

Early HOLLYMAN Marriages.

Locations as yet,unknown

Before the year 1733.

Due to the loss of many of the pages which comprise the parish registers of St Andrews,Clevedon,plus the,as yet undiscovered locations of other marriages,we may never know the maiden names of the partners concerned. Only extensive searches will reveal them.

John Hollyman the elder married his first wife,RACHAEL some time during or before 1698.They were not married at St Michaels in Clapton nor Yatton.

John Hollyman,the same as above married Ann his second wife some time after he lost Rachael who died in 1700.A perusal of St John parish register at Westbury on Trym failed to reveal and Hollyman marriage niether was there one in the next parish,that of Henbury.It is probable that they married in Clevedon,the record of which was lost.

Emmanuel Hollyman who married HANNAH possibly around 1707.I know he moved with his family to Backwell but with regards to where he came from is not known.Although he lived for a time at Clapton Court,there is no mention of any Hollyman marriage except for Phoebe Hollyman with Mr A.Gregorie.

Oswald Hollyman the son of Roger and Rachael must I feel have married in Clevedon around the year 1729. He moved to Clevedon in most likely his early teens for by that time,his uncle John (elder)was well and truly established.

John Hollyman who was the elder's eldest son married MARTHA qyite possibly in Clevedon round about the year 1732.

Hezekiah Hollyman the other son of the elder married ANN possibly in Clevedon around the year 1733,another of the lost parish records.

The only other marriage which I have failed to find is that of Thomas Hollyman who married Martha Phillips. It may be that they married in one of the parish churches of Bristol for it was in this city that many of the 'rural'Hollymans married.It has been thought that his wife was related to

Bessie Julia Hollyman who was born in the spring of 1864. For a time, she worked in the shop with her father until her marriage to Lewis Hallott in 1886. No further searches made.

Emily Marie Hollyman. Recorded in one location as, Mavis was born in 1865 and eventually married Walter Chatsworthy in 1890.

John Alfred or Alfred John Hollyman was their first son and he was born at 17 Tredegar street on April 4th 1866. He also became a baker and was most likely he who founded the Hollyman Bakery at Corporation road. He married Susannah whose maiden name I have yet to discover but she died in 1918.

Florence Harriet Hollyman or, as one census has recorded, Frances, was born during the first half of 1867: she was married in 1890 but it is not yet known to whom.

William Charles Hollyman Born in the spring of 1869, worked with his father according to the 1891 census returns. Nothing else known.

Reginald Hollyman. Born in 1873 and he too worked as a baker. (More later)

Charles Henry Hollyman was born in 1871 and that birth was registered in the September quarter. He worked as a printers compositor's apprentice. He married Louise Jane Murdock. (more later)

Lillian Hollyman was born in 1874 and became a dressmaker. I believe she married Walter H. Jeffries but she died before the Great War and her husband remarried the widow of her brother, Charles Henry, Louise Jane Hollyman nee Murdock by whom he had one daughter whom they named, Mary known as, Molly in 1919.

Robert Hollyman. Born in 1881 yet not mentioned in the 1881 census of the city for some reason. In the 1891 census he was, as a twelve year old schoolboy. I feel certain that he married a woman

years, they lived at 62 Princes street, Roath. It was here that Margaret died on the 15th of February 1959 and Arthur died just three days later it was said from a broken heart for they were very close to each other. More of Arthur later.

Alfred Henry Hollyman. Born December 9th 1885 in Cardiff was married to Edith Riorden and had three children all of whom reached adulthood. Alfred became a blacksmith and it is believed he had a very hard life and died prematurely aged 58 years old on August 24th 1943 during the war. At one period, they lived at Pengam in Cardiff and Kenfig Hill. The children were:-

Audrey Hollyman. born in 1913. Thelma Hollyman and a son, Alfred Leonard Hollyman born on November 20th 1919.

Edith, their mother, died on April 4th 1977.

Ernest Henry Hollyman. Born on November 29th 1887 worked as a coachbuilder for a Cardiff company when passenger vehicles were built by hand. He married Ethel and they spent much of their married life at 73 New Zealand road, Cardiff. They had two children:-

Arthur Hollyman who is believed to have settled in Wolverhampton and Kathleen Hollyman who now lives in Cornwall with her family.

Ernest Henry died on July 29th 1964.

William Adams Hollyman. The second to bear this name for the name, Adams comes from Ruth Adams who married John, their great grandfather who married in 1817. born on January 19th 1889. Prior to the Great War (1914-1918) William was a shipping clerk on the city of Cardiff docks but the greater part of his life was spent with the Welsh Board of Health. He used to tell about the fact that he was naturally left handed but at school, like hundreds of others both in Wales and England, that he was forced to write with his right hand by having his left hand tied behind his back. A common thing in those years.

Despite this stupid treatment, he developed a beautiful style of handwriting. He married Alice Maud Grinter at St Andrew's church, Cardiff on September 9th 1914. Alice was the daughter of Thomas Simeon Grinter, a stonemason who later became a housebuilder during the late 19th century. Thomas Grinter's line has been traced back many years to Martock, Somersetshire. Of this marriage, there was issue of one son:-

William Dennis Hollyman who was born in Cardiff in 1920. Because of the Second World War, he qualified as a Chartered Engineer and was able to pursue that profession in far off locations. He married Ludlow born Vera May Buckley in 1957 and by her, has three daughters:-

Jennifer, Claire and Valerie all of whom are now married with families of their own and living in Dinas Powis.

Dennis, as he is mostly known as, was put into contact with me from his enquiries of his 'roots' by the local vicar of the Somersetshire village from whence his grandfather was born. This was Abbots Leigh where Hollymans had settled in 1782. It is to Dennis that I owe much about his particular 'line' which emigrated to Cardiff during the last years of the 1880's.

Elizabeth Hollyman. Their first daughter was born on February 17th 1890 and became a dressmaker. She did not marry and lived out her life at 46 New Zealand road, a home which Alfred had ensured would be theirs for as long as they lived. Clearly a thoughtful and far sighted man and father.

Esther Hollyman. Born on April 13th 1892. She died aged 82 on March 18th 1974. She lived with her sisters in New Zealand road.

Edith Hollyman. Born on December 5th 1900 was also a dressmaker but did not enjoy good health and died aged 41 on September 29th 1941

Sidney James Hollyman. Born on October 29th 1893. Very little known about

Mary Hollyman. Baptised on February 6th 1871 and married William Parsons.

Their lineage is included in this study kindly provided by Mrs C. Parker who is a direct descendant living in Nailsea.

Elizabeth Hollyman. Baptised on June 12th 1782 married William Wilmott

Stokes in Bristol on September 8th 1804.

Sarah Hollyman. Sarah was the youngest daughter of Thomas and Martha baptised

on January 12th 1784. She married John Parsley of Portishead

in Clevedon on July 29th 1805. John became brother in law

to Sarah's brother John who married his sister, Sarah Parsley.

Hezekiah Hollyman. Known in later life as, Dr H. Hollyman medical officer for

health at St George's (Easton in Gordano). He was baptised

on January 9th 1786 and married Harriet, the youngest daughter

of Hannah who married his father and therefore, his stepmother.

He died aged thirty four and buried on May 22nd 1820 the year

his father died.

Of the marriage with Hannah, the widow of Thomas Wall, Thomas had issue of:-

William Hollyman who was born the year after the wedding and baptised in

Clevedon on December 22nd 1795. He became a builder of some

renown and very wealthy having built many houses and cottages

in Clevedon including what is known as the Grove in Walton

road. He married Ann the daughter of Samuel and Nancy Day of

Kewstoke in that parish on March 24th 1814. When William died

aged 59, he was buried on December 28th 1850 at the rear of

the church of St Andrews close to the pathway. Ann died at

the age of 74 and buried with her husband on March 27th 1869.

There is also a commemorative plaque inside the church to this

couple. But there was no issue from this union.

Emily Parsons. Born in 1846.Nothing else known.

Francis Parsons. Born in 1850.Nothing else known.

The Children on Sarah and David Harding.

Emma Maria Harding. Born in 1860 married Charles Tutty in 1883.Charles was born in 1856 and died in 1924.Emma outlived her husband by many years when she died in 1959 aged 99 years.

Alice Harding.It is not known exactly when she was born but she died aged twenty.Searches may be resumed at a later date.

Fanny Harding.Nothing known.

Sarah Ann Harding. As above

Lily Mabel Harding.Born in 1867 died in 1956 aged 89 years.Married to Mr A,J,Goodyer who also died in 1956.No issue.

The Children of Emma Maria and Charles Tutty.

Alice Mabel Tutty was born in 1884 and married Edward Jones born in 1887.

They married in 1911 and of this union,there was issue of:-

Lawrence Jones firstborn in 1914 but appears to have died an infant.

Douglas Donovan Jones was born in 1918 and married Margaret Mortimer in 1941.Margaret was born in 1921 and of this union,there was issue of:

Alan Edward Guthrie Jones born in 1942 and married Ann S.Tofts who was a year younger.

Brian Ellard Jones born in 1944 and married B.M.Wilshaw born in 1945.

Carol Ann Jones born in 1947 and married Robert Eric Parker.This event took place in 1968 and has issue of:-

Graham Eric Parker born in 1969:

Timothy John Parker born in 1971:

Albert William Hollyman. 1883 - 1918

The fifth child of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman was born in Cardiff in 1883. He was married to Gladys Gwendoline Lewis who was three years older than he. The marriage took place in the Salutation hotel Newport in 1906. Albert once lived at 141 Woodville road Cardiff in 1912-13 and that year, he moved to 63 Teharris street Roath. He became a member of the Cardiff Constabulary and after that a guardsman in the Grenadiers in 1914. Later, he joined the 1st Battalion Welsh Guards. (No. A.103 E 1652595) One of the many who did not return home from this war to end all wars. He died of pneumonia in France in 1918. Gladys Hollyman died in the September of 1966 aged 80.

Albert and Gladys had issue of a daughter and two sons. The daughter was:-
EDNA MAY HOLLYMAN who was born at 141 Woodville road, Cardiff on April 11th 1912. She married window dresser Peter Sydney Poole who worked for Wills's Tobacco Company. Sydney, as he was known was born in 1907 and died in 1960. Bob Mawson tells me that from his enquiries, Edna used to visit Nellie Hollyman her aunt every Wednesday afternoon at the Royal George hotel where they had long chats about the family. An elegant lady, she used to model furs in her youth for a Cardiff departmental store and on occasion met by chance actors Keiron Moore and Ronald Reagan who, as President of the USA is well known.

Her favourite pastimes were, knitting, crocheting, sewing, making lampshade covers and embroidering pictures. When she was living at Victoria Park, she would enjoy sitting in her front garden taking tea and listening to the band playing in the park.

In about 1972, she was diagnosed as having cancer but she recovered. Her next door neighbour was Christopher Morgan the BBC Wales newscaster who

John's full name was, Samuel John Pritchard and he was born in Yatton in 1874.

It is to his grand daughter Mary that I owe this contribution towards part of the history of Clevedon and its immediate environs. She was born in Hanwell, Middlesex in 1929 and married John Seabrook POULTER in 1950 when she was twenty one years old. They had two sons, Julian and Mark. Mark is married to Joyce Westwood and Julian to Prapaporn Tungsarote, a Thai girl and they live in Thailand.

Mary's husband died a few years ago and she lives in Gunnersbury Park, London.

Charles Henry Hollyman 1842 - 1895

The second son of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman nee Locke was born on March 21st 1842 and baptised into the church on April 17th the same year. It seems that before the age of fifteen, he migrated to Cardiff the city of his mother's birth. He joined the baptist chapel of Bethany at the age of sixteen and married there to Julia Marie Cole on January 19th 1893. At the time of his wedding he lived at number 16 Trinity street, Cardiff where he worked as a confectioner. Julia lived along the Canton road. Her father was John Cole once a carpenter. It may be that later, they opened a shop at 189 Bute road close to the railway. Although on the birth certificate of their son, also Charles Henry in 1870, his address was given as 185 Bute road which could have been an error. Incidentally, this son died the same year.

Julia died aged 40 years in 1881 after having so many children in almost as many years. Charles then remarried on the 9th of August, 1886 to a widow Mrs Priscilla Ponting Gow nee Monk who was two years older than he. One can see that as witnesses at his first wedding, his father, Reuben and the other a Mr John Anderson who lived to be one hundred years old. Although he was recorded as a great uncle, I must presume he would have been on Julia's side of the family. At his second wedding, his younger brother Robert James was in evidence and was to join him in his endeavours as a master baker. Mrs Ponting Gow now Mrs Hollyman was the daughter of Charles Monk, once a stone merchant who lived at 20 Castle road, Roath.

After all the searches of Charles Henry, it can be safely assumed it was his eldest son, Alfred who was to found the Hollyman Bakery at 64 Corporation road which suffered an untimely end during the Cardiff air raid on that city on January 2nd 1941.

But Charles Henry died in 1895 aged fifty three years. Of the union with Priscilla, there was no issue but of that with Julia there was issue of:-

Dear Mr Cooper,

I have recently received a cutting from a Bristol Newspaper about your work on the Hollyman family tree.This is a subject which has been 'on my list'ever since I retired over two years ago but to date have not made a start.

However,I do have some records and information which may be of interest to you.

1.Bible inscription.

"To Samuel Hollyman from his father, Henry Hollyman. 1852"

2.Family bible inscription.

"From Frances Huish to her children, Samuel & Martha Hollyman who were married on the 16th of March 1863"

The children of Samuel and Martha are listed.

Ada.	died.Sept. 3rd.1864.
Annie.	born.Feb. 23rd.1865.
Gertrude.	born.Feb. 20th.1867.
Emily.	born.Jan. 6th.1869.
Henry.	born.June 6th.1870.
George William.	born.Feb. 23rd.1874.
Louise.	born.June.18th.1876.

I have no contact with the descendants of any of the above other than those of Henry who was my Grandfather.

I know that George who had one son, Dennis remained in Clevedon. Annie married George Baker and they lived in Barry and had one son, George who did not have any children. Gertrude did not marry. Emily married an Ackrill and they have a daughter, Eileen who, I believe still live in the Bristol area.

Louise married a Mr Perry and they had two sons and one daughter.

I have no information on Samuel's father Henry except that his children included a daughter Louise who married a Moire and a son. George was born. Samuel and Martha lived in Culmstock cottage, Walton road Clevedon. The cottage still stands but the name has changed. I understand there is a book which contains a lot of information about the family, the title may be "History of Clevedon and Walton" but I am not sure of it.

In All Saints Church, Clevedon there are a number of the family graves, some of which you may have researched already.

We noted the following:-

William.	44 years Oct 1873.
Myra, wife.	42 years Aug 1872.
Nellie Beatrice.	9 months. Aug. 1870.
Annie Jane.	5 years 1863.

Writer's note.

With regard to the graves mentioned above, I fear that Henry C. Hollyman has been sadly misinformed for these graves are located in St Andrew's churchyard and that the name 'Nellie' should or rather, is Lily Beatrice.

These graves are nothing to do with Mr H.C. Hollyman's lineage other than the fact that William Hollyman was nephew to Henry Hollyman born in 1810 who was married to Sarah Arnels.

This line did descend from one, Sydenham Hollyman born in Puxton to whom we believe Mary Hollymans base born son, Samuel 'Durbin' who married Puxton born, Anne Wall.

The eldest son and second child of Reuben and his wife Rachael nee Foskett was born and baptised in Clapton in Gordano, in 1700. He married the daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Bave of Tickenham, Elizabeth Ann Mary who was also known as, Maria in around 1727-28. I have not found any record of this marriage. They lived in Tickenham where their seven children were brought up. Elizabeth died in 1744 the year their last child was born and was buried in the family vault in the Bave chapel in the parish church. She was just 35 years old. Her husband lived until the age of sixty three when he died on December 14th 1763. He was the local land assessor and was a yeoman farmer. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Hester Bave Hollyman the eldest was baptised on December 22nd 1729 which suggests her parents were married the same year. Her baptism was recorded in the parish registers of Wraxall as, 'Hester babe daughter of Reuben Hollyman'. She died unmarried aged 40 in Tickenham on January 5th 1769.

Samuel Bave Hollyman was baptised on February 8th 1731 in St Andrews church Clevedon. He too remained unmarried and inherited Barrow Court after the death of his father. He died in Tickenham and was buried on April 25th 1813.

Mary Hollyman. Fated to die at a very early age was baptised on May 27th 1734 but died aged 13 months and buried inside the parish church on March 30th 1735

Elizabeth Bave Hollyman. Baptised on January 8th 1735. She was married to John Reed in c.1770 but no records have been found of this event. They had at least one son, John born in 1774 who was married to Elizabeth Rogers by whom he had four children and one son by a Miss Ann Needs. These daughters (see chart) eventually inherited Barrow Court lands which were divided into three. Nothing else known of Elizabeth Bave Hollyman.

The Children of William and Myra Hollyman.

Born in () in Cleveland in 1856 at St. Stephens church Broad Street
William Hollyman married Myra ^{Leath} ~~around the year~~ 1857 and had six children.

As explained on the previous pages, William worked as a butcher and finally *in Cleveland and was born Oct 6 1873 age 45* died of consumption ~~or what is better known today as tuberculosis a disease~~ *Bur Sep 3* which destroys the lungs. Myra died before William in 1872 when she was 42 years old but it is not known from what.

Annie Jane Hollyman was their first child and was baptised in St Andrews church on February 14th 1858. She died aged five and buried in the churchyard on March 5th 1863.

Nyra Louise Hollyman was baptised on April 22nd 1860 and married in Bristol in 1886 but nothing else known.

William Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on February 23rd 1862. Nothing else known

Arthur Heath Hollyman. Recorded by one 'cleric' as Henry, was baptised on March 12th 1865. He married in Bristol in 1890 and settled in Banwell as a saddler. He died in 1934.

Walter Hezekiah Hollyman. Baptised on August 25th 1867; married Alice Maud and was licensee of the Bell Inn, Gloucester lane, Old Market which was destroyed in the Bristol air-raids. He died January 18th 1902 aged 34 years old. Kelly's Directory has W. Louise Hollyman as licensee in 1901.

Lillie Beatrice Hollyman the youngest child of William and Myra was baptised on November 28th 1869 but died an infant and buried with her sister on September 1st 1870. She died on August 29th aged nine months.

The headstone of the family grave is situated on the hill as one looks on the right facing the south porch, and is in very good condition.

Caroline Alice Hollyman. 1902 - 1981

This, the youngest daughter of Alfred William and Caroline Hollyman nee Jones was born in Leigh farm, Church road, Abbots Leigh on January 10th 1902 and baptised into the church on February 9th the same year.

At the age of twenty eight, she married Merchant Navy officer, William George Wallace on December 11th 1930 at 2. pm in Abbots Leigh church.

William G. Wallace was the son of William and Mary Wallace nee Yeman and was born in 1906 on September 27th on Ireland Island Bermuda.

For a time, the couples home was at 6 Kew Villas Portishead and then Caroline Wallace lived at Weston farm in Weston in Gordano. It has to be realised that being a Merchant naval officer, William was not at home for much of their married life; and so, his wife and subsequent family on their own.

During the mid nineteen thirties, Caroline moved into 'Sunny Leigh' a semi-detached house built by her father along Church road where he retired after selling Leigh farm. (Oak Leigh, next door)

I am certain that the original post office and shop was on the site and that this house and orchard was either bought or rented by John Hollyman (1786 - 1857) and was in fact, one of the houses recorded in the Appointments Book held by Miles of Leigh Court.

William worked for the American Oil Company known as ESSO which is The Standard Oil company. Whilst in Egypt in the late 1950's he suffered a heart attack and when well enough, was sent home to work at the company offices in Bristol centre. After shovelling snow from the garden path one January morning in 1963, he had a massive heart attack which proved fatal. He was buried in the village on January 10th aged 56 years.

Only after a few months, Caroline Wallace sold 'Sunny Leigh' and bought a new house in Ashton Vale but could not settle. She met a former boy friend Leonard Bass and they were married in Abbots Leigh but he lived only a

the parish church of St Mary' Rdecliffe on July 5th 1840. (More later)
Searches continued for any other offspring of Sydenham and Harriet until:-
Sophie Hollyman. Was baptised in the parish church of St John Bedminster on
October 16th 1842.

Emma Hollyman. Baptised in the same church as Sophie but on October 20th
1844. It is possible that Emma died aged three years old
for she was not recorded in the next(1851)census.

In the searches of the General Register (State) it can be safely assumed
that Sydenham Hollyman the father died in the summer of 1849 because his
name also is missing from the 1851 census.

Although searches have been going on to find the burials of both Sydenham
and Harriet, nothing certain has been found but the searches continue.

Of all the parish registers of Bristol that are available to family re-
searchers, those of St John, Bedminster, St Mary Redcliffe and St Michaels
and all Angels in St John's lane, Bedminster can only be perused for a fee
which is considerable. £5 per hour although there are bishops transcripts
in Bristol Records Office, which cover many years.

Harriet Hollyman nee Rowles was the daughter of Robert and Elizabeth
Rowles of Portbury and was baptised there on March 25th 1805 which makes
her at least nine years younger than her husband.

Alfred John Hollyman. 1866 - 1941

The eldest son and third child of Charles Henry and Julia Hollyman nee Cole(s) was born at 17 Tredegar street, St Mary, Cardiff on April 4th 1866. As commented in the family synopsis of Charles Henry, Alfred or John as he was mostly known as, is believed to have founded the Hollyman Bakery at 64 Corporation road Cardiff. He married a woman named Susanna who was born in the year 1867 in around 1895. Alfred lost his wife during the Great War in 1918 and she was buried in Cathay's cemetery Cardiff on July 6th at 4 p.m.. A copy of the 'order' shows that this interment cost thirteen shillings and six pence (about 65 p) plus 25 p for the local incumbent.

Whilst sheltering from the January air raids on Cardiff in 1941, Alfred was amongst those thirty three souls who were killed. I have sought the graves of known victims and although I did find the exact location, there appears no headstones at all.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Winifred Hollyman, the firstborn registered in the June quarter of 1896 in Cardiff did not survive past her fifth birthday and died in the summer of 1901. She was buried in the family grave with her mother in Cathay's cemetery, Cardiff.

Ethel Hollyman. Born in 1897 in Cardiff did not marry and was in fact, one of those who lost their lives in the 1941 blitz on Cardiff. She or rather, her remains were recovered from the rubble of the bakery and interred in the family grave in Cathays.

Alfred John Hollyman was born in 1901 and married Beatrice May Bishop.

On that fateful night, he did not join those in his father's bakery so survived. More later.

William Hollyman. Born in 1902 was married to Margaret Lewis in 1927. They had just one child, a daughter named Joan Margaret born in

the spring of 1929. She too suffered the fate of her aunt and grandfather. Her parents too were not spared either and they lie to this day beneath what was once the Hollyman Bakery. Like Ethel, twelve year old Joan was recovered from the rubble and given a burial in Cathay's cemetery.

A special search into the Hollyman bakery, its founding and final demise has been made by William Dennis Hollyman and myself and I include that in this work.

Apparently, when the bomb hit the building, it not only killed outright many sheltering there but fractured a gas main and this caught alight and many were burnt to death. Of the original building, only one wall remains, the whole structure was demolished and rebuilt. The house next door belonged to the son of Alfred, of the same name and his house was not damaged at all.

Upon enquiries of certain members of this family, we found that there still exists much bitterness at the way the authorities kept all news out of publication which meant that the survivors had no say in the last rites of their kin. The only two who were recovered, were buried at nine o'clock in the morning of January 11th 1941 (or 10 am) The only people present were the undertaker and a city official.

This occurred nine days after the air raid.

Caroline Alice Hollyman. 1902 - 1981

This, the youngest daughter of Alfred William and Caroline Hollyman nee Jones was born in Leigh farm, Church road, Abbots Leigh on January 10th 1902 and baptised into the church on February 9th the same year.

At the age of twenty eight, she married Merchant Navy officer, William George Wallace on December 11th 1930 at 2. pm in Abbots Leigh church.

William G. Wallace was the son of William and Mary Wallace nee Yeman and was born in 1906 on September 27th on Ireland Island Bermuda.

For a time, the couples home was at 6 Kew Villas Portishead and then Caroline Wallace lived at Weston farm in Weston in Gordano. It has to be realised that being a Merchant naval officer, William was not at home for much of their married life; and so, his wife and subsequent family on their own.

During the mid nineteen thirties, Caroline moved into 'Sunny Leigh' a semi-detached house built by her father along Church road where he retired after selling Leigh farm. (Oak Leigh, next door)

I am certain that the original post office and shop was on the site and that this house and orchard was either bought or rented by John Hollyman (1786 - 1857) and was in fact, one of the houses recorded in the Appointments Book held by Miles of Leigh Court.

William worked for the American Oil Company known as ESSO which is The Standard Oil company. Whilst in Egypt in the late 1950's he suffered a heart attack and when well enough, was sent home to work at the company offices in Bristol centre. After shovelling snow from the garden path one January morning in 1963, he had a massive heart attack which proved fatal. He was buried in the village on January 10th aged 56 years.

Only after a few months, Caroline Wallace sold 'Sunny Leigh' and bought a new house in Ashton Vale but could not settle. She met a former boy friend Leonard Bass and they were married in Abbots Leigh but he lived only a

year and a half and died whilst living in Swiss Drive Ashton. His estate went to his only daughter and Caroline had to move. This time, she bought a corner house in Haywards road Pill but did not like it. In a council flat along Hardwick road, Pill she died and was buried in the village of her birth on February 15th 1981 aged 79 years.

She lies with her first husband, William G. Wallace but on the headstone, is the legend, nee Hollyman. No forenames nor either of her married names.

Of the union with William Wallace, she had issue of:-

Kitty Wallace born in 1931 and died an infant.

Sheila Caroline Wallace. Born in Clifton on April 3rd 1932. Married F. Cooper of Northampton who was living in Clifton.

David William Wallace. Born on October 28th 1937. Married Rita Davidson and of this union, there was issue of Ian David and Susan. This marriage ended in a divorce. Later remarried and, at the time of writing, lives in Yeovil.

With the demise of Caroline Alice Hollyman is the end of the Hollyman families in Abbots Leigh. The offspring of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman left the village to settle in South Wales mostly in Cardiff. Of those in South Wales, their roots lie in Abbots Leigh and Clevedon, Puxton and the city of Bristol. As can be seen in these pages, the Hollymans have settled in many locations and a few countries: New Zealand: Canada and Australia.

Thomas Hollyman 1746 - 1820

The youngest son of Hezekiah and Ann Hollyman was born in 1746 and baptised at the parish church of St Andrew's Clevedon on March 28th 1748. He was the second son of Hezekiah and Ann to be named Thomas after the first had died. It appears that it was this Thomas Hollyman who added to the land holdings which had been acquired by his father. Thomas's Will gives much details of these lands. He married twice, firstly to Martha Taylor in Yatton in 1771 and by her, had ten children. At the age of about thirty six, Martha died and was buried in Clevedon on March 17th 1787. After her death, Thomas married for the second time to Hannah Wall, nee Bayley, the widow of Thomas Wall a Puxton farmer and of this marriage, there was just one son, William born in 1791. Thomas died aged seventy four in 1820 the same year as his youngest son, Dr Hezekiah Hollyman and was laid to rest inside the church of St Andrews in the family vault. But why in the same vault as a Phillips is not readily understood although the Ann Phillips was once, Ann Nethway who gave birth to a base child, she named Ann Hollyman.

Of the children of Thomas and Martha, the firstborn was:-

Hezekiah Hollyman. Born in 1771, baptised on April 18th 1773 died 1777 and buried on April 14th.

Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on July 13th 1774 became a farmer and married to Elizabeth Pitt in Bristol. He died on December 25th 1807 and buried on December 28th.

Martha Hollyman. Their first daughter was baptised on October 3rd 1775. She married John Griffin, the son of Mary Hollyman (her aunt) and Joseph Griffin on November 18th 1793. She died in Clevedon on August 2nd 1858 aged 62 years.

John Hollyman. Baptised on February 23rd 1777 was also a yeoman farmer. He married Sarah Parsley of Portishead in Bristol. I have not found any record of his death and subsequent burial although I assume he was buried in the same grave as Sarah in Weston

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman. 1876 - 1944

The only son of Alfred Hezekiah and Hannah Hollyman nee Fry was born in Houghton in 1876. He became a wheelwright and travelled a great deal in this vocation. He married Mary Tye in the early summer of 1899. Mary was possibly a couple of years older and lived to a great age until she died aged 90 years in 1963.

As I have already stated on the previous page, Alfred died in an accident on his own property in 1944 and one of his sons, Walter who was with him at the time suffered permanent whiteness of hair through shock.

The couple had eleven children:-

Alfred Hezekiah Hollyman the fifth Hollyman to bear this name was born in 1900. He married Eveline Golding and had issue of:-

Kevin Hollyman born in 1924.

John Hollyman born, unknown

Nothing else known.

Arthur Hollyman Born in 1904 married Ann Varney who was two years younger and had two children:-

Jean Hollyman born in 1940 and who is married to Robert Gooding (born. 1936) and they have two children:- Susan Gooding b. 1964. and a son, Duncan Gooding b. 1966. This couple are living in Clevedon.

Colin Hollyman born in 1941 married Sandra Mendham in 1967. It has been related that they courted in Stubbington where they now live. They have three children:-

Ruth Hollyman. who was born in 1971.

Joy Hollyman who was born in 1973 and,

Philip Hollyman. who was born in 1984.

So the Hollyman name continues in Hampshire with Philip Hollyman.

William Hollyman 1828 - 1873

The second son of Thomas and Esther Hollyman nee Lyons was born in 1828 and baptised on August 24th in St Andrews church Clevedon. He became a butcher as was his father and married Myra, the daughter of Isaac Heath of Thunderbolt street in Bristol on September 16th 1856.

He died of tuberculosis in Clevedon and buried on October 6th 1873 aged forty five years. Myra died before him and was buried on September 3rd the previous year. Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Annie Jane Hollyman who was baptised in Clevedon on February 14th 1858

but she died aged five years and buried on Mar. 5th 1863.

Myra Louise Hollyman. Baptised on April 22nd 1860. I know she married in Bristol in 1886 but not to whom.

William Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on February 23rd 1862. Searches continue.

Arthur Heath Hollyman. Baptised on March 12th 1865. Married in Bristol and settled in Banwell as a saddler. He died in 1934.

Walter Hezekiah Hollyman. Baptised on August 25th 1867; married Alice Maud

and became licensee of The Bell in Gloucester lane Bristol.

He died January 18th 1902 aged 34. A W. Louise Hollyman took over the 'house' in 1901. More searches required.

Lillie Beatrice Hollyman. Youngest child was baptised on November 28th 1869

but died whilst still an infant and buried on September 1st 1870. She died on August 29th aged nine months.

NB. More searching needs to be done with regard to Walter Hollyman.

Thomas Hollyman. 1793 - 1867

The third son of Samuel and Anne Hollyman nee Wall was born in the tiny village of Puxton and baptised on January 8th 1794 when he was about eight months old. He married in Bristol to Esther Lyons on October 24th 1820. Esther was a native of Yatton and was born in 1797. Thomas died aged 75 and was buried in East Clevedon, All Saints on December 23rd 1867. I have heard that Esther died in 1878 aged 83 but this has not been confirmed. Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Hezekiah Hollyman who was born in Clevedon and baptised on August 19th 1821. He became a pork butcher and married Matilda Scunnett but the marriage proved childless. Hezekiah died on September 14th 1867 aged 46. Of Matilda, I have found nothing.

Ann Hollyman. Baptised in Clevedon on June 6th 1824. Nothing else known.

Louise Hollyman. Louise was baptised on September 17th 1826. For a time, she lived with her brother and died, unwed aged 39 in 1865.

William Hollyman. Baptised on August 24th 1828 also became a butcher in Clevedon. He married Myra Heath in Bristol. Both died young. William of tuberculosis and buried aged 45 and Myra died aged 42 and buried on September 3rd 1872.

Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on March 17th 1834 became a publican but very little else known.

Alfred Hollyman. The youngest child was born in 1838 and baptised on October 14th 1839 but died aged three years and buried May 13th 1841.

For more information of this family, see separate families, if any.

Part of the INNDENTURE Concerning ROGER HOLLYMAN

This Indenture was between THOMAS EDWARDS the younger and ELIZABETH WALLIS both of Clapton in Gordano. The original lies within the safe keeping of Bristol Record Office and was placed in their hands by a firm of solicitors, Osbourne many years ago. It, with one other could have been from the SMYTHE archives.

Quote.

This INDENTURE made the eight and twentieth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand and five in the fourth year of the reigne of our sovereigne Lady Anne by the grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland Queen defender of the faith between Thomas Edwards the younger Esq lord of the mannor of Clapton in the county of Somersett of the one part AND Elizabeth Wallis of the same place spinster of the other part. WITNESSETH that the said Thomas Edwards for an in consideration of a good and perfect surrender to him made by the said Elizabeth Wallis of one indenture of lease bearing the date the fifth day of August which was in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred ninety and six And in consideration also of the sune of thirty shillings of lawful English money to him in hand paid by the said Elizabeth Wallis the reciept thereof the said Thomas Edwards doth hereby confess and achknowledge and for diverse other good reasons and considerations him the said Thomas Edwards in his behalf especially moveing HATH demised granted and to farme letten And by these presente doth demise grant and to farme lett unto the said Elizabeth Wallis all that cottage with the appurtences commonly called or knowne by the name of Jayes situate lying and being in Clapton aforesaid in the county of Somersett now in the possession of one Roger Hollyman And also all wayes waters and easements any privilege or convenience which one man has of another without profit, either by prescption or charter, as a way through his land to the said cottage belonging or in any wise appertaining TO HAVE

AND TO HOLD the said cottage and premisses hereby demised with the appurtenances unto the said Elizabeth Wallis her executors administrators and assignees for and during and unto the full end and terme of ninety years next and imediately ensueing and following and fully to be compleate and ended. If she the said Elizabeth Wallis John Ireton ~~of~~ Clapton aforesaid Louise Carpenter and Elizabeth Lockier daughter of William Lockier of the Parish of St Georges Taylor or any or either of them shall happen soe long to live YIELDING and paying therefore yearly during the said terme hereby granted unto the said Thomas Edwards his heirs and assignees the yearly rent of one shilling of Lawfull English money in and upon the feast of St Michael the Archangel and the Annunciation of the blessed Virgin Mary by even and equall portions.....etc.

I believe that this land was 'obtained' by John Hollyman the elder from Henry Wynter in 1684. The year after which Henry died and the estate was sold by the Smythe family. Thomas Edwards a Bristol merchant bought a large amount.

By this year, 1705, John Hollyman the elder had already bought or held on mortgage much land in Clevedon which he had signed from in Westbury on Trym in 1703-4.

His other brother, Reuben and his wife were by this time well and truly settled in Clapton and by 1709 or just afterwards, Emmanuel and his family had settled in Backwell. There only remains one other Hollyman, a sister I believe, Rachael who died in Clapton so probably lived with her brother and family.

Roger and Rachael produced just one son, Oswald who, in time was to be very much concerned with Clevedon court and its occupants, the Elton family. Their other child, a daughter died whilst still an infant.

The Issue of Charles Hollyman and Eliza Griffin.

Charles was the son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hollyman nee Pitt. He was born on August 1st 1795. He married Eliza the fifth child of John and Martha Griffin. Born on August 9th 1801, she married Charles Hollyman in Clevedon on April 7th 1818. They had, as far as I know, only four children but, only one appears to have survived to adulthood. It may, of course because of the intermarrying of these two families for Martha, Eliza's mother was also a Hollyman and her husband was the son of Mary Hollyman, daughter of Hezekiah and Ann. They had their first child two years after they were married:-

William Hollyman who was born on September 3rd 1820 and baptised on March 17th 1822. He died at the age of six years and buried on August 7th 1826.

Joseph Hollyman was baptised on March 17th 1822 and since I commenced this research, I have seen nothing of him. Nothing else known.

Charles Hollyman. Baptised on January 24th 1825. He too died young at the age of three years and buried on August 7th 1828.

Eliza Hollyman the youngest child was baptised on August 24th 1826. She too died young but did reach seven years old. She was buried on March 29th 1833.

A truly tragic family. I found no trace of Eliza's burial and no sign of her in the census returns of Clevedon, Kenn or Yatton.

This family lived at Highdale farm and after the death of Charles, there appeared a notice of sale in the Bristol Mirror.

Thomas Hollyman.

1793 - 1867

This Thomas was the third son of Samuel and Anne Hollyman nee Wall and was born in Puxton on May 22nd 1793 and baptised there on January 8th 1794. He married Esther Lyons in Bristol on October 24th 1820. Esther was native to Yatton and born c.1797. Thomas died aged 75 years old and laid to Rest at All Saints churchyard on December 23rd 1867. The burial place of Esther has not yet been discovered but she possible died before her husband. She and Thomas had issue of:-

Hezekiah Hollyman who was baptised in Clevedon on August 19th 1821. He became a pork butcher and married to Matlida whose maiden name is not known. There was no issue at all from this union. Hezekiah died on September 14th 1867, aged 46.

Ann Hollyman. Baptised on June 6th 1824. Nothing else known

Louise Hollyman was baptised on September 17th 1826. She lived with her brother Hezekiah for a time for she did not marry and died aged 39 and buried on November 24th 1865.

William Hollyman. Baptised on August 24th 1828. He too became a butcher and married to Myra. She died aged 42 yeras old and buried in Clevedon on September 3rd 1873. William died the following year aged 45 and buried on October 1st 1873 aged 45.

Thomas Hollyman. Baptised on March 17th 1834 and he too lived for a while with Hezekiah. Became a provisioner or a vicualler.

Alfred Hollyman was born in 1838 and baptised on October 14th 1839. He died aged 3 and buried on May 13th 1841

These were the children of Thomas and Esther Hollyman of Clevedon.

The Issue of Thomas Hollyman and Esther Lyons.

Thomas was the third son of Samuel and Anne Hollyman nee Wall and was born in Puxton on May 22nd 1793 and baptised there on January 8th 1794. He married Esther Lyons in Bristol on October 24th 1820. Esther Lyons was born in Yatton in 1797. Thomas died aged 75 and was laid to rest at All Saints on December 23rd 1867. It is thought that his widow died in 1878 aged 83. Of this union there was issue of:-

Hezekiah Hollyman who was born in Clevedon and baptised there on August 19th 1821. He became known as a pork butcher and was married to Matilda whose maiden name is not yet known. They had no children. Hezekiah died on September 14th 1867 aged 46. I have found nothing of his widow who may have remarried.

Ann Hollyman. Baptised on June 6th 1824. Nothing else known.

Louise Hollyman. Louise was baptised on September 17th 1826. She lived with her brother Hezekiah for a time and died, unmarried aged 39 years and buried on November 24th 1865.

William Hollyman. Baptised on August 24th 1828; he too became a butcher. He was married to Myra, maiden name unknown. Myra died aged 42 years and buried in Clevedon on September 3rd 1872. William died the following year aged 45 and buried in the family plot on October 1st 1873.

Thomas Hollyman was baptised on March 17th 1834 and he too lived with his brother for a while. He became a 'publican'. Nothing else known for certain.

Alfred Hollyman. Alfred was born in 1838 and was baptised on October 14th 1839 but died aged three and buried on May 13th 1841.

The Issue of Joseph Griffin and Hannah Wall

Joseph, the son of Mary and Joseph Griffin was baptised on May 11th 1771. He died aged 73 and buried in Clevedon on March 18th 1845. He married the daughter of Hannah and Thomas Wall of Puxton in Clevedon on February 7th 1791. They had ten children, the eldest being:-

Joseph Griffin who was born in 1792 and died in 1874 aged 82 years. Nothing else known.

Mary Griffin their first daughter married William Kiddle or Kiddel in Clevedon on June 17th 1811. I am almost positive that it was this William Kiddle who was appointed guardian to the children of Dr Hezekiah Hollyman in 1820.

Sarah Griffin married Richard Cottell (of Chelvey) on September 15th 1819 in Clevedon.

Temperance Griffin. She married Joseph Gurney. Nothing else known

Hannah Griffin married Simeon Perry. Nothing else searched.

Ann Griffin. Born c. 1807. Nothing else known.

James Griffin. was born in 1808. He married Mary Bird in Kingston Seymour on February 14th 1833.

One of their sons, Samuel Bird Griffin married Jane WALLIS and of their issue, Sidney Bird Griffin married a Millicent whose surname is not known. It was their son, Rev Wilfred Gordon Griffin who has compiled much of this tree.

George Griffin was born c 1809, nothing else known.

Jane Griffin born on April 20th 1809 died on January 1st 1810.

William Griffin was baptised January 16th 1811 and died aged 31. He was buried in Clevedon on May 14th 1841.

These then were the issue of Joseph and Hannah Griffin nee Wall.

Frederick Charles Hollyman. 1871 - 1949

Born in Miskin in the parish of Llanwanno, Mountain Ash in south Wales most likely at number 5. Bailey street in the summer of 1871. He was the fifth child of Sydenham and Alvinia Hollyman nee Young. In adult life, he ran a small dairy business until his liking for gambling caused it to fail. He married, presumably in Miskin to Leah Browning in 1893 and for the latter part of their lives resided at Alma Cottage, 211. Penrhiw-ceiber road where in 1949 at the age of seventy eight, he died. Leah, his widow then sold the house and went to live in Bournemouth.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Millicent Maud Hollyman who was born in 1894 and married Mr Davies in 1913.

They have at least, one daughter, Murial.

Elsie May Hollyman. Born in 1895, married a Mr Beecham in 1915.

Sydenham William Hollyman. Their only son was born in 1898. He married Sarah

Ponting in 1923 when he was twenty five years old.

He died in Ilford in 1962 as a result from an accident on the road. See next page.

Gertrude Hollyman. Born in 1900 and married Reuben C. Mann in 1921.

Elizabeth Florence Hollyman. Born in 1902. Nothing else known.

Sylvia Constance Hollyman. Born in 1910 and, at the age of eighteen, she left

Miskin for Barry where she took a course in teaching.

She then went to Dagenham to take up a position and married Donald Bond and, at the time of writing, lives in Romford, Essex. They have one daughter, Susan.

Stephanie Hollyman. The youngest child was born in 1912. She married Mr.

Taylor in Bournemouth in the summer of 1935.

The Issue of Henry Hollyman and Elizabeth Anne Stone.

Henry Hollyman was the fifth child born to Samuel and Martha nee Huish in 1870. He married twice; firstly to Elizabeth Anne Stone from which there was issue of eight children. The second marriage was to the widow of Mr Gough, the owner of Goughs caves of Cheddar, Caroline Mary Hannah. Of this marriage there was no issue. Caroline predeceased her husband by one year in 1952. Henry died in 1953. His first wife, Elizabeth died at the age of sixty years. Their marriage lasted for thirty six years. This couple went to live in south Wales where:-

Louisa Florence Hollyman their first child was born in 1895. She married Mr Herbert (Bert) Moire in c. 1915.

Henry Arnold Hollyman the only son was born in 1897 (reg. Cardiff) in Swansea and married to Eleanor Cridge on January 20th 1923. Eleanor was born in 1895 and died in 1974. They had two children. Henry died before his wife in 1970.

Hilda Ruth Hollyman was born in 1899 also reg. Cardiff and died in 1980. She married George Baker and they lived in Cheddar.

Elizabeth Hollyman. Born in 1899 but died an infant. This may be the daughter registered as Elizabeth Winifred in Swansea.

Elsie Beatrice Hollyman born in 1901. She died in 1982. Married to William Baker of Cheddar.

Alexandra Violet Hollyman was born in 1902 in Swansea. It is not thought she married and the last time I know of her, she was living in Clevedon possibly in an elderly people's home at the age of ninety years. It is to this lady I owe much of this lineage of Henry Hollyman.

Rose Enid Hollyman, the youngest child was born in 1913: she married Trevor Williams and had four children. They were, Merlin: Richard: Royston and Sylvia who is married to Mr Paul Brown and they have two children, Tanya and Jason Brown.

N.B.

Edwin and Martha Baker were married in Cannington church on May 23rd 1839. Annie Hollyman, sister to Henry Hollyman (above) married George Baker one of their sons. They lived in Barry where their son, also George married his cousin, Hilda Hollyman. Elsie Beatrice Hollyman married William Baker in Cheddar on August 11th 1924. He was originally a steeplejack from Derby, There was no issue from either marriage.

Much of this information was given to me by Mr Henry Clifford Hollyman who now lives in Cheadle. He worked for most of his later years as an engineer in the oil industry for Simon Engineering who supply heavy chemical equipment to many parts of the world. They celebrated their Ruby wedding in November 1990.

It was most fortunate that he still has the family bible which confirms all of what I have in my files of this family who originated in Clevedon.

The Issue of Henry Hollyman and his wife, Elizabeth Anne Stone.

Henry Hollyman was the fifth child born to Samuel and Martha Hollyman in 1870 in the parish of Clevedon. He settled in South Wales and it was here that in around the year 1894 he married Elizabeth Anne Stone. That marriage was to last for thirty six years when Elizabeth died in 1930. Henry married again to the widow of one of the Gough family who owned the famous Gough caves in Cheddar, Caroline Mary Hannah. Of this union, there were no issue but of his first marriage there were eight children only one of which was a son. Henry died in 1953. Their children were:-

Louisa Florence Hollyman who was born in Swansea in 1895: she married Bert Moire in 1915.

Henry Arnold Hollyman, their only son was born in 1897 and registered in Cardiff. He married Eleanor Cridge on January 20th 1923. She was born in 1895 and died in 1974. They had two children. Henry Arnold predeceased his wife in 1970.

Hilda Ruth Hollyman was born in 1899 (Cardiff) and married George Baker. She died in 1980 aged eighty one years. (See footnotes)

Elizabeth Hollyman was born in 1899 but died a year later but could have been registered as Elizabeth Winifred in Swansea. She too died young in 1900.

Elsie Beatrice Hollyman was born in 1901 and registered in Swansea. She married William Baker and died in 1982.

Violet Alexandra Hollyman was born in 1902: her name is registered the other way around. At the time of my enquiries, she was still alive and living in Clevedon. *1902-1903*

Lily Irene Hollyman was born in 1904: she died in 1923 aged 19 years.

John Hollyman the Elder. 1661 - 1727

Born at a location unknown, John Hollyman known as, the elder, first came to the Gordano valley in 1684. This is proved by his signature on a document made in Clapton when the lord of the manor was Henry Wynter. The next event concerning John was when his wife, Rachael presented him with a son on September 30th 1698 whilst he was either living at the court or close by. George Hollyman. 1802 - 1853

Although his home village was Puxton, George, the seventh child of Samuel and Ann Hollyman nee Wall was born in Clevedon and baptised a month later in St Saviours church Puxton on March 12th 1802. He worked from most of his life as a tailor and married Hannah Hole in Bristol in 1829. After his death at the age of fifty one and subsequent burial on February 21st. 1853, Hannah remarried to William Woolford and settled in Clevedon next to the Waggon and Horses public house with two of Hannah's children.

Of the union with Hannah, George had issue of:-

Ann Hollyman. Baptised on February 20th 1831. Very little is known of Ann.

Charles Hollyman. Baptised on April 5th 1833 in Clevedon. He married Martha the daughter of Charles Wilmot of Tickenham on February 11th 1861. Martha died in Tickenham aged 60 and buried on January 16th 1895. Charles lived for nearly twenty years longer and died in 1914. Of this union, there appears to have been one daughter, Elizabeth Jane Hollyman born in c. 1857. She married William Crane on January 26th 1880.

Eliza Hollyman. Baptised on September 6th 1835 but died aged four November 1839.

Alfred Hollyman. Baptised on December 21st 1837 also died young. Buried May 13th 1841.

Eliza Hollyman. The second to bear this name was baptised on August 9th 1840.

Mary Jane Hollyman. Baptised on February 19th 1842 died at the age of fifteen years and buried on April 17th 1857.

Emma Hollyman. Baptised on April 6th 1845 died aged four years and buried on December 12th 1848.

Selina Hollyman. Baptised on December 5th 1847 became a school mistress and

married Moses Gould and had four children.(See next page)

Claire Hollyman. Sometimes referred to as, Clara Hollyman was baptised on 17th March 1850. Married William Turner of Fairford, Gloucester in Clevedon on August 19th 1871.

Frederick Hollyman. The youngest child of George and Hannah Hollyman was born in Clevedon and baptised on August 22nd 1852. He became a carpenter by trade and married Ellen Burnell Bathe of Lyng in Cardiff in 1875. They settled in Cardiff where their children were born. Fred. died at the age of thirty nine and buried on November 21st 1891. (See notes on Frederick & Ellen Hollyman)

CLEVEDON MERCURY. Aug. 26th 1871. On August 19th at the parish church, Clevedon. By Rev. E. H. Fothergill, William Turner of Fairford, Glous. to Clara, daughter of the late George Hollyman of Clevedon.

Selina Hollyman was the eighth child of George and Hannah Hollyman born in 1847. She is mentioned in the 1861 census of Clevedon as aged 13 years old, a general servant. With her was her sister Claire aged eleven years old. Selina, as stated, married Moses Gould a gas fitter and bell hanger. In 1881, the family were living in Prospect Lane. See over.

Born in Abbots Leigh, the tenth child of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman nee Locke in 1856 was baptised in the village church on May 25th the same year. He followed his elder brother Charles to Cardiff and worked for him before settling out on his own at 32 Crwys street as a baker.

At the age of twenty seven, he married a widow who already had two daughters of her own, in 1883 in Cardiff. Mary E. James (maiden name unknown) hailed from Cornwall and also worked in the bakery as a confectioner, a job which was done by many women. Robert retired and moved to the county of his birth, to Weston super Mare to 110 Walliscote road not far from the sea front in a large detached house. I believe he died in 1930. But very little has been searched of his family. The two stepdaughters were:-

May A. James who was born in 1874 in Cardiff and,

Irene B. James who was born in 1876. Of the union with Mary, Robert had:-

Robert Hollyman. Born in 1884: nothing else known. A Robert J. Hollyman was married in Cardiff in 1920 but it is not known exactly who he was.

William H. Hollyman who was born in 1885: nothing else known.

Edgar Hollyman. Born in 1886: nothing else known.

Alice B. Hollyman. According to the census return, born in 1889. But I found no such name for that year, only Olive B. Hollyman. THIS Olive died in 1893.

Francis Hollyman was the youngest child and was born in 1891.

At the time of writing, there is only one Hollyman resident in W.S.M. and he is Mr. F. Hollyman. He COULD be Francis but only enquiries will tell although I have written and 'sent out feelers' to no avail.

Any future successes will be included at the end of this book.

Copy of Letter from Mr W.A.Hollyman.

Llanbedrog. N.Wales.

Sept. 10. 1990

This was sent to Mr Robert Dawson after I made enquiries of Mr Hollyman.

Dear Bob,

I thank you for your letter of the 3rd inst. and for the information you gave referring to my family.

It would appear that Alfred Reuben was my grandfather but I did not know his second name. The list of his family is O.K. Edith died when she was young but the others are all correct. I have lost touch with them over the years. Arthur was my father and I am enclosing copies of the only documents I have been able to find. As you say, he was the architect responsible for the National Museum of Wales and the Capitol cinema in Cardiff which has now been pulled down to make way for other buildings. My son is named Peter Anthony and he has two children named Ross and Juliette. His wife is Judith and her maiden name was Tyrrel.

As regards to Ken Hollyman, I'm afraid I cannot help you as I have never met him. Hollymans the bakers, I knew but not intimately. There was another Hollyman a baker and confectioner who retired quite young and went over to Weston-super-mare. But unfortunately I don't know his name as I only met him twice when I was quite young.

From the chart you sent I note that William Adams Hollyman was married to Alice Grinter. This is correct and their son William Dennis is still living in Cardiff although I have not seen him for 25/30 years.

I'm afraid this is all the information I have but hope you can get something from it.

My comments.

The chart referred to was one I sent to Robert Dawson concerning the A/Leigh Hollymans from whence this W.A.Hollyman's roots are. Alfred Reuben did not like his second name and was rarely called it.

It transpired later, upon enquiries, that Arthur was not an architect but an assistant and once worked as a manager in a steel fabrication works and had under him as an apprentice, William Dennis Hollyman who became a civil engineer of some repute.

Many thanks for your letter and for the information you gave regarding our 'tree' I know of Dennis, he is a cousin but I have not seen him for many years, Alfred Reuben was my grandfather but I do not know the name of his wife, only, Granny. As you say, Arthur was my father and I enclose copies of his birth certificate and marriage certificate together with the birth certificate of my mother who was a Mogg from Bridgwater.

My wife's name was Bates and we were married at St Marks Church, Gabalfa, Cardiff on Dec.26th 1934. I was born on 12th Jan, 1907 and my son was born July 3rd 1942. I have a daughter Norah Margaret born on 17th Feb. 1936 who married a fellow named Jenkins but have lost touch with them. I trust I have given all the details you have asked for and that they will help in the compiling of your work.

The eldest son and second child of Reuben and his wife Rachael nee Foskett was born and baptised in Clapton in Gordano, in 1700. He married the daughter of Samuel and Elizabeth Bave of Tickenham, Elizabeth Ann Mary who was also known as, Maria in around 1727-28. I have not found any record of this marriage. They lived in Tickenham where their seven children were brought up. Elizabeth died in 1744 the year their last child was born and was buried in the family vault in the Bave chapel in the parish church. She was just 35 years old. Her husband lived until the age of sixty three when he died on December 14th 1763. He was the local land assessor and was a yeoman farmer. Of this union, there was issue of:-

Hester Bave Hollyman the eldest was baptised on December 22nd 1729 which suggests her parents were married the same year. Her baptism was recorded in the parish registers of Wraxall as, Hester babe daughter of Reuben Hollyman' She died unmarried aged 40 in Tickenham on January 5th 1769.

Samuel Bave Hollyman was baptised on February 8th 1731 in St Andrews church Clevedon. He too remained unmarried and inherited Barrow Court after the death of his father. He died in Tickenham and was buried on April 25th 1813.

Mary Hollyman. Fated to die at a very early age was baptised on May 27th 1734 but died aged 13 months and buried inside the parish church on March 30th 1735

Elizabeth Bave Hollyman. Baptised on January 8th 1735. She was married to John Reed in c.1770 but no records have been found of this event. They had at least one son, John born in 1774 who was married to Elizabeth Rogers by whom he had four children and one son by a Miss Ann Needs. These daughters (see chart) eventually inherited Barrow Court lands which were divided into three. Nothing else known of Elizabeth Bave Hollyman.

Sydenham Hollyman. 1839 - 1904

The head of the first Hollyman family to settle in Miskin, south Wales, was born on December 18th 1839 at Waters's Buildings behind Bedminster parade close to what was known as, Harper's bridge at the bottom of Redcliff Hill, Bristol. He was baptised at St Mary Redcliff church on July 5th 1840.

He was the seventh child of Sydenham and Harriet Hollyman, nee Rowles and worked as a mason. He married Alvinia, the daughter of Francis Young a farmer of Michel Troy near Monmouth on September 1st 1862 at All Saint's church, Long Ashton.

It appears that the couple lived in or near Kingswood where, according to the relevant census returns, their first child a daughter was born. She was registered in Clifton, Bristol. But they did not remain here in Kingswood for very long for they migrated to a small village in south Wales named, Llanwanno where in 1866 their second child was born. By the year 1868-9 they had moved again across the hills to Miskin in Mountain Ash where they settled at number 5, Bailey street a row a terraced houses built on an alarming slope. Sydenham worked 'down the pit' until his death at the age of 64. His widow survived him by many years until she died in 1921.

Of this marriage, there was issue of:-

Sarah Ann Hollyman. Born in Kingswood near Bristol in 1863 she was taken to south Wales when she was a baby but died aged fifteen years old.

William M. Hollyman. Not ascertained if he was really the son of Sydenham and Alvinia but as we know there were no other Hollyman families near this part of the country surely must be of their issue. He died an infant, in 1866.

Harriet Eliza Hollyman. Born in Llanwanno as was William two years after her brother George. She married Robert Davies and, at the time living in Springfield place.

Sydenham George Hollyman known as, or referred to as just George was born in 1869 but died aged three years.

year and a half and died whilst living in Swiss Drive Ashton. His estate went to his only daughter and Caroline had to move. This time, she bought a corner house in Haywards road Pill but did not like it. In a council flat along Hardwick road, Pill she died and was buried in the village of her birth on February 15th 1981 aged 79 years.

She lies with her first husband, William G. Wallace but on the headstone, is the legend, nee Hollyman. No forenames nor either of her married names.

Of the union with William Wallace, she had issue of:-

Kitty Wallace born in 1931 and died an infant.

Sheila Caroline Wallace. Born in Clifton on April 3rd 1932. Married F. Cooper of Northampton who was living in Clifton.

David William Wallace. Born on October 28th 1937. Married Rita Davidson and of this union, there was issue of Ian David and Susan. This marriage ended in a divorce. Later remarried and, at the time of writing, lives in Yeovil.

With the demise of Caroline Alice Hollyman is the end of the Hollyman families in Abbots Leigh. The offspring of Reuben and Mary Ann Hollyman left the village to settle in South Wales mostly in Cardiff. Of those in South Wales, their roots lie in Abbots Leigh and Clevedon, Puxton and the city of Bristol. As can be seen in these pages, the Hollymans have settled in many locations and a few countries: New Zealand: Canada and Australia.

Alice G.Gould. aged 13 years.
William H.Gould. aged 9 Years.
Clara A.Gould. aged 8 years.
Selina L.Gould. aged 6 years.

From the information available, it could be surmised that Selina Hollyman led a lonely life, for at the age of six years old, she lost her father and was to experience the loss of four of her siblings also. Her younger brother Frederick settled in Cardiff and her sister Claire probably moved to her husband's home town. Whilst still mere children, Selina and Claire lived with each other for there is no mention of any of the other members of the family in the census returns.

Frederick, as I have already mentioned, lived in Cardiff with his wife, Ellen Bathe who hailed from Lyng. He may have been the only Clevedon Hollyman to have settled in South Wales, the others having originated from Abbots Leigh. Alice Gould, daughter of Selina and Moses, married Frederick, son of Frederick and Ellen Hollyman in 1903: *copy from original*

From the lineage chart, Puxton No 1, it can be seen quite clearly how these are related.

Clevedon Mercury May 27. 1939. Obituary. 'A Dear Old Lady of Clevedon'

Funeral of Mrs Selina Gould who resided with her daughters at St John's Cottage, Queens Road. Mrs Gould was in her 92nd year and was a member of one of the oldest Clevedon families being a daughter of the late Mr & Mrs George Hollyman, a name which has been connected with the town for several centuries.'

The first Hollyman to set foot in Clevedon was, of course, John the 'Elder' who arrived round about 1704 five years before the Elton family who bought Clevedon Court.

Rose Enid Hollyman, the youngest child was born in 1913: she married Trevor Williams and had four children. They were, Merlin: Richard: Royston and Sylvia who is married to Mr Paul Brown and they have two children, Tanya and Jason Brown.

N.B.

Edwin and Martha Baker were married in Cannington church on May 23rd 1839. Annie Hollyman, sister to Henry Hollyman (above) married George Baker one of their sons. They lived in Barry where their son, also George married his cousin, Hilda Hollyman. Elsie Beatrice Hollyman married William Baker in Cheddar on August 11th 1924. He was originally a steeplejack from Derby, There was no issue from either marriage.

Much of this information was given to me by Mr Henry Clifford Hollyman who now lives in Cheadle. He worked for most of his later years as an engineer in the oil industry for Simon Engineering who supply heavy chemical equipment to many parts of the world. They celebrated their Ruby wedding in November 1990.

Part of the INDENTURE concerning ROGER HOLLYMAN

Although strictly Roger Hollyman had nothing to do with this document, it does place him in Clapton in Gordano at the time. viz. August 28th 1705.

Quote

This INDENTURE made the eighth and twentieth day of August in the year of our lord one thousand seven hundred and five in the fourth year of the reign of our sovereigne Lady Anne by the grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland Queen defender of the Faith between Thomas Edwards the Younger lord of the manor of Clapton in the County of Somersett of the one part AND Elizabeth Wallis of the same place spinster of the other part. WITNESSETH that the said Thomas Edwards for and in consideration of a good and perfect surrender to him made by the said Elizabeth Wallis of one indenture of lease bearing the date the fifth day of August which was in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred ninety and six AND in Consideration also of the sume of thirty shillings of lawful English money to him in hand paid by the said Elizabeth Wallis the receipt thereof the said Thomas Edwards doth confess and acknowledge and for diverse other good reasons and considerations him the said Thomas Edwards on his behalf especially moveing HATH demised granted and to farme letten And by these present doth demise grant and to farme lett unto the said Elizabeth Wallis all that cottage with the appurtences commonly called or knowne by the name of Jayes situate lying and being in Clapton aforesaid in the County of Somersett now in the possession of one ROGER HOLLYMAN And also all wayes waters and easements any priviledge or convenience which one man of another without profit, either by prescription or charter as a way through his land to the said cottage belonging or in any wise appertaining. This INDENTURE made the eighth and twentieth day of August in the year of our lord one thousand seven hundred and five in the fourth year of the reign of our sovereigne Lady Anne by the grace of God of England Scotland France and Ireland Queen defender of the Faith between Thomas Edwards the Younger lord of the mannor of Clapton in the County of Somersett of the one part AND Elizabeth Wallis of the same place spinster of the other part. WITNESSETH that the said Thomas Edwards for and in consideration of a good and perfect surrender to him made by the said Elizabeth Wallis of one indenture of lease bearing the date the fifth day of August which was in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred ninety and six AND in Consideration also of the sume of thirty shillings of lawful English money to him in hand paid by the said Elizabeth Wallis the receipt thereof the said Thomas Edwards doth confess and acknowledge and for diverse other good reasons and considerations him the said Thomas Edwards on his behalf especially moveing HATH demised granted and to ferme letten And by these present doth demise grant and to ferme lett unto the said Elizabeth Wallis all that cottage with the appurtences commonly called or knowne by the name of Jayes situate lying and being in Clapton aforesaid in the County of Somersett now in the possession of one ROGER HOLLYMAN And also all wayes waters and easements any priviledge or convenience which one man of another without profit, either by prescription or charter as a way through his land to the said cottage belonging or in any wise appertaining. TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said cottage and premises hereby demised with the appurtences unto the said Elizabeth wallis her executors

administrators and and assignes for and during and unto the full end and
terme of ninety and nine years next and imediately ensueing following and

The Parish Church of St Andrews.Clevedon

Also known as The Old Church, St Andrews was named after the patron saint of fishermen and it is probable that there was a small fishing community at the foot of two hills, Church Hill and Wains Hill between which it lies. St Andrews was possibly built between 1060 and 1190 and although Norman, was built on Saxon foundations.

Within the church are two Sanctuary rings and in Medieval times, a person fleeing from summary justice could take refuge in the church by holding on to a ring until his case was held in a proper manner.

Edith Cavell was confirmed here on March 15th 1884 and at the time, she was attending school at Belgrade House in Elton road. Edith became an outstanding heroine by aiding Allied escapees during the Great War 1914-1918 whilst she was serving as a nurse in Belgium. On October 12th 1915, she was shot by the Germans. She was nearly fifty years old.

Although the church is twelfth century, the parish records have been lost prior to 1727. Some say those early scraps of parchment were used to block up holes in the church rafters. There are burial records much earlier and have been transcribed into easy readable pages. The first date and event of these transcriptions is the baptism of Anthony son of John Halse which took place on May 10th 1607. The first marriage is of John Raine and Alice Bradford on May 7th 1607/8. The first burial was of William Ashe on July 25th 1607/8.

According to the date, the last named Hollyman would have been the grandson of John Hollyman the Elder. He was buried in Nailsea in 1766 and was the father of John who first settled in Abbots Leigh.

The Hollyman family burial vaults inside St Andrews have in the main, weathered the countless tread of feet throughout the ages, only one beneath which lie the remains of the eldest son of Hezekiah and Ann, John does one see erosion which has obliterated the remainder of the wording. John lies here but there must be others. For instance, we can find no signs of the last resting places of Oswald and his wife, Elinor nor of John's wife or widow, Hannah nee Churches.

At the time of writing, most of the aisles in the church have been covered with a protective carpet. This may do just what it is intended, that is to protect but it also hides from view some, in my opinion very decorative memorials to the Hollyman families.

1981

In the Quarter Sessions Court transcripts we find evidence of local lifestyle.

In 1616,Mary Gaynard was sentenced to be publically whipped for bearing an
illegitimate child.She and the man she claimed to be the father had to give
money to the Parish to raise a fund for the child's upkeep and if she refused
to keep the child herself,she was to pay 12d weekly.Since Thomas Blake refused

to confirm he was the child's father was not punished by the Court but left to the censure of the Church.

This punishment was unusually severe but it did not discourage the populace at all since further cases of illegitimacy appeared regularly in the Court records and Parish registers.

This brings to mind, the alleged illegitimate son of Mary Hollyman in Clevedon in 1763: the son who does not appear to have been baptised but whose 'burial' was. Mary was the daughter of the parish overseer and a churchwarden and also the grand daughter of the elder John Hollyman
