was about 70 years of age, maiden name was Mary Burchfield, married William Grant June 5, 1803, in Pendleton Dist., now Pickens Dist., that William Grant died Aug. 28, 1851. Dicy Burchfield, of Pickens Dist., July 23, 1853, stated she witnessed the marriage, which was performed by Rev. Charles Rice. John Maxwell, aged about 61, testified to marriage and gave children's names. Tilman C. Magee and Lucinda Magee, both aged about 53 years, had known Grant for 30 years prior to his death. Children, according to Maxwell, were: William; Richard G.; Celia, wife of James Forrester; Catherine (now deceased); and Noah. Will of Mary Grant, dated Jan. 22, 1859, pro. July 6, 1863, mentions William; Celia, wife of James Forrester; Dannelly; Noah. Exe. Noah Grant and John S. Lart. Wit.: B. E. Seaborn, S. F. Miller, and G. L. Brown. She died March 25, 1863. On Oct. 7, 1867, Noah Grant stated he and Celia Forrester were only heirs of Mary Grant. Celia Forrester, in Habersham Co., Ga., Aug. 23, 1867, made statement regarding loyalty. Noah Grant of Pickens Co., S. C. took oath of allegiance Aug. 25, 1866, at that time aged 48. Stephen Baldwin, aged 65, and G. W. Fielding, aged 63, made affidavit to support Noah's statements.

Letter, June 10, 1856, from Solomon King, mentions Mary, widow of William Grant, No. 90973, and Sarah, widow of *William Entrekin*, No. 90970.

GUYTON, AARON—(W-21237 BLWT 36605-160-55). He applied for pension Oct. 1, 1833, while living in Anderson Dist., S. C.; born Oct. 27, 1761, Baltimore Co., Md., record in Bible taken from his father's family Bible; was a resident of 96th Dist. (now Union District on Broad River), S. C., during the War; moved to Pendleton Dist. (now Anderson) in 1796, and has lived there ever since.

Gives services in great detail: 1779 volunteer under Captain Jeffrey

of Union Dist., S. C.; in March or April called out under Captain James Steen, under Col. Wafford, marched to Augusta, to Ogeechee, then joined General Lincoln at Parker's Ferry on Edisto, was at Stono on June 20, when Lac Bullock was Major; in 1780 drafted under Capt. Moses Guyton, Major Lack Bullock, joined General Wilkenson in Georgia; after fall of Charleston served under various officers, Colonel Brandon, Hays, Robuck, etc.; in 1780 company joined General Morgan and Col. Washington of the cavalry near Pacolet River, and marched to Bush River against Tories; in 1781 joined Col. John Thompson's company and after Cowpens followed British to Catawba River; in 1781 joined General Greene's army, then under Captain Montgomery, of Col. Brandon's Regiment; August 1781 called out under Col. Pinckney, Major Jolly, Captain Robert Montgomery, served at Eutaw. Can testify to service, Major Milwee and William Grant. Well known to General J. B. Earle, Col. Hammond, Major McCann, Doctor William Anderson, Rev. James Douthit, Rev. James Hambree, Rev. James Burroughs, Rev. Sanford Vandever, and General Whitner.

On Aug. 1, 1833 Hugh Wilson and Sanford Vandiver made usual statement that Aaron Guyton was reputed to have served in Revolution.

Others mentioned in connection with his service: Col. Lease, Adjutant John Montgomery, Major Ben Jolly, Major Anderson.

Aaron Guyton died June 30, 1841. Subsequently the widow received a pension. She was still living Sept. 25, 1860, in Anderson District, S. C.

Joseph Guyton, member of Baptist Church in good standing, living in Union Dist., S. C., Nov. 24, 1845, stated his elder brother Aaron Guyton md. Margaret McCurdy October 1789, that he was not at wedding, but brother left home to be married and returned next day with his wife and their father gave an infare dinner; that he was born 1776.

Statement made by *General John W. Guyton*, son of Aaron and Margaret, in which he referred to his cousin William Guyton.

HUBBARD, WILLIAM—(S-21310, BLWT 36728-160-55). He applied for pension Mar. 4, 1833, while living in Anderson Dist., S. C. Born Halifax Co., Va. moved to Guilford Co., N. C. while young, then to Anderson Co., S. C. about 1792. In his 16th year, while in Guilford, drafted in Capt. Campbell's Co., Col. Martin, Gen. Lincoln, marched to Charleston, served four months. Attached himself to Capt. Oldham's Co., Col. Moore, Gen. Butler, served forty days. Attached himself to Capt. McDow's scouting party, served three months. Attached himself to Capt. Peter O'Neall's Co., Col. William O'Nealle, three months. Substituted himself for Deunk [?] Rogers, served six weeks. Stated William Magee and William Robinson were acquainted with him, etc. George Oldham stated he had known him since a boy, and testified to services.

Nov. 23, 1835, William Hubbard made affidavit as to his services, stating he was in his 74th year. Witnessed by J. M. Smith and Hester Ann Smith. Entered 12.670 on S. C. Roll, May 17, 1833.

HUGHES, WILLIAM—(S-21311). He applied for pension Oct. 6, 1834, while living in Pickens Dist., S. C. Born near Georgetown, Md. Oct. 14, 1758; record of his age in family Bible in Newberry, S. C., where his father moved when he was seven or eight years old; that he lived in Newberry until 1805, when he moved to Pendleton, now Pickens Dist. At age of 16 entered service at Newberry as volunteer in Capt. Thomas Duggan's Co., one of lieutenants being Carey, served under Lieut. Col. Handy (or Hardy) McCreary, Col. Williams, Gen. Williamson, in the Florida Expedition; marched to Augusta, Midway, Sunbury, Cherokee Hill, St. Tilley, St. Marys, into Florida, remained there a few days and returned home, in all nearly four months. In 1776 or 1777 volunteered under Capt. Duggan; marched to Brown's Station in Reedy River, near Tumbling Shoals, to guard frontier; four months. Spring of 1779, volunteered under Capt. Carey, Lieut. John Bergin, Col. Hays; joined Gen. Pickens in Mobley Settlement, Fairfield Dist., and on to Ninety-Six, dismissed; three months. Enlisted same year under Capt. McCracken, Col. Smith, marched to Orangeburg, S. C., Ashepoo, and Bacon's Bridge, where they joined Gen. Greene; three and one-half months, getting home about time British evacuated Charleston. Volunteered under Capt. Stark, Col. Casey to go against Tories, went down Bush River toward Augusta, and up and down Saluda River, most of the Tories being on Bush River; served six months. Out subsequently for short periods. Always "found" his own horse and clothes. *Benjamin Neighbors* was with him in Florida Expedition.

Cert. issued Oct. 22, 1835, 30.224. Wrote letter Sept. 7, 1835, signed by mark, witnessed by Carter Clayton, requesting pension cert. be forwarded to Col. Joseph Grisham, Falls, S. C.

McMAHAN, ARCHIBALD—(W-21779). He applied for pension Mar. 14, 1833, while living in Pickens Dist., S. C. Was told he was born in Lancaster, Penn.; has no record of birth, is upward of 70 years, lived in Orange Co., N. C., moved to Greenville Dist., S. C., then to Pickens, where has lived between twenty and thirty years. Volunteered before he was old enough to be drafted, in Orange Co., N. C. for three months, under Capt. William Morrow, Major Hugh Fenin, Col. Thomas Taylor; marched to Cathies Fort, returned to Hillsborough. Later his two brothers and himself were drafted but he hired *Joel Ramsay* as substitute. Drafted again, stationed at Hillsborough, captured, carried to Wilmington, kept on prison ship there three or four weeks, then sailed to Charlestown, put on prison ship *Ark*, Capt. Chapman, commander; kept prisoner 14 months, during which time Col. Lytle came aboard once and gave him and several others a blanket each; saw Col. Washington on quarterdeck and was told he was a prisoner. When dismissed from ship was given a passport to Gen. Greene's headquarters. No further services were required of him.

James Douthitt, clergyman of Anderson Dist., and John Causler stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier. Henry Pariss of Pickens Dist., and James Payne of Greenville Dist., said they knew he was in the Revolution and taken prisoner. William Payne of Greenville Dist. stated he (Payne) hired a substitute, *William Strawn*, who was taken prisoner with McMahan.

Certified copy from Comptroller of Public Accounts for N. C. of entry covering payment for military service to Archibald McMahan, appearing in Book of Payments No. 8, p. 17. Pension cert. dated May 17, 1833. He died May 26, 1841.

Mrs. Ann McMahan, aged about 80, of Pickens Co., S. C. on Feb. 15, 1845, stated she was Ann Payne before her marriage which took place in Greenville Dist., S.C. August 13, she believes 1791 or 1792, ceremony performed by Robert Maxwell, Esq., at Maxwell's house in presence of his family, her sister and her brother-in-law.

Thomas Payne, of Greenville Dist., stated, Sept. 7, 1845, he had known Ann McMahan for 65 years, witnessed her marriage in late summer of 1791, and that his father had moved that spring from Orange Co., N. C. to Greenville Dist.

James West, Greenville Dist., Sept. 17, 1845, stated he was a boy at time of marriage of Archibald McMahan and Ann Payne, by Robert Maxwell, and believes it was 1790 or 1791, as his two twin brothers were at their mother's breast, and they were four years younger than his two twin sisters who are now in their 62nd year, and he had a brother between the sets of twins.

Aaron Payne of Greenville Dist., Oct. 2, 1845, stated he was a cousin of Mrs. Ann McMahan. knew her husband in North Carolina.

riage was March 5, 1795, her first son born Dec. 21, 1795, and McMahon and his wife had three children at time of her marriage and their fourth, Prudence, was born June of that year, 1795.

Joshua Thompson, Greenville Dist., Oct. 2, 1845, stated he had a lease from Jacob Capehart for his land where he lived a mile from McMahon, that it was prior to his purchase, the deeds to which, one from Blasingame and one from Ham, are dated April and August, 1792, and Archibald McMahon was then living with his wife Ann, now his widow.

John Buckner Smith; Pickens Dist., Sept. 13, 1845, stated he had known Archibald McMahon and Ann Payne in North Carolina, that when he and his wife moved to Greenville Dist. 1792, found they were married and was told they had been married a year previous, and they then had one child.

Henry Paris, Anderson Dist. Sept. 24, 1845, stated he formerly lived in N. C., and moved to Greenville, S. C. with Thomas Payne, father of Mrs. Ann McMahon of Pickens Dist.; that Archibald McMahon drove the waggon in which Payne moved, and shortly afterwards married Ann. That his, Paris' daughter, Mrs. Cobb with whom he lives, was then four years old, and is now fifty-nine.

McMAHON, PETER—(W-21782). He applied for a pension Oct. 2, 1833, while living in Anderson Dist., S. C. Was born in March after Braddock's defeat, and so now 78 years old; moved to Abbeville Dist., S. C. when a boy; served in Revolution from that District; served under Captain John Purvis, Col. Thompson.

Sanford Vandiver, clergyman, and James McKinney of Anderson Dist., stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier. *Benjamin Smith* said he had known him before and during his service, was at Ninety-Six with him. *John Warnock* said he served with him.

On May 6, 1848, Susannah McMahon stated she was 83 years old, the widow of Peter McMahon, a pensioner at time of his death on Aug. 4, 1845 in Anderson Dist., S. C.; that she was married to him Oct. 6, 1783, by Squire Moore who then lived in Cambridge, Abbeville Dist.

On May 13, 1848, William Hubbard stated he was 86 according to his family record, that he was present at the marriage of Peter McMahon and Susannah Slator in October 1783, that he was married himself the following year according to his family record which he showed the court.

MORTON, DAVID—(S-21380). He applied for pension in 1832, while living in Greenville Dist., S. C. Born in Ireland, Feb. 28, 1761, moved to this country Jan. 1, 1769. Volunteered in Spartansburg Dist. where he then lived, in 1780, five days after battle of Musgrove's Mill, Lieut. Samuel Peaden, and he thinks Capt. Thomas Hanner; marched to Mecklenburg Co., N. C., joined Gen. Sumter. When Sumter retreated his company left Sumter at Island Ford, crossed the Catawba twice, then the Broad, joined Col. Clark and he thinks Col. Shelby at Cowpens, thence marched to Kings Mountain. After this battle guarded prisoners, then joined Sumter's forces between Enoree and Saluda Rivers, rendezvoused with Sumter at Dutch Fork until battle of Blackstock, in which Sumter

was wounded. Marched up country and camped between Forest Creek and Tygar or Packolett Rivers, pursued Tories to Block House, then joined Gen. Morgan at Grindle Shoals. Was then under Col. Ira Thomas. Was in Battle of Cowpens. Entered service in Col. Roebuck's Regiment, and guarded frontier, for six months. Then in Col. White's Regiment for six months, late in 1781. Had been steadily in service for eighteen months from August 1780 to February or March 1782. Stated *John Collins*, *William Caldwell*, *Alexander Peden*, and *James Alexander* served with him. Mentioned co. at Blackstock's commanded by Capt. James Smith.

Alexander Peden, Greenville Dist. Sept. 8, 1834, stated he knew Morton in his youth and was with him in 1780 under Col. John Thomas, and also in 1781. *James Alexander*, Greenville Dist., Sept. 15, 1834, stated he served in Revolution with David Morton, and knew he served under Col. John Thomas in 1780, under Col. Benjamin Roebuck in 1781, and under Col. Whight and other officers until spring of 1782. *John Collins*, Greenville Dist., Sept. 18, 1834, stated he served with Morton, and after Cowpens had seen him with Gen. Pickens' party. *William Caldwell*, Sept. 8, 1834, testified to Morton's service.

In 1832, Thos. Hutchings, clergyman, and Micajah Berry, both of Greenville Dist. stated David Morton was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier.

Copy of Indent No. 217, Liber O, filed. Letter of transmittal states it enclosed account of *William Goodlett* and *George Salmon*. Cert. issued July 25, 1835 (SC 29784).

Filed in this case is a letter from Theo. Litte, Morristown, N. J., July 31, 1854, inquiring for heirs of *David Morton*, a Revolutionary soldier whether pension had been granted him. He enlisted in New York; had died about 1843.

PHILLIPS, LEVI—(S-39011). He applied for pension May 15, 1818, while living in Greenville Dist., S. C. Enlisted for three years at Leesburgh, Va., 1777, Captain Calameese or Catlet, 2nd Va. Line, Lieut. Crawford, Lieut. Roy Gill, Col. Fechecker (or Fehecker), Gen. Weeden; at Battles of Brandywine, Germantown, and Monmouth, drafted as artilleryman to go south; was at Hanging Rock, S. C.; joined Gen. Greene's army; discharged at Camden, S. C., by Capt. Stokes. Sent discharge to Richmond by Whitlock to get bounty. For last three years resident of Pendleton Dist.

Robert Clanahan and *Jacob Jones* stated they served in Revolution with him. *John Nichols* and *David Kitchen* testified as to his character. He was placed on roll under cert. 16028.

In Oct. 27, 1820, Levi Phillips, of Pendleton Dist., being then 70 years old, gave a schedule of property, which included 120 acres; wife Barbara, aged 60; children: Sarah, 25; Barbara, 23; Malinda, 22; Nancy, 20; Malissa, 18; Polly, 14; George, 10. Stricken from list because of property. Restored Dec. 26, 1827.

SADLER, DAVID—(S-9471). He applied for pension Mar. 6, 1833, while living in Anderson Co., S. C. Born in Denmark, Va. Aug. 21, 1760.

record being taken from a copy he made from his father's family Bible; moved when a boy to York Co., S. C. In 1779, when 16 years 4 months old, drafted under Lieut. Hemphill, marched to Bacon's Bridge, joined Gen. Williamson, three months. 2nd tour: Immediately after served another three months, ending with battle of Stono; was at Mobley's Meeting House, Col. Neill; near Col. Bratton's fought Tories under Hook who was killed. Volunteered under Capt. McClure in summer of 1780, joined Sumter; attacked at Fish Dam Ford in night and retreated; Sumter wounded in shoulder next day; was at Williamson's Plantation, Rocky Mount, that day week at Hanging Rock, where McClure was killed; at Granby, at little fort on Buckhead; crossed the Santee after Sumter's wife; ambushed near Wright's Bluff; went home but returned; was with Sumter as long as he had a camp.

Sanford Vandiver, clergyman, and James Thompson stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier.

Copy filed of Indent, which Sadler authorized Henry Leech to receive on Apr. 12, 1785. It shows service 1780, 1781, 1782, under Col. Bratton, Capt. McConnett, Capt. John Wallace, Capt. Hanna, and Lieut. Ashe.

Cert. 23.977 issued Apr. 8, 1834. There is an order to pay it dated Oct. 11, 1847.

VERNER, JOHN—(S-7793). He applied for pension Mar. 11, 1833, while living in Pickens Dist., S. C., aged 70 years. Born Granville Co., N. C. When 10 years old his father moved to Abbeville, S. C. In 1787 he moved to Pendleton Dist., now Pickens Dist. Spring of 1778 went to McGowen's Block House in Abbeville Co., 15 miles from where he lived under Capt. Anderson; Fall of 1778, under Capt. William Wilson, went to Coleman's Fort, Elbert Co., Ga.; each time was a substitute for his brother *Daniel Verner*. Volunteered, 1780, under Col. Andrew Pickens, went to Grindle Shoals, Pacalect River, joined Gen. Morgan; was at Cowpens; marched back to Abbeville, had smallpox. Marched to Ninety-Six, under Capt. Robert Caruthers, then to guard the frontier. Volunteered under Capt. John Norwood; was with him when Masterson and Andy Neil were killed. Discharged about 1782.

Alexander White, Pickens Dist., Oct. 7, 1833, stated he was born, according to his father's record, in 1765, lived with father, William White, in Abbeville Dist. during the War; all the Verners were Whigs. Statement sworn to before Charles I. Verner.

John Cobb, clergyman, stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier, Col. Joseph Grisham in letter July 1, 1834, says Verner got less than *Bart Moore*, who found his own horse; that Verner was for over forty years a magistrate for his district.

Copy of Indent No. 102, from Comptroller's Office, filed. It is dated June 6, 1785, to Mr. John Verner, Jr., mentions service with Col. Anderson. Cert. No. 27869 issued June 24, 1834.

William Thompson, 3rd Regiment S. C. State Troops; discharged after twenty months because of a broken leg, in May 1777. Several tours against Indians, Capt. Wilson, Col. Pickens. Feb. 1779, captured by Tories near Rutledge Ford on Saluda River, escaped after Kettle Creek. March 1779 enlisted as waggoner, later pack-horseman, until August. Was at Stono and Ninety-Six. March 1, 1781, to Oct. 1, 1781, was private under Capt. Wilson, Col. Pickens.

Peter McMahan stated May 15, 1834, he served with Warnock in Thompson's Regiment.

William McGee, James Thornb—[?], Amaziah Rice, William Acker, Hezekiah Rice, and Nathan McAllister, stated he was reputed to be a Revolutionary soldier.

Mrs. Eleanor Warnock, Anderson Dist., S. C., Feb. 10, 1845, aged 77, Sept. 3, last, stated she lived in York Dist. during War, until her father moved to this District; that she was daughter of Robert Dowdle, was married to John Warnock in Abbeville Dist., by a Presbyterian minister named Hales, Jan. 31, 1786. John Warnock died in Abbeville Dist. May 28, 1842. William Smith, on July 24, 1845, aged 70, stated he had known John and Eleanor Warnock before their marriage. William Vandiver stated he was a small boy when his father moved to this District and settled near John Warnock.

Andrew N. McFall stated he had known John Warnock and family for thirty-five years. Samuel R. McFale stated he married a daughter of John and Eleanor Warnock about twenty years ago, and the family record was in the handwriting of John Warnock. Family record torn from Bible and submitted:

Ash, marched to Augusta, Ga., in battle of Brier Creek, Ga. then to two sisters, where discharged. 3rd tour: Volunteer for two months in horse service, Capt. James Crump, Cols. Ledbetter and Davidson. Volunteered under Capt. George Hamilton against Tories on Yadkin for ten days. Suggested as character witnesses: Col. John Easley, Mr. Samuel A. Easley, John H. Rosamond, and John Smith.

George Adams and *Andrew Hughes*, both of Pickens Dist., in Sept. 1832, stated they had served with Wilson in Revolution, Adams mentioning the nine months and two months tours.
