John Candor McLaughlin, born March 1794 and died December 1838, married Margaret Pharr, daughter of Ephraim Pharr and his wife, Jane Smith, marriage on 16 February 1814 and had Eliza McLaughlin, who married Robert Bass Livingston, Jane who married first a Quinn, then a Bramlet and then a Mitchell; John Torrence McLaughlin, who married Mary Frances Lee; Amanda, who married Isaac Wood, of Rome, Georgia, and Margaret, who on the death of her sister, also married Isaac Wood. Roert Bass Livingston and Eliza McLaughlin had John Wesley Livingston, killed at Spottsylvania Courthouse, Virginia, in the Confederate Army 10 May 1864; Octavia, born 11 September 1835, died 5 November 1873; Serepta, born 7 August 1833, married James Glenn Shockley and died 30 December 1862, leaving a daughter Eppie; and Allie Margaret Livingston.

Allie Margaret Livingston, born 17 June 1845, died 15 April 1918, married Dr. Amos Campbell Whitfield Travis May 2, 1866, leaving

issue John Livingston, William Darricott and Robert Jesse.

John Livingston Travis, born 25 September 1868, married Anna Morrison; Dr. William Darracott Travis, born 21 November 1870, married Maud Bomar and had Allie Louise and William Bomar Travis; General Robt. Jesse Travis, born 13 January 1877, married Rena Falligant and had Lt. Robt. Falligant Travis, A. C., U. S. A., Lt. William Livingston Travis, A. C., U. S. Norsworthy.--Mr. Tristram Norsworthy in 1639 was one of the first Burgesses or Representatives from Upper Norfolk or Nansemond County, Virginia, to the Virginia Assembly. On September 29, 1645, and on March 18, 1650, he was mentioned as possessing land in Isle of Wight County (Nugent, "Cavaliers and Pioneers"). Unfortunately all the early records of Nansemond County have been totally destroyed, and it is impossible to trace successfully some branches of this family. However, an examination of the records of Isle of Wight County seems to offer a fairly accurate solution of the problem. In 1672 Col. Robert Pitt, formerly a merchant of Bristol, England, made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, and in it mentioned a daughter Elizabeth Norsworthy. It is possible that she was the wife of Tristram Norsworthy. The probable children were 1, Martha Norsworthy married a Boyd. 2. John Norsworthy. 3. William Norsworthy. 4. Elizabeth Norsworthy, married Joseph Bridger, the "disinherited," of Isle of Wight County, Virginia, 5. Tristram Norsworthy Jr. 6. George Norsworthy. George Norsworthy must have lived in Nansemond County, Virginia, for no will of his appears in Isle of Wight County. From various records he appears to have had six children. 1. Martha Norsworthy, who married

a Baker. 2. Thomas Norsworthy. 3. Charles Norsworthy. 4. John Norsworthy. 5. Julian Norsworthy. 6. A daughter married to Humphrey Marshall. William Norsworthy made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on August 10, 1707, and it was probated on December 9, 1707 (Book 2, p. 485), mentioning 1. George Norsworthy, brother. 2. Thomas Norsworthy, son of George Norsworthy, nephew. 3. Julian Norsworthy, daughter of George Norsworthy, niece. 4. Martha Norsworthy, daughter of George Norsworthy, niece. 5, Martha Boyd, sister and witness. 6. George Norsworthy, nephew in England, son of Tristram Norsworthy, 7, John Norsworthy, son of George Norsworthy, nephew and witness. 8. John Pitt, witness. Tristram Norsworthy made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on March 5, 1709-10, in Newport Parish (Great Book 2, p. 167). His inventory appeared on page 186 of the same. He left 1. George Norsworthy, youngest son, 2. John Norsworthy, second son. 3. Tristram Norsworthy, eldest son, to receive the home plantation. He was evidently under eighten at the time of his father's death. 4. Sarah Norsworthy, daughter. 5. Elizabeth Norsworthy, daughter. 6. Frances Norsworthy, daughter. 7. Martha Norsworthy, worthy, daughter. 8. John Norsworthy, overseer. 9. George Norsworthy, overseer. 10. Sarah Norsworthy, wife. She was the daughter of Col. John Pitt, who made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, in 1702. Capt. George Norsworthy, son of Tristram and Sarah Norsworthy, married first Elizabeth Bridger, daughter of Col. Samuel Bridger, and secondly Christian Exum, daughter of Jeremiah and Ann Exum. His will was made in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on December 4, 1724 (Great Book 2, p. 173), mentioning 1. Christian Norsworthy, wife. 2. George Norsworthy, son. 3. Elizabeth Norsworthy, daughter. 4. Elizabeth Bridger, grandmother of his children Martha and Elizabeth Norsworthy. 5. Martha Norsworthy, daughter. 6. Christian Norsworthy, daughter. Z. William Scott, brother-in-law. The widow Christian Norsworthy made her will in Isle of Wight County on November 16, 1727, and it was probated on November 26, 1727 (Book 3, p. 50), mentioning 1. George Norsworthy, son. 2. Christian Norsworthy, daughter. 3. Elizabeth Norsworthy, daughter-in-law (stepdaughter). 4. Martha Norsworthy, daughter-in-law (step-daughter). 5. Christian Outland, cousin (niece). 6. Elizabeth Scott, cousin (niece). 7. William Scott, brother-in-law and executor. Thomas Norsworthy, son of George Norsworthy, made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on July 3, 1723, and it was probated on October 29, 1723 (Great Book 2, p. 141), mentioning 1. Elizabeth Norsworthy, daughter of John Norsworthy, brother. 2. John Norsworthy, brother. 3. Leah Norsworthy, cousin (niece). She was a daughter of John Norworthy. 4. Julian Norsworthy, daughter of brother John Norsworthy, 5. John Marshall, son of Humphrey Marshall. He was a brother-in-law, 6. Martha Baker, niece. 7. Martha Baker, sister. 8. Charles Norsworthy, brother and executor. Charles Norsworthy, son of George Norsworthy, made his will in Isle of Wight County, Virginia, on November 17, 1734, and it was probated on June 23, 1735 (Book 4, p. 69), mentioning 1. Ann Norsworthy, wife. 2. Charles Norsworthy, eldest son, received a silver-hilted sword. 3. Thomas Norsworthy, second son. 4. George Norsworthy, third son. 5. Ann Norsworthy, daughter, 6. A child unborn.—Hugh B. Johnston, Jr., Wilson, North Carolina.
