On this Twenty Third day of January in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty three I personally appeared in open Court, before the undersigned Judge of said County, now sitting, Margaret Smith, aged 34 years, who being first duly sworn according to law, and on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the Act of Congress passed February 8th 1853.

That she is the widow of Henry Smith who was a Revolutionary Pensioner under the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 at the rate of Ninety Six Dollars per annum payable at the Georgia Agency at Savannah.

That she was married to the said Henry Smith on the 10th day of February in the year 1819 in the County of Franklin and State of Georgia by one Adam Loney a Justice of the Peace, and that her maiden name was Margaret Henning, for proof of which she refers to the Certificate of the Ordinary of said County herewith presented.

That she lived with her said husband Henry Smith from the time of their marriage, to wit, the 10th day of February 1819 to the 8th day of January 1840 it being the day of his death and that she is still a widow and was a widow at the passage of the above named Act.

That her said husband Henry Smith died in the County of Franklin and State of Georgia on the 8th day of January 1840.

That she is known to James H. Chappell, Samuel Stone and William Brumbyer who live in her immediate neighborhood and can testify to her identity as the widow of the

said Henry Smith

That she now resides in the 215th Company Regiment of the
Franklin County and has resided there for the space of
four years and that previous thereto she resided
County Georgia

Declarant refers to affidavit of John R. Smith, Esq
Smith and John Thomas as proof of the death
of her said husband Henry Smith

She hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a Pension or
annuity except the present, and declares that her
name is not on the Pension Roll of the Agency
of any State within her knowledge.

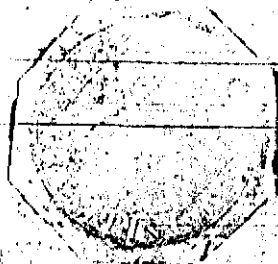

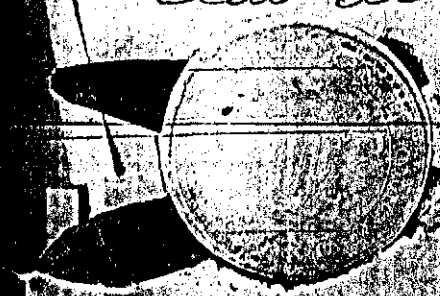

Declarations

In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed
June 7, 1832.

State of Georgia
County of Franklin's ss.

On this twenty eighth day

in the year Eighteen hundred and thirty three personally
in open Court before the Superior Court of said County
sitting Henry Smith a resident of Capt. Newell's District
in said County, aged Seventy three years, who being
lawfully sworn according to Law doth on his oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832
That he entered the Service of the United States under the
following named Officers and served as herein stated. He
was drafted in York District South Carolina for three months
under Capt. Robt. McFee, and was marched under him
and Col. Thomas Vane to Verree river in Georgia thence
to Greene near Philip's Fort where they staid about a month
thence was marched home and was discharged by Capt
McFee having served ^{as a private soldier} three months. This to the best of his
recollection was in the autumn of 1776.

The time of his being drafted at York is remembered by
Capt. McFee and he was marched under him to Major Ross
to South Carolina opposite to the mouth of Georgia and thence
to Col. Williams, also a Regiment of Regulars, but does not recollect
the names of the officers of Capt. Thomas Prince a Lieutenant, who was
seriously wounded at Monks Bluff, was marched from there
to Briar creek in Georgia where he joined Genl. Ashe was
at the Battle at Briar creek, but was out on a scouting party as
a trooper during the fight & the British having encamped on our Camp
ground his detachment was near being taken on their return as
they thought to their own Camp, but they escaped, and only one
who was taken prisoner. He & the rest retreated to Philips
McKamsar of South Carolina, from thence he was marched to
Georgia, after some Indians, who had taken and burned off
Head a thousand with the Indians near Rocky Camp where
Major Ross was wounded and died after some time he was
quartered under Genl. Williams. He was then marched

having served two months as a private in a horse company
fighting his own horse.

His brother was first Lieutenant of a Company under Colonel
Barnet from York aforesaid and had marched to Chancell
about a week afterwards deponent started on horseback
to join them as a volunteer and joined the
day after the battle at Stono and was wounded
and his brother who was wounded at Stono ~~was~~
old Barracks Hospital & deponent was appointed
him and did so from June until August when he
served in the line two months as a private ^{by reason of the loss of his horse} and this time being
sent on the death of his brother he returned home, deponent
does not recollect what year it was.

Again volunteered at York aforesaid under Capt. Barrett
was under Col. Mator & Gen. Sumpter in the autumn of 1780
he thinks and was marched & joined Col. Sumpter the Re-
gulars at Monty Coma near Charleston - from thence after
the British & Tories near Cooper river did not come up with
them and returned to camp - thence to Granby in South
Carolina where the Tories were in a Fort which surrendered
and from thence was marched to Sugar river where we were
in a battle with the Tories at Blackstocks where Sumpter
was wounded & was carried to deponent's father, where depon-
ent was discharged by Gen. Sumpter having served three
months as a private horseman fighting his own horse.

Again volunteered at York aforesaid under Gen. Morgan
to pilot him through the Country, took them to Jacobus and
from thence deponent was sent out as a spy after Bill
Cunningham & the Tories of Bush river took two prisoners
& returned to camp when Col. Morington & his Regt. horse
joined Morgan, and deponent was sent to pilot Col. Morington
to Cunningham's camp on Bush river, where
they were defeated by Col. Morington who took a number
of prisoners & returned to camp. deponent was sent
as a guard & pilot of the prisoners to Roan - Col. Morington
& returned to camp where he arrived the day after the British
defeat. When he was sent upon Col. Morington to see up
the British struggles, was kept near the British
scouting upon the British for a considerable time.

in France under the command of Gen. Bland and was kept up under Capt. Bland after the
times till nearly the time of the battle of Cornwall
considered in October 1781. Served nine months of
his last recited duty as a private horseman feeding
horse. A part of the time under Col. John Mifflin
was sent to North Carolina.

Served altogether one year and seven months
as a private horseman feeding his own horse.

1. Was born in Rockingham County, Virginia in 1759 August 18th
2. Has a record of his age in his father's Bible at declarant's house
3. Lived at York District, South Carolina since the Revolution
any way he removed to his present residence 37 years ago
where he has resided ever since. to wit in the County of Wilkes
in and State of Georgia.
4. Was drafted the first three months and volunteered always
afterwards.
5. Has stated in the body of declaration
6. Never received a written discharge, nor any pay
that he recollects.
7. Is known to George Thornton - a preacher of the Gospel
and to George Cockburn & Elias Purges - who reside in his pre-
sent neighborhood and who can testify to his character
for veracity & to their belief of his having been a soldier
of the Revolution. Is also known to James Puley of Elbert
County, a preacher, who served a part of the time with
declarant & to whom he sent to procure his testimony
but Puley was too unwell to attend court. declarant will
yet try to procure his testimony.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or gratuity
except the present, and declares that his name is not
on the Pension roll of any Agency of any State, within his
knowledge.

Sir: In reply to your letter of the
5th inst. in regard to the claim of
August Johnson as administrator of the
estate of Margaret Smith who was a
pensioner under the Act of
Feb 3 1853 No. 418, I would state
that the name of the pensioner
having been dropped from the
rolls it can not be restored
upon the application of the
administrator. The twenty sixth section
of the Act of March 3 1872 provides
that when the name of a widow
has been stricken from the rolls
on account of her failure to
any cause to claim pension
within three years after it became
due the right to claim restoration
of the name of the pensioner to the
rolls extends no farther than to the
minor children of the soldier.
As there is no minor child of the
soldier, this claim is rejected.
