Walt,

Thanks for the Bryan family materials.

I really don't know what to think. I do see a lot of similarities and feel my gg-grandfather John Wesley Bryan could be the missing son. The things that get my attention are:

1. Similarity between Hopkins Co. and Hopkinsville, and the birth dates (1813 vs. 1811).
2. The counties where Richard lived and worked, and where Peggy moved after his death. JWB was in every one of them - KY, Barbour Co., Washington Co., Choctaw Co. and Marengo Co. JWB's wife Mary Jane McCarty (daughter of Jacob McCarty) was from Marengo county. I also have a deed for land JWB bought in Montgomery Co. in 1837.
3. Richard's early death. I was surprised at JWB's age on an 1830 land document I have - where he purchased 80 acres of land in Barbour county. He would have only been 17 if born in 1813.
4. One of JWB's children was named Richard.
5. The Wesley book listed in Richard's possessions. Could be the source of JWB's name.

The thing that doesn't fit. My dad has an old cardboard picture of JWB. On the back is handwritten, John Wesley Bryan, Hopkins Co., Kentucky, 1813. I don't know who wrote it, but I have to think it was JWB or someone who knew the information to be true. It was not done by a researcher. The picture was handed down by family. The only explanation is that JWB himself may not have known.

I am sending you a genealogy book I have written, "The Bryans of Leake County". It has all the information I have received from family or found on my own. Some of it is inaccurate and I am fixing that as I go. For example, JWB's first wife died between the 1856 (date of last child from MJM) and 1860. Information I had from family members was that his second wife's name was Lou Wright and that she had five children of her own - Albert, Aldora, Erdell and Rufus. However, the 1860 census shows JWB and an Irena M.J. Bryan (I don't know her last name) were married within the year. None of her children, if any, were listed in the census. Then in the 1870 census, four children born since the 1860 census were listed - Susan, Richard, Sarah and Ariel. I will change this in my book.

One thing I was interested in from your materials is the discourse on the Morgan Bryan family. I am very familiar with this family and have researched it fairly well. I tried to come from that direction and find JWB. Incidentally, I did find two JWB's from that family. One was from Morgan\James\Henry\JWB (born 1808).

However, this JWB had a different spouse. Another JWB was from the Morgan\Thomas\Morgan H.\JWB (born abt. 1811-1813). I have not found this JWB's spouse's name yet.

Your materials show Rebecca Bryan as a daughter of Morgan Bryan and Martha Strode. She is however, a daughter of their oldest son, Joseph Bryan. I notice the Mormons have this mistake in their materials also. However, the Draper papers and other more authentic documents (such as the records from Samuel Bryan - son of Morgan given by his wife in application for pension) have it as I have stated. This information is in the series of articles published in the Lexington Herald 1912, on the Bryan family. The Morgan Bryan family is of Quaker heritage and first settled near Reading PA. There are several versions of how they got there. Your version is another. All versions I have seen start with Bryan, king of all Ireland, dethroned by the English, escaped to Denmark, married a Dane, a later generation, William Smith Bryan, returned to reclaim heritage, got kicked out again, returned to Denmark and his son, Morgan and two brothers came to America, met Martha Strode on the way over and married her shortly after getting to PA. From most versions, the Morgan Bryan family moved from PA to VA along with other Quaker families. Then, they moved to the Yadkin Valley of NC. Two years after moving there, Squire Boone moved his family there and were the nearest neighbors. Daniel and his brother Edward married Bryan girls, and as you report, William married Mary Boone.

My folks, like yours used Bryan / Bryant at different times. The early deed records of JWB in AL show his name as Bryan. In the legal records of the will of Jacob McCarty, the name is Bryan. In the census records of JWB, 1850 shows Bryon; 1860 Bryant, and 1870 Bryant. My grandfather used Bryant. One of my uncles used Bryant. The others used Bryan.

I am grateful for your information and would appreciate any further revelations. I will also stay in touch if I learn anything. Thanks.

I recently met Sue Mortenson from Pittsburg at a genealogical seminar and she informed me that you have written a book on the Holliman-Hollyman family.

The original Hollyman book left me hanging in mid-air since I am descended from James Grantson Holliman served as a Pvt. in the Revolution from Johnston Co., NC, and migrated to Lancaster Co., SC about 1793 according to his Revolutionary War Pension Application. I suspect his father was Samuel Holliman who lived in Johnston County, NC, but was on the line when Dobbs County was formed. He would have died in Dobbs County, for which there seem to be few records.

As you know, George Holliman was never able to connect the North Carolina Hollimans to Christopher and his bunch in VA, and I have enjoyed the same problem. Perhaps you have talked with Dr. Charles Holliman of Raleigh, who helped with the first book, and who probably knows as much as anyone, but feels he is old enough that he no longer needs to cite sources.

If you ever need information on James of NC/SC, or any of his descendants, most of whom came to Alabama about 1832, let me know.

I understand that you are descended from a John Curtis who was born in Charleston, SC 1790, and wondered if any of your research might have revealed the parents of my ancestor, John Alexander Curtis. I have never found any records in SC which were of any value in establishing their parentage. Dr. James moved to MS by 1840, and John was there before 1850. They were partners in the Columbus Hotel, also known as the Curtis Hotel, and John served as a private in the Civil War, dying soon after and leaving a year old daughter, who was my Grandmother. The SC census have been of little help, but Charleston seems to be the most likely birthplace.
