Thank you for the information recieved in your letter of January 24th. I do hope you can acquire enough information to publish a book. So often someone gathers so much data and it does no good because it is unpublished.

I wrote to Mrs. George Holliman to ask if I could buy one of the Hollyman books. I was sorry to learn that Mrs. Holliman had passed away in 1963. Her sister, Mrs. J. B. Calhoun, who lives at the address you gave me, said that the books had all been sold so I guess there is no way for me to acquire one.

The last time I visited with my mother, she told me that the children of Francis R. Holiman who was my grandfather's sister and the daughter of Elija A. Holiman and who also married Bob Shaw, the youngest, Jane died in 1870 when the typhiod epidemic took her mother and Aunt, Mary. Francis and Bob's older daughter, Mary, married Tom Mcgee in Arkansas. They moved to Oklahoma and lived in the Broken Arrow area much of the time. They had eleven children. Mary was dead before 1945 when Tom visited in our home. He has died since that time. The third daughter, Martha, married Manuel Jones. They lived at first near Fowell, Texas and later moved to the Arkans-s-Oklahoma area. They had five children and were both dead before 1945.

Tradition has it that Elije A. Holiman was in the Civil War in behalf of the Union. I remember hearing when I was a child that I had one great grandfather that fought for the North and one that fought for the South. My g-grandfather Byler fought the complete war in the 34th Arkansas Infantry. My mother said that Grandpa Holiman was not in the service very long. The archives in Washington sent my money back. They found no service record and Jamina never applied for a pension. Perhaps he did fight for the South after all. I would like to find his record.

I believe this is all of interest at this time. I will be pleased to hear from you again.

Dear Mrs. Flanagan:

Mr. Herman Starnes through correspondence with Mrs. B.A. Sullivan, of this City, was kind to supply me with your name and address. Since Mr. Starnes gave me your family outline, I recognized at once that we were from the same family connection.

I have the Flyler family book published by Mr. Starnes, also the Lucas family book, by a local writer, and the Hollyman Family book, by George A. Holliman. The last mentioned author is now deceased, but his widow resides at 112 Short Bay Street, Hattisburg, Mississippi.

Elizabeth Plyler, who married Cornelius Holliman in Lancaster County, South Carolina, in 1813 was my Great-Great Grandmother. I am enclosing herewith for your file some basic data, which you may find interesting. For your information I have been working, at odd times, since I partially retured three years ago, on my Holliman line. Family records were scarce, sooI have not found out very much. However, I am gradually parcing together a little information here and there, and am hopeful that you will supply some data on your branch of the family.

I am working on the theory that Charles Holliman, Warren Holliman, and Cornelius Holliman, who came to Fayette County, Alabama, in 1836, and Willis and John Holliman, who settled in Choctaw County, Mississippi, were sons of James Holliman, who was a Revolutionary War veteran, born in Johnston County, North Carolina in 1850, and who moved to the upper part of Lancaster County, S.C. in 1792, where he later died on May 17, 1836. He drew a pension for his war service, and I have a copy of his pension records. I had a rumor however that Cornelius was a son of Willis Holliman, but who in turn could have been a son of this James Holliman.

daughter of Raul Plyler. He in turn was a son of Hans Heindrich Bluiler, and he in turn was a son of Casper Bluiler, who came to America with his family on May 19, 1735. Hans Heindrich Bluiler whose Americanized name was Henry Plyler, fought in the American Revolution, and applied for a pension. Elizabeth was probably born in Lancaster County, S.C. and her husband Cornelius Holliman was likely born there too. They came to Fayette County in 1836. He had previously (1830) been a Trustee of Old Zoar Church and Camp Ground (Methodist) in Chesterfield County, S.C. When he arrived in Fayette County, Alabama, in 1836, he became attached to Old Springhill Church, near Newtonville, Alabama. This was primative Baptist Connection. He was one of the Church Trustees.

Elizabeth Plyler Holliman probably died at Newtonville after they settled there, for on June 23, 1838, he married Elizabeth Rainwater, widow of William Rainwater. They moved to the Northerly part of the County, on farm of 160 acres, half of which was in Fayette County, and the other half in Marion (now Lamar) County. Cornelius died there in 1862. I have been unable to find his grave. He served in the War of 1812, and I have a copy of his war and pension records.

For record of the children, see the attached.

My records show that Elijah A. Holliman and Jemimah Yerby (daughter of Amon Yerby and wife Rachel) were married in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama, March 30, 1837. The 1850 Census shows that he was 34 years old and his wife 33 years old at that time. Their children shown werel Frances R, Mary E., and William. The 1860 Census of this same family (Fayette County), shows that he (Amon) was born in S.C., and his wife is shown as "Lavinia". A Nancy Martin, house keeper was then living with them. She was born in Miss. Amon and wife moved to Alabama in 1820. According to my record Elijah A. was a Private in Captain Palmer's Company of Alabama Reserves in the Confederate Army. Amon was born in 1789, in North Carolina., and I understand he died near Millport, Alabama, in July 1861. I do not know where Elijah A. Holliman died, but have heard that it was near Millport, around 1932, and that he was then one of the Oldest Confederate Veterans in the area. I would the to have any information you have on him.

Following data may be interesting:

1820 Census Lancaster Co. S.C. shows Cornelius H. & Willis H. there. Deed records of the County show James Holliman there in 1800 & 1804. Cornelius sold lands there in 1823 and in 1832. He sold lands to Martin Plyler there in 1824. Anson County, N.C. records show Warren Holliman made deed to Elijah Walters (apparently his brother-in-law) in 1835. This land adjoined property of Elijah and Joshua Walters.

James Holliman, Jr. died there in 1804, willing to his Father James Sr., a farm in Lancaster County, S.C.

James Holliman of Mecklinburg Co. N.C. sold to Peter Team lands in 1801.

Charles Holliman made deed to Daniel Walters in 1835.

Note that the named Elijah and Joshua probably came into use in the Holliman family, from connection with the Walters Family. Warren Holliman married Millie Walters.

I trust that this information is of interest to you, and if I can supply other data, please call on me.

Dear Mr. Holliman;

Thank you so much for your most welcome letter of January 8. I had done very little research on my mother's father's line until recently. My grandfather always sat quietly by and let my grandmother talk about her family so naturely I was a little more curious about the things she had said and there is where I started. I have been working on family history about 18 months and have found it very exciting. I have contacted some very wonderful people to whom I am cousin and am most pleased with the progress I have made.

My mother, Martha Jane Holiman is a wonderful, Kind and patient lady of 89 years. She is still better read and I am afraid, a little brighter than any of us, her children. She had rheumatic fever in 1908 and it left a crippling of the joints which has become progressively worse until she has become confined to a wheel chair. She has lived with me until this winter when she went to a niece's house in Missouri because she can no longer be left alone. I am hoping she can return in the Spring. She married my father, Merrit E. Ryan on Sept. 6, 1900. He was reportedly killed by the Mexican bandit, Pancho Villa, while on a trip to Mexico in 1923. His body was not recieved by the femily and his burial place is not known. He was the son of Vorgil Ryan of Knickerbocker, Texas. - SARAH BRICE.

In A History of Arkansas-Fulaski, Jefferson, Louoke and other Counties-1889-page 549-- There is a sketch on Dr. Josh Holiman. Have you read this? It gives a different death date for his wife. Ferhaps this is the second wife, and I am speaking of Cornelius Holliman. It also gives The names of the children.

Elija Alexander Holiman Was born in 1816 in South Carolina. He married Jamima Yearby (Jemimah Yerby) in 1837. They had 1. Frances who married a Bob Shaw and had three girls, Mary, Martha and Jane. She died at the age of 25 years in a typhoid epidemic and is buried in Newton County Arkansas. She was born in 1845—died 1870.

2. Mary was born in 1850. She had not married in 1870 and died in the same epidemic that took Frances.

3. William Moses (my grandfather). Born May 9 1856 at Fayette, Alabama. On June 2, 1873 he was married, in Arkansas to Lurana Love Byler, daughter of Elliot Rucker Byler and Serena Patton. The children were Martha Jane born Nov. 18 1878. 2. a girl, Stilborn. 3. a boy in 1882 that lived only a few hours. 4. Ama born Feb. 20 1885 died 1918. and 5. Rucker Born March 10, 1888—died July 4, 1966. Elija and Jamima had one other child, a boy Stilborn.

Elija A. Holiman was in the Civil war but I have been unable to find his papers. Possibly because I was looking in the wrong state and may have been spelling his mame wrong. I did not write to the archives but one time and I was trying from Arkansas.

I plan to do further research on the time they spent in Arkansas. I do not know what year they migrated there but that is where the girls died in 1870 and where William Moses (my Grandfather) married my grandmother in 1873. William and his wife Lurana, never moved from his father's house, or Elija and Jamima from their son's house as the case may be. Before 1878 when my mother was born, they had moved to Collin County, Texas, near McKinney. They farmed all of their lives. Elija died in February 1888 and is buried in the Chambers graveyard near Weston in Collin County. Jamima died July 30, 1895 and is buried at Fowell in Navarro County. Both of these counties are in Texas.

About 1917 William M. and Lurana moved to Oklahoma where they lived the remainder of their lives. Lurana Died Jan. 30, 1933. William M. died Sept 16, 1939. They are both buried in the Seabolt Cemetry at Nicut, Oklahoma. This was the most devoted couple I have ever known. They were Baptists and lived as such. They raised three children of their own and helped raise eleven others from three different families.

With walittle more work, perhaps we can straighten out a few more of our questions on the early family. It will be interesting to try. If you have any questions or find anything new, let me know.

Dear Mrs. Flanagan:

Thank you for the information contained in your letter of January 12th. I had thought all along that your Elijah A. Holliman was the one who lived near Millport, in Lamar County, Alabama, and who died around 1932, and who at that time was one of the six surviving Confederate Veterans in the County. It is apparent to me, that the one that I thought was your Elijah was most likely the Elijah Holliman, son of Charles Holliman, and brother of my Grandmother Baker's "Uncle Warren" of the Ashcraft's corner area of Fayette County.

I think that the origin of the usage of the names Elijah and Joshua in our Holliman family, came from Elijah Walters and his son Joshua Walters of Anson County, North Carolina. the 1830 Census of that County, Charles, Warren and Cornelius Holliman (Spelled with one L - incidentally, and which spelling is more usual than uncommon in our family), were both living in the same community as the Walters pair. Warren married Millie Walters, perhaps the daughter of Elijah and sister of Joshua. At any rate, all through the family for a couple of generations thereafter, there was an ample supply of these given names. My grand-father John T. Holliman, had a brother Elijah, who died of wounds at Newnam Georgia, following the Chicamauga campaign of the Civil War. Charles, who settled in Fayette County, in 1836, with Warren and Cornelius, had a son named Elijah. Cornelius had such a son (your Grandfather), Dr. Joshua who moved to Miss., thence to Arkansas, thence back to Fayette County in the Civil War, thence back to Arkansas, had an Elijah. Warren, who County, to Arkansas around 1840, had an Elijah. Warren, who moved from Fayette Perhaps there might have been a family relationship - distant, between the Walters family and the Holimans. The James Holliman, who was a Rev. War soldier applied for pension in 1832, and one of those who signed papers recommending it was Elijah Walters, so there was a close connection between the families.

The 1850 Census of Marion County, Alabama, (part of which was later taken in to make up Lamar County), shows the following, which may be of interest:

Note: Elkana was Elizabeth Holliman's son by 1st marriage to William Rainwater. They were married near Linden Alabama, around 1832. He evidently died at Newtonville before 1839, because her pension application shows that she married Cornelius Holliman in Fayette County in 1839. She was an older sister of "Aunt Polly" (Mary) Lucas, who married Uriah Holliman. Her Father was Charles Daniel Lucas, who died at Newtonville.

NOTE: Same community where Rube Burrows, famous Alabama outlaw was reared. He was born in 1854.

The 1860 Census does not show either of these Hollimans in MarionCounty. However, pension records of Elizabeth Rainwater Holliman, state that they moved to Arkansas around 1858 and stayed a couple of years, then moved back to Fayette County, where Cornelius died in 1862. Census of Arkansas for 1860 shows Cornelius there, and I judge that is about the time that Elijah and family left this area. I also think that his sister, Sarah also went to Arkansas, as I have no record of what became of her. (Saline County (DeKalb Township).

Data on Dr. Joshua C. Holliman, brother of your Elijah, is shown in "Memoirs of Arkansas", by Goodspeed. He was in Garland County, Hot Springs Township.

Since it is likely that Cornelius, daughter Sarah and Son, Elijah H. moved to Arkansas around 1858, it may be that Elijah served in the Civil War from that state, and that my records on him in Alabama could refer to some other Elijah. I will try to pin this down when I go down to Montgomery, Alabama, the next time. The State Department of Archives, Milisary Department has a vast amount of Confederate records, including Company Rosters, and alphabetical list of those who served. Since there were a number of Elijahs in service, it may be difficult to check. However, for a small charge, (for copies only), you can get this department to supply you with enlistment, service and pay roll records. Dont hesitate to write them.

Milfred Foe Walton, Box 249, Benton, Arkansas is a descendant of Warren Holliman, and wife Millie Walters, who moved to Arkansas, in 1840. He is interested in the family history, and I have had some correspondence with him.

We have distant relatives in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, and possibly Mississippt, and I have gradually accumulated a good many bits of information on them. I hope eventually to be able to publish a genealogical report, but its going to take a lot more effort, to get to all of the facts.

Again, I thank you for the data, and will be pleased from time to time to exchange information with you.

I have recently noted the 1860 Census of Fayette County, Alabama, which shows:

#279. Elijah Holliman, 44, Born, S.C.
Lavena Born S.C.
Rachel Born Ala.

Mancy Martin, Housekeeper, born Miss.

I thought this might be of interest to you. It shows that your Great grandfather was still in Alabama in 1860, or else that he had returned from his Western trip. Cornelius, his brother went to Grant County, Arkansas, around 1858 and was there when the 1860 census was made, but returned and died in Fayette County, Ala., in 1862.

I am enclosing herewith a copy of some material I obtained from the Archives records, on film, in the local library. I am of the opinion that Elijah A; Holliman served inthe Confederate army, although there were some on both sides during the war.

I am sure that the Archives Department of Miss. at Jackson, Miss., would have a copy of George A. Holleman's book on file. The Birmingham Library has two copies. The Library of Congress also has a copy. There were about 500 books printed and sold by George A. Holleman, and most of these are in Mississippi. The Delk family was related to George, so a good many of the books went to members of that family. If you will keep searching I am sure that eventually you will get to look at one of these volumes. As to our family, however, it commences with Cornelius, born 1792, who married Elizabeth Plyler. There was a mass movement of the Hollimans around 1836 to Alabama and Mississippi, from whence they scattered into the West. Eventually I hope to do some work at the archives departments at Raleigh N.C. and Columbia S.C. and possibly connect up some missing links.

Dear Mr. Holliman;

Please do not think me ungrateful for not answering your letter of Feb. 22nd much sooner. It has been the time of the year when Uncle Sam requires his yearly report, and he frowns upon people who for any reason, fails to get it in on time—at least that is what I have been told. At any rate the rush is temporarily over and I can go back to pleasure.

I have not heard from Ruby Sullivan for some time. In her last latter she mentioned a sick husband. I do hope that they have returned to normal health.

My mother is now back in my home. She is a wheel chair patient, suffering from rheumatic Arthritis, but is a very healthy minded 89year old. I am having great difficulty finding a sitter to take care of her. I am not old enough to be able to retire to take care of her.

The DAR Chapter has heard that I am doing research on my family. They have asked me to join. I am a little confused since I have not done this research myself. The Plyler book does not say anything about Henry Plyler having been a Revolutionary War Soldier and Mrs Sullivan is a Member through Conrad Plyler's service. I may have overlooked this or maybe it is not in there. Mr. Starnes says he got most of his information from Mrs. Sullivan. Mrs. Sullivan says that in my ancestry there is James Holliman and also James Mcmillian who are Revolutionary War Soldiers.

If Hans Heindrich Bluiler fought in this war I can go in on him. I had thought I might go in on James Holliman since that was my mother's name but unless you have the dates etc. and are willing to help me with them it will take some time to acquire this information. James Mcmillian is the grandfather of Mary Elizabeth Plyler but there also it will take research to find the data required. I am enclosing an application form rather than trying to tell you what data is required. If and when I go back to Washington D C I plan to do more research in the libraries there. They are so rich in information that I love to go there.

Thank you so much for the exerts you sent me from the Archives on the Civil War Hollimans. I am most grateful to you. If you do not have the information I am asking for, please do not worry about it as, being a genealogist myself, I understand how hard it is to find even the smallest bit of information sometimes. Any help whatsoever you can give me in this matter will be most appreciated.

P.S. Did 2 Somewhere overlook sincerely your cousin the fact that Hans Heindrich Bluille was a R. W. Solding?

Dear Mrs. Flanagan:

I note that you are trying the DAR, and I hope that you succeed, for I have a couple of children who are also interested. I have made some preliminary study for them, but have as yet not been able to assemble the necessary proof which I know will be required. I have an Aunt, Err. Earl Ray, formerly of St. Louis, Mo., who now resides at Tuscalogsa, Ala. I have been trying to assist her in getting in the DAR through the Blakeney line. My Grandmother Blakeney(original name), married my Grandfather George W. Baker and this connection has a proven DAR connection through the line of Captain John Blakeney of Chesterfield County, J.C. However, she has been unable to prove one connecting link, and hence is not in the DAR yet.

Our ancestor Cornelius Holliman was closely associated with these Blakeney's in the NW corner of Chesterfield Co. 3.6. (Near the settlement of Dudley). The Blakeney family cemetery is near Dudley and it is owned by the local DAR chapter at Monroe N.3.

I have read Herman Starnes book several times, but it leaves me confused. I do not know where he got his information that our Elizabeth Flyler Holliman was a daughter of Paul Flyler. It is possibly so, but I did not supply him the information, for I did not know this. I believe that this would be a difficult link to prove up, if you plan to use the Plyler line as an approach to DAR. Mrs. Sullivan is a member of DAR through the Flyler line, and she can probably be of help to you. Both she and her husband afe getting along inyears, and he is not in good health. Her efforts in genealogical work are somewhat hampered, as she cannot get away from home to study.

I think that it would be worth while to travel to Madesboro, in Ansth County, N.C. and to Lancaster, in Lancaster County, S.C. and to Chesterfield, in Chesterfield County, S.C. for work in the country records. I have planned on this for several years, but thus far have not found the time to do it. Deed records, showing sales by heirs of lands, marriage records etc., should be helpful in tieing some of the missing points together.

I am enclosing herewith some data from my records, which may be helpful to you. I have not written the N.C. Archives Department of data on James Holliman, but I am pretty sure, from various indicators that he is nur ancestor. He was born in 1750, moved to

Forgive me if I omit an occasional "L" from your name. As you have said, some of the Holimans did drop a letter. I know that the men in our branch of the family were not as highly educated as some of the others might have been, but I do know that they could all read and write. Why they would have dropped the letter is one of those things that happen that cause families to lose members. My mother went as far in school as she could in Texas without leaving home. Her Mother's father was a schoolteacher before he moved to Arkansas and he saw to the education of his children even though they pioneered the wild country.

I'm sure we will have to go to the counties in N. C. and S. C. for further information. I would love to go to Ashville NC soon but I do not know how I can get away. I plan to get the maps that I will need etc. just in case the opportunity should present itself this Summer.

I am wondering if any descendants of Dr. Josh in the Hot Springs area are interested in our research, and if so how much they know. He seemed to have gone farther with education than some of the others and may have left valuable records somewhere. Have you contacted any of them? I am told by friends that there are Holimans living there and presume that they are our good Doctor's posterity. I had planned to try to contact some of them when I started Holiman research but found you first. I will write a letter or two and see what I can discover. I will let you know anything new I find. I feel that several people working together can accomplish more and faster.

Thank you again for the material in your letter which I recieved yesterday. Somewhere there is going to be the information that we are looking for.

I have contacted some of Dr. Josh's kin in Hot Springs but they are quite vague about anyone beyond their grandfather, the Doctor. Dr. (Uncle Josh) Holliman had some fires during the Civil war and all of his records were destroyed they think.

Mrs. Alba Thomason who is the daughter of the Dr.'s som Cornelius has written to me. Her: home is in Clayton, New Mexico but she has been visiting in Hot Springs and Little Rock. She was a child when her father died and has had little contact with the remainder of the Holimans. Mose Holiman, Son of Steve and first cousin of Mrs. Thomason lives in Hot Springs, is a retired car dealer, an interesting personality I am told, but he has not written to me. I presumed it was because he had no information.

Mrs Iva Hibbs of Dequeen Ark, is the daughter of one of the doctor's daughters. She did not tell me which one. She is the one who told me of the fire. On checking her letter again I find that the fire was in 1910 or 1911 and it almost destroyed Hot Springs and nearly all of the records. Her mother kept the old family record for years but she does not know where it went after her mothers death ... a pity. So far I have drawn mostly blanks in Hot Springs but it was a dim hope to start with. So until later I remain

I am hopeful that this spring I will be able to do some extensive work on our family line. I believe, however that County records in Anson County, N.C. and Landaster County, S.C. will have to be checked. James Holliman, the Revolutionary War Soldier was born in Johnston County, M.C. according to his war record. Early records of that County might reveal the name of his Father.

Indications are that James Sr. had a large family. Cornelius could have been a younger son, or even a grandson. Cornelius lived near Willis H. in 1820, and could have been his son, with Willis being an older son of James Sr. Records show that they all lived in the same community.

In submitting proofs on your DAR application, try to get them from old records, etc., and it might be well, and helpful if you got your mother to make a detailed affidavit giving your family record back to your great grandfather. I have had my mother do this in our family, and will be glad to let you have a copy of her affidavit as an outline to go by, if you need to borrow same. I suggest you make some search for connecting links in Anson, Lancaster and Chesterfield Counties before you submit application. I hope that you will supply me with any such data, if you get same. Mrs. Sullivan has a friend, Mrs. Carter who is retired and lives in Washington, and likes to do research. She might help you.

Dear Mr. Holliman;

Without success I tried to stay well this winter. Sorry not to have written sooner. I also moved my business location besides yearly bookwork, so no time was left for research. I hope to start again now.

Some Holiman stories I thought you might enjoy was told recently by my 90 year old mother, Martha (Mattie) Jane Holiman Ryan.

In the first place, she figured that Elija A. Holiman did not come to Arkansas until her father "Bud" was 12 years old. This would have been Winter ca 1868. This would have placed Elija in Alabama during the Civil War and I have sent for his Military service papers from there.

She said that the Holimans, (family of Cornelius Holliman) were feuders. They carried on their childhood battles after they were grown—among themselves as though they were still children. The reason Bud had no other name for a long time was that he was named for Dr. Josh. Mom said that he was entered in the Family Bible as Jody Lee. While Bud was still an infant, Elija got mad at Josh and scratched the name out of the Bible and never did give the child another name. When Bud was five years old, they were at the general store one day. The subject of his name was discussed and the owner told Bud that he would give him a new straw hat if he would take his name. Bud went home with new straw hat and a name. Moses? Some time later he added the William, but he was always known in the family as simply "Bud". Grandma did not want to call him that and always called him "Billy".

This story I hesitate to tell you--but Bud Holiman told it with a big hearty laugh. One day Dr. Josh was mad at one of his sisters. He had to go on a call that took him by her house and she happened to be standing in the door. He did not want to speak to her, so he turned his head in the other direction and pretended not to see her. After he was past the speaking point and it was apparent to her that he was going to completely ignore her, she trilled at him, "Speak ass, Mouth womt".

Mrs Sullivan said that Cornelius daughter, Sarah, was another lost member of the family. Mom said that after they moved to Tom Green Co., Texas --ca 1892--one of the daughters of a daughter of Cornelius came to visit them--she thought perhaps from Missouri. She did not know which daughter was her mother. Her name Was "Sally" Coperel. Her husband was Charlie. They had Lige, a school teacher. Jim, who later went to a Texas college. Henry, not too bright (Mom said) but he could do heavy work. Mack. Rosetta, had married a Marshall and did not come out till later. Then there was Louisa, Lizzy and Martha Lee. 4 boys and 4 girls. Sally was Grandpa's first cousin.

Your letter of March 31st received, and I was very glad to hear from you again. I note the interesting stories about our Holiman kin. Apparently the early settlers in Alabama were pretty quick tempered. I know that Charles Daniel Lucas. who was an early settler at Newtonville in Fayette County, and who was one of the trustees named in the deed to Old Springhill Primatic Baptist Church, was also of the same type. His oldest daughter was the 2nd wife of Cornelius Holliman, our common ancester. She had previously been married to William Rainwater, and was widowed after they moved to Newtonville. Our great-great Grandmother Elizabeth Flyler had also died there. After Cornelius married the 2nd time, only Elijah stayed near him. They moved from Newtonville to the northerly part of Fayette County, and settled there, Elijah with his Father. Uriah, the brother of Elijah married Mapy (Rolly) Lucas, a younger sister of Elizabeth Mainwater, and while the whole crowd was living near Newtonville, the Charles Daniel Lucas family had a big split up. It seems that Charles Daniel Lucas administered a licking to one of his kids, and the balance of the family got madm, and moved to the Northerly part of Fayette County, leaving Old Charles Daniel by himself. He lived out the balance of his life at Newtonville, and was buried in an indian grave yard on the Menz Hughes farm about 2 miles North of Newtonville. His grave is known and identified. Apparently, Uriah and his crowd were not too closely associated with Elijah and Cornelius thereafter, so it confirms what you say about their squabbling.

Nothing is known about Sarah, the daughter of Cornelius and Elizabeth Plyler. I think she went to Arkansas with her brother, Dr. Josh. I have a reference to an "Aunt Sarah", who married a Reynolds. The Reynolds family were also among the early settlers at Newtonville, and some of them moved on to Arkansas about the time Warren Holliman and his group left.

I am enclosing herewith some data on the Sally Coperel you mention. I have had considerable correspondence with Mrs. Hollie Marshall McLaughlin, of 5222 Homer St., Dallas, 6, Texas, who supplied the information. I hope that you will find it interesting.

Some of us, sometime, ought to check deed records of Lancaster County, S.C., and the same records in Anson County, N.C. on Cornelius, Warren and Charles Holliman. Since REV. War. James, came from Johnston County, N.C., the deed records there might interesting. I have beard that some of the Anson Chunty Hollims

The papers finally came that I ordered from Washington DC. I made the copy inclosed for your files.

The description is a surprise to me as my own grandfather, Bud, was a very tall man, over six feet-blue eyes and medium complexion. Grandmother was very small. She could stand under his outstretched arm without touching it with the top of her head when they were married, they said. My mother and I both inherited his height, being about 5 8%" which is tall for women. Mom is stooped now as was grandpa in his later years. I will ask Mom next weekend if this description is correct for him.

This paper also proves how wrong legend can be. I was sure that the family said that he fought only for a few months, (true), but that he was with the North, (false), a point you were so sure was wrong.

I searched the 1860 and 1870 Newton Co. Ark. census but could not locate either of my great-grandparents. I know that they were there in 1870. That was about the time Mary and Francis died and they were buried in that County. Elija was still in Alabama in 1860 but my grandfather Byler was there. I searched and researched and am positive they were not listed. They must have been OUT in the sticks. Bud Holiman visited the graves of Mary and Francis before my mother was married and she said that the country was very wild.

Nothing else new at this time so will stop for now.

Pardon my delay in answering your letter of June 10th. I have reviewed my file and have no record on Pelly Ann Holliman who married Milton D. Barnes, probably in S.C. or GA. River Falls, is in Southern Alabama, near Red Level. I recently met a lady here in a business transaction who stated that as a young lady she once went with a Holliman boy near Andalusia, which is also in the section Mrs. Barnes Mentioned. Evidently the same family of Hollimans are still In that section. The name "Polly" probably was a family nicname, and the name probably was "Mary", as this was the case in my own Great Grandmother's name.

I will keep the name Mrs. Albert Barnes, Box 131, Groesbeck, Texas, 76742 in my files, and if I run into any data on the family will wrate her.

My wife and I have just returned from a short vacation with our daughter, son-in-law and three grand daughters at Maguna Beach, near Panama City. The weather here has been very hot and dryk but we found it the same down there. Had an enjoyable trip however. Our son and his family are in New Foundland, Canada, on a camper trip, and will return in August. He will then go to Wallops Island, Virginia, for a two weeks project for NASA, and then return to his teaching work at Blacksburg, Virginia.

I received the data on Elijah Holliman, and appreciate it very much. It is entirely possible that he may have served another time in the Confederate Army. He may have enlisted in another branch, as I have found this so in other cases. Lt. James F. Holliman, Elijah's nephew served two times under different enlistments. You will remember that when the siege of Vicksburg was going on, General Johnston tried to raise another army to lift the siege. A great many Alabama people were taken into this second army. My Great grandfather Uriah Holliman, and one of his sons died at Oklona, Mississippi, in May 1862, following Shiloh. My Great-Grandmother, Polly (Mary) Holliman, lived near Webster in Fayette County, and drove a two mule wagon from her home, to Oklona, some sixty-five miles away, to wait on her husband and son. She remained to bury them, and having contracted measles from them, drove back to Fayette County, alone, after the funerals. She was a mid-wife and said to be the only doctor in Lamar County, Alabama, during the War. My father, and four of his brothers were delivered by her.

Dear Mr. Holliman;

The data on the living members of our branch of the family is something that I neglected when I was doing my active research. Because of the permanent records that are being printed, I am gathering all of the information that I can get on the family of William Moses Holiman b 9 July, 1856.

I do not know how much education the children of Cornelius Holliman had, or how much education his son Elija Alexander Holiman was able to get. The spelling of the Name was changed here for all the descendants of this men, and that usually means that there was a lack of &chooling somewhere. When Elija A. Holiman moved to Arkansas, he settled in one of the wildest parts of the state and I am sure there were no schools for the children to attend. When my mother was a girl and they were living in Texas, her father, William Moses Holiman decided that he would move back to the place where they lived when his sisters died. They went by covered wagon and camped at the spring that heads up White River in Washington County. WG Grandpa took one of the horses and went on. Mama said that he was gone all day. When he came back, he said that he had found the graves, which had been mounded over with rocks for protection, but that he did not want to stay They started there because the country was just too wild. back to Texas the next day. When William Moses Holiman married Lurana Love Byler, he could not read or write. Lurana's father had moved to Arkansas from Tennessee he had taught a little school even though at the time he was young. He and his wife, Serena Patton were parents of eleven children and they were taught at least the three Rs. Lurana taught her husband to read and write.
