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CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS  
PROMPTING MIGRATION  
OF FAMILY GROUPS

- 1457 Henry VII born, the son of Edmund Tudor. m. 1486 Elizabeth of York, dtr. of Edward IV. Throne 1485. Died 1509.
- 1485-1509 Reign of Henry VII, of the House of Tudor
- 1485 Battle of Bosworth Field.
- 1491 Birth of Henry VIII, second son of Henry VII. m. six times. Ruled 1509-1547.
- 1492 Columbus discovers America.
- 1509-1547 Reign of Henry VIII, son of Henry VII, despotic Tudor monarch. By Anne Boelyn father of Elizabeth I.
- 1513 James IV of Scotland slain by British. Battle of Flodden. Battle of Spurs.
- 1517 Martin Luther begins Protestant Revolt.
- 1534 Henry VIII broke with Papacy when Clement VIII refused to annul his marriage to Catherine of Aragon so he might marry Anne Boelyn. Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury declares marriage null and void. Parliament proclaimed the King head of the Church of England. (Act of Supremacy). Church lands and funds confiscated. Many Catholics who refused to pledge loyalty to Anglican Church executed.
- 1536 John Calvin publishes Institutes of the Christian Religion, giving impetus to protestant movement.
- 1537 Edward VI . Ruled 1547-53.
- 1539 Henry VIII proclaims the six articles.
- 1542 James V of Scotland defeated by English at Solway Moss, and soon dies.
- 1547-53 Edward VI, Henry's son reigns. Prayer Book revised. Became King age 9, died age 15. Edward Seymour, Earl of Herford named Protector. Reformation speeded up. Anglican Creed defined by Cranmer.
- 1553-58 Mary I (Bloody Mary), daughter of Catherine of Aragon, and Henry VIII reigns and favored Catholicism by acknowledging Papal supremacy and her marriage to the Catholic Phillip II of Spain.
- 1558-1603 Elizabethan Age. Elizabeth, daughter of Ann Boleyn, who was considered illegitimate by most Catholics, and Henry VIII,

reestablished Church of England. She was made head of the church, and her subjects ordered to conform to the approved ritual. Church of England assumed its permanent protestant form.

1560 Scottish Parliament established after Scottish Lords rebelled against the Catholic Regency of Mary of Guise Presbyterianism adopted.

1561-67 Mary, Queen of Scots assumes Scottish crown. After marrying the alleged murderer of her husband, she was compelled to abdicate and flee to England, where Elizabeth kept her as a prisoner.

1567. Mary's infant son James VI proclaimed king of Scots.

1570 Elizabeth excommunicated by Pius V.

1576 Sir Francis Drake attacks Cadiz.

1585 Sir Walter Raleigh and Greenville started a colony on Roanoke Island, off the coast of North Carolina, which had disappeared without a trace when a resupply ship arrived two years later.

1587 Elizabeth had Mary Queen of Scots executed for treason, leaving her son James VI of Scotland legal heir to the English throne, which he later assumed as James I, First of the Stuarts.

1588 Defeat of the Spanish Armada by Frobisher, Drake and Hawkins. 44 of 130 Spanish ships destroyed.

1603-1625 Reign of James I, son of Mary, Queen of Scots, who had been James VI of Scotland. Insisted on religious uniformity. A Protestant, he engaged in intrigues with the Catholic Church until the death of Elizabeth in an effort to regain the crown for his imprisoned mother.

1607 Jamestown settled by the Virginia Company

1607-1609 Pilgrims fled Leyden, in Holland, to avoid persecution in England.

1611 King James version of Bible published.

1612 Tobacco grown in Virginia

1618-1648 The Thirty Years War begins out of the Protestant Reformation in Europe.

1619 Virginia House of Burgesses meets for first time.

1620 A congregation of Pilgrims from Scrooby, Nottinghamshire left for Holland as a result of anti-puritan actions of the crown, first for Holland, and then arrive at Plymouth Colony, Mass.

1622 Powhatton Indians attack English Colony in VA.

1625-1649 Reign of Charles I, Stuart son of James I.

1626 Dutch secured Island of Manhattan

1628 Fall of Huguenots at New Rochelle

1628 Petition for Right placed some restrictions on rights of the King.

1629-1640 Parliament dissolved for 11 years by Charles I.

1629 Puritans organize Massachusetts Bay Company with charter from Charles I: Boston and Salem settlement begins 1630.

1630 Thomas Wentworth (who became the Earl of Stafford) became Lord Deputy of Ireland, and Bishop William Laud strengthened Church of England anti-Puritan, anti-Calvanistic attitudes which threatened the Reformation by insisting on continuity of Anglicanism with pre-reformation Catholicism. King Charles I tried to impose an episcopate and the English Book of Common Prayer on the Scots, which the General Assembly of the presbyterian Church resisted. Charles invaded Scotland, but was inadequately financed. Larger migrations of the 1630's were religious in nature.

??? Sent protestant Scots to Ulster, Ireland to replace the troublesome Irish Catholics who were displaced.

1632 Part of Virginia, which became Maryland, granted to George Calvert, Lord Baltimore, and his fellow Catholics as a proprietary colony with feudal tenure. Formally an Anglican colony, but Lord Baltimore zealously declared tolerance for other sects since he himself was Catholic.

1634 First settlement in Maryland under Lord Baltimore's son Cecilius.

1636 Thomas Hooker led settlers to the Connecticut River. Roger Williams, driven from Mass. by intolerance of Puritans, started Rhode Island colony.

1637 Dissenters from Mass. Bay colony settle Exeter, New Hampshire. ( Did not become a colony until 1680)

1640 Scots invaded 2 northern English counties. King Charles I endeavored to impose Anglican Liturgy on the Scottish Presbyterians (Calvinists) which brought them to open rebellion. Irish rebelled and killed 30,000 Protestants in Ulster. King Charles called long Parliament in Nov, which sentenced Stafford to death. Passed many reforms including right to dissolve itself, but refused money for war on the Scotch and Irish for fear he would use it against them instead.

1640-1660 The Long Parliament called by Charles I to secure money to fight the Scots..

1641 English Army requested to invade Ireland to save Church of England.

1642-1648. War between the Parliament and the King. Cromwell becomes leader. No monarch.

1642 Battle of Edgehill, and Battle of Worcester.

1643 Battle of Devizes and Newbury

1644 Battle of Marston Moore.

1645 Battle of Naseby

1647 Charles I surrendered to Scots, who turned him over to England.

1648 Cromwell defeats Scots army.

1649 Maryland Toleration Act designed to prevent persecution of Catholics.

1649 Charles I tried and executed by Rump Parliament.

1649-1659 The English Commonwealth under Cromwell. Virtual dictator 1653-1658.

1650 Irish rise in support of Charles II. Defeated by Cromwell at Wexford and Drogheda.

1650-1651 Cromwell defeats Scots at Dunbar and Worcester.

1651 English Navigation Act requires all colonial shipping to be on English bottoms.

1656-1659 War with Spain

1658 Sept. 3, Cromwell dies. Succeeded by his son Richard.

1659 Richard Cromwell flees to France. Restoration of Charles II.

1660 A Convention Parliament is formed, and Charles II returns from exile and restores the Monarchy and The Church of England, but his secret desire is to restore Catholicism and regain absolute power. Allowed Clarendon, his Chancellor, to enforce "The Clarendon Code" as listed below.

1661 Corporation Act denied office to Non-Anglicans

1662 Act of Uniformity prescribed Prayer Book. 1,000 forced from office.

1663 Carolina Colony chartered. Second Navigation Act passed.

1664 Conventicle Act provided for imprisonment or transportation of dissenters. Persecution not continuous or always effective, but civil disabilities not removed until 19th century.

1664 New Jersey chartered.

1665 The Five Mile Act. Penalties on Non-conformist ministers and meetings.

1665-1666 The great fire of London and the Plague

1667 Clarendon banished by Charles II for anti-catholicism.

1672-1674 The Third Dutch War.

1673 Parliament passed The Test Act requiring all officials to celebrate the Anglican communion and disavow the doctrine of transsubstantiation. Third navigation act passed.

1675-1676 King Philip's War in New England.

1676 Bacons Rebellion in Virginia.

1681 William Penn gains charter for Pennsylvania

1685 End of reign of Charles II, James II, his brother, assumes the throne. A Catholic, he imposes benefits on Catholics, suspended the Test Act

1685 Invasions by the Duke of Monmouth (at Sedgemoor on June 6) and the Earl of Argyle in Scotland, who were treated in a cruel and heartless manner by Lord Chief Justice George Jeffries who conducted the "bloody assizes".

1686 Dominion of New England established.

1687 James II issues Declaration of Indulgence, granting liberty of worship to his Catholic brethren and other nonconformists. Placed many Catholics in office and in army.

1688. June 10. A son is born to James II, which threatens to continue the Catholic Stuart reign. Secret negotiations with William of Orange. Second Declaration of Indulgence issued. William of Orange invades in Nov. 1688 with 14,000 men and starts The Glorious Revolution, and Dartmouth allows fleet to land unopposed at Torbay, and advanced toward London. James II was allowed to flee to France, and Parliament declared his abdication.

1689 Battle of Killiecrankie.

1689-1702 William III (of Orange) and Mary crowned as joint sovereigns under constitutional limits. A Toleration Act softened intolerance but did not eliminate it, and still recognized the dominance of the Anglican Church. (Mary died 1694)

1689 When Bostonians heard of overthrow of James II they rebelled against his Governor, Andros. William abolished Dominion of New England and realigned the colonies. New Yorkers drove Nicholson into exile.

1690 Battle of Boyne. See Battle of Beach Head.

1691. Lord Baltimore overthrown. Act of Toleration repealed in Maryland. Catholics deprived of political rights and forbidden to hold services except in private homes. (May have applied to other non-Anglicans)

1694 Queen Mary dies, leaving William of Orange to rule alone.

1702 William III dies. Anne ascends the throne.

1702-1714 Reign of Queen Anne

1707 Act of Union between Scotland and England, forming Great Britain.

1732 Georgia chartered as a colony.

1765 James Watt develops the steam engine.

1776 Declaration of Independence. Adam Smith publishes Wealth of Nations.

1793. Louis XVI of France beheaded.

1804 Coronation of Napoleon.

1815 Battle of Waterloo.

1830 July Revolution in France.

1833 Abolition of slavery in British colonies.



1845 Irish famine and great migration.
