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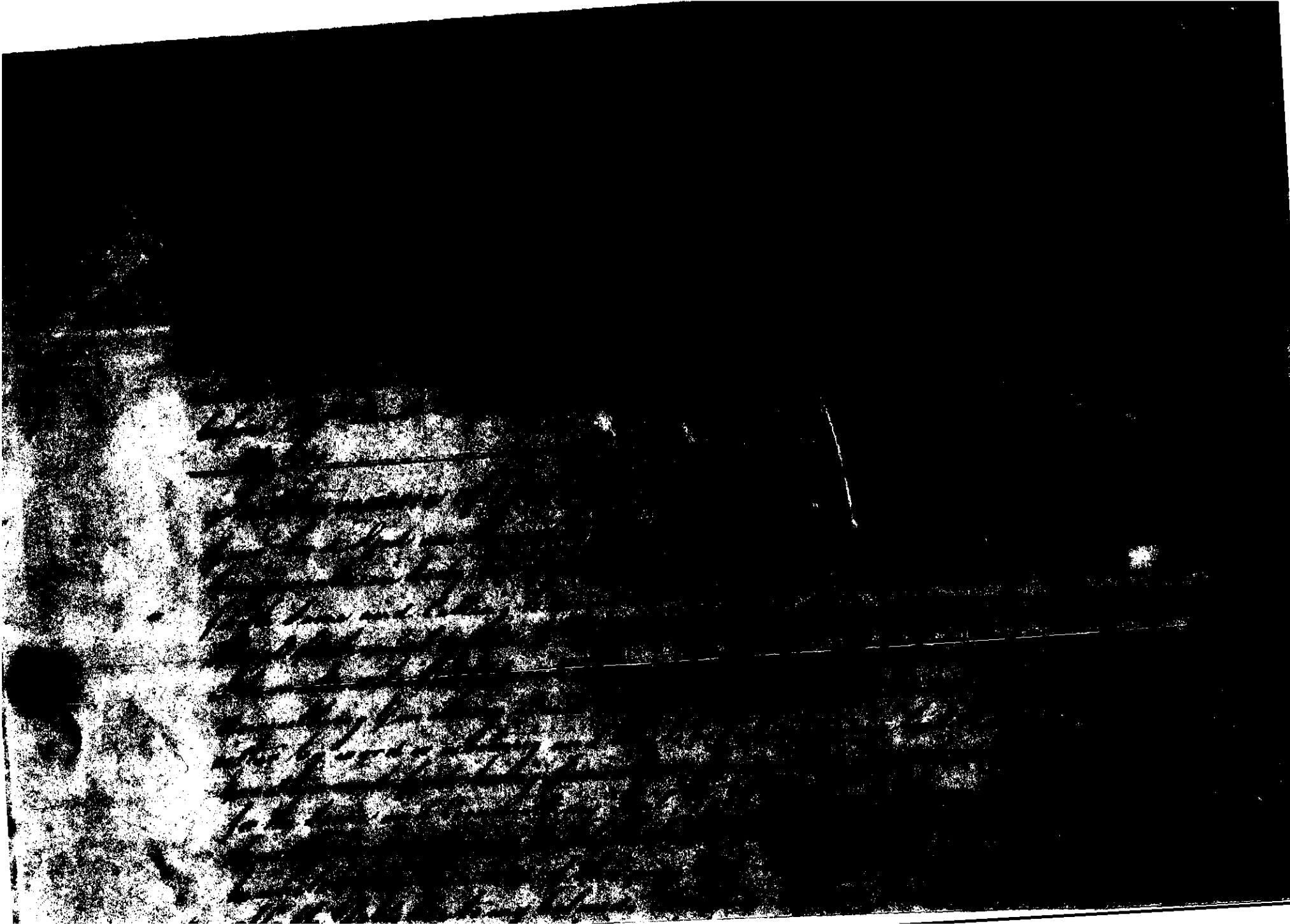
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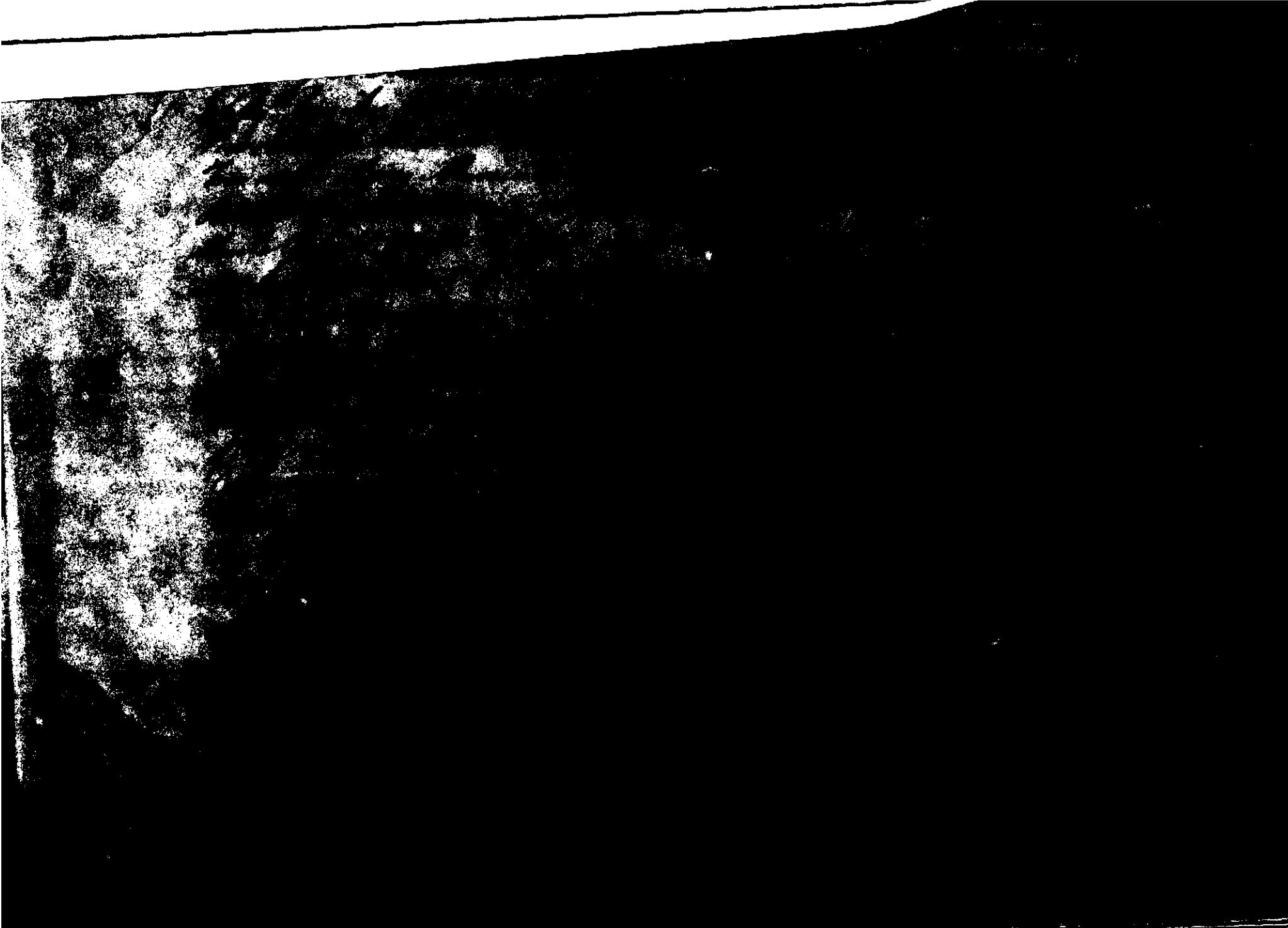
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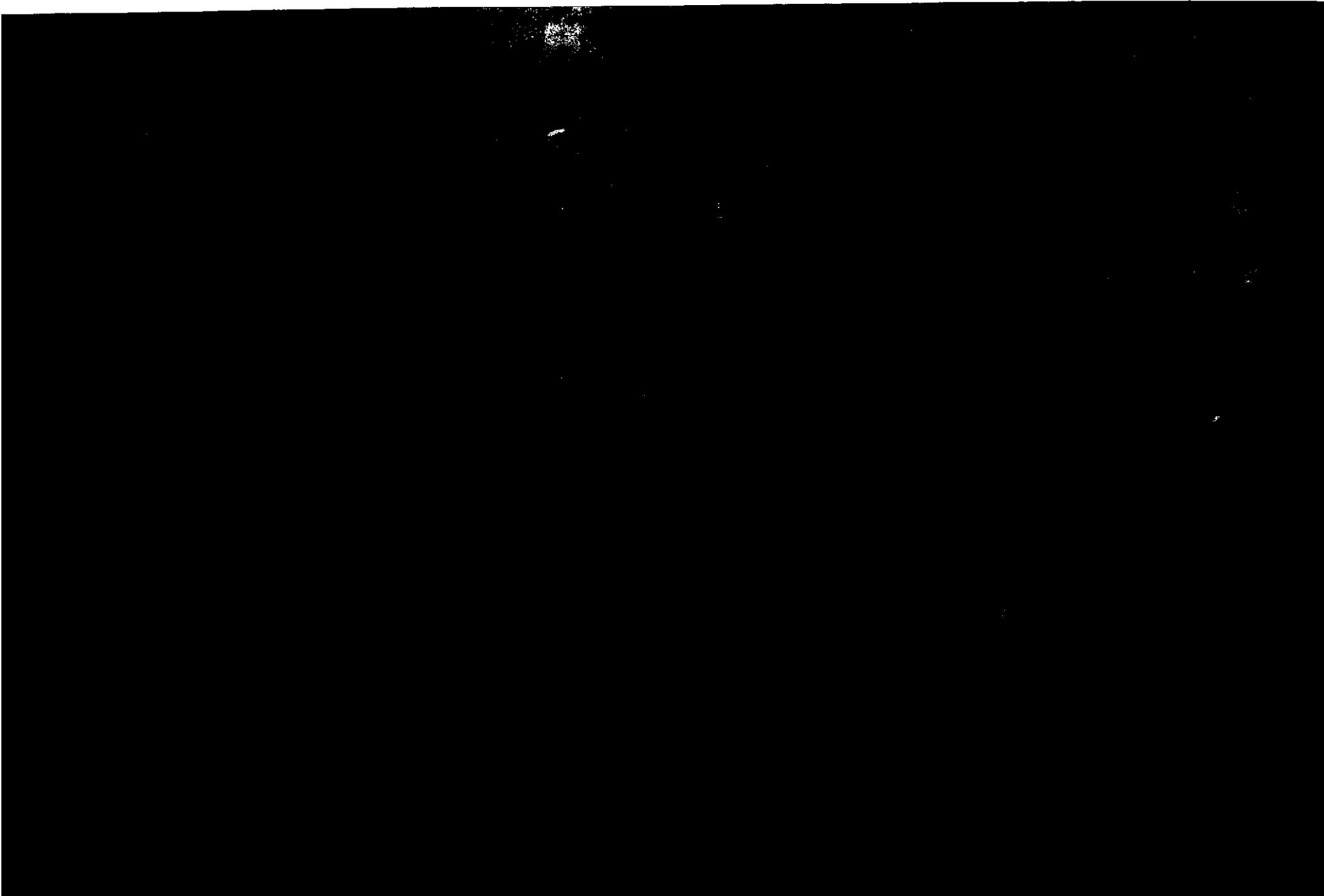

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7th 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. On comparing these papers with the following rules and the subjoined notes you will readily perceive that objections exist, which must be removed, before a pension can be allowed. The notes and the regulations will show what is necessary to be done. Those points to which your attention is more particularly directed, you will find marked in the margin with a brace, (thus: }) You will, when you return your papers to this Department, send this printed letter with them, and you will, by complying with this request, greatly facilitate the investigation of your claim.

seventy four years, a resident of the county and state
aforesaid, who being first duly sworn according to law
in his oath, make the following declaration in order
to obtain the benefit of an act of Congress passed June
1832.

John Bell states that he entered the service of
United States and served in the revolutionary war under the
following named officers as herein stated - The state
was born in Cumberland County, state of North Carolina
on the 8th day of April 1758 and moved to this county
in the year 1780 in Cumberland county, Tennessee.

He entered the service as a drafted soldier under Captain

John Singleton in his company of Infantry and served 2 months
there was in the year 1778. In the year 1779, in the month

February and served as a drafted soldier for 3 months in Captain

Moore's company of Infantry - In the month of June following

served another tour in the same company of Infantry and

under the same Capt Moore - Col Richardson being the
Commander of the regiment

In the year 1780 served during the month of May in Capt

Moore's company of Infantry in Col Richardson's regiment

In the year 1781 he entered the service as a volunteer

in Captain Bell's company of ~~Infantry~~ in Col Richardson's

regiment and continued therein from first of the month

to the December following a period of nine months

after this he was in service every third month until the

close of the war but cannot state positively how long

he served but would state to the best of his recollection

he served two tours of one month each under Captain

Hill -
John H. Mos.

The first battle he was in was in Georgia, at ~~the~~
and was under the command of Capt. ~~the~~
Col Sharp was the commander of the ~~the~~ ~~the~~

Charleston and took thirty British prisoners -
The further states that he moved from South Carolina
to Georgia, thence to Williamson County Tennessee where
he lived 17 years and then moved in 1822 to Madison
County Tennessee - When there being friends some of his
friends ~~and~~ to make application to the
Government for a pension for him, and to produce
necessary testimony he wrote to his brother in law
China who sent him the annexed testimony in the year
of 1830 which is filed in support of his declaration -
He has no documentary evidence, having kept his dollars
with some continental money until they were eaten up by
worms or insects -

During his tour of nine months as a volunteer under
Captain Hill he furnished his horse, and during this
time the Tories burned his house and all contained
therein - He had a good horse saddle and bridle
taken from him by the British soldiers -
He hereby relinquishes every claim to an annuity or
pension except the present, and declares that he
is not on the pension roll of any agency of the

a part of the Revolutionary War that is to say from
the beginning of the year 1781 till the Spring of 1782

or close of the war a period of near one year
These deponents believe and that he was afterwards

as they verily believe honourably discharged. That
they know from the belief and report of those times

that the said John Odil performed and served some
small tours of service in said war as a drafted

private before he entered the service but cannot state
any of the particulars thereof. They state that the

said John Odil was always accounted for man
of veracity and good standing and character

whilst they know him as a man who had
unquestionably been a faithful soldier in behalf

of the American Cause during the Revolutionary
war. These deponents also state the former that

he is sixty nine years of age and the latter that he
is seventy years of age on the 14th day of April
