SMITH, JAMES (1792–1855). James Smith, soldier, planter, and politician, was born in Spartanburg County, South Carolina, on September 10, 1792, the son of David and Bersheba (Harrington) Smith. He volunteered in the War of 1812 and fought in the Creek Indian wars and as a lieutenant under Andrew Jackson at the battle of New Orleans. After the war he returned to South Carolina, where in 1816 he married Hannah Parker. The couple became the parents of eleven children. In 1819 the Smiths moved to Lincoln County, Tennessee, where Smith led a vigilance committee against the Indians. He and Sam Houston^{qv} were both colonels in the Tennessee militia in 1835. Smith came to Texas in March 1835, settled in Nacogdoches, and established an extensive plantation. On April 9, 1835, Gen. Sam Houston introduced him, by letter, to business associates in New York as Colonel Smith. He wrote from New York to Sam Houston on November 28, 1835, that he was shipping 100 first-rate rifles to Natchitoches, Louisiana, and planning to bring well-equipped troops to Texas from Tennessee to fight against Mexico. Smith's wife and children arrived in Nacogdoches on January 1, 1836, along with his sister and brother-in-law, Andrew Hamilton. Smith arrived with his troops and entered the service of the revolutionary army^{qv} as captain of cavalry of the Nacogdoches Mounted Volunteers on April 11. After the victory at San Jacinto, he went immediately to army headquarters there and, on May 4, 1836, was appointed inspector general with the rank of colonel by Gen. Thomas J. Rusk^{qv}. He served with Rusk from headquarters at Victoria until September 5, 1836. On September 8, 1836, he was appointed by Sam Houston to raise companies to build forts and protect settlers west of Nacogdoches. During 1837–38, when relationships with Indians were particularly troublesome, the Smith plantation at Nacogdoches became a refuge for the harried settlers of the surrounding counties.

Smith commanded the second battalion of Rusk's regiments at the battle of the Neches^{qv}, in which Chief Bowl^{qv} was slain, in July 1839. On March 7, 1840, he was elected a brigadier general and took command of the Third Brigade on the northwest frontier with Mexico. He remained there until August 19, 1844, when he was ordered by President Sam Houston to command the troops detached to suppress the Regulator-Moderator War^{qv} in Shelby County. Smith represented Rusk County in the Texas House of Representatives from February 16, 1846, until December 13, 1847. Smith County, organized in April 1846, was named in his honor. The city of Henderson, named for his friend James Pinckney Henderson^{qv}, was built on land given to Smith for his services to the Republic of Texas^{qv}. He died on December 25, 1855, and was buried with military honors in a brick vault in Smith Park at Henderson. In an address of 1873 Guy M. Bryan^{qv} attributed the Lone Star emblem to Smith: "A half century since, overcoats were ornamented with large brass buttons. It happened that the buttons on the coat of General Smith had the impress of a five pointed star. For want of a seal, one of these buttons was cut off and used."

SMITH, JAMES FRANKLIN (1868–1920). James Franklin Smith, pastor and civic reformer, son of John Wesley and Emily Elizabeth (Combs) Smith, was born on December 24, 1868, near Gadsden, Crockett County, Tennessee. His scant rural schooling during Reconstruction^{qv} was followed by four years of teaching. While sustaining himself by part-time teaching and preaching, he attended Bethel College, McKenzie, Tennessee, graduated in 1892, and was ordained the same year. He received the B.D. degree from Cumberland University at Lebanon, Tennessee, in 1895. In 1896 he took an A.M. degree from

Columbia University and was graduated the same year from the Union Theological Seminary in New York. He accepted a call from the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Dallas, Texas, in October 1896, and came to a small congregation worshipping in a long frame building in a residential section of the city. This pastorate, which Smith held for the rest of his life, was marked by an unusual growth in membership and enlarged church properties. Within fifteen months a new, downtown church was completed and renamed Central Presbyterian Church. Under Smith's leadership a City Temple was completed in time for his church to serve as host to the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., in 1918. Save for a six-month trip abroad in 1901, Smith gave his entire time to his church and causes such as the abolition of race-track gambling, prostitution, and open saloons on Sunday. Smith was the recipient of many honors outside his own congregation, including an honorary doctorate from Trinity University in 1906. The general assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., named him moderator for 1918–19, the highest honor the church can bestow. During his period as moderator, the New Era movement was launched. His first book, an exposition of his religious concepts and personal philosophy, was published in 1914 under the title *My Father's Business and Mine*. His autobiography, *A Journey across Fifty Friendly Years* (1920), was written and finished shortly before his death. On September 9, 1904, he married Lillian Duff Neal of Louisville, Kentucky; they had two sons. Smith died on July 15, 1920.

SMITH, JAMES NORMAN (1789–1875). James Norman Smith, pioneer teacher, churchman, and county surveyor, was born in Richmond County, North Carolina, on September 14, 1789. From 1808 until 1840 he lived in Tennessee, where he farmed and taught school; James K. Polk was one of his students. In 1840 he arrived at Indianola, Texas, and made his way to the Upper Cuero Creek Settlement^{qv} in what is now DeWitt County. There he began a long career of political and social leadership. He was among the organizers of the Cumberland Presbyterian church there and was the first elder in the region. At Clinton he continued his church work as elder, Sunday school organizer, and recruiter. Smith's school at Upper Cuero Creek was the first organized in the vicinity. After surveying the nearby town of Concrete in 1846, he moved first to Cameron, then to Clinton, where he took up the duties of county clerk, a position he held from 1846 to 1865. He also operated a store in conjunction with his duties as county surveyor, Masonic leader, and schoolmaster. He died on March 21, 1875, and probably was buried beside his second wife, Elizabeth Hungerford Moorehead Smith, in the Old Clinton Cemetery. He left four volumes of memoirs that illuminate antebellum life in North Carolina, Tennessee, and the Guadalupe valley of Texas.

SMITH, JOHN (ca. 1795–?). John Smith, one of the first Texas Rangers^{qv} and a member of Stephen F. Austin's^{qv} Old Three Hundred^{qv}, was born about 1795. He moved to Texas in 1822 or early 1823 and was listed in the first census of Texas, taken on March 3, 1823, as a resident of the Colorado District, a twenty-eight-year-old farmer with one horse. Throughout the winter of 1822 and the spring of 1823 the first Austin colonists camped along the Colorado River had been plagued by attacks from Indians, who had killed a number of their members, and from thieving bands of smugglers, who were traveling the contraband trails from Mexico to Louisiana. Alcalde^{qv} John Jackson Tumlinson, Sr.,^{qv} and Capt. Robert H. Kuykendall^{qv} requested

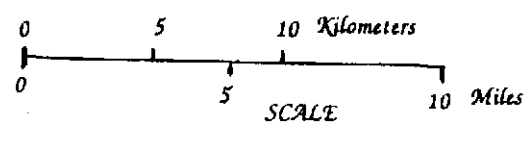

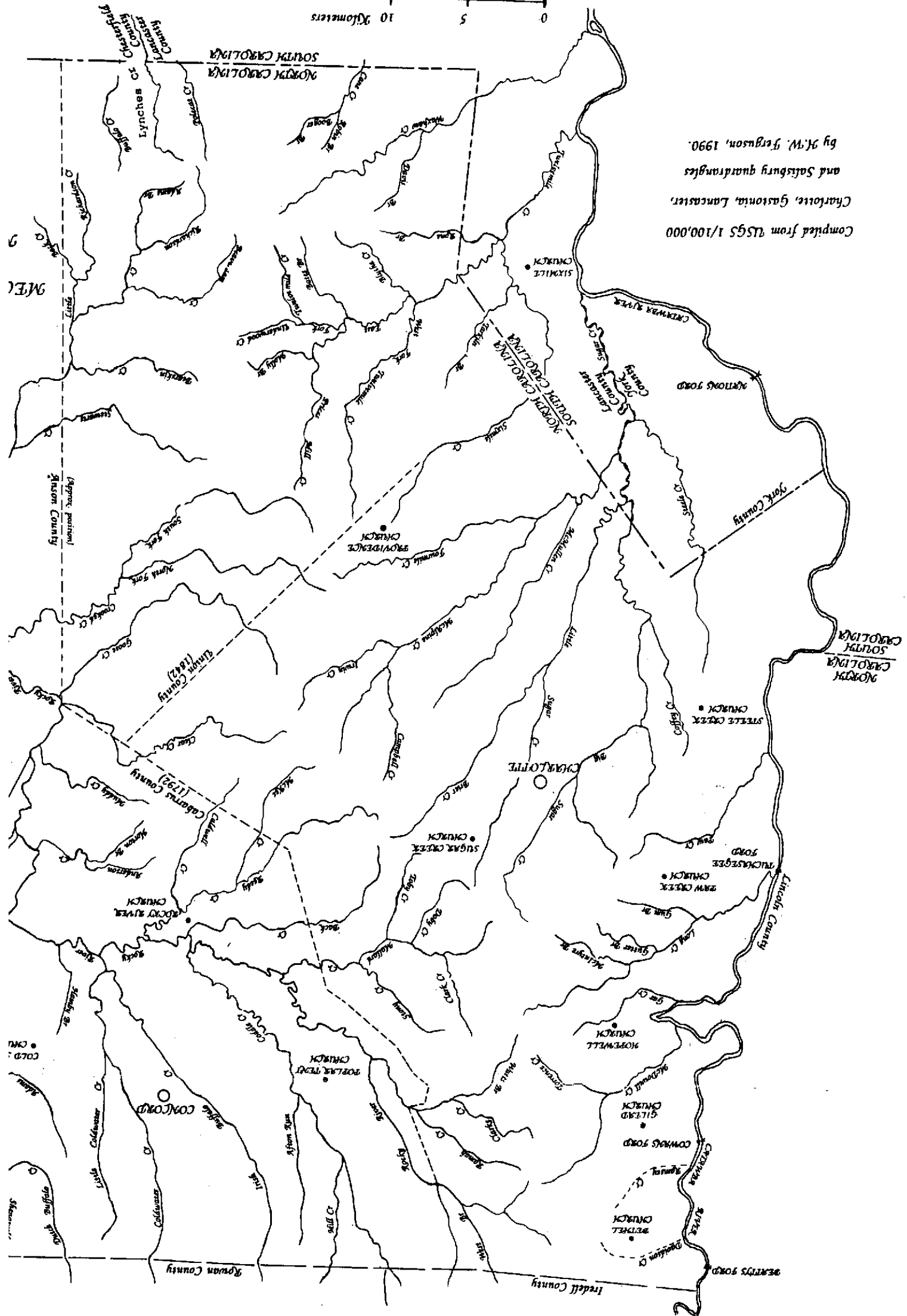


Sketch Map of
